

Coach Larry Lagemann Hangs Up The Whistle

Lagemann Says Time Is Right After 300+ Wins In 22-Year Career

After more than 20 years and more
than 300 wins, Coach Larry Lagemann says the time is right to retire and focus on other things.

Lagemann is just retiring from coaching duties for the Clopton Lady Hawks basketball team, he will continue to serve as the high school principal.
"I've been very lucky. I've had some great teams," Lagemann noted. "You

almost 100 cats in Louisiana have been trapped, then professionally spayed/neutered and returned to the area from which they were trapped in an effort to decrease the



During the last big event on Monday and Tuesday, March 27-28, a total of 34 cats (almost evenly female and male) were trapped by volunteers and then spayed/neutered and treated by staff from the University of Missouri College of Veterinary Medicine. The cats were released to the areas from which they were trapped as per the agreement that Louisiana Community Cat Coalition (LCCC) made with the city last year. population in town, particularly stray, feral and "community" cats.

The group responsible for making this happen is the Louisiana Community Cat Coalition (LCCC). The group approached the city with a plan last year that was several years in the making behind the efforts of Deborah Rue Holland.

The group is a not-for-profit organization with 501c3 status so all donations are tax-deductible. LCCC used the Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) method which has been proven to effectively and efficiently reduce cat populations and improve the overall health of homeless cats.

In information provided to the city by LCCC it was stated that TNR programs have proven advantages over traditional methods of animal control. TNR offers permanent reduction of populations, thus reducing stress on animal shelters, rescues and elimi-nates the killing of healthy, though unadoptable, cats.

MoDOT reminds motorists of the importance of driving safely through work zones with the observance of National Work Zone Awareness Week, April 3-7. #ORANGEFOR-SAFETY

Motorists are reminded to slow down, put their phone down and pay attention as they drive past work zones. Not all work zones look alike. Work zones can be moving operations, such as striping, patching or mowing. They can also be short-term, temporary lane closures to make quick repairs or remove debris from the

Driver inattention was the num-

es last year. The average text takes five seconds to read. Traveling at 55 mph, you will travel more than the length of a football field blindfolded. MoDOT's slow moving maintenance operations move as slow as 10 mph, and if you aren't paying attention to the road, you will come up on the closed lane very quickly.

Any time highway workers are present on a Missouri roadway whether it's a long term lane clo-sure, a moving operation, or shoulder work - your safety and the safety of those workers depends on drivers' focus and attention. Since 2012, the state Slow Down and Move Over law includes MoDOT vehicles parked with amber/white lights flashing. down and change lanes when approaching MoDOT vehicles or w enforcement and emergency vehicles with lights flashing.

"The law is simple: If you see flashing lights on the side of the road, move over to give workers and emergency personnel plenty of room to stay safe," said MoDOT Chief Engineer Ed Hassinger. "If you can't move over on a crowded highway, you should slow down as you pass them. We want you and our work-ers to make it home safe every day.

Furthermore, the method is proven to reduce nuisance behaviors such as yowling, fighting and urine marking. The TNR method not only provides financial savings, but also helps save time for the animal control officer.

"We are spay/neuter advocates and work with other rescues," Holland noted. "We want to strengthen the ties within the rescue communities and work together and help new groups get going."

She pointed out that other communities can adopt the same method and added she is more than happy to share the information and the proposal she drew up to work with the City of Louisiana.

The group held a large TNR event last week. A total of 34 cats were trapped in certain areas of Louisiana. All of them were treated by professionals with the University of Missouri College of Veterinary Medicine. The mobile unit provided vaccination, spay and neuter services and after-care.

Holland said that five locations (colonies) have been completed in Louisiana at this time. Each area had between three to eight cats.

The mobile unit comes for a cost of about \$425. Jerry and Gail Smith offer space for the work to be conducted.

It works out to about \$8.50 per cat that would not receive veterinary services in any other way. LCCC held its first large event

LCCC held its first large event last November and almost 50 cats were treated. A smaller event was held in February where 17 cats received treatment.

All of the work was done from fund-raising efforts by a handful of hard-working volunteers. Holland and the others physically trap the cats in targeted areas with humane traps. The cats sit overnight before treatment the following morning. They are fed and tended to appropriately throughout the process. Once they are deemed ready for release, the cats are returned to the area from which they were trapped. Cats who have been treated also have their ears "tipped" so they are recognizable to volunteers and animal control as a cat that has already been treated.

The mobile unit that visited last week brought two licensed veterinarians, two technicians and seven students who are completing training.

Holland said ideally the group could have about six large-scale events and smaller events six more times every year

more times every year.

Research has shown that if an area can treat up to 70 percent of the cat population, the numbers quickly reflect the results in the long-term. Just destroying a cat does not make true strides in controlling population.

Currently the program depends on the efforts of Holland, who also coordinates with other area efforts; Barbara Simonton, who also works with the John Cotton Animal Shelter; Tammi Smith who works with Diva's Wish Rescue; and Morgan Windmiller. Holland noted the group is in desperate need of more volun-

Holland noted the group is in desperate need of more volunteers. She pointed out that efforts can be as small or as large as a person is willing to give. The same is true of donations. The group has numerous ways in which an individual can give.

which an individual can give.

The group needs traps. LCCC currently partners with other organizations such as the Paws On Me group in Lincoln County which has donated traps for efforts in the past. There is a wealth of information about ideal traps on the

group's Facebook and other

fundraising pages.

The best traps have two doors and are 10-inches in diameter and about 32-inches long. Holland pointed out they are sold online and at farm stores such as Orscheln's and Tractor Supply.

The group also needs old flannel sheets, fleece blankets, food and cash donations.

The University of Missouri College of Veterinary Medicine's mobile unit has answered the call for Louisiana. During the last spay/neuter event held last week there were two licensed veterinarians, two technicians and seven students who took part in the efforts. A total of 34 cats received vaccination, and were provided spay/neuter services, along with the aftercare that is involved. Those cats were trapped in targeted areas around Louisiana and were released to those same areas. The "Trap-Neuter-Release" program has been proven to be a better long-term solution in controlling cat populations and behaviors than a trap and euthanize approach. The Louisiana Community Cat Coalition formed just last year and already about 100 cats have been treated and returned.



About five surgeries can take place at one time in the mobile unit. Cats are trapped on Sunday and Monday nights for treatment on the following Monday and Tuesday mornings. Surgeries generally take place throughout the day. It costs between \$300-\$375 to have the mobile unit so the LCCC is always in need of donations and volunteers.

There is good news and not-so-good news when it comes to bridges on state highways in northeast Missouri. There are fewer poor condition bridges, since some bridges previously in poor condition have been replaced in the last year. There are also 39 replacements planned in the next 4 years, and there are 2 bridges that are no longer closed "indefinitely" due to condition.

However, the Missouri Department of Transportation's Northeast District, comprised of 17 counties, is averaging 10 bridges each year moving into the poor condition category, and 63 bridges have been in poor condition for more than 5 years.

poor condition category, and obbridges have been in poor condition for more than 5 years.

MoDOT bridge engineers recently completed their routine annual inspections on more than 600 bridges and culverts throughout the district. "Since funding has been and continues to be a challenge to support maintaining our transportation system, our goal is just to keep all bridges open and, on major routes, avoid weight limit postings," explained Travis Wombwell, a professional engineer who heads up the Northeast District bridge division.

"With 10 bridges anticipated to move into the poor condition category each year, it is going to be tough to support our goal," he added. To help, Wombwell explained, MoDOT places a high priority on flushing and sealing all decks and maintaining expansion joints on bridges to help extend their use.

The bridges that were inspected over the last 6 months were located in Lewis, Lincoln, Monroe, Montgomery, Pike, Ralls, Randolph, Scotland and Warren Counties. Later this year, Wombwell's engineers will begin annual routine inspections in Adair, Audrain, Clark, Knox, Macon, Marion, Schuyler and Shelby Counties. Large bridges like the Mark Twain Memorial Bridge, the Champ Clark Bridge and bridges at Mark Twain Lake are inspected using a large piece of equipment called a Snooper, and these are done throughout the year. The Champ Clark Bridge is slated for full inspection in June.

Some of the higher profile bridge replacements that will occur this year include the two bridges on MO 16 in Lewis County, the two bridges on MO 79 in Pike County, the Route H bridge in Lincoln County, and the MO 168 overpass bridge in Palmyra.

"There are a lot of items we have to accomplish between now and then, but we are progressing at a good pace," Killen said.

The actual construction of a new bridge is expected to begin

later this year.

Killen and his team are working with MoDOT's external civil rights division to bring together the four teams and disadvantaged business enterprises (DBE's) to help prepare for the work. An event with these audiences will be held Friday, April 21. Any DBE interested in attending needs to contact MoDOT's external civil rights division.

The bridge will also be closed overnight between Monday and Tuesday, April 10-11 (weather permitting) to perform routine maintenance.

The bridge will close at midnight on Monday, April 10 and reopen to traffic on Tuesday, April 11 at 6 a.m.

Motorists will need to use alternate routes during this time. Message boards will be placed in advance on either side of the bridge to alert drivers.

MoDOT also wants to remind area drivers that MO 79 south of Louisiana will be closed later this year to replace two bridges. The contract for new bridges over Buffalo Creek and Noix Creek is expected to be awarded next week at the Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission meeting. A public informational meeting will be held later this spring when more details are known about the project.




