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## Pike Shop Provides Employment, Opportunity To Help During Pandemic

Behind the walls at the Pike Shop in Bowling Green lies really hard working team members in charge of several different contracted jobs.

Through Speed Commerce in Louisiana the Pike Shop has been assembling synthetic fertilizer grow boxes for Garden Patch of St. Petersburg, Fla., to the tune of 3,400 per day.

There are seven to eight people who work on the line for assembling the packets. First the burlap covering is hit twice with a hot glue gun operated by Assistant Director Lisa Lovell. Following that step Sam Rowe, John Prince, supervisor; Kenny McCafferty, Justin McCurdy, Matt Perkins, supervisor and Jermaine Davis each take their turn make each fertilizer grow box whether it be placing the fertilizer packet on the hot glue, wrapping an instruction paper around the burlap and fertilizer to putting them in clear plastic bags and finally sealing the bag.

The team members also bags organic fertilizer in one-pound green bags that are sealed and wrapped in burlap with instructions. The bags are then sealed and labels are applied before being shipped to Speed Commerce for Garden Patch.

These two jobs last from December to June each year.

On to a different job the Pike Shop employees Russell Trierweiler and Wendy Hull scoop enough to make one-pound bags of dolomite lime. The weight has to be within one gram of the pound to meet the requirements. These bags are then sent to the sealer Christina Spears. The two fillers average 900 bags each per day.

Trierweiler and Hull also work at the Pike Resale Shop.

During the COVID-19 pandemic they have worked at the Pike Shop after a two-week shut down. Marilyn McCrory who is the manager of the resale shop also works on various jobs at the Pike Shop.

Another recently acquired job is helping to assemble 3M respirator masks. The Pike Shop is governed by DESE (Department of Elementary and Secondary Education). DESE emailed all sheltered workshops state-wide trying to get help with the assembly of the masks. Lovell and Pike Shop Director Julie Moore traveled to Mexico to the Handi-Shop to observe the assembly process following the two weeks off. After deciding their team members were up to the challenge they brought 15,000 mask pieces back for assembly by Pike Shop team members Tim Thompson, Dayton Dwyer, and Corey Carroll. They have finished the first 15,000 masks and are working on the next 15,000 with a contract for 40,000 more.

The Weaver Company of Columbia contracted the work to the sheltered workshop. The process to making the masks ready to ship includes attaching the elastic ear straps to the plastic frame and packing them into a box of 500 before being shipped back to Columbia to have the final pieces attached before delivery to customers.

Dura Flex from High Hill has contracted with the Pike Shop to assemble

## Pike County Health Department Addresses Community Spread Of COVID-19 In Pike County

Pike County has now seen evidence of community spread of COVID-19 in two cases.

Community spread means people have been infected in an area (such as a county), including some who are not sure how or where they became infected. Pike County Health Department staff has begun contact investigations and notifications regarding these two cases. Any close contacts of positive cases will be contacted individually.

These community spread cases highlight the extreme importance of social distancing and following the recommended guidelines to stay safe including avoiding social gatherings of more than 10 people and staying home whenever possible. If individuals must go out for essential activities, such as work or getting supplies, they shall keep a distance of 6 feet from others, wear face coverings and practice proper hygiene. Other essential activities include engaging in tasks essential to health.

Close contacts are considered those who were within 6 feet with no face coverings for more than 10 minutes and up to 48 hours of when the positive case developed symptoms. It is unnecessary to list itineraries for cases where close contacts are able to be identified throughout the investigation process. Thus far, all case investigations have been able to identify all close contacts. At a time where a positive case would

have been in a public setting with close contact of unknown individuals would be when the listing of an itinerary would become potentially necessary to ensure public safety.

At this time there are two cases that are hospitalized and the others are/were in in-home isolation.

Residents can expect weekday case count updates at 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. Case counts can be found on the Pike County Health Department website, Facebook and Twitter pages. Because Missouri's numbers have grown, the state lab is only sending positive results. Pike County Health Department will only be providing the updated total number of positives in the county each day and are unable to list accurate numbers for pending cases or nega-

tive results.

As of press time on Monday, May 4 Pike County is reporting five active cases for a total of 11 cases county wide during the pandemic.

Audrain County reports one case that has recovered.

## Area High Schools Prepare For Semi-Traditional Graduation Ceremonies

As the state prepares to open back up, area high schools have set dates for the 2020 graduation ceremonies.

Just as it appeared that virtual ceremonies would be the only option seniors, an announcement from Bowling Green R-I offered some hope.

A tentative date for traditional graduation has been set for June 5 according to a message sent out by the high school and posted to their social media. Although there will be some precautions set in place.

"The announcement by Governor Mike Parson on Monday relaxing some state restrictions has allowed our administration to set a tentative date for a traditional graduation on June 5," the high school stated in a message sent out and posted on their social media last Thursday.

"This date was picked based on recommendations from the Pike County Health Department but was tempered by the knowledge that there has been some recent community spread of the COVID-19 virus in our county. Continued social distancing guidelines means that the graduates will most likely receive only a very limited number of tickets for guests. That number may be as low as two. The June 5 date is still very fluid and conditional on our county's health situation, but we felt it was prudent to set a date in order

to give families ample time to prepare."

The school will attempt to live stream the graduation for anyone unable to attend in person. It will also continue with the previously planned virtual ceremony for graduates who are leaving for military service before the June 5 date.

"Even by changing graduation to June 5, not all graduates will be able to attend; we respect these students' choice to defend our nation and will try to create a memory through the prerecorded video. The video will also serve as a safeguard in case our county's health situation deteriorates and attempts to reschedule the graduation fail."

On May 4 seniors had a chance to pick up their caps and gowns, clear out lockers, and receive a yard sign. They were also honored with a parking lot parade as faculty waved and honked from cars to say farewell.

Bowling Green staff are also coordinating with seniors to video them walking across the stage in 5-minute intervals for the virtual ceremony. Seniors will need to schedule a time to walk by calling the high school office.

Dates and times are May 5 (8 a.m.-noon), May 6 (1-5 p.m.), and May 7 (10 a.m.-2 p.m.). Seniors will need to schedule their time

## Pike County Anticipates \$2,147,190 From CARES Act

On March 27 Congress passed and President Trump signed into law the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act). The CARES Act established the Coronavirus Relief Fund and appropriated \$150 billion to the Coronavirus Relief Fund. Under the CARES Act, the funds are to be used to make payments for specific uses to states and certain local governments. The United States Department of Treasury issued guidance on April 22 regarding the use of the funds for state, territorial, local, and tribal governments. On April 28 Pike County received information and guidance from the

office of the Missouri State Treasurer regarding the distribution of certain CARES Act funds from the State of Missouri to Pike County. The treasurer's office has requested Pike County to review, approve, sign, and return a certification for payment by Friday, May 1, 2020 based on the guidance issued by the state treasurer. Based on the calculations and estimates by the state treasurer, Pike County anticipates receiving \$2,147,190 in funds from the CARES Act. The county anticipates receipt of the CARES Act funds on or about Wednesday, May 6, 2020. Pike County will utilize the guidelines provided by the United States Treasury and the State of Mis-

ouri in making determinations about the use, including allocation and award of the funds received under the CARES Act, Pike County is in the process of reviewing the CARES Act requirements and guidelines issued by the treasury and will develop policies addressing issues related to the next anticipated steps in this process, including who can apply to review these funds and the process and requirements for doing so. Further information regarding Pike County's allocation and distribution of CARES Act funds will be made available to the public as more information is gathered.

ments of a typical graduation. BGHS plans to provide the picture and the video to seniors free of charge. They have decided to ask that only the graduates enter the school for the video and photograph, otherwise, they will be exposing its staff and volunteers to literally hundreds of people. If you need someone to fix your hair or garments, please have them remain in the parking lot. Any community spread of the virus related to school during May might jeopardize our chances of holding the rescheduled graduation in June. As of press time, no information was available on plans for Clopton High School. The People's Tribune will post updates on its website and Facebook as information becomes available. Louisiana High School has set a tentative date for June 19 for their traditional ceremony. Planning for the ceremony appears still in the early stages and the nature of COVID-19 in the area makes the situation fluid. Silcox principal Rod Hamlett confirmed in a message to The People's Tribune they would hold graduation ceremony July 10 at 7 p.m. Van-Far is planning on holding a ceremony for seniors and parents on June 6 at 6:30 p.m. The ceremony will be held on their football field with a rain day for June 7 at 6:30 p.m. The school is planning with safety in mind for everyone while still allowing the graduating seniors a chance for a semi-traditional ceremony. If rained out for both days, the school will utilize the virtual ceremony they are currently working on.

As for the virtual ceremony, school officials sent a message to seniors via their school emails requesting they schedule a time for pictures and a video to prepare for the virtual graduation if they would happen to need it due to weather. Dates to sign up will be on May 13 and 14. May 13 will be from 12-4 p.m., and the May 14 from 1-5 p.m. Students will sign up for 10-minute time slots. Students will have a photo on the stage. "A parent is also welcome to come in with the student at the designated time if you'd like to take a picture of your own. We ask that just one parent or guardian taking the photo enter with the senior so that we can continue to keep everyone healthy and be able to proceed with a traditional graduation as scheduled, as well as it will assist us in maintaining the time schedule." The message from Van-Far officials also notified seniors of when they could pick up their cap and gowns and finalize any business with the school. Parents and seniors are encouraged to contact their respective school offices for more information.

## NECAC Observing Community Action Month

With the ongoing coronavirus outbreak, the North East Community Action Corporation (NECAC) is showcasing programs that can help during the May observance of National Community Action Month in Pike County.

NECAC is a 12-county area not-for-profit social service, community health and public housing agency that delivers more than 60 programs to qualifying low-income, elderly, youth, disabled and disadvantaged clients and earns its revenues through contracts and grants with federal, state and local governments, private businesses and other non-profit organizations. The Bowling Green-based agency has 95 full-time and more than 200 part-time employees, and currently operates a budget of more than \$26 million.

Two of the programs that can help during the pandemic are utility assistance and job skills information.

Because of COVID-19, the deadline to apply for the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) in Missouri has been extended to May 31. NECAC and other non-profits contract with the state to administer the federally-funded program at the local level. LIHEAP can pay part of the energy bills of income-qualifying people. Eligible households could receive a minimum of \$47 up to a maximum of \$495, depending upon income, household size and type of heating source. Payments are made directly to utility companies.

Job skills information also is being offered. The classwork includes information about writing a resume, preparing for an interview and standing out among a crowd of applicants. In addition, skills such as communication, teamwork, problem-solving, time management, use of technology and employee responsibility are discussed.

NECAC President and Chief Executive Officer Don Patrick said Community Action programs and services continue to help improve the lives of thousands of people.

"We are pleased to join Community Action Agencies across the United States, especially during the COVID-19 outbreak, in observing more than five decades of helping people and changing lives," Patrick said. "This is a time when we can

highlight the important social service, community health and public housing programs that we administer and deliver to those who need our services."

Other common Community Action programs include housing rent-assistance, homeownership, home weatherization and repairs, affordable housing, senior and family apartment developments, family planning health services, in-home senior care services and county outreach programs.

NECAC is governed by a 36-member volunteer Board of Directors. Fred Vahle of Warrenton is the chairman. Serving from Pike County are Justin Sheppard and D. Randall Cone of Louisiana and Curt Mitchell of Clarksville.

She loved to work and had various jobs throughout her life, A&P, IGA, West End Market, Holman's Market, Terrace Motel and Sears just to name a few. She was also a wonderful seamstress and had a custom sewing business for a time. She and Guy were ever the entrepreneurs - while working full time they always had a side business they were working on, such as delivering the St. Louis papers and even raising chinchilla mink in the attic.

Along with Steve and Judy, they owned and operated King's Liquor and Package Store at two locations and later started the first convenience store in Bowling Green. What is now Crossroads started from a full service Texaco filling station. One evening while Irene was working alone, a young man came in with a shotgun and demanded money. Irene was able to convince the young man not to ruin his life by doing this and if he would leave she wouldn't call the police. The young man left.

After selling Crossroads, Guy and Irene opened a convenience store in Middletown and lived there until the store burned. They returned to Bowling Green and purchased Crossroads again. After a few years they sold it again and both retired.

After retiring, Irene worked for the Green Thumb program at the NECAC office in Bowling Green. After retiring from there, she worked at DiDi & GiGi's Boutique until its close. Irene was 84 at the time. Never one to be idle, she did volunteer work for Pike County Home Health and Hospice until her fall in January 2020. She loved working and talking to people.

She loved her family and friends, she had an infectious laugh, she was impatient and opinionated, she loved to play pitch and dance, and she was an incredible cook. A family and friend favorite was her fried chicken. It was even suggested she start a fried chicken stand.

They will review these guidelines regularly and communicate changes through email, the website and social media to meet federal,

state and local guidelines. The staff will continue providing virtual resources for members who are still sheltering at home. Phase 2 openings will be announced when further restrictions have been reduced to allow for more traditional programming and facility usage.

Please be patient as we work through this together. Limitations and change often lead to frustration. The team is here for everyone, ready to help relieve daily stress and enhance your physical, mental, and spiritual health, and well-being.

semble cardboard corner posts. The cardboard comes in flat and following glue being applied each piece is folded to make the finished post. This job was acquired several years ago. Eventually the posts are shipped to True Manufacturing for the assembly of boxes to ship various re-

frigerator type machines. Along with the corner posts, they assemble foam shipping boxes for car axels. Approximately 15 pallets a week are made with 112 pieces on each pallet.

**Why are there contaminants in my water?**  
Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk.
