Louisiana Hires Gschwender As Bulldogs Head Football Coach

Bulldog fans will see a familiar face calling the plays on the sidelines this season. Last week, the Louisiana R-2 School Board announced that Steve Gschwender has been hired as the Bulldogs new head football coach.

Gschwender is no stranger to the role. He led Louisiana's football program from 2009 through the 2013 seasons.

Of course, Cunningham Field has been like a second home to Gschwender, who grew up on the sidelines watching and eventually playing under his Hall of Fame father, Coach Tony Gschwender, graduating before from Louisiana in 1994.

"I feel privileged to be given the chance to lead the LHS football program again," Steve told the Tribune. "The Bulldogs have a solid core group of athletes who I'm excited to work with."

Prior to returning to the Bulldogs, Gschwender has been the lead offensive coordinator for the Van-Far Indians who went 6-5 this past season. "I really enjoyed working last season.

with the athletes, coaches and everyone at Van-Far," he continued. "I've been with those kids since they were in junior high and love every one of them. They worked hard every day and care about winning; it reflects the values their parents teach them, and I am grateful for the time I got to spend there and hope to have had a positive influence on them."

Gschwender said he hopes to bring a work ethic and mentality that young athletes in Louisiana will emulate.

"It's remarkably simple to consistently be successful at the high school level," he explained. "All you need to do is show up and care about winning. Simple, but not always easy. We will be successful based on our consistency every year in those two things. Without those two things, winning isn't possible in anything you attempt. Hopefully, bring the type of work ethic and mentality that kids will latch onto and use as a model for how to go about their work. Show up and care."

purpose uses. The State of Missouri has entered into a contract with Nabholz Construction to build the enclosed, climate-controlled arena which will measure approximately 140,000 square feet in size.



What is a USE TAX that is on the April 2 ballot for the city and the county? A Use Tax is a tax applied to the purchase of goods from "out-of-state" vendors. Typically, these are purchases made online. This is to educate only and not to try to persuade you to vote a yes or no. Currently, when you shop in town you pay a cally to upkeep some area CITY OF BOWLING GREEN sales tax and the city, county, and state receives

income from your purchases. As it currently, if you order the same item online from an out-of-state vendor. you pay a Missouri state "use tax" but not a city or county use tax. The state is seeing income from these purchases but not the city or county. If the city/county passed this "use Tax" the city and county would gain additional income that would match the rate of shopping in Bowling Green and Pike County. This would put our city and county businesses on the same playing field. Taxes are a voter issue. To pass or reject a "use tax," it must go on a ballot and then be voted on by the legal residents of Bowling Green for the city use tax and Pike County for the county use

State Representative Chad Perkins Report

REP. PERKINS REFLECTS ON THE FIRST HALF OF SESSION, LOOKS FORWARD TO PASSING KEY PRIORITIES IN THE SECOND

HALF OF SESSION The Missouri House of Representatives wrapped up the first half of the legislative session, passing several key priorities before heading into their annual mid-session break. Regarding these key priorities, Rep. Perkins noted, "I am particularly proud of our focus on public safety initiatives, reforms to the initiative petition process, and supporting the governor's decision to aid Texas in securing our border."

As for the remainder of the session, Perkins expressed his desire to see a budget pass that includes provisions for rural infrastructure improvements, many of which he has advocated for since the beginning of the session. Perkins stated, "Infrastructure is vital

to the growth of our rural formatting standards and imcommunities, and I am committed to ensuring that the budget reflects that necessity." He emphasized the importance of addressing rural infrastructure needs to foster economic development and improve the quality of life in rural Missouri.

SUPPORTING VETERANS' MENTAL HEALTH

HB 1495 prioritizes the mental health and well-being of Missouri veterans. The bill tasks the Missouri Veterans Commission with expanding its efforts to prevent veteran suicide by reviewing and implementing measures outlined in the Commander John Scott Hannon Veterans Mental Health Care Improvement Act of 2019. Collaborating with the Department of Mental Health, the Commission will provide recommendations and implement programs to address veteran suicide, subject to appropriation. With veteran suicide rates in Missouri surpassing the national average, the bill emphasizes the need for tailored support mechanisms and proactive measures. HB 1495 mandates annual reports on the effectiveness of these efforts, aiming to set a precedent for addressing veteran suicide and ensuring veterans receive necessary resources and sup-

INVITIATIVE PETITION REFORM

HB 1749 proposes significant changes to the state's initiative petition referendum process. The bill aims to amend the Constitution by introducing specific statewide.

posing new requirements for petition circulators, such as U.S. citizenship or Missouri residency. It prohibits payment to signature gatherers on a per-signature basis and standardizes petition signature pages. Key provisions include setting deadlines for challenges to ballot titles, estabresidency

lishing requirements for circulators, and limiting participation to Missouri residents. The bill emphasizes efficiency and integrity by standardizing approval procedures, including review by state officials and advance submission of sample sheets.

PROTECTING CHILDREN, VULNERABLE PERSONS FROM TRAFFICKING, EXPLOITATION

The House passed HBs 1706 & 1539 with a vote of 143-1 to combat sex and human trafficking and protect vulnerable individuals. The legislation establishes the "Committee on Sex and Human Trafficking Training" and the "Statewide Council Against Adult Trafficking and Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children." These bodies aim to coordinate efforts, establish training guidelines, and enhance penalties for offenders. The bill mandates training for various professionals and expands the admissibility of statements from children and vulnerable persons in criminal proceedings. It also imposes restitution fees for individuals convicted of specified sexual offenses to support anti-trafficking efforts

Final Deadline For Access MO Grant

The Missouri Department of Higher Education & Workforce Development (MD-HEWD) has extended the final deadline for the Access Missouri Grant to June 1 due to federal filing technology issues leading to lower-than-expected Missouri filing rates for the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

MDHEWD previously announced the priority deadline was extended from Feb. 1 to April 1 due to the delayed federal release of the 2024-25 FAFSA.

The Access Missouri Grant provided over \$72 million to more than 35,000 students during the 2022-23 academic

Students who file a FAFSA by the April 1 priority deadline and are eligible for the Access Missouri Grant are guaranteed to receive an award. Eligible students who complete the FAFSA after the priority deadline but before the June 1 final deadline may receive an Access Missouri award, subject to available funding and based on the FAFSA completion date. Individuals who file by the final deadline will have until July 31 to make any needed FAFSA corrections.


