

CONTRIBUTING WRITER It was a modest sentence that would have unprece-

dented consequences. On Jan. 11, 1864 – almost

160 years ago - Missouri U.S. Sen. John Brooks Henderson of Louisiana introduced what would become the 13th Amendment.

It simply said: "Slavery or involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime, shall not exist in the United States."

While similar to other proposals that had been made, it would be what author Michael Vorenburg called "the foundation of the final amendment."

Henderson, a former slave owner who had witnessed the Civil War's carnage, was remarkably audacious.


The Constitution hadn't been changed in six decades. The last update had been rather innocuous – requiring the president and vice president be elected together rather than having the defeated person serve in the secondary role.

The amendment "appears to us like kicking a dead man," the Nashville Daily Union intoned. Henderson stuck to his guns, saying that "the inalienable right of liberty belongs to all men.'

United States," he told Senate colleagues.

Henderson had many champions in his quest, not the least of whom was Abraham Lincoln. The senator and the president had been close confidantes since Henderson came to Washington in 1862.

Lincoln had told Henderson about his plan to issue the Emancipation Proclamation eight months before doing so. The senator proved a vocal advocate for the president's emerging views on methods to free the slaves.

In February 1864, the Senate Judiciary Committee added to the punishment

and James Wilson of Iowa were merged. The final draft was approved in the Senate on April 8, 1864. The House followed on Jan. 31, 1865. One day later, Illinois became the first state to ratify. Missouri did so within a week. The amendment was declared in effect after Georgia approved it on Dec. 6, 1865.

A strict constitutionalist, Henderson had been explicit about the consequences if slavery remained.

"History will repeat itself," he said. "New wars will come. The innocent will suffer again. Shall we then leave slavery to fester again in the public vitals?"

The book "Abraham Lincoln and the Battles of the Civil War" credits Henderson 'with rare courage and skill" for his efforts. Author Alexander Tsesis calls the 13th Amendment "monumental" because America had "committed itself to promoting freedom through a national mandate."

"This was no formulaic act; it created a constitutional obligation to preserve and further liberty rights," he wrote.

MDC Seeks Recycled Christmas Ti rees

What better Christmas present could there be than a new home? Of course, some anglers might say an improved chance to catch fish would be at the top of their list.

Christmas trees can check both boxes by creating a place for fish to live and giving an advantage to anglers.

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) is accepting used natural Christmas trees to create fish habitat at multiple locations in the St. Louis region from Dec. 26 through Jan. 12, 2024.

So how does recycling a used Christmas tree give fish something to celebrate? Turns out, a bunch of them can create the aquatic equivalent of an underwater condominium.

"Much like we humans need a home, fish also need to have shelter so that they can rest, feed, and hunt, said MDC Fisheries Management Biologist, John Schulte. "Christmas trees make an excellent material for building this much needed habitat in our manmade lakes across the region. This will help support quality fishing opportunities for our anglers now and in the future.'

According to Schulte, the trees provide woody cover that makes excellent habitat for invertebrates. These are an ideal food source for smaller fish, which draws them in like a magnet. This in turn brings in bigger fish and creates a situation that gives a boost to the lake's entire food chain.

"These trees will help young fish escape predators in the lake," Schulte added, "With this cover new generations of fish are more less likely to be eaten, which can potentially help support the fishery.'

The trees benefit some of the most popular fish that anglers like to pursue, including largemouth bass, bluegill, redear sunfish and crappie.

Since these fish typically spawn in shallow water, the trees are tied to cement blocks and submerged at depths of four-to-seven feet to give emerging fish easy access to their cover.

The underwater brush piles concentrate fish, so the submerged trees can be a boon for anglers as well. By noting the location of the trees, astute anglers can focus their efforts in these areas to improve their odds. Schulte said the treetops are usually visible for five-to-six weeks after being put into the lake before they become waterlogged and sink completely. This gives anglers until about

tential fishing jackpots. Resourceful anglers often mark the sites for future reference on maps they make themselves or by using a GPS.

Schulte said it's best to drop off the entire tree, without cutting it up or removing any branches. Tree donors should remove all decorations, including lights, garland, and ornaments before drop off. Sites where MDC is accept-



Finnerty died peacefully from this world Friday, Dec. 15, 2023, surrounded by his wife Maxine, his daughters, and their spouses.
