Replacing Bridge Near Middletown On 161

This summer, the Missouri Department of Transportation and its contractor will close MO 161 to replace the bridge over the Cuivre River just east of Middletown in Montgomery

To learn more about the project, area residents and drivers of MO east of Middletown are encouraged to attend a public informational meeting on Thursday, April 20 from 4:30-6 p.m., at the Middletown Baptist informational Church, 302 Johnson Street in Middletown.

This is an open house style meeting, and MoDOT engineers and staff will be available to answer any questions about the project and the road closure. It is anticipated the road will be closed up to 80 days once the contractor begins work. The Missouri Highways and

Transportation Commission awarded the project to Don Schnieders Excavating at its meeting today in the amount of \$914,427.05.

Free Skin Cancer Screenings

Skin cancer is the most common type of cancer. Each year there are more new cases of skin cancer than all other cancers of the breast, prostate, lung, and colon combined, with one in five Americans developing skin cancer in the course of a lifetime.

Some risk factors for skin cancer include a lighter natural skin color, family history of skin cancer, history of indoor tanning, history of sunburns (especially early in life), and skin that burns, freckles, or reddens easily. "If you have any of these risk factors, you should see a doctor for a skin cancer screening at least once a year," says Dr. Schuyler Metlis with Hannibal Regional Medical Group. "Catching cancer early often allows for more treatment options, and if you have skin cancer, finding it early is the

best way to make sure it can be treated with success."
