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Justin L. Schaedel Douglas P. Grote Dawson G. Miller Investigation Leads To Recovery Of **Stolen Trailers And Arrests** By BRICE J. CHANDLER

Last week, the Audrain County Sheriff's Office released information on a twomonth long investigation that led to multiple arrests and the recovery of stolen property.

Multiple law enforcement agencies including the Missouri State Highway Patrol, East Central Drug Task Force, the Pike County Sheriff's Office, and the Bowling Green Police Department assisted the Audrain County Sheriff's Office (ACSO) on the recovery of six stolen trailers, which resulted in the arrests of Dawson G. Miller, 25, of Vandalia; Douglas P. Grote, 47, of Curryville; and Justin L. Schaedel, 41, of Laddonia.

According to the release, around mid-January, an Audrain County investigator assigned to the East Central Drug Task Force received information regarding the whereabouts of a stolen utility trailer during an unrelated narcotic investigation.

"On Jan. 26, information obtained led investigators to an address along Pike Road 442 near Middletown, where they located a 2023 Maxwell enclosed cargo trailer, valued at \$15,000, that had been reported stolen from Maxwell Trailers in Boone County," the statement read.

the investigation took officers named suspect, Douglas P. to an address along Missouri Route BB in Audrain County. At the address, they recovered a Lamar Dump trailer which had been stolen from a residence in Laddonia. The trailer was valued at \$10,000. Information from that recovery led to another stolen trailer at an address along Missouri Route M in rural Pike County.

"While there, they recovered a Featherlite Aluminum car hauler valued at \$10,000," the release continued. "The trailer had been reported stolen the previous February from Chariton County, Missouri."

Using the previous information that identified people suspected of the trailer theft, an ACSO patrol supervisor located one of the named sus-pects, Dawson G. Miller, driving near Farber in Audrain County. The patrol supervisor, along with Sheriff Oller and K9 Andi, stopped the vehicle for an observed traffic violation. During the stop, K9 Andi alerted to the presence of narcotics in the vehicle.

A search of the vehicle yielded methamphetamine and Miller's arrest for the drug offense.

"Later questioning of Miller regarding his involvement in the thefts of the two recovered trailers yielded further information about more stolen trailers," the release continued.

On Feb. 1 at an address along Pike Road 48 near Curryville, authorities found a 2022 Homesteader cargo trailer that was stolen from Mexico.

Also on Feb 1, a trooper with the Missouri State High-Five days later, on Jan. 31, way Patrol located a second Grote. The trooper stopped the vehicle for an observed traffic violation and requested K9 assistance. Sheriff Oller and K9 Andi responded, and a vehicle search yielded methamphetamine and a firearm, along with Grote's arrest.

license in Laddonia on Feb. 1. Undersheriff James Shrader stopped the car for the observed violation.

"[Schaedel] was arrested, and his vehicle was searched with consent, and Methamphetamine was located," the Audrain Sheriff's office stated. "[Schaedel] was transported to the Audrain County Jail. A later interview of Schaedel led to more usable information."

After the arrests and further questioning, investigators followed the leads to an address along US 54 near Curryville and recovered the final two trailers.

"On Feb. 29, 2024, investigators recovered a 2013 Maxwell cargo trailer, valued at \$8,000 and a 2023 Load Trail dump trailer, valued at \$9,000, both of which were earlier reported stolen from Montgomery City," the release stated.

"I can't thank my staff enough for their hard work and dedication to working with other agencies to bring stolen property back to right-ful owners," Sheriff Oller said. "This investigation was long and intensive and is fur-ther proof that property crimes are many times directly tied to illegal drugs and illegal drug activity.





The Bradford Pear tree was popular in the 1980s, 90s and early 2000's for its' white blossoms that transformed the spring landscape, colorful fall foliage and its' disease resistance. However, over time, this beauty has become an invasive species. The tree has become an aggressive spreader that can quickly crowd out native species and make it difficult for anyone trying to manage acreage.

aiming to relieve the financial burden on Missouri's military personnel by ensuring that a significant portion of their signing bonuses remains with them, rather than being surrendered to the government. This initiative, supported by the House, reflects the sentiment that those serving in the armed forces deserve support from their home state.

Currently, Missouri law provides a tax deduction for active and reserve members of the Armed Forces. House Bill 1713 extends this deduction to signing bonuses, recognizing their importance in major life events such as purchasing a home, a vehicle, or supporting a growing family.

VALENTINE'S LAW SEEKS TO IMPROVE **PUBLIC SAFETY**

The Missouri House of Representatives has perfected HB 1692, also known as "Valentine's Law", aimed at enhancing public safety by addressing concerns regarding fleeing suspects. Inspired by the sacrifice of fallen St. Louis County Police Detective Tony Valentine, the bill introduces measures to combat fleeing suspects, streamline penalties for resisting arrest, and establish stricter consequences for aggravated fleeing. The bill aims to strike a balance between apprehending perpetrators and ensuring public safety, while also serving as a deterrent to reckless behavior. This legislation emphasizes our support for law enforcement and community safety, while also honoring Detective Valentine's memory.

a good food source for insects and their larvae. Take a look at your oak trees, which are native. Do you see holes in the leaves? Probably so. Oak trees are a "keystone species" and great food source for insects, which are a food source for birds. growing plants hydroponi-

Horticulture educators from University of Missouri Extension and Lincoln University Cooperative Extension are giving programs and teaching classes in hydroponics, a system for growing plants without the usual constraints of the outdoors - temperature, water, sunlight soil or location.

In 2022, regional horticul-ture specialist Donna Aufdenberg, and state specialist, Dr. Juan Cabrera-Garcia received a Specialty Crop Block Grant through the Missouri Department of Agriculture to teach colleagues, producers and home gardeners how to grow plants hydroponically.

Each educator received a hydroponic unit for growing salad greens. Most units fit on a desktop and use the nutrient



The Bradford Pear, one of several cultivars of the Callery pear, was brought to the West from China in the late 1800s as a small ornamental. Over the years, more cultivars of the pear were developed with an eye toward strengthening its weak branch structure. The breeding also moved the pear


