Pike County 911 Dispatcher **Assists In Delivering Baby**

In the early hours of May 11, 2023, a routine overnight shift turned into a memorable event for Pike County 911 Dispatcher Faith Cooper along with expecting parents, Christie and Kaleb Rosentengle.

At approximately 1:19 a.m., Cooper fielded an emergency call from Kaleb Rosentengle reporting that his wife, Christie, was in labor with contractions less than three minutes apart.

With little time to wait for assistance from Pike County Memorial Hospital or Eolia Community Fire Protection District, Cooper, a trained Emergency Medical Dispatch (EMD) professional, guided

their car at 1:31 a.m., merely ten minutes into the call. According to reports from other news sources, this is the couple's fourth child and the second born in a vehicle.

"This is a very significant event, as this is the first 911 call resulting in our dispatchers assisting with a childbirth since Pike County 911 implemented Emergency Medical Dispatch in 2020," a press re-lease for Pike County 911 stated. "All Pike County 911 dispatchers are certified in EMD and CPR and must also continue in training throughout their career.'

The statement went on to express how Pike County 911 will continue to provide the best care to the community during their time of need.

Pike County 911 congratulated the Rosentengle family on their healthy baby boy and extended commendations to the dispatchers involved in this extraordinary call.

Pike-Lincoln Technical Center Announces New Director

In a press release last week, Bowling Green High School head football coach, Joe Chinn, announced his resignation from his position to accept the role of assistant principal at the school.

Chinn, who also served as an assistant track coach, will be replaced on the football field by Missouri Hall of Fame inductee and assistant coach Mark St. Clair, according to athletic director Matt

Chance. "This decision did not come lightly because having to give up coaching was a difficult choice," Chinn said via social media. "I will forever cherish all the memories that being a coach has brought me. Being able to lead these teams and watch the boys turn

to men and being able to share those moments with my own children is something I will never forget! I have loved every player that I have ever coached like my own and am so proud to watch them succeed! I loved that my children got to experience all of what comes with being a coach's kid! With all that being said, I feel that I am leaving the program in a better position than when I got it, and it is in great hands!"

Chinn led the Bobcat football program for three seasons, following several years as an assistant coach. In the past two seasons, the Bobcats have narrowly missed the state games. They finished this past season with a 12-1 record after falling to Blair Oaks in the Class 2 semifinals. Chin's Bobcats earned a

30-6 record during his time at the helm.

St. Clair has contributed significantly to the Bobcats' success as the offensive coordinator. With 30 years of experience as head coach at the Hannibal Pirates program, St. Clair elevated the Bobcat offense to an unprecedented level. The Bobcats had the highest scoring offense for a small school in the nation, averaging 64 points per game. "I know they will do great

things in the future!" Chinn continued. "I am excited to start this new chapter and look forward to see what it brings!'

Although the Bobcats will be losing a large number of graduates, the program re-mains strong and is expected to be competitive in Class 2 this fall.

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
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
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

REP. PERKIN S REFLECTS ON 2023 LEGISLATIVE SESSION When looking back on the now finished legislative session, Rep. Perkins noted several victories achieved by Republicans. "We've had several successes this session. The victories I'm most proud of are cutting state taxes on Social Security benefits, the future expansion of I-70, and the commonsense transgender bills. Each one benefits Missourians in numerous ways. I, along with my fellow Republicans, will always search for ways to increase economic opportunities for Missourians and protect the most vulnerable among US.

MISSOURI GENERAL ASSEMBLY CONCLUDES HIGHLY PRODUCTIVE LEGISLATIVE SESSION

As the 2023 legislative session wrapped up Friday afternoon, lawmakers from both chambers left Jefferson City with a long list of accomplishments. During the session that began in January, House and Senate members worked on numerous policy proposals ranging from tax relief for seniors to improved access to health care to enhanced support for Missouri's most vulnerable citizens. In total, the legislature gave final approval to more than 60 pieces of legislation.

When the legislative session opened in January, House Speaker Dean Plocher told his colleagues, "The American Dream is achieved through hard work, commitment to freedom, education, as well as individual and fiscal responsibility. I will work toward an agenda that prothey empower Missourians." As session came to a conclusion this week, the House had made good on the Speaker's promise by passing a number of measures that will position Missouri and Missouri citizens for long-term success and opportunity.

Bills of Interest Passed During the 2023 Session Include:

Providing Tax Relief to Seniors -SB 190 will provide substantive tax relief to Missouri's older population. The legislation will eliminate the state income tax on social security benefits. It will allow all seniors regardless of their adjusted gross income or filing status to deduct 100 percent of their social security benefits.

The House handler of the bill said, "Missouri is one of only 11 states in the country that still taxes social security. With the rising cost of consumer goods, it's more important now than ever to put money back in the pockets of Missouri's seniors, particularly those on fixed incomes. It's time for Missouri to join the other 39 states that have already eliminated the tax on social security."

Helping Seniors Stay in Their Homes - SB 190 will help protect seniors from being taxed out of their homes. The bill effectively freezes the property tax on the home of Missourians who are 65 years of age or older. It will allow counties to adopt an ordinance that authorizes a property tax credit for eligible senior homeowners. The bill would in effect ensure seniors don't pay more in property tax on their property than they did for the same property when they turned 65 years of age.

The bill's handler noted that for most Missourians their home is their largest asset and the one tangible thing they have to show for a lifetime of work. He said, "Seniors who have played by the rules their entire lives, saved for retirement, paid their fair share of taxes, should never face the prospect of being taxed out of their home by the government. Senate Bill 190 ensures that they won't."

Saving Adolescents from Experimentation (SAFE) Act - SBs 49, 236 & 164 is legislation supporters say will protect Missouri's children from unnecessary and harmful sex change drugs and surgeries. The SAFE Act would prohibit health care providers from performing gender transition surgery on young people under the age

also prohibit a health care provider from prescribing or administering cross-sex hormones or pubertyblocking drugs to a minor for a gender transition, unless the minor was receiving such treatment prior to August 28, 2023. A violation of the provisions would be considered unprofessional conduct and would result in the revocation of the health care provider's professional license.

One supporter of the bill said, This is not against transgender people. This is just to make sure that children do not make decisions that could affect the rest of their lives, that they may not have all the information, that all of us may not have all of the information, and we want to make sure that they get that information."

Promoting Fairness for Female Student Athletes - SB 39 is meant to promote fairness in competition and opportunity for female student athletes. The bill would prohibit a private school, public school district, public charter school, or public or private institution of postsecondary education from allowing any student to compete in an athletics competition designated for the opposite sex, as determined by the student's official birth certificate. The bill clarifies that biological sex is only correctly stated on birth certificates if it was entered at or near the time of birth or modified to correct scrivener's error. The bill also makes it clear a female student may be allowed to compete in an athletics competition designated for male students there is no such athletics competition for female students offered.

Combating the Opioid Epidemic -SB 189, SB 186, SB 24, and HB 402 would allow Missourians to have an easily accessible means to ensure their medications aren't contaminated with the highly dangerous opioid, fentanyl. Currently in Missouri, fentanyl test strips are not legally available to test drugs or pills for the deadly substance. The legislation will allow the test strips to be legally available as they are in many other states. Supporters say the state has seen an increase in the number of overdose deaths from synthetic opioids such as fentanyl. According to the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services, more than 2,000 drug-related overdoses occurred in the state in 2021, with approximately 70% of those involving a synthetic opioid.

HRH Receives Patient Assistant Grant

To alleviate the financial burden of cancer treatment, the American Cancer Society (ACS) recently awarded a \$10,000 transportation grant to Hannibal Regional Healthcare System. The grant is one of 380 transportation grants totaling \$6.2 million awarded to health systems nationwide. The funding will allow health systems to provide eligible patients an estimated 577,350 rides to treatment.

When someone is faced with a cancer diagnosis, they are overwhelmed with many things to manage and worry about. We want to assist in any way we can, including with transportation, so they can worry less and focus on their cancer treatments and getting better," shares Wendy Harrington, President & CEO of Hannibal Regional Foundation. "We are so apprecia-tive of the American Cancer Society for their continued support of this program and the positive impact it has on our patients."

Lack of transportation to treatment prevents many people living with cancer from getting high-quality care which worsens cancer outcomes. In a study presented at the 2022 American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO) Quality Care Symposium, American Cancer Society researchers found that 2.8% of cancer survivors reported delays in care due to transportabarriers. Cancer tion survivors who delayed care due to lack of transportation were more likely to use the emergency room and had the highest risk of all-cause and cancer-specific mortality.

According to the American Cancer Society's Cancer Treatment and Survivorship Facts & Figures 2022-2024, cancer survivors experience greater financial hardship than the general population for many reasons including the inability to work. They also have higher out of pocket medical costs compared to people without a history of cancer. The economic burden of cancer is more profound in survivors who are younger or were diagnosed in childhood, underinsured or uninsured, and have lower incomes.

The local health systems we partner with across the country use this funding to deliver assistance directly to the patients who need it most."

prepared to cover them if temperatures dip below 32 degrees. When choosing annuals, consider the sight where you will plant them. Choose plants for shady locations if the site does not receive a lot of sunlight. If it is in full sun, choose sun-loving annuals.

I like growing annuals in containers but, one must consider the care they need in the heat of summer. Some container plants need watered every day, some will need deadheading, and others will need fertilizing every few weeks to look their best.

Consider native plants for your landscape or beds. Native perennials tend to be adapted to local conditions and take heat and drought better than annual flowering plants. Natives also attract butterflies and other pollinators. Consider helping to restore the monarch butterfly population and plant milkweed. Monarch populations have been in decline for several years due to loss of habitat and the use of pesticides. Planting their larval host food, milk-

By mid-May it is usually safe to weed, you can help restore monarch numbers in your area. Also, consider other butterfly species and plant host plants that attract them to the yard. Take time to enjoy the beauty of spring and take notice of all the plants in flower

and the pollinators flying around. Wasps, yellow jackets and hor-nets aid in pollination, and if they are not bothering you, just leave them alone. Typically, bees and other insects that many people are afraid of, are not going to sting un-less aggravated. Many of these insects are found in leaf litter, so as you are cleaning out flower beds they may be encountered. Wear gloves and never swat or scream at them. Slowly back away and move to another location. Some people are highly allergic to stinging insects, so try to avoid areas where you might find these insects hanging out.

If interested in learning more about native flowers and pollinators, consider taking the Master Pollinator Steward course in the future. There is a class going on now, so the next one will be offered April-May 2024.

Mow fescue lawns at a height of 3 inches. Do not scalp a lawn. This allows light to reach the weeds and a scalped lawn is often infested with weeds. A weedy lawn is usually an indication of low soil pH. Lime is used to raise the pH of soil. Fertilizer prices have gone up a lot in re-cent years, but if fertilizing, use a weed n' feed in May. Crabgrass preventer should have been applied in April. Creeping Charlie is a major problem in some lawns. This weed can be very difficult to control. Herbicides containing Triclopyr are recommended for hard to control weeds. You may be fighting this weed every year.

Missouri Department of Con-servation (MDC) shows turkey hunters checked 41,970 birds during Missouri's 2023 regular spring turkey season, April 17 through May 7. Top regular season harvest counties were Franklin with 973 birds harvested, Callaway with 801, and Osage with 792.

Young turkey hunters also harvested 2,566 turkeys over the youth weekend, April 1 and 2, bringing the overall 2023 spring turkey harvest to 44,536 – the highest harvest total since 2016.

"Stable, though still lower

MDC Reports Hunters Harvest 41,970 Birds Preliminary data from the than the ideal, hatches each of 36,253. the past three years and excellent spring turkey hunting weather likely contributed to this year's higher harvest total," said MDC Wild Turkey Biologist Nick Oakley. "The 2023 harvest was 23-percent higher compared to 2022 and it was 19-percent higher than the average over the previous five years.







Nana's Company's Coming **Basic Tomato Sauce** Serves 8 over pasta 1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil 3 anchovies, mashed 3 large onions, finely chopped 3 cloves garlic, minced 1 stalk celery, minced 2 carrots, grated 1 small can tomato paste 3 large cans crushed Italian tomatoes 1 cup red wine 2 bay leaves, whole 2 tbs. dried oregano Juice and zest of half a lemon 1/2 cup chopped fresh basil Salt and pepper to taste Heat oil in a large pot with a heavy bottom. Slowly saute the anchovies until they dissolve, mashing them with a wooden spoon. Saute onions, garlic, celery, and carrots until very soft. Add tomato paste and continue cooking until the paste is

tinue cooking until the paste is caramelized and a deep bronze color. Add the tomatoes, wine, and bay leaves. Stir. Cover and simmer for at least an hour. Continue simmering uncovered to allow to thicken. Add oregano, basil, zest, and lemon juice. Cook 15 minutes and serve over spaghetti. Grate Parmigiano-Reggiano over the whole.

Don't be afraid to make this the day before or even 2 days before you plan to serve it. It only gets better as the flavors meld.

If you have any leftover you can use it as the base for a shakshuka, or add peas and mushrooms and a bit of buttermilk to make a wonderful tomato soup that you can serve topped with curls of Parm.


