## McCurdy Recognized With Governor's Heroism Award

Last month, Governor Parson recognized Lloyd McCurdy as the 2019 Heroism Award of Distinction recipient.

McCurdy, a stationary engineer at Women's Eastern Reception & Diagnostic Center (WERDCC).

He along with other recipients for 2019 and 2020 distinction awards were recently recognized after COVID-19 forced delays in the planned ceremonies.

"I am honored to recognize you," Governor Parson said in a video to McCurdy and other award recipients. "Your contributions to Missouri go above and beyond normal job responsibilities. You serve as an inspiration for others to follow."

Along with the governor's award, McCurdy also received the Missouri Department of Corrections Director's Award for Valor in 2019 for saving the life of small child who was running towards the busy Highway 54 not far from the WERDCC facility in Vandalia.

An original press release from the DOC explains how the events unfolded and a little about Lloyd.

Lloyd McCurdy prefers to fly under the radar.

"I always try to stand back and analyze the situation before I jump into anything," McCurdy said. "I like staying out of the limelight."

The morning of the May 24, 2018 incident might have pushed him out of his comfort zone.

McCurdy, who favors the quiet of the midnight shift, was leaving the Vandalia women's prison in his truck just before 7 a.m. He saw colleagues Michael Redington and Casey Hatton driving to work. Then he spotted a toddler, clad in only a diaper, running in the direction of Highway 54.

Protective instincts overrode McCurdy's usual laid-back mode. He zipped around the block to intercept the youngster, arriving on the scene as the boy was stepping out onto the highway in the path of an oncoming semitrailer. Amid shouts of coworkers too far away to intervene, McCurdy leapt out of his truck, also shouting, prompting the semi driver to slam on the brakes and the tiny

## Rep. Chad Perkins Capitol Report

General Assembly Gives Final Approval to Legislation to Enhance Support for Foster and Adoptive Parents (HB 429 and HB 430)

Legislation is now on its way to the governor that would provide additional financial assistance to Missouri families who provide a stable home to children in need. The House this week gave final approval to two bills that received strong support in the Senate before coming back to the House to receive overwhelming bipartisan approval.

The House gave final approval to HB 429 by a vote of 127-8. It would authorize an income tax deduction for Missouri taxpayers for the expenses related to providing care as a foster parent. The bill would authorize a deduction of up to \$5,000 for married couples or single parents, provided that individuals who are married but file separately can only claim up to \$2,500 each. The Senate added other provisions to HB 429 including the expansion of the adoption tax credit, the Birth Match Program, and additional improvements to the state's adoption regulations and proceedings.

HB 430 was approved by the House by a vote of 142-0. It would expand the state's existing \$10,000 tax credit to any child adopted by Missouri taxpayers on or after January 1, 2022. Currently the credit applies only to adoptions of special needs children. The bill also increases the annual limit on the amount of tax credits that can be authorized from \$2 million to \$6 million. The Senate also added provisions to expand the tax credits for contributions to domestic violence shelters and maternity homes.

House Approves Funding Bill to Support Vulnerable Missourians (HB 21)

The House has sent a funding bill to the Senate that would provide resources to help Missouri's most vulnerable citizens. The legislation appropriates more than \$342 million in funding to support seniors in nursing homes, provide care for the developmentally disabled, expand mental health programs, add public defenders to the criminal justice system, and boost K-12 school transportation funding.

HB 21 makes fiscally responsible use of the funds saved by rejecting the expansion of Medicaid. The House Budget Chairman said in the bill, "A lot of very good things are happening for a lot of people in the state of Missouri who cannot help themselves. This is the prioritization of the people who are most needy in our state that we help through the state budget."

For Fiscal Year 2022, House Bill 21 would:

- Provide skilled nursing homes with \$88.2 million in new reimbursement, approximately \$10.00 a day for each bed
- Provide public K-12 schools an additional \$15.5 million for formula transportation funding
- Provide Home and Community Based Services (in-home care), including Consumer Directed Services (CDS), with an additional \$19,711,680 in state and federal funds (bringing the total increase in the House version of the FY22 budget to \$166,378,997)
- Provide \$2 million in funding for a workforce diploma program (adult high schools) to help adults earn a diploma, plus another \$1.8 million in new funds for existing adult high schools
- Provide an additional \$588,000 for the recruitment of families to participate in the foster care system (Missouri has more than 13,500 kids in the system)
- Provide \$2.9 million to establish a pilot program with pediatric hospitals to train family members to become certified home health aides (that will lead to savings for in-home care)

Gov. Mike Parson also ordered the

dome of the Missouri State Capitol to be illuminated purple in honor of the day. In March, Parson also showed his support for military children by issuing a proclamation that recognizes April as the Month of the Military Child.

He said, "Proclaiming April as the Month of the Military Child pays tribute to military children across our state for their commitment and sacrifice as they support the military service member in their family. When parents serve our country, their kids serve, too."

### BILLS SENT TO THE SENATE

HB 991 exempts federal economic impact payments from state income tax. Supporters say the bill will reduce the tax burden for taxpayers by waiving the tax on direct economic stimulus payments from the federal government that certain individuals received last year. Supporters said that this is not the first time that such a waiver has happened as a result of direct payments from the federal government.

HB 911 designates the portion of Interstate 64 from Winghaven Boulevard to Prospect Road within the city of Lake St. Louis in St. Charles County as the "US Navy SEAL Scotty Wirtz Memorial Highway".

HCR 29 will ensure that Harris-Stowe State University can successfully discharge a statewide mission in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) for underrepresented and under-resourced students. Supporters say Harris-Stowe University has a growing population and that their efforts in STEM are drawing students in.

HB 589 changes the laws regarding the confiscation of animals. Supporters say the bill requires a speedy disposition hearing to determine if an owner is liable for animal abuse or neglect and will save money. Often animal owners forfeit their rights to the animals because they cannot pay the bond or the costs associated with the legal challenge. It also specifies that a court must order a person found guilty of the offense of sex with an animal to submit to and pay for a comprehensive evaluation conducted by a licensed mental health professional prior to the person's sentencing. The bill also establishes that a person commits the offense of animal neglect if the person has a hoarding disorder causing the accumulation of custody or ownership of animals.

HB 177 modifies the law to allow records or meetings of governmental bodies that include descriptions of discussion about security procedures, including evacuation and lock down procedures, to remain confidential and closed to the public.

HB 27 requires posting notice, under the Sunshine Law, of meeting times, dates, places, and agendas as well as minutes of open meetings on a public governmental body's website and social media if the governmental body manages a website and/or social media page. The social media notice requirement can be satisfied by posting a link to the webpage containing the notice. Supporters say the bill pushes current procedures into the digital age and allows for more convenient notice to the public.

### BILLS SENT TO THE GOVERNOR

SB 189 creates a "Negro Leagues Baseball Museum" special license plate. Upon making a \$10 contribution to the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum, a vehicle owner may apply for the plates. Applicants shall also pay a \$15 fee in addition to regular registration fees, but no additional fee shall be charged for the personalization of the plates. Supporters say the bill will help provide small donations to the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum, which is instrumental to Missouri and baseball history. The license plate will create more awareness about this time in history, even attracting visitors to Missouri.



Members of the Clopton FFA chapter have been busy competing in state competitions that close out the school year.

This year, chapters are competing in various events over the course of four weekends culminating in the Missouri's 93rd State FFA Convention.

Despite that busy schedule, members along with the school district's agricultural instructor and FFA Advisor Kaylee Calvin made time to complete a project near their hearts.

On Thursday, April 8, they completed work and installation on a memorial bench dedicated to the school's longtime ag instructor and FFA advisor, Mike McCrory, who died last October.

"For years, Mr. McCrory called Clopton home as he shared his talents and knowledge with many students as the Agriculture Instructor/FFA Advisor," Calvin wrote on the chapter's social media page.

McCrory graduated from Clopton

in 1974 and highly active in 4-H and FFA. After graduating from the University of Missouri-Columbia, he returned to Clopton to pass on his love for agriculture, encouraging, and building relationships with thousands of students during his 33 years at the school district.

Unable to give up his love of teaching, he returned to the field for another three years with Elsberry School District before retiring and serving the community in various roles.

Shortly after his death, students in Calvin's Ag Construction class began work on the project.

"This project came from the simple fact that Mr. McCrory had a huge impact on many people in the Clopton School and community," Calvin explained. "After his passing students wanted to do something in his honor because of all the things he brought to the FFA. The memorial bench was the final product because it is something that could be

shared with everyone and serve as a reminder for the positive impact that he had on so many people's lives."

## Missouri State Fair Releases Exhibitor, Camping Information

Missouri State Fair exhibitors interested in competing at the State Fair this year can now access the Premium Guide, a comprehensive tool for State Fair exhibitors, on the Fair's website, [mstatefair.com](http://mstatefair.com).

The Premium Guide includes important rules and regulations for the Fair's numerous livestock shows and competitive exhibits. Exhibitors are encouraged to explore the Premium Guide for information, and to note any changes to their particular areas of showing/competing.

Approximately 28,000 entries are expected for this year's agriculture showcase, Aug. 12-22, in Sedalia. New livestock shows and competitive exhibit contests have been added including a Youth Sheep Skilathon, Miniature Hereford Show, No Limits P.I.G. Show, 4-H/FFA Sheep - Team Fitting, Youth Sheep and Meat Goat Judging Contest, Fairy Garden Contest and several new Home Economics cooking contests.

Exhibitors can also view a list of competition updates on the Fair's website. Rule changes, new contests and shows, new superintendents and more can be found there.

Entries for State Fair livestock shows and competitive exhibits will be accepted starting Tuesday, May 11. Exhibitors are encouraged to access the online entry and payment system via the online portal that is expected to go live on the website that morning. website starting at 9 a.m. on May 3. The form will need to be filled out in full, including payment information, and must be faxed to the Fair. Please only send the fax one time. Multiple submissions jam the fax machine and could result in multiple payments processed.

No camping forms will be distributed or accepted on-site. Camping reservation requests must be made via the online portal or forms sent in via fax.

Please note that the State Fair website typically experiences very high traffic volume on the morning the livestock exhibitor camping system goes live. State Fair staff works with our webmaster and site host to be diligent in our efforts to accommodate the hits that the site often experiences during this time. We appreciate your patience and understanding should any situations arise.

## MDC Encourages Public To Leave Wildlife Wild This Spring

As you head outdoors this season to enjoy the sunshine and warmer weather, you may encounter a variety of newborn animals. Young wildlife can pull on our heartstrings as they appear to be abandoned, but that's usually not the case. The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) reminds the public that interfering with wildlife can do more harm than good.

"Young animals are rarely orphaned," explained MDC State Wildlife Veterinarian Sherri Russell. "If the young is left alone, the parent will usually return. Parents are normally out searching for food and cannot constantly attend to their offspring."

Baby birds are a common newborn people can come across in the spring.

"If you see a chick with feathers hopping on the ground, leave it alone and bring pets inside because it's a fledgling and the parents are nearby keeping watch," Russell said. "Fledglings can spend up to 10 days hopping on the ground learning to fly. If you find one that has no feathers, you can return it to the nesting area if possible, as it most likely fell out of the nest."

Other common issues include dogs catching young rabbits and lawn mowers running over their nests.

"Rabbits seldom survive in captivity and can actually die of fright from being handled," said Russell. "Even if the animal is injured, it's best to return it to the nest because the mother will most likely return."

Russell also noted that human scent does not cause wild mothers to reject their young, and most newborn animals do not survive in captivity.

"People have good intentions, but the care and rehabilitation of wild animals require special training, facilities, and permits," stressed Russell. "Without such care and knowledge, wild animals will remain in poor health and could eventually die. Not to mention, it's illegal to possess many wild animals without a valid state or federal permit."

Russell also said wildlife can become dangerous as they mature, and can carry parasites, disease, and cause property damage.

"Native wildlife can carry mites, ticks, lice, fleas, flukes, roundworms, rabies, distemper, tuberculosis, respiratory diseases, and skin diseases, some of which can be transmitted to humans," she explained.

Although tempting to take them into our homes, the best you can do for wild animals is leave them be.

## MDHEWD Suspends Testing Requirement For A+ Eligibility

The Missouri Department of Higher Education & Workforce Development (MDHEWD) has issued guidance suspending the end-of-course exam requirement for 2021 high school seniors.

Previous guidance, issued in March 2020, suspended the requirement for high school seniors who graduated in 2020 because of school shutdowns at the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic. Guidance issued during October 2020 indicated that the 2021 seniors must continue to score proficient or advanced on the Algebra I end-of-course exam, or achieve a combination of high school grade point average and ACT math subscore that meets the alternative to the end-of-course requirement.

However, upon further review of the pandemic's impact on students and educators, MDHEWD has determined it is appropriate to extend the Algebra I exam waiver to the class of 2021. As a result, the 2021 seniors will not be required to meet either the Algebra I end-of-course requirement or its GPA/ACT alternative to qualify for the A+ Scholarship.

When making this determination the MDHEWD took into consideration the State Board of Education's decision to suspend the use of test results for accountability purposes. Other factors include:

While raw exam scores will be available later this spring, score levels (e.g., advanced, proficient, etc.) will not be announced until sometime in the summer, which would leave some seniors without timely information about their eligibility for the scholarship.

Another factor was the continued disruption in the availability of ACT testing sites, making it difficult for students who did not meet the primary requirement to meet the alternative.

Finally, the department recognizes that many students who are learning remotely continue to face challenges in meeting the end-of-course requirement.

Earlier in the academic year, the department provided information about COVID-19 related accommodations for high school students pursuing eligibility for the A+ scholarship. Those accommodations included clarification regarding satisfying the 95 percent attendance requirement for remote learning students, a reduction in the number of hours a student must complete in order to meet the tutoring and mentoring requirement, and guidance for mid-year high school graduates whose graduation was delayed due to the pandemic.

The A+ Scholarship Program provides scholarship funds to eligible graduates of A+ designated high schools who attend a participating community college or vocational/technical school. More than 10,000 students utilize the A+ Scholarship at Missouri each academic year.



## MDC Urges Public To 'Beefriend' Native Pollinators

Spring and summer months bring both the buzz of lawnmowers and bees. These fuzzy flyers are important pollinators, playing a crucial role in the production of many favorite fruits and vegetables. The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) encourages the public to "bee-friendly" these valuable native pollinators.

"Missouri is home to around 450 species of native bees, but it's not uncommon for more to be identified each year," said MDC Urban Wildlife Biologist Erin Shank. "There are several common bees Missourians will encounter, including the bumblebee, carpenter bees, sweat bees, and the leafcutter bee."

Most native bees only live about one year. They emerge in the spring as adults, visiting flowers and building nests. Many species, such as bumblebees, make their nests underground, while others, such as leafcutter and mason bees, will set up shop in small cavities found in wood or in the pith of plant stems.

Bees may send some running for the hills for fear of being stung, but most native bees are harmless.

"Most don't have stingers long enough to penetrate human skin," said MDC Community and Private Land Conservation Branch Chief Bill White. White and his team work to create and maintain native wildlife habitat in communities and on private lands.

Additionally, native bees are doing their agricultural duty by pollinating flowering plants that provide food, fiber, and even medicines.

Shank explained that native bees, such as the bumblebee, are effective pollinators because of a technique called buzz pollination.

"It's a vibrating movement involving their wing muscles that allows the bumblebee to free pollen from the anther, the flower's pollen-producing structure," Shank said. "This strategy causes the flower to explosively release pollen. There are some flowering plants that will release pollen only through buzz pollination. One favorite, the tomato plant, requires either buzz pollination or visitation by a larger bodied bee, such as the bumblebee."

### BEE A FRIEND

There are several ways the public can support Missouri's native bees. Shank said the best way is to get floral.

"It's all about the flowers," Shank stressed. "Provide native companion plants, and especially those with colorful blossoms, because color attracts bees."

Companion planting, in which one plant helps the growth of another, can help facilitate the pollination of fruits and vegetables. For example, planting bee balm can help pollinate tomatoes, peppers, and eggplant. Other examples of flowering companion plants include sunflowers, wild hyacinth, blue wild indigo, purple prairie clover, and common milkweed.

There are several options of flowering trees and shrubs, too.

"Redbud, American plum, and

golden currant are great for pollinators," said White.

Shank noted that providing more flowers can also mean not mowing the lawn as much.

"Clover, violets, and dandelions are some common lawn plants that provide vital food for bees – especially in the spring before most flowers appear," Shank explained. "Delaying mowing or mowing higher can help bees by letting the plants grow. Even allowing access to the ground by not mulching every inch can help. Some bees need access to the soil to excavate their nests."

### NO YARD? NO PROBLEM!

Shank said residents who live in urban areas without access to a yard can still be a big help to native bees.

Surprisingly, St. Louis has one of the most diverse bee populations in the Midwest, with more than 200 species found in the city limits alone.

"You can offer bees native flowers in a planting box or pot," Shank explained. "Getting involved in a community garden or helping plant at a nearby park is great, too."

For those without a green thumb, it may be tempting to buy the bee houses or hotels being offered in stores. However, the real need is not nesting sites, but native flowering plants. Many of the commercially available bee hotels contain the wrong length of tubes or wrong diameter for Missouri's bees. Find out how to build your own at <https://www.xerces.org/publications/fact-sheets/nests-for-native-bees>.

White stressed the need for yearly maintenance on bee houses.

"After bees emerge in the spring, either the used tubes need to be removed or plugged so they can't be reused," White stressed. "The tubes will harbor parasites and disease, as well as pollen mites that could impact another generation of bees wanting to use the house. The more houses erected in one spot, the bigger the problem becomes and more harm to local bees. The fact remains that native bees will benefit more from native flowering plants than bee houses."

### UN-BEE-LIEVABLE

Bee pollinators' national value is around \$30 billion annually, and they are responsible for 1 in 3 bites of food Americans eat. Without bees and other pollinators, humans would not have foods such as grapes, nuts, coffee, and even chocolate.

"It's easy to forget their critical role in agricultural food production," Shank said. "But by making small strides to plant native flowers and shrubs, Missourians can support bee health and habitat."

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) encourages people to unwind in nature this spring by enjoying Missouri's flowering trees and shrubs. Many of Missouri's native trees and shrubs bloom in spring, putting on dazzling displays that attract native wildlife such as birds and pollinators. Flowering spring trees and shrubs can be enjoyed while out in the yard, out on a walk, or even from the indoors while social distancing.

Early-bloomers in the coming weeks include:

- Serviceberry with clusters of white flowers that appear before other native trees put on leaves, allowing this often-overlooked tree to stand out in wooded areas. When you spot a blooming serviceberry, take note of the location. You can return in early June to enjoy the serviceberry's delicious, blueberry-like fruits. Learn more at [mdc.mo.gov/discover-nature/field-guide/downy-serviceberry](https://mdc.mo.gov/discover-nature/field-guide/downy-serviceberry)

- Spicebush is a small shrub that commonly grows in moist wooded areas and along streams. It produces petite clusters of pale yellow flowers in early spring. As the host plant of the beautiful spicebush swallowtail butterfly, this shrub makes an attractive, wildlife-friendly addition to home landscaping. Learn more at [mdc.mo.gov/discover-nature/field-guide/spicebush](https://mdc.mo.gov/discover-nature/field-guide/spicebush)

- Redbud is celebrated each spring for the vibrant pink-purple flowers encircling the trees' leafless branches. Fun fact: Redbud flowers are more than eye candy. They're edible and make a tasty and colorful addition to salads and desserts! Learn more at [mdc.mo.gov/discover-nature/field-guide/eastern-redbud](https://mdc.mo.gov/discover-nature/field-guide/eastern-redbud)

- Wild plum produces clusters of delicate white flowers that are visited by several species of bees. This small, thicket-forming tree is common along roadsides, in old fields, and on the edge of woods. Wild plum is a valuable food source for wildlife, but people can also enjoy the small, edible plums that ripen in late summer. Learn more at [mdc.mo.gov/discover-nature/field-guide/wild-plum](https://mdc.mo.gov/discover-nature/field-guide/wild-plum)

MDC encourages people to plant native trees and shrubs and replace non-native varieties such as the invasive Bradford or Cleveland Select ornamental pear trees. These invasive species are known to multiply quickly and crowd out native Missouri plants. Though it's been a popular landscaping tree for decades, cultivated forms have spread aggressively throughout the state. Cultivated varieties of this plant for sale include Aristocrat, Autumn Blaze, Bradford, Capital, Chanticleer, New Bradford, and Redspire, among others. All are invasive and should not be planted. The public is encouraged to visit [grownative.org](https://grownative.org) for a list of vendors that sell Missouri native plant species.
