Warrenton Oil Company Acquires Abel Oil Company

Warrenton Oil Company, a family-owned and operated company founded in 1972 and located in Truesdale, Missouri, today announced the acquisition of Abel Oil Company, a family-owned and operated Missouri-based company located in Louisiana and founded in 1940.

Warrenton Oil Company quietly started the acquisition process for the popular shell stations, but didn't publicize the acquisition until Thursday, Sept. 30.

Prior to a press release, both oil companies announced the change to employees this week.

Sources with ties to each company confirmed the acquisition to The Tribune on Wednesday, Sept. 29.

The Tribune reached out to both companies early Thursday morning, but both were unavailable for comments at the time.

Mike Hafner, a spokesperson for Warrenton Oil Company, responded Thursday afternoon with a press release.

According to the release, Warrenton Oil Company and their FastLane Convenience Stores have agreed to terms to acquire Abel Oil Company and Abel's Quik Shops.

The acquisition should be complete by the end of 2021. The deal includes Abel Oil Company's eight-

een Missouri convenience stores, which will significantly expand Warrenton Oil's presence into Audrain, Ralls, Monroe, and Pike counties.

"The addition of these stores will allow us to better serve our customers and their communities throughout northeast Missouri," Wayne Baker, President & CEO of Warrenton Oil Company, said. "We are excited to expand our farm and commercial fuel business footprint

"The Abel stores are in great shape and Warrenton Oil plans on adding additional food and other services in some of the stores,"

Hafner told the Tribune after speaking with Warrenton Oil Company officials. "None of the Abel's facilities will be closed. In fact, where space and land are available, Warrenton Oil Company intends to consider expansions including car washes, dog walks, dog washes, co-brand fast food, and more."

Hafner went on to explain that the purchase of Abel's included the company headquarters in Louisiana.

"It will be used as a satellite office, distribution warehouse, and a base for expanding the farm and commercial fuel business," Hafner said. "Warrenton Oil hopes to retain all Abel employees."

Paynesville Man Was Soldier Of Fortune

Editor's note: Following is the second part of a story series by award-winning print and broadcast journalist, historian and public relations professional Brent Engel of Louisiana.

James Carson Jamison left Pike County for the gold fields of California, but a quest for greater adventure would lead him on a much longer journey.

In December 1855, Jamison met in San Francisco with representatives of William Walker, a Tennessee doctor, attorney and journalist who wanted to set up English-speaking, slave-holding colonies in Central America.

"At this age I looked upon life with an enraptured eye; its every prospect charmed me, and in my exuberance of health and strength I asked no odds of time nor fortune," Jamison later wrote.

On the third day at sea, Jamison was overwhelmingly elected first lieutenant by the 46 men who planned to join Walker, even though most of them were strangers.

Upon arrival, Jamison was summoned to the commander's headquarters. The author said he never saw the "Grey-Eyed Man of Destiny" smile or wear a military uniform.

Walker was a soft-talking, tee-totaling, well-read, disciplined man who was just as likely to order a

death sentence for anyone who insulted a woman as for committing a crime. He was so stern that he once reduced in rank his own brother, Norvel, for breaking military rules. Jamison saw the bad, but also the good in Walker's character.

"Men like Walker have their faults, and these are accentuated when they fail; their virtues sink into the grave with them," he wrote.

Two years earlier, Walker had tried unsuccessfully to establish a colony in Western Mexico, but hoped for a better outcome in Nicaragua. Walker contracted with Nicaraguan President Francisco Castellon to provide military support.

Jamison's outfit saw action almost immediately upon reaching the country, which was a key shipping route between New York and San Francisco. As with the Mexicans, Castellon's detractors weren't happy about gringos laying claim to their land, even with a presidential decree.

Jamison's company fought at several locations, including Rivas, LaVirgen, San Jorge, San Juan del sur and Granada.

It was during the first Battle of Rivas on April 11, 1856, that Jamison was shot in the right leg. Surgeons ignored him because there were other soldiers who needed greater attention.

Of particular note was the gallantry of one captain from New

York. He stuck his arm around the corner of a building to fire a pistol, only to have an enemy bayonet thrust through the limb followed by the sound of the attached rifle blowing it to bits.

The captain "withdrew his shattered arm with proper haste, and gazing at it with immeasurable disgust, remarked dryly: 'The damned rascal got my pistol,'" Jamison wrote.

Knowing that "capture meant death," Jamison crawled from the street into an unfinished cathedral, bullets dinging off the church's bell. He fell asleep and woke in pain several hours later. Deciding to retreat, Jamison slowly made it back to his company, barely escaping enemy patrols.

The Pike County native witnessed other brutalities and oddities of war. At Masaya, he saw "scores of the enemy shot down while holding up their hands in token of surrender."

In another battle, an American soldier was struck by a bullet to the head that "killed him so instantly he never moved."

"I did not have the least suspicion of what had befallen him until orders were given to withdraw to a position of greater safety," Jamison wrote. "Then it was found that the poor fellow was still grasping his rifle, as if taking aim."

Crash Claims Lives Of Two Area Men On Hwy. 54

Two people died and two others were seriously injured after a head-on collision in Pike County, Missouri, early Sunday, Oct. 3.

According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol crash report, a Chevrolet Lumina was traveling east on MO 154 around 12:48 a.m., when it failed to stop at a stop sign and hit a semi truck traveling west on US-54 head-on.

Troopers said New London resi-

dent Miguel Mendez, 19, and Hannibal resident Jacob Hamm, 23, were pronounced dead at the scene by Pike County deputy coroner Harry Nelson just before 4 a.m.

They said neither were wearing safety devices.

Troopers said Hannibal residents William Macfarlane, 22, and Landon Leake, 23, both sustained serious injuries.

Macfarlane was taken to Univer-

sity Hospital in Columbia while Leake was taken to Blessing Hospital in Quincy.

Trooper said Macfarlane was not wearing a safety device. They said it's unknown whether Leake was wearing a safety device.

The driver of the semi, 56-year-old Monte Jackson of Greentown, Indiana, was not injured. Trooper said he was wearing a safety device.

GOATS

They really like clover hay. I entered both of the fainting goats in the fair. One goat got first and one got last in a class of three goats.

With my Boer goats, I got one wether in March. The doe Boer, and the other wether Boer we got in May. I wrote an essay for the Pike County Youth Fair-board grant program because I have never had or shown goats before. I was awarded \$250 from the grant program to go towards the goats. I used that money towards purchasing one of the goats. The fair went good for the Boer goats. One of my Boer goats was chosen third for the Sale of Champions sale order. My other wether Boer goat didn't place very well at the fair. My doe Boer goat won her class at the fair.

I went to the Missouri State Fair with my wether Boer goats and I put them in a carcass class. A carcass class is where the goats are judged on foot and then we put them on a trailer and they are taken to butcher and then judged on the rail. The fair was paying around \$3 per pound live weight. One of the wethers got third on foot and 18th on the rail. The other wether got 11th in his class and placed 19th on the rail.

I did not have a very good experience showing goats. I think it is because I didn't halter break them enough. I am not going to show goats next year.

INTERNATIONAL FOODS

This year was my second year in International Foods and it was an exciting year. This year we focused mainly on Italian cuisine and made some of the dishes that are common there. The things that we made this year were ravioli and homemade sauce as well as biscotti. The first thing we did was start making the dough for the ravioli. We took the flour, eggs, salt, and olive oil and mixed it all together and once it was mixed we had to knead it and work the dough. Then we put it through the pasta machine and got it rolled out into one long sheet of dough. We set them on the counter top and started working on the filling for the dough.

For our filling we decided just to do a regular beef filling. We browned the beef and took a spatula and broke it up into really small bits. Then, we took a meat presser and made the pieces even smaller. Next we added spices like salt, pepper, oregano, and garlic and let it cook in. After a few minutes of the spices being in the beef we added one block of cream cheese and a sprinkle of mozzarella, and let the cheese melt in.

Through all this we had a pot of sauce on the stove to which we had added cilantro and oregano.

Our next step was taking out the filling and making our raviolis. We each had our own stretch of dough and a table-spoon. We scooped out the filling onto the dough until we ran out of dough, leaving space in between each pile. Next, we whisked some egg yolks up in a bowl, and with a brush, brushed the egg yolk in all the spaces between the filling. We took our other piece of dough and laid it on top and formed little raviolis. We took a butter knife and cut out the squares around the filling forming the shape of the ravioli. To make them look a bit prettier, we each took a fork and pressed a pattern around the edges of the dough. Finally, it was time to cook! We had a big pot of boiling water on the stove and we each took turns cooking our ravioli. They actually took more time to cook than we had originally thought, so they ended up cooking about 20 minutes each. When they were done, we took them out, topped them with some sauce and enjoyed ourselves.

The other food that we made was biscotti. I made double chocolate. The way I made mine was I took flour, sugar, butter, unsweetened cocoa powder, eggs, and vanilla extract. I also added semi-sweet mini chocolate chips, dried cranberries, and halved pecans to mine. I mixed the ingredients all up in a bowl until they started to come together. Then, I took it out of the bowl and placed the dough on a clean, floured countertop. Here I split the dough into two pieces and kneaded the dough, and shaped them until they looked like logs. Next, I placed them both on a greased baking sheet and put them in the oven for about 35 minutes. After that time was up, I took them out and let them cool down a little.

After 30 minutes, I took a bread knife and cut them into little pieces and put them back in the oven to crisp up for around ten minutes. When they were done, I took them out and after cooling for a bit I added icing to one of the ends on each one. This was a fun year for me in International Foods and I can't wait to do it again next year.

CAKE DECORATING

One of my 4-H projects this year was cake decorating and this was my first year. It was a tough project for me just because I had absolutely no experience in cake decorating at all. Some of the things I learned to do this year was how to make fondant and royal icing. I also learned how to make basic patterns with icing. This project was an interesting experience for me.

For my first cake decorating project I decided that I wanted to have a green fondant so my project leader suggested that I make my own and it was so much fun. I had previously had no idea what fondant was, I had never heard the term

before so the whole process was new to me. The way that we made the fondant was by taking marshmallows, water, and microwaving that in intervals of twenty seconds then stirring and we did that four times. Then we put the marshmallow mix in a mixer and slowly added powdered sugar and kept mixing it until it started to get stiff and stick together. Then, with extremely greased up hands we took the fondant out of the mixing bowl and split it into sections for each of us to use. Because I wanted mine green, I then took green food coloring and added it to my fondant until it was the color I wanted. Next, I rolled it up in Saran Wrap and let it set.

The next thing that we did was make royal icing. For this we put about four cups of powdered sugar in the mixer along with egg whites and cream of tartar and a little bit of water. Then we mixed it all together until it was standing in peaks. I kept my first batch of icing plain, and then later made another two batches and colored one pink and the other one a dark green, darker than my fondant color. Then it was time to put the fondant on the mold. This year, I had a square mold, because it was my first year I wanted to keep it simple. So, I rolled out my fondant and started placing it on the box. For some reason, the fondant kept breaking around the edges so what I did was, I took a marinating brush and put a little water on it. Then, held the fondant together with my fingers and brushed water all along the edges of the box to keep the fondant together. The reason that I did this is because I knew marshmallows were sticky and when they were wet they would stick together. Although it kept the fondant together the end result was not the prettiest.

After making sure the fondant would stick I started on my icing. I took the batch that I had left white and made a pattern around the bottom edge of the cake. Then I took the pink colored icing and made little flowers all over the top of the cake by taking the decorating tool and going in a spiral. Finally, I took the green colored icing and made little vines going around the middle of the cake on the edges, with little leaves attached to them. This project was definitely a learning experience for me because prior to this project I had never done anything like this before. It was all a very interesting process and I am glad to have gained some basic skills in this field. Because this was such a fun experience for me I believe that I will also do this project next year. It was definitely fun and I can't wait for the next project year.

BEEF

This was my first year to take Beef 1 in 4-H, and I thoroughly enjoyed every minute of the project. I began by purchasing my steer from a local individual in November of 2020; at that time the steer was nine months old. At that point I started and steadily increased feeding him a creep mix from a local farm store.

As winter started, I began breaking him to lead by first letting him get used to a halter being on his face. During this time my steer also got used to a tension between his halter and the rope by him stepping on the rope that was hooked to his halter. This process proved very beneficial, because in the next few weeks following, I was able to begin pulling on the rope and he would reluctantly follow. By practicing leading him throughout the coming months he steadily became a better follower. Also, during this time, I watched several educational 4-H videos along with receiving my SMQA certification.

As spring came, we increased the area my steer and my sister's cow and steer were staying so that they all could have more grass to eat. I also began spraying him with a fly repellent which has been continued until the flies end.

One of the biggest learning experiences was exhibiting at the fair. After I had convinced my steer that the running water was not going to hurt him (which was not hard to do), I washed him a cou-

ple of times leading up to the fair. Once we arrived at the Pike County Fair it was super important to make sure they were drinking plenty of water and to keep them calm while in a noisy, loud, and busy area. I also tried to calm him down by leading him through the show ring as practice for the real event. So, after the event started, I first registered into the showmanship competition. It went okay the main thing I think was that he was hot and unsure about his surroundings which made him impatient. Secondly, I registered for the Beef Show. During this event my steer was a little bit calmer, so the event ran much smoother. Lastly, I was entered into the Rate of Gain competition. It is recommended that on average a steer should gain 3 lbs. per day. I achieved third place in the county with an average daily gain of 2.71. If I was going to be in 4-H next year this would definitely be a project I would take, because there are so many great learning experiences when showing at the fair or just raising cattle.

was six of them and on the way here they got lost in shipping and all died. The owner that shipped them replaced them with another six that cost me nothing and they all survived. I got the Modern Game I bought from one person named James Miller. I got the Black Rose comb from a person that gave me them for free. He gave me them when I didn't know that they had lice. I got the lice treated then a raccoon got two of them and I only had one left.

"We identified a need in the community for having multiple vehicles at one time," VanHooser explained when asked why the hospital purchased the truck. "Since we went over to the 911 dispatch, we've had multiple call-outs at a time and an increased call volume. With that increase, we recognized the need for a third service vehicle in times when both ambulances are out and we're having to send out for mutual aid. Now, we can respond in the supervisor truck because it has all the equipment necessary to be on the scene and initializing care for the patient."

According to VanHooser, the truck has been at the hospital for over a month. She and the two supervisors told The Tribune that outfitting the truck with lights and sirens along with the PCMH wrap has been a work in progress which was only recently finished.

"Right now, it's been in full operation status for a week," Quattrocchi said.

The vehicle will be primarily used by the EMS supervisors responding and being on the scene when needed; however, VanHooser said there are many more uses for the truck.

"If they were gone and we wanted or needed to put somebody in that response vehicle, we could put any paramedic in it and get them to a patient."

"Our dispatch screens the 911 calls and codes them with our system," Quattrocchi added. "We're able to respond based on the severity level they tell us and provide an extra hand. As Reesa said, we're also able to respond when the ambulance is not around, so that we're not delaying care once somebody calls 911. We're able to get to the scene and start treatment."

One of the most notable uses for the truck will be accessing patients who live in rural areas with rugged driveways.

"The crews won't be able to transport patients in the vehicle, but if it's a serious enough event they can begin treatment and call for air support," VanHooser said. "They can also help manage landing the helicopter with the fire department personnel on scene and quickly get that patient to the care provider they need. That gives us an advantage for the people who are really sick."

"There are places that ambulances just cannot access," Monroe added. "This gives us one more tool to access those patients. You're no longer having to wait for extended periods for EMS to show up and help you. This truck will also really help in winter. We can get anywhere that we need to."

As an example, they described a recent

scenario where medical crews were loaded into the vehicle and traveled up a narrow driveway where the ambulance couldn't pass. The truck quickly transported medics and equipment to a patient in need. Along with other emergency responders, the team was able to carry the person to the ambulance by hand.

Some money used to purchase the vehicle came from COVID-19 funding, it also was used to purchase state-of-the-art equipment to outfit a vehicle.

"The vehicle and equipment were purchased with COVID-19 funding," VanHooser continued. "With approval from the hospital board, our administration worked hard with us to get this pushed through. Our Board very much supports this knowing that the community is asking for more. There's lots of talk about needing a third ambulance. Being able to sustain and support a third crew with our call volume is a tough task, but this is kind of a bridge between that idea, and it's a big step forward for our EMS department."

Another use for the vehicle is also supporting community events such as visiting schools and training with local first responders - tasks that would normally tie up an ambulance.

"I think we've come a long way and we've always delivered excellent care," VanHooser said. "This is just another way for us to step up and be there for the community. It also allows the supervisors to go out on community events and help train with local fire departments. We're happy to assist with educational events in the community."

Having the right tools can make all the difference in a lifesaving situation, and according to the EMS Director, the ambulances and now the truck has some of the best in the state.

"I don't know if the community realizes the great level of equipment and care they are getting from our ambulance service," VanHooser noted. "The board has pushed to allow us the best of equipment out there."

"We have better equipment than what the city of St. Louis has," Monroe added.

"We're carrying cardiac monitors, medications, we've got everything you can imagine on an ambulance in here," Philip motioned towards the truck. "I think as we're still learning how this is going to help us and the community, it's a step in the right direction. It's going to become a true asset."

"That's the biggest thing," VanHooser finished. "It's a push forward for community support and making sure that we are thinking about the safety and welfare for the community."
