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### **Bowling Legend Visits Louisiana**

Recently, the parking lot of Twin City Bowl in Louisiana was packed to near overflowing. Nothing extraordinary about that, especially for one of—if not the—last bastions of family entertainment in

But this wasn't an ordinary night. It was Monday, May 8, and the bowling league season had already ended just in time for high school graduations and full Little League schedules.

For Twin City Bowl and avid fans of bowling in general, it was an extraordinary night and perhaps a once-ina-lifetime opportunity. A bowling legend had spent the day there and was finishing the night meeting fans, signing autographs, and bowling with a limited number of pa-

Walter Ray Williams Jr. is a name that should be recognizable in almost any bowling alley, yet several in larger city establishments didn't recognize the bowling star who holds a staggering 123 Professional Bowlers Association

(PBA) titles. The seven-time PBA Player of the Year and star of the documentary, A League of Ordinary Gentlemen, was competing in a horseshoes tournament in Wentzville and wanted to find a couple of bowling alleys to host clinics

and a meet and greet. Unlike some of the greater St. Louis venues he contacted, his name was immediately recognized by Jennifer Asquith—daughter of Twin City Bowl's owner, Diana

Jennifer said she initially thought the call was a scam, after all, it's not every day one of the greatest pro-am bowlers alive calls from his home in Florida.

She immediately got to work ensuring the event was

Williams made the right call when contacting the Louisiana bowling alley.

Built in 1959, Twin City Bowl has been a staple in the community for generations. Diana Guthrie, the secondgeneration owner, took over the reins from her parents more than 15 years ago. They had left their home in Centralia, Missouri, to purchase this center in 1974.

Now Diana's children and grandchildren help out with the family husiness

Under their watchful eyes, the bowling alley has not only survived, but thrived, hosting fundraisers, parties, high school bowling competitions, and even youth bowling tournaments.

Unlike the silence of the full-to-capacity parking lot, inside the bowling alley was alive with the sounds of laughter, high-fives and fistbumps, background music from the jukebox, and of course the clattering of bowling balls crashing into pins.

excitement, Williams sat quietly and focused on his students and bowling partners as one picked up a spare. One young man rushed back from the lane to give Williams an excited fist bump before joining a group of friends.

It was a common occurrence as the night grew along with laughs and excitement from bowlers of all ages, but especially the younger crowd.

Twin City is quickly becoming a place that harbors young talent in the area. Several have competed over the past few years and gained state-level recognition and ac-

One of the young talents to emerge from this small-town bowling alley is 11-year-old Bo Blaylock, who recently took 1st place in the U12 division of the 2023 MOUSBC Pepsi Youth Championship, bowling against 53 competitors in a six-game contest. His winning score? An impressive

Perhaps the next legend like Williams? Maybe even better one day.

But the bowling alley isn't just about the sport - it's a place where the community comes together for a cause. For the last 19 years, Twin City Bowl has held its annual Bowling for a Cure event to raise funds for cancer victims.

May 8 was, in many ways, a reflection of what makes Twin City Bowl so special. People from all walks of life, coming together to share a laugh, a story, or a game, cheered on by a community that feels more like a family.

"This is a really big deal for this place," one avid patron told the Tribune. "A lot of people grew up watching him on TV, and now they've got an opportunity to play and learn from him right here in

tnis smaii town. Looking around at the camaraderie and the sheer joy of the moment, Williams could only agree.

"I think all the smiles and the good time everyone is having speaks for itself," he

Williams' visit only adds to the rich tapestry of stories at Twin City Bowl. It's a place where legends are welcomed, champions are made, and above all, where a community comes together.



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


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# Poppy: The Flower That Honors Fallen Warriors "In Flanders fields the poppies blow / Between the of being the most popular garpagne Bubbles," are reward-

"The hauntingly eloquent words of McCrae helped to immortalize poppy as one of the most recognized symbols honoring soldiers who died in combat," said University of Missouri Extension horticulturist David Trinklein.

The poppy referred to by McCrae is known today as the corn poppy or Flanders poppy (Papaver rhoeas), a common flower native to Europe, Trinklein says. Its seeds often lie dormant for years and spring to life when the soil is disturbed. This happened in European cemeteries used to bury fallen soldiers of World War I, which is one reason the plant is associated with those who have died in combat.

Poppies belong to the Papaveraceae family, which contains 30 genera and about 600 species. Most are coldtolerant and prefer relatively cool summers. Among the annual poppies, in addition to Flanders poppy, is the notorious opium poppy (Papaver somniferum). Although its flowers are quite beautiful, growing the opium poppy is illegal in Missouri, noted Trinklein.

The Iceland poppy and Oriental poppy are two of the most familiar perennial types.

ular orange-red flowers are 3 ½-4 inches in diameter and have petals with a crepepaper texture. Borne singly on wiry stems, the flowers wave well above the lowgrowing, sharply toothed foliage. Leaves and broken stems yield a milky white sap.

Like most poppies, the Oriental poppy is not suited for extremely hot weather and usually goes dormant in summer, Trinklein said. In Missouri, it flowers in the spring, usually April, and seemingly disappears from the landscape by July due to heat.

Oriental poppy prefers well-drained soil and a sunny exposure. Do not overwater during its dormant period, which often extends throughout the winter. Plant with other species of annuals and perennials that will provide color in the area once the poppies go dormant. You can start Oriental poppy from seeds, but it will not flower until the second or third year. In addition to red-orange, flower colors include rose, salmon, pink and white.

Iceland poppy (Papaver nudicaule) prefers cool climates and tends to be shortlived in Missouri. Because of this, Missouri gardeners probably should treat it as an annual or biennial. It has colorful and distinctive flowers. Some of the more durable


period is brief, said Trinklein. "If annual poppies interest you, then Shirley poppy is hard to beat," he said. "Shirley" refers to any named cultivar of Papaver rhoeas. Some cultivars are quite colorful and have flowers likened in texture to tissue paper. They are easy to grow from seed.

Poppies generally do not transplant well, so directly seed annual types into the garden. If started indoors, plant in a cool location in peat pots or other biodegradable containers that can go in the ground with the plant. This reduces root disturbance and increases the chances of transplant success. Poppies tend to reseed themselves readily and can become a weed in the annual flower garden. To prevent this, simply remove seed pods before they mature and shed seed.

Another type of poppy treated as an annual in Missouri is derived from the opium poppy but is legal to grow in our state. Peony-flowered poppy (Papaver somniferum var. paeoniflorum) bears spectacular, fully double flowers up to 5 inches in diameter with lacy, tightly packed petals. It comes in shades of red, pink, purple and white and requires the same care as Shirley poppy.

### **MU Extension Works To Fight Startling Statistics On Mental Health In Missouri**

Mental Health Awareness and the Missouri Department of Month, observed in May, is a good time to look at the startling statistics on suicide and mental health challenges in rural Missouri, says Karen Funkenbusch, University of Missouri health and safety specialist.

Three statistics reported by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention are especially

troubling, she says. Between 2003 and 2017, the suicide rate for rural Missourians rose 78 percent. And rural men between the ages of 35 and 44 have triple the statewide suicide mortality rate in Missouri. Additionally, all of Missouri's 99 rural counties are designated Mental Health Professional Shortage Areas. That is the largest shortage of behavioral health care providers in the U.S., Funkenbusch says.

Those statistics come from "Growing Stress on the Farm," a 2020 study of expanding economic and mental health disparities in rural Missouri. The Missouri Coalition for Community Behavioral Healthcare, Missouri Department of Mental Health, Missouri Farm Bureau, Missouri Hospital Association and MU Extension worked on the report.

Those growing disparities have pushed mental health advocates in MU Extension to seek ways to help the state's farm and ranch families find access to services and break down pervasive stigmas regarding mental

MU Extension coordinates with the North Central Farm and Ranch Stress Assistance Center

Agriculture to provide resources through USDA National Institute of Food and Agriculture

MFA Foundation is another MU partner that commits to support rural communities in need of mental health services. "The MFA Foundation's substantial four-year commitment will allow the expansion of teletherapy sessions and increased educational awareness in more rural communities," says Funken-busch. "This generous gift will assist in the creation of more resources and the development of a statewide mental health awareness campaign targeting one of Missouri's most vulnerable populations."

This often means taking the services to farmers, rather than farmers traveling for treatment, she says. Time and distance are common obstacles that rural families encounter in finding counseling services. Technology helps to overcome these obstacles with services such as telehealth counseling sessions and Zoom meetings.

These "long-distance rela-onships" also help rural families fight off the pervasive stigma of mental illness. In a small town, people may often recognize your farm pickup parked outside of a counseling office, she says. Or they might worry about running into their counselor at community, school or church events. That may keep some from seeking help.

Telehealth services help to relieve farmers and their families ranchers and immediate family members are eligible to receive free, confidential teletherapy. To request free teletherapy counseling, go to www.muext.us/PSC-FarmRanch, adpsc@missouri.edu or call 573-882-4677.

Another MU Extension service is Show-Me Strong Farm Families, also funded by USDA NIFA. www.muext.us/SMSFF.

MU Extension offers many

other mental health programs to help rural Missourians. These include Mental Health First Aid, Q.P.R. Gatekeeper, Taking Care of You, Weathering the Storm in Agriculture: How to Cultivate a Productive Mindset, Communicating with Farmers Under Stress and Tai Chi. Additionally, programs such as Heroes to Hives reach out to military vet-

# INCREASE IN **PROPERTY** VALUE NOTICE

The Pike County Assessor's office is set to start mailing out notices to property owners in the coming weeks for anyone whose property has increased in assessed value since last year.

The primary reason for value increases in 2023 is due to an increase in land values for the majority of residential and commercial properties.

Land values in Pike County have not seen an increase in over 20 years. Other possible reasons for value increases are new construction, correction of error or omission in assessment records, new parcels and/or reassessment of a property. Reassessments are determined as of Jan. 1 of odd-numbered years.

Real estate market values change over time, even if no improvements are made to the property. Value increases and decreases are done by state law and are not the fault of individual assessors or staff, "We don't set the market, we only interpret what it's indicating".

The assessor's office determines value only: the taxing entities determine the tax rates. If you feel that your taxes are too high, then you should involve yourself in the budget process of the taxing entities and make your voice heard at their budget meetings.


