## Public Meeting Will Be April 20 To Discuss Replacing Bridge Near Middletown On 161

This summer, the Missouri Department of Transportation and its contractor will close MO 161 to replace the bridge over the Cuivre River just east of Middletown in Montgomery County.

To learn more about the project, area residents and drivers of MO 161 east of Middletown are encouraged to attend a public informational meeting on Thursday, April 20 from 4:30-6 p.m., at the Middletown Baptist Church, 302 Johnson Street in Middletown.

This is an open house style meeting, and MoDOT engineers

and staff will be available to answer any questions about the project and the road closure. It is anticipated the road will be closed up to 80 days once the contractor begins work.

The Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission awarded the project to Don Schnieders Excavating at its meeting today in the amount of \$914,427.05.

The Missouri Department of Agriculture today launched the 8th annual Focus on Missouri Agriculture contest, asking Missourians to share the unique stories and images of agriculture through photographs. The contest, which runs through June 15, is an opportunity for amateur photographers across the state to submit their best images of agriculture. That image may take shape through a breathtaking Missouri farm landscape, an aerial shot of harvest, a farm tractor that has been in the family for years or a fun moment captured on a mobile device showcasing farm life.

The Focus on Missouri Agriculture Photo Contest is open to Missouri's amateur photographers of all ages. Participants may enter up to three photos in each of the six categories. The photo contest categories are: Beauty of the Farm, Faces of the Farm, The Farmer's Life, Pride of the Farm and Farm Selfie. Children's Barnyard, a special category for budding photographers ages 12 and under, is back for the eighth annual contest as well.

Entries will be judged on visual impact, creativity, memorable content and image quality.

The contest offers prizes and many chances to win thanks to the Missouri Department of Agriculture's Missouri Grown program. A \$50 Missouri Grown Market gift certificate will be awarded to the first place winner in each of the six categories. An

Missouri Grown Market gift certificate, valued at \$150, will be awarded to the Best of Show. Category winners and Best of Show will also receive professional canvas prints of their winning shot.

Winners will be announced in mid-July, and winning images will be displayed during the Missouri State Fair in the Agriculture Building, Aug. 10-20.

## Free Skin Cancer Screenings

Skin cancer is the most common type of cancer. Each year there are more new cases of skin cancer than all other cancers of the breast, prostate, lung, and colon combined, with one in five Americans developing skin cancer in the course of a lifetime.

Some risk factors for skin cancer include a lighter natural skin color, family history of skin cancer, history of indoor tanning, history of sunburns (especially early in life), and skin that burns, freckles, or reddens easily. "If you have any of these risk factors, you should see a doctor for a skin cancer screening at least once a year," says Dr. Schuyler Metlis with Hannibal Regional Medical Group. "Catching cancer early often allows for more treatment options, and if you have skin cancer, finding it early is the

best way to make sure it can be treated with success."

Beginning in April and going through June, Dr. Metlis will be hosting free skin cancer screenings throughout the region. The screenings are free however space is limited, so call ahead to schedule an appointment.

Options for Women opened in May 2016 and serves pregnant women from Pike County and surrounding counties. Services include: free pregnancy testing, limited first trimester ultrasounds, adoption referrals, abortion education, parenting education through an "Earn While You Learn" program, referrals for medical help, referrals for temporary housing, post-abortion counseling, and ongoing friendship and encouragement. Since

opening last May, over 40 women have been served. The Center is sustained by the generosity of donors and community volunteers.

Participants in this year's Walk for Life will walk at their own pace and strollers are welcome. Family friendly activities in conjunction with the walk are a Bounce House and face painting.

Food items including grilled hamburgers, porkburgers, hotdogs, fruit and chips will be available from 11 a.m.-1 p.m. Carry-outs will be available for those not participating in the walk event.

In advance of the walk, participants are encouraged to ask friends, family and co-workers for a donation to benefit the pregnancy resource center. 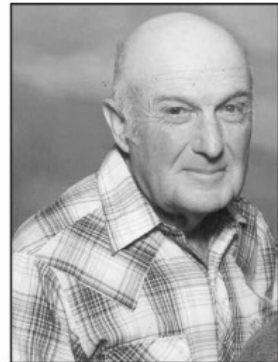

"This year's theme 'Bridging the Gap' is a fitting one for our Member of the Year. This person believes in building bridges, not burning them; in creating a firm foundation and carefully planning the structure to span from one side to the other," Brown explained.

"We've heard tonight about the plans to replace the iconic Champ Clark Bridge. A bridge that just a couple of short years ago, our community couldn't foresee getting funded. With the game tied, Nichols was intentionally walked to load the bases with Jordan Billings coming up and just one out.

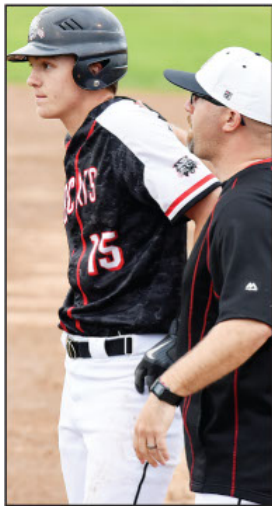
The lefty slugger knew what he had to do and on the first pitch he saw, lifted an opposite field fly to left to sacrifice home Merz for a walkoff win.

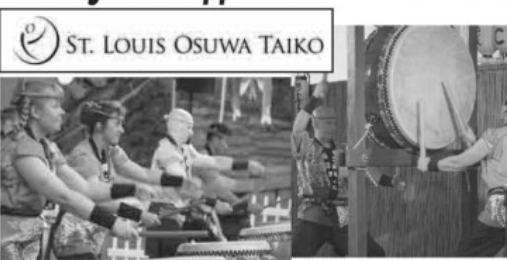

## From the Mayor's Desk...

In Clarksville mandating law requires that the City be represented by a Board of Alderman comprised of two residents from the South Ward and two residents from the North Ward each serving two year terms. The Wards follow an identical cycle of electing members on alternate years to ensure a continuity of knowledge and activity.

Board members are expected to represent their constituents by guiding the overall management of the city. The primary responsibilities of the Board of Alderman are to develop and adopt policies and budgets and establish the overall goals and directions of the city for the good of the people. This responsibility takes time and a strong commitment to Clarksville.

Regardless of how many votes are cast in an election, when the count is verified persons are elected and take their seat. Their power to represent their individual Ward is dependent upon the residents making known to them their interest, ideas, opinions and willingness to assist in implementing the same. Do you know your representatives? Have you shared your thoughts, concerns and ideas? Are you willing to assist in implementing your ideas?

The mayor presides at all meetings of the board and shall not have a vote. The mayor signs all orders, drafts and warrants drawn on the city along with the person serving as treasurer. The mayor communicates to the board and recommends any measures believed to be for the best interests of the city. The mayor also exer-

cises a general supervision over all officers and affairs of the city. These duties and others are found in RSMo 79 & 95.

It is an amazing and exhilarating experience to be in the presence of a large group of mayors from the 126 cities and towns that touch the Mississippi River working to preserve, maintain and upgrade the river. It is also a most welcome opportunity to be a part of the new Missouri Mayors group who began meeting recently guided by the mayor of Kansas City, Mayor Sly James.

No mayor seeks to find another meeting to attend, but when a gathering produces significant results with benefits to your town, it becomes important to make time for such a meeting. Discussing subject of mutual interest and following that discussion with agreed upon action is most desirable. Hearing directly from Governor Greitens as was the case this week in Jefferson City allows those of us serving as Mayors the opportunity to bring home first hand information regarding issues of concern.
