NECAC One Of Only Four National Grant Recipients The not-for-profit North East homeownership." ing Center, which Sheriff John Cot-

Community Action Corporation (NECAC) is one of only four recipients nationwide of a grant from the Local Initiatives Support Corpora-

The two-year, \$70,000 LISC Safety and Justice funding will be used for administration of the NECAC Aspire Partnership Small Homes program, which kicked off July 9. One-bedroomhomes will be built by inmates at the Lincoln County Jail and sold by NECAC in Missouri, Illinois and Iowa. LISC is a non-profit financial institution that supports community development initiatives nationally.

"We welcome this grant as part of Aspire Partnership," said NECAC Deputy Director for Housing Development Programs Carla Potts. "We will soon begin building houses andhelping more of our neighbors achieve the dream of

Aspire was developed by NECAC, and is modeled after a similar project in South Dakota. Lincoln County Jail inmates will build 612square-foot houses with instruction from the Carpenters Union District Council of Greater St. Louis.

Residents of Missouri, Illinois and Iowa may buy the homes for around \$37,000 through NECAC. Buyers must work with the agency to secure a loan or get one on their own. Financialassistance through the U.S. Department of Agriculture's 502 Direct Loan Program may be available.

The \$37,000 cost does not include land, transportation from the jail to the home site or a foundation. Buyers must have a lot that is locally zoned for a small home and payany utility or sighting costs.

The houses will be built at the Lincoln County Jail's Inmate Train-

tle opened in 2019 with the goal of reducing recidivism and providingprisoners with workforce skills they can use to get a job upon release. In the past, the volunteer inmates have worked with non-profit organizations and completed several local projects.

The union will use the International Brotherhood of Carpenters Career Connections Carpentry curriculum in training the inmates, who will receive classroom and hands-on instruction. Upon completion, inmates will have an opportunity to receive and industry recognized credential, which is a state or federally-approved designation awarded to someone who has shown proficiencies in technical skills associated with the program.

Area Schools Plan Aug. 24-25 Start

Last week, area schools laid out plans 4 to start of the 2020-2021 school year. Those plans include detailed lists of how the schools intend to mitigate potential COVID-19 ex-

posure. The schools are asking for patience, cooperation, and flexibility as they work with the Pike County Health Department to provide a safe learning and working environment

for students and staff. "I feel that since we had a very successful full length, in-person summer school, and graduation ceremonies with mitigation practices in place, we have confidence moving forward with the regular start date of August 24th," Bowling Green Superintendent, Dr.Matt Frederickson noted in his letter to students' families. "This has been difficult as the situation surrounding COVID-19 changes daily, if not hourly, at the local, state, and federal levels. Again, these adjustments have been made based on the best guidancefrom our local health department."

Louisiana Superintendent, Dr. Todd Smith echoed those sentiments in his letter addressed to R-II fami-

'Creation of this plan has been developed with the latest resources available – and as we all know, things are changing daily. Our plan must be flexible as well," Smith said in his letter. "We have made our best effort to balance local direction with state and national guidelines.'

"As you know, this year has been unlike any other. It has now been 130 days since we have seen our students,

and we are doing everything we can ensure that they are safe upon our return in August," Silex's Superintendent, Rod Hamlett, said in his update beforethe districts Aug.25 reopening.

The safety of our students and staff is our [number] one priority."

As of the time of this writing, Van-Far had recently finished surveying families. Both Van-Far and Clopton had not released their return to school

Students and families can expect changes in how each school handles how to mitigate COVID-19 exposure with social distancing and daily

Before entering both Bowling Green and Louisiana schools, students and families will be required to use daily self-screening forms provided by the schools along with checklists. All the area school districts are asking that students stay home if they exhibitany symptoms.

While Louisiana will not be taking temperatures at the door, any student exhibiting symptoms may be screened as recommended by the Health Dept and CDC.

Bowling Green staff and students should plan for daily temperature checks at the entrance of the school buildings.

"A temperature of 100.4 degrees or higher will require the individual to be isolated and sent home," according to Dr. Frederickson. "Students and staff who are home with a fever must be fever-free for 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medications and may return to school with a doctor's note with a diagnosis

Pike County has received a \$1.5 million grant from the Economic Development Administration(EDA) to Pike County. The grant will create a bypass around the southern part of the City of Louisiana, enabling motorists to avoid Highway 79 which closes whenever a flood occurs.

impacts it has when critical roads get shutdown. This grant ensures people can still go about their lives when the next flood hits, so that farmers can still get grain to the elevator, businesses can continue operating and workers can safely get to their jobs. I'm thankful that the Trump Administration continues to recognize the challenges our rural communities face. The grant will provide major improvements to Pike County Road 251, which is currently used as an alternate route during flooding. The road saw a 360 percent increase in

traffic during the Flood of 2019. However, the narrow gravel road is not built to handle a heavy amount of traffic or large loads.

Improvements will include widening and paving the road which will provide a safe and reliable route to use during flooding.

The EDA grant, to be matched with \$376,393 in local investment, is expected to retain nearly 40 jobs. The project is funded by the Additional Supplemental Appropriations for Disaster Relief Act of 2019, which Graves supported. That bill provided EDA with \$600 million in additional Economic Adjustment Assistance (EAA) Program funds for the Flood of 2019 and other dis-







Hammerhead Worm Kills Earthworms

By Linda Geist, MU Extension writer Some Missouri gardeners are finding a new type of flatworm in landscape soils. The hammerhead worm is a "voracious, top-level predator," says University of Missouri Extension horticulturist Kelly McGowan. "It will eat anything in its path," she says. It primarily feeds on native earthworms.

Not much is known about the hammerhead worm, which belongs to a family of flatworms called land planarians. The worm gets its nickname from the blunt shape of its head. McGowan says itseffect on soil fertility and nutrient cycling remains unknown. It is soft and flat and bears striping in different colors. It likes dark, cool, moist areas and moves and feeds mostly at night.

Not only is it deadly to earthworms, it leaves a nasty trail of mucus and excrement that helps it glide along. It produces sexually by laying eggs and asexually by fragmenting and growing new heads and tails when cut into pieces. McGowan says the hammer-head worm likely hitchhiked to Missouri in potted nursery plants.

It is small and difficult to see in potting soil but can grow to several inches long. Mc-Gowan suggests putting the soil in a wheel-barrow and looking for the flat worms. No known treatmentsexist, but gardeners can rid the soil of these predators by heating the soil to 93 degrees for five minutes. They survive freezing temperatures. Its one good quality is that it preys on slugs.

Mow High To Keep Weeds Under Control BY LINDA GEIST, WRITER, weeds. As grasses grow, there is less that clump, says Miller.

MU EXTENSION

Use your mower's highest setting for fewer weeds and lusher grass. University of Missouri Extension turf pathologist Lee Miller says mowing too low is a common mistake. "We want your grassto be the trees of your lawn," he says. "Your feet should sink into the grass." Miller says more than 10 separate studies since 1958 have found a direct correlation between mowing heights below 3.5 inches and substantial increases of weeds such as dandelion, white clover and crabgrass for tall fescue and Kentucky bluegrass lawns.

Mowing grasses to their optimal height—3 1/2 to 4 inches for tall fescue and Kentucky bluegrass, including mixes; and 1-2 inches for zoysiagrass-gives them a competitive advantage over weeds. Cutting high keeps sunlight and heat from

room for weeds to grow. In short, a weed in need is a good thing. "The current bank of weed seeds in your lawn needs sunlight to heat the soil surface for germination and aid youngseedlings in growth," says Miller. "Growing Kentucky bluegrass or tall fescue tall robs them of sunlight and prevents weeds from establishing and competing for turf."

When weeds cannot grow, turfgrass roots get more room to spread and become more dense. The more leaf a plant has now, the more sunlight it can harvest and the more food it can make for itself.When temperatures rise in summer, grasses face intense stress from heat, drought and disease. Giving grasses ample leaf tissue helps them withstand that stress.

For a healthier and more attractive lawn, never mow more than a third of the leaf and avoid clippings

Mow often to avoid taking off too much at one time, but make sure the grass is actively growing when you do so. "We often see a lack of growth and turfgrass dormancy during drought and hightemperatures," he says. "If it isn't growing, you shouldn't be mowing." Conversely, take care when mowing after big rainstorms. Under the weight of a mower, saturated soils can rut and are more easily compacted.

Also, avoid "ring around the collar" trimming – cutting short in areas around roads, sidewalks and lawn margins. Scalped areas become a hot spot for weeds, particularly foxtails and crabgrass, which will soak up the extra heat from the asphalt and quickly outgrow scalped turfgrass.

Tips On Watering Your Garden How does your garden grow? No grow allow the soil to remain wet 6-8 inches edu/g6950 for more information.

How does your garden grow? No grow or slow grow? It could be your H2O.

How and when you water your garden often makes the difference between healthy or diseased plants, says University of Missouri Extension horticulturist Tom

Fowler offers some simple watering tips that can provide a bushel of benefits.

First, water at the right time for the best

results. Watering in the morning allows leaves to dry if they get wet. If watered at night, plant foliage stays wet longer.

Secondly, do not spray water on leaves. Try to water only in the root zone. Wet leaves create an environment where diseases, especially fungi, thrive.

Give your plants' roots a good soaking. Light, daily watering creates shallow root systems. Long, less frequent waterings

below the surface. Fowler suggests keeping a long screwdriver or similar device near your garden spot. If the screwdriver tip easily penetrates six inches or so into

the soil, it is watered enough.

Drip or trickle irrigation also provide good results in home gardens, Fowler says. Watering by hand allows water to go only where needed.

Water during dry spells and during critical plant development stages such as

Most Missouri gardens need about

one-three inches of water per week. Finally, Fowler recommends soil testing to determine your garden's nutrient needs. See the MU Extension publication "Steps in Fertilizing Garden Soil: Vegetables and Annual Flowers" at extension2.missouri.

Fowler shares other gardening basics: •Choose your garden site well. Garden plants need 6-8 hours of sunlight daily. Plants prefer morning to early afternoon sunlight.

•Avoid locating gardens near trees. Tree roots can extend 30 feet or more and take water and nutrients that garden plants need. Walnut and pecan trees produce a chemical that causes wilt in some fruits and vegetables.

Gardens should slope to allow proper

surface runoff and subsoil drainage. • Locate gardens near water sources to avoid carrying water or running long hoses.



July Gardening **Tips From Botanical Garden**

Ornamentals

·Continue to pinch mums until mid-July. Pinching after this may delay flowering.

·Deadhead perennials (remove dead flowers) that have finished blooming.

·Prune climbing roses and rambler roses after bloom.

·Spider mites may be a problem during hot, dry weather. Leaves will become speckled above and yellowed below. Evergreen needles appear dull gray-green to yellow or

·Water newly planted trees and shrubs thoroughly at least once a week.

·Fertilize trees and shrubs by July 4. Late fertilizing may cause lush growth that is more prone to winter kill.

·Black Spot may be a problem on roses. Remove and pick up infected leaves and spray fungicides as needed.

·Powdery mildew may be found on lilacs. It is rarely harmful and shrubs grown in full sun are less susceptible.

·Divide irises now. **Vegetables**

·Blossom end rot of tomatoes and peppers may become a problem. Maintain soil moisture and do not let soils dry out. Place a layer of mulch 2-3 inches thick around ·Keep weeding! Prevent weeds

from going to seed.

·Dig potatoes when the tops die. Plant fall potatoes by July 15th.

·Harvest onion and garlic when the tops turn brown.

· Keep cucumbers well-watered. Drought condition will cause bitter

·Sow seeds of carrots, beets, turnips, and winter radish for fall harvest the last week of July. Also set out broccoli, cabbage, and cauliflower transplants for the fall garden at this time.

Fruit

·Protect grapes from birds! ·Prune out old fruiting canes of raspberries after harvest is complete.

Apply second spray to trunks of peach trees for peach borers.

·Early peach varieties ripen now. ·Blackberries will begin to ripen

Turf

·Water lawn frequently enough to prevent wilting. Early morning irrigation allows turf to dry before nightfall and will reduce the chance of disease.

·Monitor lawns for newly hatched white grubs. If damage is occurring, apply appropriate controls, following product label directions

Sonny Perdue announced last week the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will launch a third round of Farmers to Families Food Box Program purchases with distributions to occur beginning by September 1 with completion by October 31, 2020. The purchases will spend the balance of \$3 billion authorized for the program. So far, over 46 million Farmers to Families Food Boxes have been invoiced and delivered.

"This third round of Farmers to Families Food Box Program purchases is a testament to the great work done by vendors in support of American agriculture and the Amerthat the program is accomplishing what we intended – supporting U.S. farmers and distributors and getting food to those who need it most. It's a real trifecta, which is why we call it a win-win-win," said Secretary Perdue. "The efforts of everyone involved form the backbone of the Farmers to Families Food Box Program and its goal to help fill the hunger gap in all of our communi-

Background:

In this third round of purchases, USDA plans to purchase combination boxes to ensure all recipient organizations have access to fresh produce, dairy products, fluid milk, and meat products.

Eligibility in the third round will be open to entities who can meet the

specifications. Proposals will be expected to illustrate how coverage will be provided to areas identified as opportunity zones, detail subcontracting agreements, and address the "last mile" delivery of product into the hands of the food insecure population.

A notice explaining the solicitation process will be issued in the days to come with a webinar and other educational opportunities provided for those interested in participating.

In the ongoing second round of purchasing and distribution, which

began July 1 and will conclude Aug. 31, 2020, USDA aims to purchase up to \$1.47 billion of food for the program. For the second round, USDA extended contracts of select vendors from the first round of the program worth up to \$1.27 billion. Some contracts were not extended at the vendors' request or reduced based on information provided by the contractor. Additionally, in the second round, USDA approved up to \$202 million in new contracts, via a new acquisition activity, with select vendors whose offers were not previously accepted due to various issues in their proposals. These distributors were selected to increase the focus on Opportunity Zones in order to direct food to reach underserved areas, places where either no boxes have yet been delivered, or where boxes are being delivered but where there is additional need.

The first round of purchases totaling more than \$947 million occurred from May 15 through June 30, 2020.

Continued from front page not related to COVID-19."

Louisiana is requiring the same with the exception that students and staff be fever free for 72 hours without a doctor's note.

As for the use of masks, the school districts differ slightly. Silex is requiring all faculty and staff along with students in grades 4-12 to wear masks while in the school and on buses.

Bowling Green Students in grades 6-12 and staff will need to wear masks anytime they are not able to stay at least three feet from another person - 15 minutes at a time, and during passing times. The R-I district will provide masks to students who cannot affordthem. "Students riding a school bus will need to wear masks," According to the district's letter.

Louisiana's plan states that masks for students are encouraged but not required. The same is stated for bus riders: although encouraged, masks are also not required on buses.

"Please consider having your child wear a mask on the bus," Todd Smith added. "Staff will wear masks anytime they are within 6ft of a student or other staff member.'

The individual school districts have also mirrored each other on the challenges of maintaining social dis-

"We will make our best effort in all aspects of the students' day to maintain social distancing," Smith noted. "Buses will have assigned seating, load from back to front and

we will ask siblings to sit together." Each school district will utilize assigned seating on the bus, but the districts are encouraging families to transport their students to and from the schools due to limited room on the buses.

"Those who live within a mile of school are asked to walk or ride your bike and those who can ride with parents to school are encouraged to do so," Frederickson added in his letter.

In Bowling Green, desks and student workstations will be spaced as far apart as possible. In school gatherings such as assemblies, rallies, school parties, dances, etc., will not be held until further notice.

The Bowling Green Athletic Director is planning to release addidetails regarding tional extra/co-curricular activities based on recent guidance from the Missouri State High School Activities Association.

The schools are also making daily cleaning and sanitation a priority. Louisiana schools will have hand sanitizing stations available and will require students to use them frequently. Staff will receive training on proper sanitation procedures during our pre-openingteacher days. Bus drivers and classroom teachers, along with custodial staff, will clean and disinfect regularly throughout each day.

Both Van-Far and Silex have conducted surveys asking parents how they feel about the return to school. Of 187 responses at Van-Far, nearly 85 percent answered that their child would return to school in a traditional model. 15% said they preferred distance learning.

Silex saw similar results. "We realize not all families will be comfortable sending their student(s) back to the classroom just yet," Rod Hamlett stated. "With this, our administrative team has developed a Return to School Plan that respects and honors theindividual needs of each family."

According to each school district, they are offering virtual learning as an option over returning to the inperson classroom. They ask for an advance notice from families wanting to utilize this option.

'Parents have already had the option to apply for virtual learning options that are considered by the local school principal and counselor starting with the 2019-2020 school year," Dr. Frederickson stated. "This process will continue. Applications for any typeof Remote Learning for the Fall Semester are due by August 14. Once a family chooses this option, the decision will be in place for the entire first semester."

Dr. Smith had a similar message via his letter. "The District is in the process of purchasing enough Chrome books and Tablets for each student to have one to use. Should a student be quarantined, or school closed all together - instruction will be deliveredelectronically," Smith said. "Before the COVID 19 outbreak, Missouri had already required that each District offer an option for virtual education. That option is still in place... Eligibility and appropriateness are determined by the building principal and coun-

Silex schools would like to be notified by Aug. 3 for students opting for virtual learning.

Students tested positive for COVID-19 after school starts will have to utilize virtual learning until cleared to return.



Need Hunter Education? MDC Options

With hunting seasons coming up for deer, turkey, migratory birds, waterfowl, and other game, the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) encourages Missouri hunters who need hunter education to get it early.

Those hunting in Missouri during a firearms season or acting as an adult mentor to another hunter must have hunter-education certification, unless exempt. Exemptions include:

•Hunters age 15 years or younger who will be hunting with an adult mentor age 18 years or older who is certified in hunter education or exempt.

•Hunters born before Jan. 1, 1967. •Hunters with a disability exemption

•Hunters age 16 years or older who have purchased an Apprentice Hunter Authorization and will be hunting with a properly permitted adult mentor age 18 years or older.

•Hunters who are landowners hunting on land they own.

•Hunters who can prove completion of an approved hunter-education course in another state.

MDC offers two hunter-education options: a Blended Format and an All-Online Format.

The Blended Format has two parts. The knowledge portion provides information to participants on all aspects of hunter education and can be taken online, through a free self-study guide, or in a classroom setting. Participants must also complete a four-hour skills session that includes a multiple-choice final exam. The skills portion is a hands-on demonstration of skills learned by participants. Participants must complete and pass both portions to earn certifica-

The All-Online Format may be completed by Missouri residents 16 years of age and older. It consists of an online course and requires a fee paid to the online course provider. The All Online option requires the passing of a final exam but has no skills portion.

To help keep participants, instructors, and others safe during the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, MDC will limit inperson class sizes to small numbers of participants. Class availability will also be limited due to smaller class sizes and

limited availability of venues. Social distancing will be required. Masks will not be provided. MDC will abide by applicable local health requirements and strongly encourages participants to bring and wear masks. Hand sanitizer will be available to participants.

MDC reminds the public that it is still critical to continue to heed all COVID-19 public-health measures during outdoor activities, such as physical distancing, avoiding overcrowding, handwashing, and others.

Follow the food. That is the mantra of moles as they follow their favorite food, earthworms, and tunnel throughout your yard. A molehill creates an upheaval of soil surrounding a verticaltunnel shaft, which often occurs after big rains, that is an exit point for moles to get some air, says University of Missouri Extension turf pathologist Lee Miller. Both tunnels and molehills can trap falling worms and serve as fastfood drive-thru lanesfor moles.

These pesky mammals usually do most of their furrowing and burrowing in spring and fall, but excess rainfall can trigger ac-tivity at other times. Moles alternate between sleeping and beingactive every two hours, but do not mistake them as sluggish. The velvety creatures are lightning fast, Miller says. They are voracious eaters, consuming 75-80 percent of their body weight daily. Their strong forepaws have an extra thumb, and they can dig a foota minute when in hot pursuit of food.

Moles are often maligned for destroying flowers and ornamentals. Actually, the damage comes from their tunnels, which can expose roots to air, causing them to dry and die, says Miller. Somehomeowners try in vain to rid their lawns of moles by applying grub control insecticides, thereby de-priving moles of food, but earthworms are their main food source.

Three main controls exist for moles, Miller says. The key to all of them is to find active runways. Take a wooden dowel or stick and collapse a number of areas along the runway system, flaggingthem to track their location. Remember that moles feed and rest in two-hour cycles, so check back in three to four hours for areas that mole activity has pushed upward. Place controls

along these active runways.

1. Repellents. Give the moles to your neighbor. Many repellents sold at nurseries and garden centers contain castor bean oil. Control can last one to three months, but rain or irrigationoften shortens control. Follow label directions.

2. Baits. These prove effective, particularly ones that are shaped—and some even claim to be flavored—like earthworms. Wear rubber gloves when handling to protect yourself and avoid puttingyour own scent on the bait. Keep children and pets away from the rodenticide. Follow label directions carefully.

3. Trapping. This remains the most effective and efficient means of control. Several trap types exist. Among the more effective types are scissor-type traps. They can be stepped on to opentrap along the runway. A plate on top enables the scissors to snap shut when the mole pushes soil back up against it.

EXTENSION Vegetables: If hot, dry weather is making it difficult to grow vegetables, provide plenty of moisture and use straw mulch around plants. Keep gardens weeded so weeds are not competing with vegetable plants and flowers for moisture. Weeds attract insects, so another good reason to keep the garden weeded. Knowing when to harvest sweet corn and vine crops like watermelon can be tricky. Corn is ready for harvest when silks begin to turn brown anddry. After silks are mostly brown, pick out a thicker ear from a row. Peel back the husk to get a peek at the kernels and see if it is ready to pick. Okra grows quick, and should be picked daily. Pick okra pods when they are 2 to 3 inches long. Watermelonshould be harvested when the underside of fruit turns from whitish to yellowish. Do not pick winter squash too early. Butternut, spaghetti, acorn and other winter squashes should be picked whenever the fruits have turned a deep, solid

or white areas on your berries, this is a type of solar injury, which usually occurs under hot, dry conditions. Solar injury is caused from ultravioletradiation from the sun that appears when there has been an abrupt increase in temperature along with a drop in humidity. Keep your plants well irrigated and if this is a problem, try using a shade cloth to provide some protection. Grapes start to ripen in July in northern Missouri. As grapes ripen, sugar, color and pH increase, although, sugars accumulate more and grapes tend to be sweeter during dry, hot weather. Summer rains can delay sugar accumulation. Water increases berry size and dilutes the juice inthe berry reducing the sugar. Cloudy days reduce photosynthesis and the production of sugar. In order to avoid the birds beating you to them, use netting to protect ripening clusters.

Ornamentals: Butterflies need both a nectar and larvae source. Bright colored flowers that are tubular hold the most nectar and are attractive to hummingbirds. Through the years, I havetried many butterfly and hummingbirds plants in my gardens. Zinnias, are one of my favorite garden flowers. They tolerate heat and dry conditions fairly well. They make excellent cut flowers to arrange and bring into the home. I grow both 'California Giant' and 'Profusion' zinnias, which have become

directly planted in a garden bed or border. Lantana is an annual flower that blooms profuselyfrom May until the first hard freeze, which is usually late October or early November. Cleome also known as spider flower, petunias, impatiens, parsley, dill and fennel are just a few of the annuals that attract butterflies, their larvae, and also hummingbirds. Columbine, cardinal flower, coreopsis, coneflower, yarrow, goldenrod and aster are just a few perennial plants that attract butterflies and hummingbirds. Butterfly and hummingbird gardens also need rocks so butterflies can rest and soak up the sunshine, birdfeeders (leave out the red food coloring for the hummingbirds) and bird baths as a water source. Disease, Disorders and Insects: Be on

the watch for Japanese beetles. Japanese beetles feed on the leaves, flowers or fruit of more than 300 species of plants. They were first found in the United States in 1916 in a nursery in New Jersey. They are native to Japan, where their natural enemies keep their populations in check and they are not a serious plant pest. In the United States, however, the beetle does not have any nat-ural enemies. It founda favorable climate with an abundant food supply. Hand pick and place in a bucket of soapy water.

Cucumber beetles and Squash bugs are a pest on cucurbit crops. Companion

planting with various herbs and flowers, like marigolds, help repel them to some extent. Their populations tend todecline as fall approaches. Diseases like Septoria Leaf Spot and Early Blight may be a problem on tomatoes from improper watering practices or if there has been a lot of rainfall. Replenish straw mulch under each tomato plant by mid-summer, take off leavestouching the ground, and if necessary spray the plants with a fungicide containing 'chlorothalonil'. Be sure to follow label directions and observe the pre and post-harvest intervals. Blossom end rot is a tomato disorder that may appear in hot, dry weather. A lack of calcium in the soil or more likely inefficient uptake of calcium by the plant is the culprit. Cucumber plants that are stressed from lack of water or heat may produce bitter fruit. Keep all vegetable plants well-watered and mulched to hold in moisture.

Trees and Shrubs: Shade trees can provide much enjoyment during the summer months and create fond memories. I remember climbing the mimosa tree in my grandparent's yard, and picking thepink flowers off of it. Mimosa trees do not grow well here in northeast Missouri, and I miss seeing mimosa trees during the summer. I also remember a big, old American Elm tree in our backyard in Texas county and having picnics with my sisters under that oldtree. Unfortunately, Dutch Elm disease killed it in the 1980s.
