Most communities battle cat populations so a few Louisiana volunteers have taken on the challenge of helping to control the population and health of feral, stray and "community" cats with the help of the University of Missouri College of Veterinary Medicine. A group of two licensed vets, two technicians and seven students performed surgery on 24 cats on Monday, March 27 that had been trapped the night before by Louisiana volunteers. Once the cats have been spayed/neutered and treated for rabies, they are released to the area from where they were trapped. The Louisiana Community Cat Coalition (LCCC) is a volunteer-based group that is eager for help and donations to continue the good work that is already yielding positive results within certain areas of Louisiana.

Voters Head To The Polls For A

Several local seats for municipalities and school boards will be decided in the April 4 election, along with two propositions.

Pike County Clerk Melissa Kempke said she expects voter turnout to be about the same as it was for the last April election at just over 16 percent.

The Louisiana R-II School District and the City of Bowling Green have issues on the ballot.

The Louisiana School District is proposing a no tax increase issue to issue \$4 million in general obligation bonds to do numerimprovement projects. According to the ballot language,

approval of the proposition is estimated to result in no tax increase over the existing debt service levy of \$.50 per one hundred dollars of assessed valuation of real and personal property.

The ballot language includes the list of projects the district hopes to accomplish including "acquiring, constructing, improv-ing, finishing and equipping school facilities and land needed tioning equipment.

Community Mourns Loss Of Mr. George Nienhueser

Honored WWII Veteran Spent 26 Years As Bowling Green High School Principal

Distinguished, admire admired, respected - there is no shortage of superlatives to describe the late Mr. George H. Nienhueser, Jr.

He experienced an immense life as a decorated war hero of "The Greatest Generation" who went on to be an educator and school administrator. His 26 exemplary years as principal of Bowling Green High School proved influential to his fellow staff members and thousands of students who passed through

Mrch 22 in Springfield at 92-years-old. He will be remembered by many as a trusted friend, a man of high standards, an advocate for children who left a lasting impact on the community he served.

As word quickly spread of his passing, a great deal of those who had been influenced by Mr. N. flooded the family's Facebook pages with fond remembrances that varied from salarms to that varied from solemn to amus-ing, and all full of heart.

Former student Ruthie Grote Murray remarked, "We may have been scared to death of him, but all of us walked away from BGHS with the utmost respect for him. Some of us still laugh about kneeling on the floor and praying the hem of our skirts touched the floor! Mr. N. would certainly have his work cut out for him if he had to enforce that now. Funny how some of the little things in life we

remember. Great memories of a great man," she added. Another former student Lisa Galloway Haney observed Mr. Nienhueser as "a guy who deliv-ered dry wit, offered a sweet smile, showed compassion and had a great laugh that echoed down the halls of the high

It has been more than 30 years since Mr. Nienhueser has patrolled the halls of BGHS, but his presence is still felt by a great many whose lives were touched by his influence.

"I was fortunate enough to have had him as my high school principal and then got to work for him for several years," noted Kent Hufty. "His son, Butch, was in our class so several of us got to see Mr. N. away from school. While at school, he was the man in charge - no question. At home, he was a dad, just like our dads. I learned a lot from him and will always be grateful for his guid-ance," Hufty stated. "Our community was extremely lucky to have had a man like Mr. N. lead our high school for so many years.

Mr. Nienhueser was born Nov. 4, 1924. At just 18-years-old he was drafted in 1943 and bravely served overseas at the height of World War II. He was an Army Sergeant who took part in the front lines of campaigns in Belgium, England, France, Germany and Holland.

The American Red Cross is issuing a call for platelet and type O negative and AB blood donors to make an appointment to give after severe winter weather in some parts of the country caused about 250 Red Cross blood drives to cancel in March, resulting in more than 8,500 uncollected blood and platelet donations

Platelets, type O negative blood and type AB plasma are three of the most in-demand blood products by hospitals. Those who give can help patients locally or across the country as the Red Cross has the ability to move blood products where and when they are needed

Platelets are tiny cells in blood that form clots and stop bleeding. Although they are needed for many reasons, cancer patients often rely on platelets during treatment. Platelets must be transfused within just five days after donation, making steady donations an important component of patient care. By giving platelets, donors can help patients kick cancer.

Type O negative blood can be

transfused to patients with any blood type and is often needed in emergency situations when there time to determine a patient's blood type. While less than seven percent of the U.S. population has type O negative blood, hospitals depend on frequent O negative donations to ensure it's always available for patients in need. Type O negative blood donors are an important part of the Red Cross trauma team.

Type AB is the universal plasma type and can be transfused to patients of any blood type in an emergency. Plasma helps maintain blood pressure and supplies criti-cal proteins for clotting and

With the 35th Infantry Division, Nienhueser's actions in 1944 were met with Silver Star recognition. While in France he led his squad into machine gun fire and was able to secure the position and then assisted with the

evacuation of casualties. The Silver Star Medal is the United States military's thirdhighest decoration for valor in combat. Nienhueser was also awarded the Bronze Star for heroic achievement/service, meritorious achievement/service in a combat zone. He also received the Purple Heart in recognition of his time serving in World War II.

Like so many of his fellow yeterans, Mr. Nienhueser's military experiences greatly shaped the man he became though he was selective in his discussion of those

Following his time in the military, he went on to help shape the futures of thousands of young minds in teaching and administration. He came to the Bowling Green School District to serve as high school principal in June 1958. He spent the next 26 years in that capacity until his retirement.

Serving by his side was his wife, Anna, who was a publica-tions teacher at Bowling Green High School. Both were well-

known for running tight ships. Bob Kirkpatrick called Mrs. Nienhueser a stalwart for Mr. N. over their 68 years of marriage.

"She supported him and they believed in a good school. They made a good team," he remarked.

Kirkpatrick came to the Bowling Green School District in 1975 as a junior high teacher and coach. He served for a year as a high school guidance counselor under Mr. Nienhueser before

becoming the middle school prin-cipal. Kirkpatrick said Mr. N. was instrumental in his career.

"He was a mentor to me. We got to know each other quite well over the years. He was a good example for me," Kirkpatrick explained. "He walked his talk. He didn't just have high expecta-tions for everyone else, he had high expectations of himself."

Kirkpatrick said he called on Mr. Nienhueser many times for

"He never told me what to do, but I benefited greatly from his wisdom.

Kirkpatrick noted that his most fond memories are of fishing trips Mr. Nienhueser would organize for male faculty members following the school year that lasted two or three days.

"He was a man's man. We all got together and fished and cooked and told stories. It was a good time and I enjoyed the cama-

Kirkpatrick added that Mr. Nienhueser was not someone who wanted to be fussed over and did-

n't look for praise or recognition. "A lot of students may have thought he was too hard at times but I think as time went on they could look back and know how much they benefitted from his expectations

When Mr. N. retired from Bowling Green High School in 1984 it was Argil Ellison who stepped into that position after spending several years at Mr. Nienhueser's side as an athletic director and assistant principal. Ellison came to BGHS in 1968

and found tremendous guidance under Mr. N. He also found a kindered spirit as both were avid outdoorsmen.

"We spent many days and nights talking about the school and education. We also spent many, many hours in the duck blind. He was a master at duck calling," Ellison recalled. "We

Soil Health Workshop Held At Pike County Fairgrounds

Health Workshop.

A Soil Health Workshop, focus-ng on Cover Crops, was held at the Pike County Fairgrounds, Bowling Green. The event, well attended by local farmers and landowners, featured several informative speakers. Dr. Randy J. Miles, Director of the University of Missouri Soil Health Assessment Center, explained their research and the purpose of the soil tests being taken state wide through the Missouri State Cost Share cover crop program, which is administered through county Soil administered through county Soil and Water Conservation Districts. Local landowners Harry Cope, Montgomery Co.; Jason Todd, Montgomery Co.; John Scherder, Pike Co.; Cecil Harness Jr, Pike Co. all spoke on their experiences using "Cover Crops with Livestock". Representing the MO Department of Conservation was Chris Williamson, who talked about "Wildlife and Cover Crops". University of MO Extension Department speakers; Greg Luce, Rusty Lee, and Charlie Ellis covered the topics "SDI", "Cover Crops" and "Nitrogen Management."

In addition to the speakers, there were several vendors on hand for attendees to visit with about the different types of cover crop seeds available and their costs. Also on site, was a seeder set up to seed cover crops, including the capability to seed in tall forages, such as unharvested field corn.

The workshop was made available through sponsorship by the following: USDA-NRCS, FSA; University of Missouri Extension; Lincoln, Montomers, Pike Lincoln, Montgomery, Pike, Warren County Soil and Water Conservation Districts; Braungardt Ag Services; Green Cover Seed; Green Valley Seeds LLC; HNB Banks; LaCrosse Lumber Co.; Lead Creek Cover Crops LLC; MFA; Service and Supply Coop; Frankford Farm Supply; NRCS grant secured by SWCD. Meyer Speaks To Ecumenical Women's Group

Peggy Meyer, co-owner with her husband of Meyer Farm and Little Noix Lavender Field, presented a program to the Ecumenical Women's Breakfast group at their first meeting of 2017 on March 13.

It was held at Centenary United Methodist Church in Louisiana with the ladies of Calumet Presbyterian Church as co-hostesses in providing a bountiful breakfast. There were 41 in attendance from nine area churches

Special guests were Dr. Todd Special guests were Dr. Todal Smith, Superintendent of Schools of Louisiana R-II School District and Marvin Brown, school board member, who asked the group for their support on the upcoming vote in April on school funding.

In explaining her background for her interest in growing and sharing fresh produce, Peggy shared that her father and grandfather were truck farmers and she grew up growing produce and get-ting valuable experience by work-ing at Farmers Market stands from a young age. She and her husband Charlie bought the property where they now live in rural Louisiana about nine years ago and discovered how excellent the soil was for growing a wide variety of pro-

The Meyers have invested in a "High Tunnel" that is being used to grow food in a protected environment. It is 96 feet long, 30 feet wide and 12 feet high and has many positive benefits such as the reduction of soil erosion, protection from the elements, and especially protection from the many deer in the area. Lettuce can be grown even during cold weather, and other items grown in the tun-nel include red raspberries, spinach, kale, chard, beets, car-rots, and tomatoes. The High Tunnel relies totally on solar heat and has a drip system to irrigate,

saving on utility costs that other greenhouses generate. Everything the Meyers grow starts from seed rather than plants, and the food ends up being sold at a Farmers Market at Lake St. Louis, at the Louisiana Farmer's Market, local restaurants, and at our local schools. Chickens, turkeys, and bees have been part of the Meyer

Farm in recent years also. Peggy originally planted lavender in memory of her mother and soon learned it was a valuable crop as deer don't eat it, it doesn't need a lot of water or care. The original field was killed off during a hard winter, so she started over with a new variety of lavender that is hardier during Missouri winters It is a culinary variety that can be used in cooking and teas but is mostly sold in fresh bundles through Farmers Markets to those want it for decorations. Many also feel that lavender can

be a sleep aid and so like to have it in their bedrooms

The Ecumenical Women's Group is a diversified group of women in Pike County with many different religious affiliations who come together four times a year to enjoy breakfast, fellowship, inter-esting programs, and who work together to share their blessings with others through many ways. The small charge for breakfast is donated immediately to causes voted on by those in attendance that day, and this group voted to give the money to the Community Food Pantry, Pike Pioneers Nutrition Center, and "Joyce's Trolley" which is a local transportation service that has a handi-

ful movement that is already yielding positive results in certain areas in town.

The group works with vet organizations such as the University of Missouri College of Veterinary Medicine which has brought a mobile unit to town for two-day events in which almost 50 cats are spayed/neutered and treated for rabies at a greatly-reduced price.

rabies at a greatly-reduced price.

Holland and fellow volunteers including Tammi Smith and Morgan Windmiller of Louisiana, and Barbara Simonton of Bowling Green identify areas where there is a large concentration of cats without dedicated owners. The women talk to residents in the area to estimate the number of cats and then go to work trapping the animals beginning on a Sunday night.

The cats/kittens are trapped in a

The cats/kittens are trapped in a humane manner and immediately collected. The cats remain in the traps with a blanket covering the cage to help create a calm environment overnight. The cats are fed and tended to until the mobile medical unit arrives on Monday morning.

Generally a crew of two licensed veterinarians, seven or eight students and a couple of techs perform surgeries throughout the day. Volunteers help shuttle the cats from a garage on the property of Jerry and Gail Smith to the surgery bays in the mobile unit and back to the garage following procedures. After surgery, each cat is carefully monitored and provided food and water until they are deemed ready to be released from the area which they were trapped the following day.

rabies for about \$8.50 per cat. The group tries to get about 50 cats for each event. Holland noted it costs \$300 for the mobile unit to vitis Louisiana.

"We ask for donations from the

"We ask for donations from the people who are trying to take care of the cats, the people feeding them and looking out for them. But generally they are people of limited means who just have good hearts," Holland pointed out.

She need that when the group

She noted that when the group identifies an area they try to make contact with as many of the residents in that area as possible so they know what they are doing with the traps and understand that it is for an incredibly good cause.

"We take care of the cats overnight before surgery and make sure they are fed, watered and have along numerous in the

"We take care of the cats overnight before surgery and make sure they are fed, watered and have clean newspaper in the cages," Holland explained. "After surgery we feed them again and add syrup to restore their glucose levels and keep them until they are healthy and ready for release."

She pointed out that research

She pointed out that research has shown that if 70 percent of the cat population in an area can be fixed that it provides a more long-term solution than simply using a euthanasia approach.

The People's Tribune will explore more of the research behind the Trap-Neuter-Return method in the second part of this feature in next week's edition. The second part of the article will also feature more information about adoption/rescue efforts and the organization of the group. LCCC works with the John Cotton Memorial Shelter and many other organizations. One of the LCCC volunteers is currently working on a new rescue organization called "Diva's Wish."





Three pitchers took the mound for the Bulldogs in defeat.


