

Toll History Of Louisiana Bridge Recalled

Tolls ranging from 10 cents for pedestrians to \$3.50 for large trucks helped finance construction of the crossing, which had opened on May 12, 1928. Charles Billings was the first toll operator. The undated photo attached shows the toll booth and U.S. 54 on the Missouri side.

The new Champ Clark Bridge welcomed its first traffic without any fees on Aug. 3, 2019. The old structure was imploded on Oct. 18 of that year.



stead of the "poetic form" found in Hebrew texts. He still found room for literary redemption.

"Really, the wonder is that the discrepancies are so few, and this very fact serves to confirm its divine origin, inspiration and preservation," Smith wrote.

The Methodist Quarterly Review backed the author, saying the "article loses nothing from the fact that his spe-

cialty is another line." Upon Central College's 50th anniversary in 1907, Smith wrote the poem "Let Us Make Men" and com-posed songs which were sung by alumni and students who "formed a torchlight procession, and, headed by the band, marched through the principal streets singing," according to one account.

A log of dates and recollections never was far from Smith's reach. Many listings dealt with the weather, college milestones or campus activities, but others were more personal. He loved football, often recording the results of games, especially when Central won over larger-school opponents. Smith could rightly be called an early weather forecaster, developing a whistle code for climatic predictions. For example, one long blow and two shorts meant fair and mild conditions were ahead. Named head of the college's faculty in 1901, Smith also served almost a year as acting president.

Local Reporting Is Key To Drought Conditions

State agencies are accelerating drought response efforts in Missouri and developing resources to assist those at greatest risk of serious impacts. Reports of local conditions are a key tool in assessing the changing drought situation. The public can assist local, state and national decision makers better understand conditions in their area by submitting a survey form via the Condition Monitoring Observer Reports (CMOR) service at droughtimpacts.unl.edu/Tool s/ConditionMonitoringObservations.aspx.

CMOR is an online collaborative effort to crowdsource data on ground-level drought conditions as they develop. Reports and photographs submitted through CMOR are used by state and federal officials to ensure the national drought map accurately portrays conditions in Missouri and other states. By ensuring the map's accuracy, federal resources can be made available as soon as possible for drought-affected areas.

A Bowling Green native helped the world remember a phrase used to describe the proof Missourians are said to require.

Dr. Thomas Berry Smith was an educator, scientist, religious historian and scholar, but he also wrote poetry and songs.

One of them – entitled "Show Me, I'm From Old Mizzoo" – is a tribute to residents' forthright-yet-skeptical nature. The sheet music indicates the tune is "heartily dedicated to Missourians everywhere."

"Teachers should order it and have the pupils sing it," wrote the Missouri School Journal. "It is a good boosting song for Missouri."

Despite academic successes, it's clear from one of Smith's poems that verse was the talent he wished others had extolled.

"I would rather be a factor of a song the world repeats, than the blood illumined actor drawn in triumph thro' the streets," he says. "His the victor's scenic glory, dying with the rabble's cheers, mine the poet's classic story, living thro' the lapsing years."

SMART START

William Hugh Smith came to Missouri from Virginia in 1846 and settled in Pike County three years later.

The farmer and leathermaker specialized in raising mules. He married Isabella McCune Fullerton on Jan. 16, 1850. Berry, as he was called, arrived on Dec. 7 of that year, the first of seven children.

An uncle, Carr Waller Pritchett, was one of two professors who taught classes at Central College in Fayette during the Civil War, even though curators had closed the campus.

In 1866, Pritchett founded a college bearing his name in Glasgow. Smith graduated there with a bachelor's degree in 1873. Four years later, he married Emma Marvin Newland, the daughter of a Methodist minister who had moved to Missouri from Tennessee in 1832.

Smith earned a graduate degree and studied at Yale University before returning to Missouri and teaching everything from geology and chemistry to physics and Latin at four colleges. The institutions included McCune College in Louisiana. He joined the Central faculty in 1886.

Smith "is the best natural science teacher I ever saw before a class," said longtime Missouri educator James M. Greenwood. The State Teachers' Association called him "one of the most loved and respected" educators.

For much of the next four decades, the professor rarely put down his pen. No subject was off limits.

Smith contributed to educational texts, such as 1891's "Studies in Nature and Language Lessons," which was based upon the "theory that experience and expression should go hand-in-hand." It argued against having kids write essays about unfamiliar subjects.

'I hate compositions' is often heard from pupils who have good sense when they say it, and thus protest against the lack of good sense on the part of teachers who burden them with a hopeless and dreary toil," one reviewer said, adding that the book "should find a place in every primary and secondary school, and its universal use would lay a foundation for accurate expression and ease in composition."

The professor raised a few eyebrows with the essay "The Poetry of the Bible," in which he argued that the authors of the King James version had made "a great mistake" by "making every page of the Bible to look like prose" in-

PIKER POWER

As busy as he was, Smith always found time for his own writing.

In 1900, he published a collection of almost 80 poems entitled "In Many Moods." It featured three odes to Pike County.

The first was the oftquoted "Once a Piker, Always a Piker," in which Smith says that all who have placed a foot in the county are considered brethren.

In "They Voted Straight for Pike," the author sits in on a mythical debate as the gods argue over which Missouri county is the best:

"As last resort, some one proposed to vote by written ballot – each one to his like

When these were read in alphabetic rote Lo! all the gods had voted straight for Pike.'

In "The Pikers at Home," Smith pays tribute to the pioneers who helped settle Misand the West, souri concluding with the lines:

"Famous the song that was sung of Joe Bowers, lover of Sally and brother of Ike,

Song that was sung till this country of ours, grew into statehood, the great 'State of Pike.

On May 3, 1917, Smith and composer A.D. McCampbell copyrighted "Show Me, 'm From Old Mizzoo.'

The song featured five verses and a chorus, and was published by A.W. Perry and







Dr. Thomas Berry Smith Sons Music Company of Sedalia, which was in business for almost 100 years until the late 1960s.

"It is a jolly ringing song and the people will like it because of the lively music and stirring words," the Missouri School Journal said.

Smith and McCampbell sold the sheet music for 10 cents each or a dozen for \$1 around \$2.50 to \$20 today. The chorus goes:

"Show me! Show me! I'm from old Mizzoo

I have learned a few things, just a very few

I'm a willing learner, tell me something new

But you'll have to show me, I'm from old Mizzoo.

The song never was a big seller and other ditties that praised Missouri became more popular, but it has not faded.

In 2018, writer Rachel McBride Lindsay made mention of the song in an essay "Missouri: An entitled Ozarks Native Crosses the Show Me State." She says the tune offers "self-deprecating humor with defiant regional pride."

Smith spent the latter part of his life focused upon writing songs, stories and poems about history while being bestowed the title of professor emeritus by Central College, now known as Central Methodist University.

One article was about his alma mater, Pritchett College, which closed in 1922. He ended the piece with the Latin phrase "sic transit gloria mundi" - thus passes the glory of the world. Smith died at 82 in Fayette on May 8, 1933
