Louisiana Community Cat Coalition Efforts Yielding Positive Results In Controlling Population, Behavior

Volunteer-Based Organization Needs Help, Donations To Continue Work

In less than a year of operation,

almost 100 cats in Louisiana have been trapped, then professionally spayed/neutered and returned to the area from which they were trapped in an effort to decrease the

population in town, particularly stray, feral and "community" cats.

The group responsible for making this happen is the Louisiana Community Cat Coalition (LCCC). The group approached the city with a plan last year that was several years in the making behind the efforts of Deborah Rue Holland.

The group is a not-for-profit organization with 501(c)(3) status so all donations are tax-deductible. LCCC used the Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) method which has been proven to effectively and efficiently reduce cat populations and improve the overall health of homeless cats.

In information provided to the city by LCCC it was stated that TNR programs have proven advantages over traditional methods of animal control. TNR offers permanent reduction of populations, thus reducing stress on animal shelters, rescues and eliminates the killing of healthy, though unadoptable, cats.

Coach Larry Lagemann Hangs Up The Whistle

Lagemann Says Time Is Right After 300+ Wins In 22-Year Career

After more than 20 years and more than 300 wins, Coach Larry Lagemann says the time is right to retire and focus on other things.

Lagemann is just retiring from coaching duties for the Clopton Lady Hawks basketball team, he will continue to serve as the high school principal.

"I've been very lucky. I've had some great teams," Lagemann noted. "You don't always measure success by wins and losses, but I've been very fortunate."

Lagemann retires with a total record of 309-188. He was the boy's head coach at Clopton from 1997 until 2006. He said he was known as "Mr. 99" for

a while because he seemed to get stuck on that number. He left the coaching position in 2006 when he became the high school principal. His record with the boy's team was 99-137.

"I always wanted to be a boy's head coach. And I really enjoyed it."

Lagemann noted that he came to the Clopton School District in 1995 and spent two years as the assistant coach for Ed Lindsay's storied Lady Hawks program. He added that it was a pleasure to serve alongside him as the boy's coach as well.

"When I got the principal's job, I thought I was done with coaching, but I came back in 2008."

Prep Work To Take Place For New Champ Clark Bridge

This week the Missouri Department of Transportation and its contractor will have work zones set up on Highway 54 on either side of the Champ Clark Bridge, as well as on Third Street in Louisiana, to do some core drilling in preparation for the new bridge.

There are four locations, and in each area, the highway will be down to one lane throughout each day.

"This is one of several things we are trying to accomplish prior to actual work beginning to replace the bridge later this fall," explained Keith Killen, a professional engineer with MoDOT's Northeast District and project manager for the new bridge.

Killen said there are four teams

competing for the design-build contract for the new bridge, and it is anticipated one of these teams will receive the contract award at the Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission meeting to be held in Pike County in late June.

Long-time Louisiana Fire Chief Mike Lesley made the announcement last summer that he would be stepping down in command and recently the department held an election for his replacement.

Mike Poyser has taken over as acting chief. His official appointment as chief will take place at this month's regular city council meeting on Monday, April 10.

Assistant Chief will continue to be Philip Quattrocchi, First Captain is Mike Chidster and Second Captain is Brandon Brown.

Lesley noted the only position that is changing is to take over the spot he's held for the past almost 14 years.

"(Poyser) is a really good guy. He is very knowledgeable and experienced," Lesley told The Trib on Monday.

MoCHIPS Child ID At Clopton

Keeping children safe is an important priority for school districts. This is why Pike County R-III School District (Clopton) has teamed with the Missouri Masonic Children's Foundation to offer the MoCHIP Child ID (Missouri Child Identification) Program.

The MoCHIP ID program will be held Saturday, April 8 from 10 a.m.-2 p.m. at Clopton Elementary in conjunction with the Parents As Teachers (PAT) Spring Fling.

This free program is a comprehensive child identification program designed to give families a measure of protection against missing and abducted children. The program consists of five com-

ponents: digital photographs, digital fingerprints, child information and emergency contacts, dental bite impressions and two laminated ID cards. The information is given to parents or guardians of the children on a mini-CD computer disk. The disk is compatible with the format for the "AMBER ALERT" program.

MoDOT Work Zones Are A No Phone Zone

The start of spring signals the start of a busy season of construction and maintenance work on Missouri's nearly 34,000 miles of state roads and bridges. MoDOT reminds motorists of the importance of driving safely through work zones with the observance of National Work Zone Awareness Week, April 3-7. #ORANGEFORSAFETY

Motorists are reminded to slow down, put their phone down and pay attention as they drive past work zones. Not all work zones look alike. Work zones can be moving operations, such as striping, patching or mowing. They can also be short-term, temporary lane closures to make quick repairs or remove debris from the roadway.

Driver inattention was the num-

ber one cause of work zone crashes last year. The average text takes five seconds to read. Traveling at 55 mph, you will travel more than the length of a football field - blindfolded. MoDOT's slow moving maintenance operations move as slow as 10 mph, and if you aren't paying attention to the road, you will come up on the closed lane very quickly.

Any time highway workers are present on a Missouri roadway - whether it's a long term lane closure, a moving operation, or shoulder work - your safety and the safety of those workers depends on drivers' focus and attention. Since 2012, the state Slow Down and Move Over law includes MoDOT vehicles parked with amber/white lights flashing.

Motorists are required to slow down and change lanes when approaching MoDOT vehicles or law enforcement and emergency vehicles with lights flashing.

"The law is simple: If you see flashing lights on the side of the road, move over to give workers and emergency personnel plenty of room to stay safe," said MoDOT Chief Engineer Ed Hassinger. "If you can't move over on a crowded highway, you should slow down as you pass them. We want you and our workers to make it home safe every day."

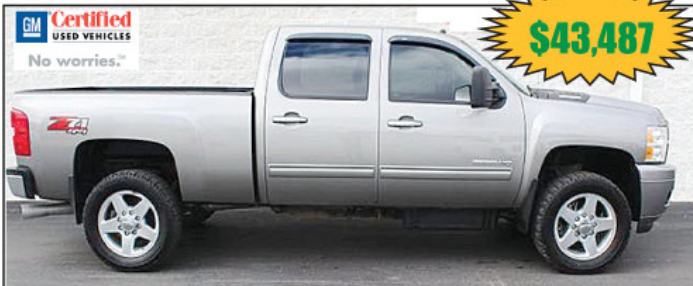

Furthermore, the method is proven to reduce nuisance behaviors such as yowling, fighting and urine marking. The TNR method not only provides financial savings, but also helps save time for the animal control officer.

"We are spay/neuter advocates and work with other rescues," Holland noted. "We want to strengthen the ties within the rescue communities and work together and help new groups get going."

She pointed out that other communities can adopt the same method and added she is more than happy to share the information and the proposal she drew up to work with the City of Louisiana.

The group held a large TNR event last week. A total of 34 cats were trapped in certain areas of Louisiana. All of them were treated by professionals with the University of Missouri College of Veterinary Medicine. The mobile unit provided vaccination, spay and neuter services and after-care.

Holland said that five locations (colonies) have been completed in Louisiana at this time. Each area had between three to eight cats.

The mobile unit comes for a cost of about \$425. Jerry and Gail Smith offer space for the work to be conducted.

It works out to about \$8.50 per cat that would not receive veterinary services in any other way.

LCCC held its first large event last November and almost 50 cats were treated. A smaller event was held in February where 17 cats received treatment.

All of the work was done from fund-raising efforts by a handful of hard-working volunteers.

Holland and the others physically trap the cats in targeted areas with humane traps. The cats sit overnight before treatment the following morning. They are fed and tended to appropriately throughout the process. Once they are deemed ready for release, the cats are returned to the area from which they were trapped. Cats who have been treated also have their ears "tipped" so they are recognizable to volunteers and animal control as a cat that has already been treated.

The mobile unit that visited last week brought two licensed veterinarians, two technicians and seven students who are completing training.

Holland said ideally the group could have about six large-scale events and smaller events six more times every year.

Research has shown that if an area can treat up to 70 percent of the cat population, the numbers quickly reflect the results in the long-term. Just destroying a cat does not make true strides in controlling population.

Currently the program depends on the efforts of Holland, who also coordinates with other area efforts; Barbara Simonton, who also works with the John Cotton Animal Shelter; Tammi Smith who works with Diva's Wish Rescue; and Morgan Windmill.

Holland noted the group is in desperate need of more volunteers. She pointed out that efforts can be as small or as large as a person is willing to give. The same is true of donations. The group has numerous ways in which an individual can give.

The group needs traps. LCCC currently partners with other organizations such as the Paws On Me group in Lincoln County which has donated traps for efforts in the past. There is a wealth of information about ideal traps on the

group's Facebook and other fundraising pages.

The best traps have two doors and are 10-inches in diameter and about 32-inches long. Holland pointed out they are sold online and at farm stores such as Orscheln's and Tractor Supply.

The group also needs old flannel sheets, fleece blankets, food and cash donations.

TNR stops the breeding cycle of cats and therefore improves their lives while preventing reproduction. Holland noted the group also tries to educate people who feed and care for stray or "community cats" to help the situation be more neighbor-friendly.

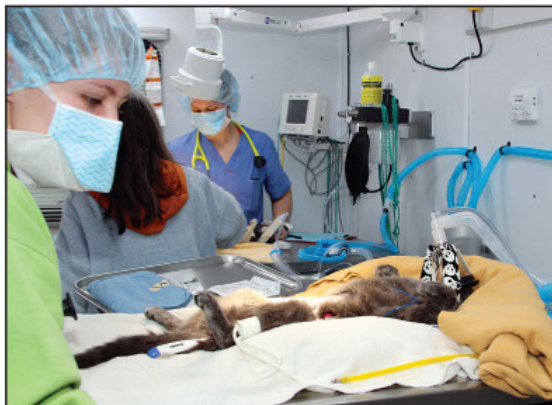

The University of Missouri College of Veterinary Medicine's mobile unit has answered the call for Louisiana. During the last spay/neuter event held last week there were two licensed veterinarians, two technicians and seven students who took part in the efforts. A total of 34 cats received vaccination, and were provided spay/neuter services, along with the aftercare that is involved. Those cats were trapped in targeted areas around Louisiana and were released to those same areas. The "Trap-Neuter-Release" program has been proven to be a better long-term solution in controlling cat populations and behaviors than a trap and euthanize approach. The Louisiana Community Cat Coalition formed just last year and already about 100 cats have been treated and returned.

About five surgeries can take place at one time in the mobile unit. Cats are trapped on Sunday and Monday nights for treatment on the following Monday and Tuesday mornings. Surgeries generally take place throughout the day. It costs between \$300-\$375 to have the mobile unit so the LCCC is always in need of donations and volunteers.

Two Pike County Bridges Make MoDOT's Top Priority List

There is good news and not-so-good news when it comes to bridges on state highways in northeast Missouri. There are fewer poor condition bridges, since some bridges previously in poor condition have been replaced in the last year. There are also 39 replacements planned in the next 4 years, and there are 2 bridges that are no longer closed "indefinitely" due to condition.

However, the Missouri Department of Transportation's Northeast District, comprised of 17 counties, is averaging 10 bridges each year moving into the poor condition category, and 63 bridges have been in poor condition for more than 5 years.

MoDOT bridge engineers recently completed their routine annual inspections on more than 600 bridges and culverts throughout the district. "Since funding has been and continues to be a challenge to support maintaining our transportation system, our goal is just to keep all bridges open and, on major routes, avoid weight limit postings," explained Travis Wombwell, a professional engineer who heads up the Northeast District bridge division.

"With 10 bridges anticipated to move into the poor condition category each year, it is going to be tough to support our goal," he added. To help, Wombwell

explained, MoDOT places a high priority on flushing and sealing all decks and maintaining expansion joints on bridges to help extend their use.

The bridges that were inspected over the last 6 months were located in Lewis, Lincoln, Monroe, Montgomery, Pike, Ralls, Randolph, Scotland and Warren Counties. Later this year, Wombwell's engineers will begin annual routine inspections in Adair, Audrain, Clark, Knox, Macon, Marion, Schuyler and Shelby Counties. Large bridges like the Mark Twain Memorial Bridge, the Champ Clark Bridge and bridges at Mark Twain Lake are inspected using a large piece of equipment called a Snooper, and these are done throughout the year. The Champ Clark Bridge is slated for full inspection in June.

Some of the higher profile bridge replacements that will occur this year include the two bridges on MO 16 in Lewis County, the two bridges on MO 79 in Pike County, the Route H bridge in Lincoln County, and the MO 168 overpass bridge in Palmyra.

For more information about upcoming road work by county, go to www.modot.org/northeast. You can also sign up to receive email notifications and text alerts for road closures in your area.

The bridge will close at midnight on Monday, April 10 and reopen to traffic on Tuesday, April 11 at 6 a.m.

Motorists will need to use alternate routes during this time. Message boards will be placed in advance on either side of the bridge to alert drivers.

MoDOT also wants to remind area drivers that MO 79 south of Louisiana will be closed later this year to replace two bridges. The contract for new bridges over Buffalo Creek and Noix Creek is expected to be awarded next week at the Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission meeting. A public informational meeting will be held later this spring when more details are known about the project.

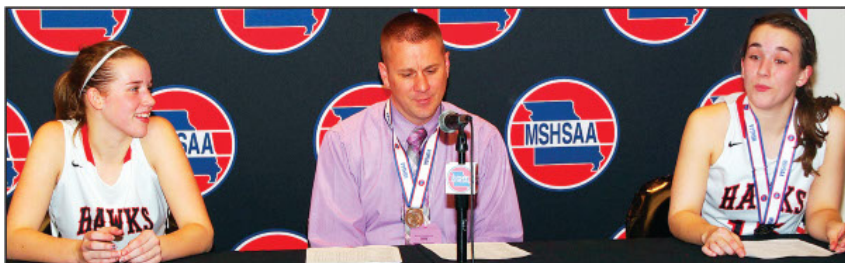

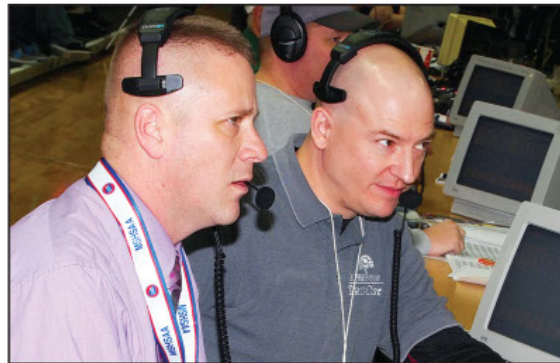

returned with third place hardware and completed a 27-4 record for the season.

Last year the Lady Hawks posted a 24-5 season and came up short in the state quarterfinal. This year the team finished 26-2 and fell in the district championship.

Overall, Lagemann retires with an overall record of 210-52 for girl's basketball.

"I was very fortunate to have talented girl's teams over the years."

He added that he can't pick a favorite bench from which to coach. He said there were positive take-aways from coaching boys and from coaching girls.

"The bottom line is you're teaching them the game and you want to teach them how to be successful."

Basketball is a fluent language in the Lagemann household. While Larry was a student he was coached by Dale Miller and his wife, Susan, was coached by Ed Lindsay. Over the years, Susan has been right by her husband's side teaching and cheering and the kids have followed right along.

"I sort of followed in (Miller's) footsteps as an administrator and coach. He was instrumental in getting me hired at Clopton," Lagemann remarked. "With him and Coach Lindsay, I had really good role models and mentors. People with that amount of experience and knowledge - I used them as a model and a guide."

Lagemann is home-grown talent and also played for two years at Culver-Stockton and two years at Maryville University before hanging it up as a player and taking over a whistle behind the bench.

He noted that he matured as a per-

son and as a coach over the years.

"I adjusted to the kids. They want to be taught. They want to be cared about. They know what's expected of them if they get the same effort from you," Lagemann observed. "There have been years where a team has exceeded expectations and there are years where you don't feel like you hit your potential. I just like the see the kids be successful and compete."

Lagemann is leaving the coaching position as his youngest son, Evan, will be finishing junior high and entering high school in the next school year. Ashtyn will also be playing with John Wood Community College starting in the fall.

"It came together at the right time," he noted.

Lagemann said that while he was able to spend a great deal of time with his girls while coaching, it sometimes came at the expense of activities in which Evan competed in junior high track and basketball. Lagemann said that leaving coaching will allow him more time to spend at Evan's activities while still attending Ashtyn's games.

"It's going to be a big adjustment for all of us," Lagemann said. "Our lives have revolved around this. It will be a lifestyle adjustment."

Lagemann said he has enjoyed so many years that it's hard to pick out his most fond memories.

He pointed to his second year as head coach (1998-1999) of the boy's program, when the team finished 14-14 for the season and claimed the district championship.

He also noted the 2011 and 2015 seasons when the girl's teams competed in the state tournament.

He added the year with both his daughters on the team at state will always hold a special place in his heart.

That memory, along with many oth-

ers, are treasured by Lauren as well.

"Having my dad as my coach was definitely challenging because we didn't have the typical coach-player relationship. He was definitely harder on myself and Ashtyn than he was on other players, especially in practices, which is something I don't think a lot of people understand," she stated. "I wouldn't have wanted to have anyone else as my coach though, because it just makes all the success we had that much greater since it was with my dad. Going to the Final Four was definitely the best ending I could have had to a career with my dad and is by far my favorite memory and something I wish every player who has a parent that's a coach could experience."

Lagemann was praised by fellow staff members as well for his years of service in coaching.

"Coach Lagemann's impact he had on the girl's basketball program here at Clopton will definitely be missed. His coaching career was very deco-

rated and one that many coaches only dream about. Whoever assumes his role as the new coach will have some big shoes to fill," remarked Matt Cannon who serves as athletic director and a fellow coach at Clopton.

Superintendent Mark Harvey said he appreciates the job Lagemann has done.

"Larry's commitment to the student athletes at Clopton is one to be emulated. He has been a positive role model for our kids during his tenure as

a coach in the district," he stated. "I must also thank Susan, Lauren, Ashtyn, and Evan for giving him up for the long hours he has spent away from his family," he added.

Harvey said a replacement for the 2017-2018 season has not been named at this time and there is no definite timeline on when that announcement will be made.

Alum and former player Deavon Omohundro has served the past several years as Lagemann's assistant.

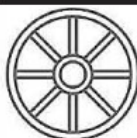

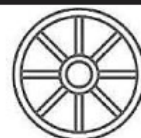

It may not seem so to those who lose water and have to wait, but if you see what is required of these people in digging, repair and replacement, in the mud and often in the dark, you will understand and be grateful that we have willing and knowledgeable personnel to deal with the situations as they arise.

Northeast Missouri Bull Sale

The 45th Annual Northeast MO Performance Tested Bull Sale was held at Palmyra, Mo. on March 25. The overall average on forty-seven bulls was \$3,481.

The high breed average was Angus at \$3,599. Other breed averages were Simmental \$3,400, Polled Hereford \$3,343, and Charolais \$2,762.

High selling bulls in the sale were Angus consigned by Double A Angus, Shelbyville, Mo. and Keithley/Jackson, Frankford, Mo. and sold for \$5,800 and \$5,100 respectively. They were purchased by Palmer Farms New London, Mo. and Tim Flowerree New London, Mo. Thirteen other bulls sold for \$4,000 or higher.

Other top selling bulls included Ricketts Charolais, top Charolais at \$3,250; Donald Drebes, top Simmental at \$3,700.

Bulls offered in this sale met certain predetermined standards in order to be eligible for this sale. Bulls must be in the upper 50th percentile in two out of four EPD (Expected Progeny Difference) traits: CE or BW, WW, YW, or Milk, yearling height 49 in or above, weight at a year 1,100 lbs. or above, semen tested and examined for breeding soundness and to be found satisfactory potential breeders. As well as meeting

health requirements: tested and found negative for Brucellosis and BVD-PI, vaccinated against Leptospirosis, and must follow state requirements for trichomoniasis.

The annual meeting of the Northeast Missouri Beef Cattle Improvement Association, which sponsors the bull sale, was held March 30 at the Quality Inn in Hannibal with 95 members and guests attending. Several awards were presented at the banquet.

Plaques were presented to the owners of the high indexing bulls in the sale. Charolais went to Ricketts Charolais, Angus went to Tony Griffin, and Hereford went to Clint Allen.

Other awards presented, included Outstanding Seedstock Producer, Shon Haerr, Taylor; Outstanding Commercial Producer, David Clark, Edina; and Outstanding Service to Cindy Claus.

Both Apple and Android users will need to install the app update to telecheck turkey harvests. Apple users must have at least the iOS 9.0 version to use the updated MO Hunting app. Android users must have at least Android 5.0.

The youth spring turkey season runs April 8 and 9 and the regular spring turkey season runs April 17 through May 7. Learn more at huntfish.mdc.mo.gov/hunting-trapping/species/turkey and from the MDC "2017 Spring Turkey Hunting Regulations & Information" booklet, available at MDC offices and nature centers and other locations where permits are sold.
