## Bobcats Secure Third Consecutive District Championship

The Bowling Green Bobcats have once again claimed the title of Class 2 District 7 champions after a victory over South Shelby in a highly anticipated matchup.

Friday night's game at Shelbina, Missouri, lived up to its billing as a showdown between two undefeated teams. Bowling Green emerged the victor with a final score of 66-50. For the players, the game meant more than winning their third consecutive district championship, it was also a chance to prove their mettle in a hard-fought battle.

For many fans, this was the biggest matchup of the Class 2 tournament. The Cardinals obliged by providing Bowling Green with their biggest challenge of the season so far.

The game had its share of ups and downs, including a 75-yard touchdown run called back early in the contest. However, the Bobcats maintained their composure and focus, responding positively to adversity.

The Bobcats struck first after shutting down South

Shelby's opening offensive push and forcing them to punt.

Bobcats' senior, Bleyne Bryant, put up the team's first points after making a 38-yard touchdown run with Dane Dunn adding the two-point conversion.

Again, Bowling Green's defense showed up and forced the Cardinals into a turnover.

The Bobcats followed up on their next possession with a push, resulting in Bryant making a three-yard dash into the end zone. After another successful two-point conversion, Bowling Green held a solid 16-0 lead with only 2:51 left in the first quarter.

Finding themselves in an unusual spot of being scoreless in the first quarter, the Cardinals were far from giving up.

They responded with a 70-yard touchdown run from running back Kendal Hammond and a two-point conversion of their own.

Bobcats' quarterback, Jace Eskew, wasn't letting the quarter end with South Shelby having a high note.

He threw an impressive 42-yard touchdown pass to

Dunn with 1:22 remaining to finish the first out with a score of 24-8 after the extra two points.

South Shelby fought back throughout the game by narrowing the Bobcats' lead down to only 10-points with their quarterback connecting with receivers for several big touchdown passes.

The Cardinals also made good on recovering an onside kick only to find the Bowling Green's defense too formidable which resulted in a turnover and another Bryant touchdown.

Their next attempt at the onside kick was stopped short by Walker Chandler who quickly recovered the ball.

Eskew, Bryant, Dunn, and the entire Bobcats defense were instrumental in the team's success. Bryant showcased his skills on the field rushing for 408 yards and five touchdowns in the district title game.

The Bobcats improve to a 12-0 record as they set up to face 11-0 East Buchanan in the Class 2 state quarterfinals at home on Saturday, Nov. 18. Kickoff is at 1 p.m.

## Drone Assists Audrain Deputies In Arrest

According to a press release from the Audrain County Sheriff's Office, a deployed drone helped keep a watchful eye on Vandalia at night during a recent power outage. But those nights weren't without incident. One such incident directly involved the Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (UAV).

On Tuesday, Nov. 7 during the late-night hours, members of the sheriff's office were assigned to the City of Vandalia for patrol while a scheduled city-wide power outage was taking place. During that time, the Sheriff's Office UAV Pilot was observing the area with our UAV that is equipped with Forward Looking Infrared (FLIR).

During one of his observation flights, our drone was "attacked" by another drone in an intentional attempt to cause a crash. The Sheriff's Office UAV Pilot was able to evade the drone and locate the other operator with the infrared camera. The pilot was able to guide deputies to his location and he was arrested, and his drone and related equipment were seized.

The man was identified as Ryan D. Breden, 40, of Vandalia. Breden was a subject who had been contacted by deputies out walking the streets at 1AM the night before during the scheduled power outage.

Breden was transported to the Audrain County Jail and

was booked for Attempted First Degree Property Damage (Felony) and Obstructing Government Operations, and he remains there pending formal charging and release decisions from the courts.

infrared capabilities makes it very easy to observe a large area and see anyone moving about."

So far, the drones have helped in various situations besides the Nov. 7 incident.

"We have used it a few times during manhunts, with some success, the latest, a month or so ago when the aircraft located a felony suspect from a vehicle pursuit," Sheriff Oller continued. "It's a valuable tool that we try to utilize whenever we feel it will be effective, and to cover Vandalia while the power was out all night and there was virtually no light, proved to be an effective use."

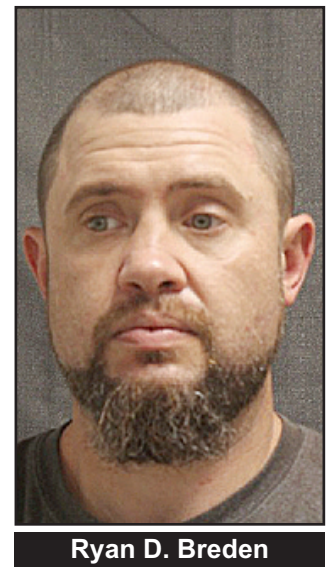
Despite receiving some criticism, other Vandalia residents were happy with the department's response to the power outage.

"Those three nights, there no reported vehicle break ins or thefts," Sheriff Oller said. "I'll call it a successful venture."

Records of the Nov. 7 incident were also forwarded to Federal Aviation Administration for appropriate proceedings to commence for violations of federal law.

Some citizens have criticized and questioned the department's use of a drone, but Sheriff Oller told the Tribune this was not a normal use for the drone. According to Oller, the department has had the drones for a few years, only recently adding the aircraft with infrared to their inventory.

"This was a special circumstance," Sheriff Oller explained. "With a city-wide power outage, it becomes very easy for anyone up to no good to be able to duck into a dark spot to avoid a passing patrol car. The aircraft with



## Pike County Becomes A Purple Heart County

Just in time for Veterans Day, the Pike County Commissioners gathered with a crowd outside the courthouse last Thursday, Nov. 9 to designate the county as a "Purple Heart County."

Along with a proclamation, the designation made by the Military Order of the Purple Heart signify that the county honors Purple Heart medal recipients and the sacrifices they've made to earn the decoration, which is awarded to members of the armed forces who were wounded or killed while serving.

"We wanted to do this for all our veterans in the county," Presiding County Commissioner, Bill Allen, said. "You are the ones who sacrificed for our freedoms. All three of the commissioners wanted to recognize that

sacrifice and thank you for serving our country."

During the ceremony, Commissioner Allen told the gathering that the county is in the process of having MoDOT install seven signs with the designation on them.

All of the signs will be placed at highway entering Pike County: two on Highway 61, two on Highway 54, two on Highway 79, and one on Highway 161.

The commissioners have worked with Senior Vice Commander of Missouri Walter Schley of the Military Order of the Purple Heart for the project.

The designation is one step closer to the Military Order of the Purple Heart goal of having all 114 counties in the state become Purple Heart counties which would make Missouri one of only a few states in the country to achieve the accomplishment.

Pike County is the 93rd.

"[Schley]'s group got ahold of us and told us about the designation, we got to work on doing everything needed to make it happen," Allen told the Tribune. "The other two commissioners and myself wanted to get this done this to kick off Veterans Day. All of this is for the county's veterans."

## MDC Reports 90,334 Deer Harvested

Preliminary data from the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) shows deer hunters in Missouri harvested 90,334 deer during opening weekend of the November portion of firearms deer season Nov. 11 and 12.

Of the 90,334 deer harvested, 53,159 were antlered bucks, 7,163 were button bucks, and 30,012 were does.

Top harvest counties for opening weekend were Franklin with 2,114 deer harvested, Texas with 1,825, and Howell with 1,726.

According to MDC, this year's opening weekend harvest was similar to the previous five-year average. Last year, hunters checked 93,355 deer during opening weekend of the November portion of firearms deer season.

"With the cool mornings and comfortable afternoons, it would have been hard to ask for more pleasant conditions to be deer hunting this past weekend," said MDC Cervid Program Supervisor Jason Isabelle.

The November portion of firearms deer season runs through Nov. 21 followed by

the CWD portion Nov. 22-26 in open counties. Archery deer hunting resumes Nov. 22 through Jan. 15, 2024. The late youth portion runs Nov. 24-26. The late antlerless portion of firearms deer season runs Dec. 2-10 in open counties and the alternative methods portion will occur Dec. 23 through

Jan. 2, 2024.



## Vandalia Community Asked To Volunteer

Four rugged horsemen rode out of the east and drew rein in the midst of a vast, open, lonely prairie at a spot far removed from unfauling water sources.

A place where rattlesnakes and biting green flies were prominent and prairie grasses were as tall as their horses, a barren place where pioneers would not settle. Other men had ridden across that same prairie with only a glance of contempt, including Ulysses S. Grant, who said this land was "uninhabitable".

These four rugged horsemen, Aaron McPike, Amos Ladd, John Haden, and Judge Harmon Caldwell with the spirit and insight to see beyond the obvious took their vision and laid the foundation of what soon became the envy of many surrounding more elderly communities. Amos Ladd and John Haden were among the founders of Laddonia (Laddonia being named for Amos Ladd) and Judge Herman Caldwell and Aaron McPike helped to lay out the town of Curryville in 1886 with this experience the vision of these men took hold and the town of Vandalia was formed. Due to the diligence of Aaron McPike for his remaining life, Vandalia became the Queen of the Prairie and Aaron McPike the father of

Vandalia. The Vandalia Area Historical Society is asking the community to volunteer their support to make Vandalia's sesquicentennial a memorable tribute to the residents of the past, present, and future. They invite everyone to attend the kick-off meeting Saturday, Nov. 18 starting at 9 a.m., in the

## Be Careful With Camp Fires

With ongoing drought conditions continuing around much of the state and many of Missouri's 450,000+ deer hunters hitting the woods and making deer camps over the coming weeks, the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) reminds everyone to be extra careful with campfires and other sources of outdoor fire that could cause a wildfire.

**MAKING A CAMPFIRE:** Clear a generous zone around fire rings. Store unused firewood a good distance from a campfire. Never use gasoline, kerosene, or other flammable liquid to start a fire. Keep campfires small and controllable. Keep fire-extinguishing materials close, such as a rake, shovel, and bucket of water. Extinguish campfires each night and make sure coals are cold before leaving camp, even if it's just for a few moments.

## Dave Willis Given Quilt Of Valor

On Thursday, Nov. 2 at the regular meeting of the Susanna Randolph Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution David Willis was presented with the Quilt of Valor.

David was drafted into the United States Army on Feb. 17, 1969 and performed his basic training at Fort Leonard Wood in central Missouri.

David was then sent to Fort Ord, Calif., where he acquired his advanced individual training as an infantry soldier, 11B, commonly called a "grunt". David shipped out to Vietnam on July 17, 1969 from Fort Lewis, Wash. After a stopover in Japan he landed in Vietnam the next day.

During his time in Vietnam he spent most of his time on patrol in the bush only returning every two to three weeks to do guard duty at the base camp at Bien Hoa.

While in Vietnam David earned his Combat Infantry Badge (CIB), which is awarded to infantrymen and Special Forces with the rank of colonel and below who fought in active ground combat in a brigade size unit or smaller.

He also earned the Army Commendation Medal for acts of heroism involving conflict with an armed enemy and the Bronze Star for heroic or meritorious service in a combat zone. He also earned the Vietnam Campaign Medal with 60 device for soldiers serving in Vietnam from 1960 to 1975, the Vietnam Service

David returned to the United States on July 15, 1970 and was stationed at Fort Carson, Colo., where he finished his enlistment on 17 February 1971 at the rank of sergeant (E-5) and was honorably discharged.

The Quilts of Valor Foundation began in 2003 by founder Catherine Roberts whose son was deployed to Iraq. She dreamed of a soldier being drug down an emotional gutter until he was wrapped in the quilt and his whole demeanor changed from one of despair to hope and wellbeing. The message of her dream was Quilts equal Healing. The first Quilt of Valor was awarded in November of 2003 at Walter Reed Army Medical Center to a soldier from Minnesota who had lost his leg in Iraq.

Each Quilt of Valor is formed by loving hands that join bits of fabric together, one piece at a time. Ruth Miller, who is a member of the Susanna Randolph Chapter constructed this quilt specifically for David and Mary Lou Lynn quilted it here in Vandalia.

Medal given to all members of the United States Armed Forces serving in Vietnam from 1965-73 and the National Defense Service Medal which is awarded to US Armed Forces members serving during the Vietnam war.

## Saving Lives On Screening At A Time

Lung cancer is the leading cause of cancer-related deaths, accounting for nearly one out of four.

cover lung cancer screenings, including Medicare and Marketplace Insurance Plans. Lung cancer screenings are available for a cash price of \$159. A lung cancer screening may be right for you if:

1. You are between the ages of 55 - 79
2. You smoke or have smoked an average of one pack per day for 30 years
3. If you are an ex-smoker, you have quit in the last 15 years
4. Or have one additional risk factor of COPD, pulmonary fibrosis, personal or family history of cancer, radon exposure, occupational exposure to asbestos, silica, cadmium, arsenic, beryllium, chromium, diesel fumes, or nickel

After a lung cancer diagnosis, your doctor will help you determine next steps for your treatment. Chemotherapy or radiation is often used to destroy the cancer cells and surgery may also be recommended. "Surgery can be an effective treatment for lung cancer and different options exist. Your doctor may also recommend chemotherapy or radiation after surgery. This treatment is a precaution and helps kill microscopic cancer cells, which could spread to your lymph nodes," shares Dr. Minoff. "The sooner you begin treatment for lung cancer, the better the chance of good results."

If you meet the criteria and are at risk for lung cancer, call the James E. Cary Cancer Center at 573-406-5801 to schedule a lung cancer screening or talk with your primary care provider.

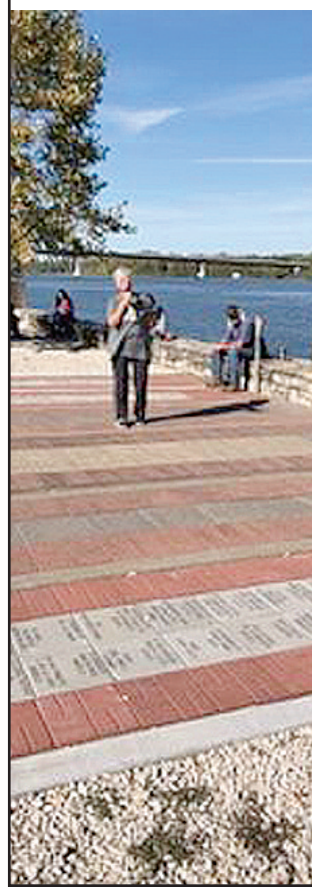
