ment community from across the state gathered at the State Capitol to honor four fallen officers who paid the ultimate price for their service. The names of the officers have been added to the memorial's Wall of Honor.

Northeast Correctional Center's Kelly Rolando was amongst those names.

Rolando had served 8 years as a correctional officer with the Missouri Department of Corrections when he tragically lost his life in a head-on collision on Highway 54 Bypass in Mexico, Mo. The Oct. 22, 2023 accident happened as he was returning to the Northeast Correctional Center in Bowling Green after an assignment in Columbia.

The ceremony, which normally takes place outside, at the Missouri Law Enforcement Memorial, was moved to the Capitol Rotunda because of the threat of inclement weather.

Lt. Governor Mike Kehoe and Attorney General Andrew Bailey were among the speakers at the annual memorial service held on the first Saturday in May.

"It takes great courage, strength, and commitment for law enforcement officers to put on their uniform each day knowing that their duty requires them to run toward the dangers that others flee," Lieutenant Governor Mike Kehoe. "We can never repay the immense debt we owe those who made the ultimate sacrifice to protect us, but we are eternally grateful for their selfless service and vow to continue to support their families and loved ones.

"The 746 officers' names inscribed on Missouri's Law Enforcement Memorial represent the very best of us - a legacy of heroic service to protect Missourians, despite the risks" Attorney General Andrew Bailey said. "Today, we send the message to those in law enforcement who work to protect us every day that we have their backs."

Each year the families of law enforcement officers who have died in the line of duty the previous year, and through the decades, participate in the ceremony by placing white carnations in a wreath in honor of Missouri's fallen heroes.

On Friday, May 3, a candlelight vigil was held at the Law

"We owe a tremendous debt to the officers who made the ultimate sacrifice while enforcing the law and answering the call to service," Governor Parson said. We are proud to light the Capitol Dome and Missouri Law Enforcement Memorial blue, as we stand alongside the families and colleagues of our fallen heroes to express our gratitude for their selfless service to our state.'

President Packs Punch Into Louisiana Speech

Editor's note: Following is the final in a two-part story series.

Unlike presidential appearances in the 21st century, there were no protestors to disrupt or disrespect Theodore Roosevelt when he vis-

ited Louisiana in 1903. "The good order which prevailed throughout the day was another feature of which we feel proud," the Pike County News wrote. "Not a disturbance occurred and not an accident happened to mar the harmony and pleasure of the occasion and not a partial of partisan feeling was exhibited. The people recognized the president as their chief servant and honored him

A crowd estimated at 7,000 to 10,000 people was "anxious to get up close so that they could hear and see," added the Louisiana Press. It was "certainly an honor and credit to all concerned that the event passed off as nicely and satisfactory as it did."

therefor."

Roosevelt's speech, which lasted eight minutes, was well-received, but newspapers noted one slight bit of disappointment. Teddy apparently didn't get his shoes

dirty.
"It cannot be said that the president touched the soil of Old Pike for he walked upon an elegant Brussels carpet which (local business) Wald Bros. furnished for the occasion." The Press said.

Roosevelt acted as if he didn't want to leave, because handlers had to tell him it was time to get on his train on go to St. Louis. The president told Louisiana Business Association representative Bert S. Carrick that he appreciated the "hearty good will shown him by our people," the Press added.

"Good bye and good luck," Roosevelt said as the train lurched south from the station.

Others accompanying the President in addition to Democrat Congressman Champ Clark of Bowling Green and Carrick included former Pike County Republican Congressman and U.S. Attorney David Patterson Dyer, who would be appointed a federal judge by Roosevelt in 1907; former Louisiana city attorney, Pike County prosecutor and Missouri State Senator David A. Ball, a law partner of Clark's who would run unsuccessfully for governor in 1908; and attorney, bank president and La Crosse Lumber Company executive Charles G. Buffum.

The party also included Roosevelt's Secretary of the Treasury, Leslie Shaw, a former Iowa governor; Surgeon General Presley Rixey; and Presidential Secretary William Loeb Jr.

Newspapers noted that the train included a library, smoking rooms, an observation area, private office and barber in addition to a dining area, sleeping quarters and rest-

"Every convenience of the executive mansion is at his hand," the Press reported.

The reception committee included Louisiana Mayor John Cole and 90 other residents, along with dozens of people from other Pike County communities. There were also committees on decorations, grounds and platform, music, advertising and guard of honor.

In a letter to Carrick the next day, Dyer thanked "the people of Pike County for the splendid reception accorded the President" and offered appreciation to the reception volunteers.

"Your appointments were splendidly arranged and executed, and the members of your several committees performed their duties with great care and dignity," Dyer

Roosevelt was "greatly pleased (and so expressed himself on the train) with the splendid reception accorded him at Louisiana," Dyer continued. "The hospitality for which Pike County is noted was never better illustrated than it was yesterday. The loyalty of all our people to the government and their respect for the President without regard to party, is the surest guarantee of the perpetuity of our free institutions.

Dyer finished by asking God to bless America and "save it for our children and their descendants to the remotest generation."

"Protecting the rights of lawful property owners against squatters is essential for preserving property rights and maintaining order in our communities. This is a timely bill, given what has been happening in our country." Perkins said upon perfec-

Squatters who unlawfully occupy vacant properties can cause significant damage, accrue unpaid utility bills, and create safety hazards. Squatters also strain law enforcement resources as their removal often requires lengthy legal proceedings. Perkins concluded, "Clear laws allowing expedited eviction of squatters and criminal penalties for trespassing are necessary deterrents." PROTECTING LIFE

HB 2634 will prohibit abortion clinics from receiving Medicaid reimbursements. It bars the use of public funds, including Medicaid reimbursements, to support abortion facilities or their affiliates. The bill also grants taxpayers and the Attorney General the authority to enforce these provisions through legal action.

Additionally, the bill amends existing statutes to mandate that MO HealthNet participants can only use services from qualified providers. It empowers the Department of Social Services to terminate contracts with providers deemed unqualified due to specific offenses. Furthermore, it prohibits reimbursement to abortion facilities under the "Uninsured Women's Health Program."

Upon the bill's passage, Rep. Perkins stated, "Public funds should never be utilized for these purposes. I'm proud to have supported this legislation, and I'm pleased to see it reach the governor's desk."

SUPPORTING OUR MILITARY COM-MUNITY

SB 912 is a comprehensive bill aimed at supporting the military community in Missouri. It includes several provisions to assist active-duty personnel, veterans, and members of the National Guard.

military and National Guard enlistment and re-enlistment bonuses. This financial incentive recognizes the sacrifices made by those serving in the armed forces.

The bill also seeks to simplify the process for veterans to obtain handicap placards for their vehicles, streamlining the application process and reducing bureaucratic hurdles. Additionally, it covers expenses for military specialty license plates for veterans, making it easier for them to display their service proudly.

Recognizing the importance of mental health support, SB 912 mandates collaboration between the Missouri Veterans Commission and the Department of Mental Health to combat veteran suicide. This initiative aims to provide essential resources and support services to veterans struggling with mental health issues.

Notably, the bill extends benefits to veterans who served on active duty or in the National Guard between 2001 and 2021. It streamlines procedures for disabled veterans, allowing them to present VA documentation instead of requiring alternative paperwork to the DMV to verify their disability status, simplifying the

prehensive approach to supporting Missouri's military community, addressing various aspects of their needs, including financial incentives, accessibility, recognition, and mental health support.

Missouri Supports Texas in Secur-

ing the Border

MO SUPPORTS TEXAS IN SECURING THE BORDER

HB 2016 was signed into law on Wednesday, May 8, as Governor Parson traveled to the southern border in Texas to receive an update on Missouri personnel deployed to the border in support of Operation Lone Star. During the visit, the Governor signed HB 2016, the supplemental appropriations bill that funds the deployment, into law.

The deployment strategy involves implementing rotating shifts for National Guard members and dispatching highway patrol troopers equipped with standard law enforcement gear, all of whom have volunteered for the mission. In line with these efforts, the Missouri General Assembly approved a \$2.2 million supplemental budget request to support border security initiatives and replenish the Governor's emergency response fund.

known-as "a smart cookie' probably because I was reading before I was four-yearsold. I can remember sitting at the kitchen table reading the comics to her while she prepared supper. We were a large poor family - six children stayat-home mom, farm-worker dad, etc. Unfortunately, there were not many books, magazines, newspapers, etc., available for me to read; we didn't live close enough to a town, nor were any of the towns big enough, to have a library. When we finally moved close to Kirksville, I was seven, and my mom signed me up for a library card. I checked out seven books for one week and I was the happiest person in the

Clarksville had a library that was started in 1880's by Alpha Literacy Society - what a lucky little town! In 1896, the newly organized GFWC Fortnightly Reading Club campaign for a better library more books and beginner building, \$300 was raised; more books and land were bought to build a library, which still stands and is used today. It doesn't have a bathroom or running water, nor is it a public library, although that is the name of it -Clarksville Public Library. It is still open, unfortunately because of caused "by appointment" only. Approximately two years ago, the furnace had to be replaced, and most of the funds were used for that purchase. Today, two members of the board for the library have paid personally the utility bills and the insurance.

Long before plug-in air fresheners and scented canmake their homes more livable by masking unpleasant

odors. Herbs served that purpose very well and frequently were strewn over floors, said University of Missouri Extension horticulturist David Trinklein. Walking on herbs' aromatic foliage released their fragrances. Additionally, many herbs were thought to possess medicinal properties and were used to treat various ailments. Today, herbs add zest to our diet as well as fragrance to our lives, and they are becoming increasingly popular with

non-woody plant that dies dles, people used plants to back to the ground at the end of each growing season. A more functional definition is a plant whose leaves, stems or seeds are used for their aromatic, culinary or medicinal properties.

People have used herbs for thousands of years in interesting ways, Trinklein said. The ancient Greeks treated stomach problems with parsley and used sweet marjoram as a tonic. The Romans used dill to crown heroes and purify the air in their banquet halls. Scottish highlanders used thyme to impart strength and courage as well as to prevent nightmares. In medieval with artemisia to protect them from the cold. Early immigrants to the United States brought herbs with them, and they found many familiar herbs growing in the wild in their new country. Herb gardens were an essential part of

the pioneer homestead. Homegrown herbs became less common as modern grocery stores provided easy access to a growing variety of fresh and dried herbs. But many gardeners today are rediscovering the satisfaction derived from growing herbs in their gardens or in contain-

ers, said Trinklein. There are more than 70 herbs that fall into into one or nary, aromatic, ornamental and medicinal.

Culinary herbs such as basil, parsley and chives add flavor and appeal to food. Aromatic herbs include lavender, lovage and mint and are used to scent linens and clothing as well as for potpourris and sachets. Most are members of the Lamiaceae (or mint) family and produce strong-scented, volatile oils that last a relatively long time after harvesting and drying.

Ornamental herbs such as catmint have brightly colored flowers and are used in the garden for visual interest. Finally, medicinal herbs such as feverfew and angelica are

for treating illness or relieving pain. Modern science has confirmed therapeutic benefits for a few of these herbs, but the medicinal value of many of them is probably overstated. In fact, a few, such as comfrey, can be dangerous if consumed and should only be used topically.

Most herbs can be grown from seed, though a few, such as peppermint, must be vegetatively propagated. As a general rule, herbs will grow in any location suitable for vegetable production, Trinklein said. Herbs need well-drained soil for successful production. Incorporate plenty of well-decomposed organic matter into

the soil before planting to improve its porosity.

Herbs need only modest fertility; high fertility leads to excessive vegetative growth and poor flavor or aroma, he said. Most herbs appreciate at least six to eight hours of direct sunlight and adequate amounts of water throughout the growing season.

Few diseases and insects trouble herbs. If pests become a problem on culinary herbs, use a pesticide labeled for food crops.

Hosta Steps Out Of The Shadows In 2024

a shady area more than hosta, said University of Missouri Extension horticulturist David Trinklein. The hardy perennial that thrives in shade is low-maintenance and easy

"It is little wonder, then, why hosta was selected by the National Garden Bureau as its Perennial of the Year for 2024," said Trinklein. Its lush foliage comes in a variety of sizes, shapes, colors and variegation. Hosta is one of a few plants that brings attractive color to the shadiest of garden corners.

Horticulturists estimate there are more than 4,000 cultivars of hostas, he said. They range from miniatures such as "Baby Bunting" and "Tiny Tears," which are several inches in diameter when mature, to giants such as "Sum and Substance" and "Emperor Wu," with a height and spread of 48 inches.

Hostas usually fall into one of five categories based on height or leaf color, Trinklein said. These are dwarf, edger, ground cover, background and specimen-hostas of any

Leaf color varies between solid colors of green, blue and yellow, or variegated in any combination of these colors. Most variegated cultivars bear dark leaves with light or colored edges. A few cultivars are viridescent, changing from lighter to darker shades during the growing season. Others are lutescent and change from green to yellow. A very few change from yellow to white, a trait known as albescence.

Hostas also can be classified according to their leaf shape (strap, lance, egg, heart and circular) and leaf surface (flat, rugose, cupped-rugose, wavy undulate, contorted, piecrust or furrowed).

Like daylilies, hostas bear a compound inflorescence known as a scape. Individual flowers on the spike are lavender or white, depending upon cultivar. Some flowers are delightfully fragrant, adding further appeal to this attractive plant, said Trin-

Although most consider hosta a shade plant, relatively

heavy shade. Most prefer several hours of morning sun followed by afternoon shade, or broken patches of dappled sunlight. Hostas' aggressive roots compete well with the roots of most tree species.

Generally, blue-leafed cultivars need a shadier expo-Greenyellow-leafed cultivars can tolerate more sun. Most suntolerant cultivars will exhibit some leaf-edge burn if exposed to afternoon sun and Midwestern summer heat.

Some hosta cultivars take years to develop into a mature clump. Therefore, good soil preparation is a sound investment. Hostas prefer rich loam soil high in organic matter and slightly acidic. Good drainage also is important. Mix about 4 inches of organic matter deeply into the soil to prepare average soil. Wellrotted manure, compost, leaf mold or peat are good sources of organic matter. Plant in a 12-inch-deep hole that is 1 ½ times the cultivar's mature di-

ameter. Divide dormant hostas for more plants, or buy established plants in nursery con-

hosta from its container and free any tangled roots. Put the plant in the hole so that soil covers the roots at the same level as they were in the nursery container. Remember that soil settles when watered. If planting dormant divisions, soak the roots in water for about 30 minutes before planting. Always water thoroughly after planting.

Gardening experts disagree about the need to fertilize hostas. Some insist that most garden soils contain sufficient nutrients, making additional fertilizer unnecessary. Others maintain that hostas need more fertilizer. This group says to add a granular, complete fertilizer such as 12-12-12 or 5-10-5 early in spring, followed by two more applications about six weeks apart. Apply according to label directions and consider the cultivar's stature and vigor. Do not fertilize hostas after mid-July. This could stimulate late-season growth and prevent the plant from hardening for winter, Trinklein said.

Hostas need about 1 1/2 inches of water per week dur-

Perhaps no plant brightens height with colorful or unique few cultivars thrive in deep, tainers. To plant, remove the ing summer. Burned leaf tips lot of publicity as of late, said and drooping leaves are a telltale sign of too little water. If extra irrigation is required, water early in the morning to allow leaves to dry quickly.

Increase your hosta numbers by dividing the clump early in the spring when the shoots start to emerge from the soil. Most cultivars need about five years of undisturbed growth to establish the

Slugs and snails typically chew small, round holes to feed on the leaves of plants. They leave a dried trail of slime as they move from one spot to another. Control slugs and snails by using poison baits containing measurol, metaldehyde or iron phosphate. Place pans filled with beer in the garden. Pests will crawl into the pan and drown. Deer also love hostas. Repellents, electrical fences, guard dogs and motion detectors control deer, to greater or lesser effectiveness.

Other than foliar nematodes, hostas are relatively disease-free. Hosta virus X (HVX) is a relatively new virus that has been getting a

Trinklein. Cultivars with light-colored leaves may show blue or green markings that usually follow the vein of the leaf into the surrounding tissue. This results in a mottled appearance. Leaves also may look lumpy or puckered.

Symptoms on cultivars with dark-colored leaves are harder to detect and may appear as light-colored mottling instead of colored streaks. HVX spreads by mechanically transferring from an infected plant to a healthy one, especially during propagation. There is no cure, and gardeners should rogue out infected plants, Trinklein said.

It is difficult to choose which of the 4,000 hosta cultivars to plant. Look for a cultivar that has won an award given by the American Hosta Society or the American Hosta Growers' Hosta of the Year Award, said Trinklein. "Once considered a 'green filler' for shady areas, hostas are now the stars of shady landscapes," he said.
