Accident Claims Life Of Young Mother Of Two

Friends and family are reeling after a tragic accident cut short the life of a young mother of two.

Pike County Ill., sheriff, David Greenwood issued the following press release about the Saturday, Sept. 30 single vehicle crash.

According to Sheriff Greenwood, at 8:50 p.m., the Pike County Sheriff's Department responded to a crash on State Highway 106, east of Barry, Ill.

The vehicle was traveling eastbound on State Highway 106 when it left the roadway and rolled over.

Bowling Green Man Refuses To Let Roadblocks Stop Him

Editor's note: Following is the second part in a story series by contributing writer Brent Engel.

Adam Black Chambers helped make the Missouri Republican one of the best early newspapers in the state, but it didn't happen without controversy.

Chambers co-founded the Salt River Journal in Bowling Green before moving to St. Louis and taking over the Republican. An incident that led to arguments still taking place today occurred on April 17, 1841

Around 9 p.m., four men entered the Collier & Pettus financial brokerage at the corner of Pine and Water streets on what is now the Arch

grounds in St. Louis. Expecting to find the place empty, they instead encountered Jesse Baker.

The intruders killed the clerk and then tried to find keys to the safe. Baker's roommate, Jacob Weaver, showed up at 11 p.m.

"The door was opened, and the first step across the threshold was his last, being struck a murderous blow on the head with a heavy crowbar, which had a moment before been

transferred from its work of rapine to that of murder," wrote author Thomas Lynch.

Another two hours were spent unsuccessfully trying to crack open the safe. The burglars finally set fire to the building and left.

Baker and Weaver had worked as firefighters, so their deaths were especially grieving for the department. Both were about 22 and single.

The Republican said of Baker that there "was not a worthier young man in our community" and called Weaver a person "of excellent character" who "had the entire confidence of his employers and the esteem of all his acquaintances."

The crime took another deadly turn when a wall collapsed as crews battled the blaze, crushing Chief Engineer Anson Kimball. The New Hampshire native also worked as a carpenter and was "of ir-

reproachable character," the Republican said. He left behind a wife.

"We live, indeed, in dangerous times when such damning crimes can be committed in the very heart of the city and the brutal authors go unhung and unwhipt of justice," the newspaper wrote on April 19.

Authorities had four suspects, all of whom had worked on the St. Louis riverfront. They were identified as Madison Henderson, Charles Brown, James Seward and Alfred Warrick.

Henderson was a slave and Warrick had been kidnapped into bondage at one time. Brown and Seward were born free, and were what author Lynda J. Morgan called "militant egalitarians who bristled under racial injustices.'

The four were products of a corrupted social environment where the law allowed human bondage and African Americans were considered inferior. While the suspects sometimes helped slaves escape, they also stole them for resale and were involved in other crimes. Author Thomas C. Buchanan wrote that the attempted heist "was not an isolated incident."

"In a world founded on the wholesale theft of human life and structured by economic exploitation, the men roved the western rivers in pursuit of spendable cash, a quest that frustrated boat owners, urban authorities and southern slaveholders in the bargain," Buchanan said.

The city offered a \$5,000 reward - almost \$143,000 today. The men had taken separate paths out of St. Louis, but investigators caught a break when a local barber offered information. One by one, the suspects were rounded up and pleaded not guilty to murder, burglary and arson.

"Justice now appears to stand a fair chance of being meted out," the Republican editorialized on May 6. "They now, all four, seem destined to

pay the high penalty due to the violated laws.

Six days later, the paper was telling readers to be less judgmental, saying the proceedings should be "compatible with a full and fair investigation."

The men were tried separately by different juries between May 24 and 27. Henderson was first, followed by Brown, Seward and Warrick.

State law banned blacks from testifying, so the men couldn't offer their own defense. To give the appearance of fairness, attorneys were assigned to them. Since there was no direct evidence linking the defendants to the crime, iurors had to rely upon hearsay and the clouded memories of called witnesses.

In each case, convictions were handed down in a matter of minutes. Judge James B. Bowlin – a slave owner, former state representative and future congressman - sentenced the four to hang on July 9.

"You have time left for your penitence and prayer for preparation for the end that awaits you," Bowlin told the men. "Not so with the victims of your great crime."

The six-week interim gave Chambers an idea. Now, if the jailer would just cooperate.

NECAC Taking Applications For Utility Assistance The North East Community

Action Corporation (NECAC) is taking applications from the elderly and disabled for the federally-funded Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program and the Energy Crisis Intervention Program in 12 Missouri counties. The program is under way for applications from the elderly and disabled, with applications for all others starting Nov. 1.

"Apply if you think you'll need assistance," said NECAC's Angela Kattensaid braker. "The cost of utilities is going up. We can help a lot of people with any fueling type.' NECAC assisted about

9,600 households with utility assistance last year, and expects the number to increase this winter due to inflation and escalating costs.

LIHEAP offers a one-time payment to income-qualifying households depending upon the type of utility they use. The maximum benefit for tank propane-heated homes is \$495. It's \$326 for natural gas and fuel oil, \$318 for electricity, \$219 for wood, \$153 for kerosene and \$177 for cylinder propane.

ÉCIP may be used by income-qualifying household through September 2024, with a maximum of up to \$800 from Nov. 1-May 31 and \$600 from June 1-Sept. 30. Applicants must have received a shut-off notice.

Applications are being accepted online or in person at NECAC Service Centers. The monthly income limit for a oneperson household is \$2,535. For a four-person residence, it's

\$4,875. Additional amounts are available upon request.

The program is funded by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and is distributed through the Missouri Department of Social Services, which then contracts with NECAC and other Community Action Agencies in Missouri to administer the service. Payments are sent directly to utility companies.

MDC Announces Fish Salvage Order For Lake At Logan Conservation Area

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) has authorized an Emergency Fish Salvage Order for Lake #2 at William R. Logan Conservation Area in Lincoln County. The order will take effect Sunday, Oct. 1 through Tuesday, Oct. 31, 2023. Lake #2 is located in the northwest portion of the area.

MDC is enacting the order because the dam on the 6.8-acre lake is failing and needs to be reconstructed. Cutting the lake dam to make necessary repairs will completely drain water from the lake, resulting in the death of all fish in the lake. The Emergency Fish Salvage Order will enable anglers to remove as many fish as possible so as to

minimize waste. During the order, anglers may take all species of fish from the lake (excluding endangered species listed in 3 CSR

10-4.111 of the Wildlife Code of Missouri). In addition to fishing methods already authorized for the lake, the order enables anglers to take fish by the following methods during hours when Logan Lake #2 is open for public use and fishing: gig, atlatl, underwater spearfishing, bow, crossbow, snagging, grabbing, dip net, throw net, seine, and by

hand. These temporary parameters will expand opportunities for those who fish the lake. They apply only to Lake #2 on Logan girls." We Welcome Your Local News


