Even by today's standards, Mrs. Henderson was a staunch health advocate. Though a belle of Washington high society, she was no ordinarv housewife.

Mrs. Henderson was an author, real estate broker, architectural consultant and a fund-raiser for many social concerns. The most promiers were treated to her hospitality. It was in sobriety, though, that she found one of her greatest causes.

Community Bands Together To Help Injured Ambulance Crew By BRICE J. CHANDLER Said he had so many visitors, a replacement ambulance is

Thousands of social media shares and national headlines have helped the Van-Far and surrounding communities support the two Van-Far Ambulance District crew members who were critically injured in a July 4 accident that claimed the life of a Bowling Green woman.

As many celebrated the country's Independence Day, it was just another routine work night for EMT Leslie Dahl of Farber and her part-ner, Paramedic Jason Bostic of Troy. The two were returning from a call after dropping off a patient at Hannibal Regional Hospital when they were hit head-on by a vehicle travelling in the wrong lane on U.S. Highway 61 in New London.

According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol, 43year-old Terri Rucker was driving northbound in the southbound lane of US 61 at approximately 9:48 p.m., when she collided with the Van-Far ambulance.

The force of the collision caused the ambulance to roll over with the front end completely smashed in. A heart stopping image for anyone, especially family and friends.

Tragically, Rucker was pronounced dead at the scene by emergency response crews who responded in minutes.

Both Dahl and Bostic were airlifted by Air Evac to University Hospital in Columbia, where they were listed as in critical condition with life threatening injuries.

Miraculously, both have improved.

"Leslie was taken off the ventilator and is doing great!" Wendy Hull, Administrator of Van-Far Ambulance District updated everyone via social media. "Jason is doing great!



they had to kick everyone out. They are both in for a long recovery but thank God they are still with us!"

News of the incident brought on an immediate response from the community and people across the country with fundraisers being set up to help with expenses as they set off down that long road.

A barbeque fundraiser on Monday, July 17 in the park-ing lot of the Bar Code Bar and Grill in Vandalia from 10 am until sold out. All proceeds from the event spon-sored by White Rose Missionary Baptist Church will go to Bostic and Dahl. A t-shirt fundraiser has been set up by fellow Van-Far Ambulance District co-worker, Samantha Day.

'We are selling these shirts to help raise money for Jason and Leslie and their families," Day wrote on Facebook. "They are \$25 with all proceeds going to the accounts for Jason and Leslie. We will take orders through the 17th and place the order then."

A poker run has also been set up by the Sons of Light and Bar Code Bar for Saturday, Aug. 26 to help the injured EMS crew.

According to Hull, the ambulance involved in the crash was deemed a total loss, leaving the district with just one remaining unit. The district will likely use assistance from mutual aid EMS agencies for staffing until a replacement ambulance can be purchased.

"We have been receiving a great deal of support from our community and surrounding EMS agencies," she wrote. 'The ambulance involved in the accident is a total loss and leaves us with one remaining ambulance. Our crews may occasionally be responding to calls in a mutual aid unit until

able to be purchased. It is also likely that we will be utilizing intermittent assistance from mutual aid EMS agencies for staffing while we focus on taking care of Leslie, Jason, and their families."

Also in response to the incident, a bank account has been established at the United Credit Union in Vandalia to help Dahl and Bostic with medical expenses and loss of income during their recovery. Van-Far Ambulance District has also set up a Venmo ac-count (@VANFARAMBU-LANCE) to receive online donations.

The Van-Far Ambulance District expressed gratitude for the support it has received from the community and surrounding EMS agencies during this time.

"Thank you to all the responders from Ralls County Ambulance District, Marion County Ambulance District, New London Fire Department, Hannibal Rural Fire Department, Air Evac Lifeteam, Survival Flight, New London Police Depart-ment, Ralls County Sheriff's Office, NorthEast Communications (NECOMM) 911 and the Missouri State Highway Patrol who responded to this difficult incident and took great care of our injured crew members," Hull wrote.

Why Rucker was traveling in the wrong lane remains under investigation.

Editor's note: Following is the first part of a story series by contributing writer Brent Engel.

Perhaps nowhere is contradiction as prevalent as in politics.

No matter what the year, legislators find a way of setting new standards for irony.

Missouri U.S. Senator John Brooks Henderson of Louisiana was no exception. The man who introduced the 13th Amendment outlawing slavery once "owned" people himself.

But long after leaving Congress in 1869 and working on a host of progressive issues, the retired Pike County lawyer still had a dilemma on his hands.

More accurately, it lurked in his cellar. Near the end of his life, Henderson became a teetotaler and a prohibition

Patterson Dyer, described the senator's father as "addicted to the use" of spirits and "when in his cups was very quarrelsome." The elder Henderson died in a drunken brawl with a neighbor in 1836, when his son was 10 years old.

In 1865, Henderson served as a marshal for the second inauguration of his friend, Abraham Lincoln. The president asked Henderson to keep a drunken and rambling Vice President Andrew Johnson from speaking to the crowds.

Ten years later, Henderson served as a special federal prosecutor seeking convictions of people arrested as part of the Whiskey Ring tax scandal. President Ulysses S. Grant fired him when Henderson started indicting Grant's friends and close associates.

But the most likely source

In her 1904 book "The Aristocracy of Health," Mrs. Henderson called alcohol a 'poison" obtained from 'products of decay" that were never intended to be used by man as food or drink."

"The germs of putrefaction are simply death agents," she wrote.

Mrs. Henderson went on to lambaste wine makers for what she likened to destroying one of God's perfectly good fruits.

"How must the perversion of this delicious food strike the sense of the Giver, when endless tons of it – enough for the poor man's table in all the world - is yearly converted into a decaying, putrefying mass, to be drunk as a poison beverage?" she asked.

NECAC Class Offers Practical Savings Lesson

Martinez has Carolyn found a handy way to cut down on food costs.

The Pike County woman enrolled in a dehydrating class sponsored by NECAC. It's just one of many life-skills classes offered by the agency.

"I've got a garden going and I'm ready to have some vegetables," Martinez said. "I'm going to try. I'm going to do good. We've got a good class here. Everyone is wonderful.'

Rising food prices have led many people to look for ways to save money. One alternative is to grow or preserve vegetables and fruit.

NECAC's free one-day class for income-qualifying participants offered lessons on dehydrating apples and pota-



toes to make chips. "It enables them to have

more food that's sustainable and to cut down on costs," said NECAC Pike County Service Coordinator Penny Dixon. "You can buy more fresh vegetables in the summertime than you can in the wintertime. It really helps."

Martinez was unfamiliar with the dehydrating process. After slicing a potato, she blanched the chips for four minutes in hot water, then shocked them for a minute in cold water. The chips were arranged on a tray and put into the dehydrator at 131 degrees. Completion takes six to 10 hours, depending upon the thickness of the chips.

As an added bonus, each participant received a dehy-

drator to take home. NECAC Shelby County Service Coordinator Lisa Blickhan began the program this spring with 45 units and says there are about 15 left. She will teach the class in other counties upon request.

"We're very appreciative of what NECAC does and the people who come and teach us different things and how to save money," said another class member, Tammy Perez.

"It's a win-win for them," Blickhan said. "The families will be able to make their own food and cut down on their grocery bills."

Other life-skills classes offered by NECAC include gardening, healthy eating on a budget, canning, home safety, energy savings, stress management, fraud awareness and realistic renting.

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

Trees are a valuable part of home landscapes, says Harper. They beautify surroundings and help save energy by providing shade

Signs of stress include wilted foliage, off-color leaves, leaf scorch, leaf drop and early fall coloration. Most of the tree's active roots

are within the top 12 inches of soil

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
