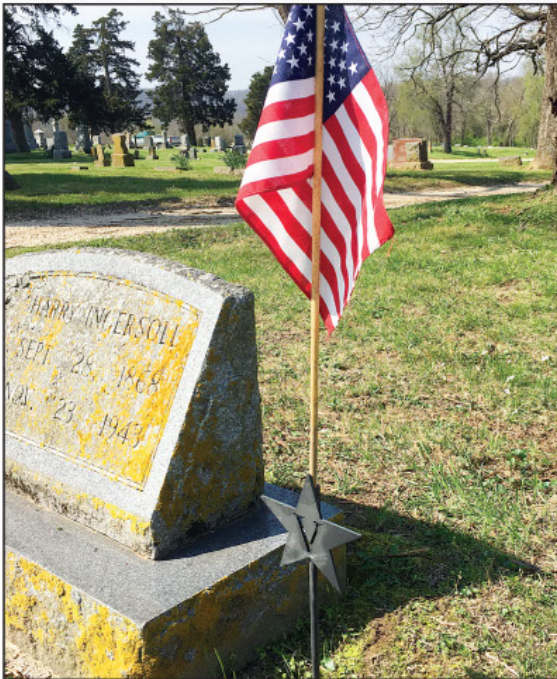

## Greenwood Cemetery Plans Annual Breakfast

The annual spring breakfast for Greenwood Cemetery will be held on Saturday, April 29 at the Clarksville American Legion. Biscuits & gravy, grilled sausage, eggs, pancakes and drinks will be served from 7-9:30 a.m., for \$8.

For many years Memorial Day weekend at Greenwood is the site of American flags decorating veterans' graves. Starting this year, some of these flags will be held in metal flag holders crafted by students at the Pike-Lincoln Area Vo-Tech school in Eolia. Under the direction of instructor, Scott Hipes, the welding class laser cut the star shaped metal design with a "V" cut out and the auto body class painted them. A ten dollar donation would ensure that a veteran grave of your choice will be recognized and the flag holder will be installed in time for the 2017 Memorial Day weekend. All proceeds will be used to pay for supplies to complete the second phase of this project so every veteran grave will be permanently designated. More information will

be available the morning of the breakfast for anyone who would like to support this endeavor sponsored by the cemetery board.

Each year we like to honor our veterans who are buried at Greenwood and share some of their stories with the community. A well-known family who lived in the Clarksville area since the 1800s raised a family of children who served our nation proudly and this is a chapter from their family story.

Edward Hall Bryant was born Feb. 19, 1890 on the family farm owned by his parents, Ben W. & Florence (Beauchamp) Bryant. Edward married Genia Price Witten on May 20, 1914. She was the daughter of Simeon and Buannah Dudley Witten of Cyrene. To this union were born 12 children and all 12 children and three of the grandchildren were born in the same home Ed was born in on a farm south of Clarksville on the hill locally known as Kissinger Hill.

## Commissioners, Louisiana City Officials Debate Future Of Centralized 911 Operation

County Looks To Form New Advisory Board For Consolidation Of 9-1-1 Services

While tempers might have flared at the Pike County Commissioners office on Monday, April 24, it appears the conversation is just getting underway on the best way to consolidate 9-1-1 services and operations.

The debate between commissioners and city officials in Louisiana started with a letter last week in which the commission stated they would no longer provide the city with \$25,000 in annual funding for 9-1-1 operations in Louisiana.

The debate actually goes back much further over many years and many different commissions and city councils.

The letter from commissioners

to Mayor Bart Niedner dated April 17 stated, "After much discussion and consideration of fiscal responsibility, we have decided it is in the best interest of the county to consolidate the 911 system. As a result, 2017 will be the last year the county will be providing the annual \$25,000 funding to have a 911 satellite office in Louisiana."

The letter went on to invite Niedner to discuss ideas about centralization of 9-1-1 services, funding and the path forward.

Niedner scheduled the Monday meeting and was joined by City Administrator Kelly Henderson, Chief of Police April Epperson and others.

Niedner explained that he took issue with the way the commission unilaterally made a decision

to withdraw the funding that has been in place since 2003 for 911 operations in Louisiana without a real plan to move forward with centralization. Niedner noted that everyone agrees that centralization is the best move for the future, but added the commissioners should have put a committee together and hold public discussions on the proper way to move forward prior to a decision to remove funding.

Niedner added that he and the constituents in Louisiana are in favor of moving forward with a plan to have an independent centralized 911 service, but would not like to see the operation controlled by any certain office, such as the Pike County Sheriff's Department. Niedner said it is difficult

Lagemann announced his retirement from coaching recently

following a 20-year bout that has included both the Clopton boy's and girl's programs and a couple of trips to state. Omohundro was one of the many students he coached over the years. She has served as his assistant for all four years she has been with the Clopton School District since signing on in 2013. She has also

coached the junior varsity team during that time and served as the junior high girl's basketball coach for the past two years. She also teaches middle school math.

"I think Deaven will do a great job with the program," Lagemann noted. "She was a tremendous asset to the program the last four years as an assistant and junior high coach. She has built good relationships with the girls and relates well with them."

On Saturday, April 10 the Vandalia Police Department responded to the 500 block of East Page for a report of a domestic disturbance in progress.

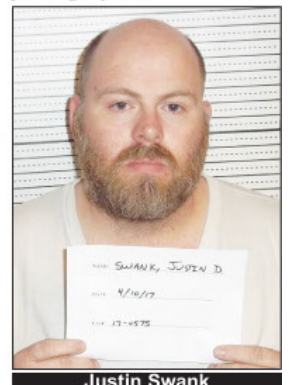
Officers arrived on scene; made contact with all parties involved and after an investigation of the scene Officers placed Justin Swank, 36, of Vandalia under arrest.

## Frank Is Guest Speaker For Clopton Baccalaureate

The ministers of Southern Pike County will sponsor the Clopton School baccalaureate services on Wednesday, May 17 at 7 p.m.

The speaker for the evening will be a 1985 Clopton graduate Steve Frank.

During his years at Clopton, Steve competed in basketball, track, and baseball. He played on three final four teams for Coach Dale Miller in basketball, 1983, 1984 and 1985, finishing second in state in 1983 and 1984 and third in 1985.

After high school, he attended East Central Community College, where he continued his basketball career. After a great two year career, he transferred to College of the Ozarks, where he finished his last two years of his basketball career, mentored by Coach Al Waller, and earned a degree in secondary education. Steve was inducted into the College of the Ozarks basketball Hall of Fame in 2007.

In 1995 he was married to his wife, Mona, who was an outstanding athlete and volleyball player at College of the Ozarks.

In his first nine years as a high school coach, Steve coached at Hollister and Silex as the boys varsity basketball coach. In 1996 he led Silex to its first-ever boys district championship.

In 1999 he switched over to coaching girls' basketball, taking a job on Conway High School back down in the Springfield area, and has coached girls' basketball for the past 17 years. Over that 17 year span his teams have played for 14 district championships, won 10 district championships, made three

trips to the final four, and won back to back Class 3 state championships the past two seasons at Stafford High School.

Coach Frank has been married to his wife, Mona for 23 years. She is from Stafford where she was also an outstanding athlete playing volleyball, track, softball, and basketball. She played four years of college volleyball at College of the Ozarks. They have twin daughters, Hayley and Kayley, sophomores at Stafford High School, where the girls are members of the varsity softball, golf, and basketball teams. Both girls were all-conference and all-district players. Hayley was named all-state player for the second year in a row, and she also received the honor of being named MO Class 3 player of the year after capturing their second straight state title in MO Class 3 girls' basketball completing their season with a record of 33-0.

Coach Frank is completing his 26th year of teaching/coaching with an over-all record of 467-179 and has been honored to be named Mo Class 3 Coach of the year in 2016 and 2017. Coach Frank has been honored with many coaching and community awards in SW Missouri. He spends a lot of his free time working with the youth in his surrounding area, continually working to develop and mold the younger students not just be good athletes; but to be great assets to their school and community.

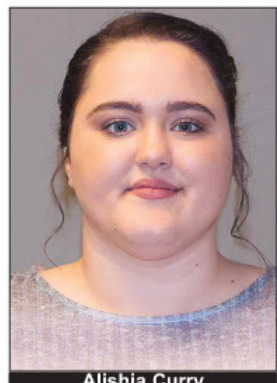
He instills the importance of hard work, passion, and love in everything they do. The positive results of this will enable students in all phases of life and help each

one become a better person. "This has been the key component in all my coaching of teams over the years. I never ask more out of my students that I'm not willing to do myself. I love and treat each student as if they were my own. I have been blessed over the years to have great students to teach and coach."

Coach Frank commented, "I finished my master's degree in administration in 2001, but I have chosen to continue teaching/coaching because I enjoy my job so much. My grandfather always stressed to me that it's not about money. It's about doing what you love every day. I can honestly say that I love my job and enjoy coming to work everyday. There are very few people that honestly get to say that. It's so rewarding to watch our young kids grow up and take the lessons we instill in them as teachers, coaches, and mentors and apply them in life as they move into the later phases of life."

Coach Frank has lived in Stafford for the last 15 years and enjoys fishing, hunting, and going to the lakes in his off time. "My family loves going to the lake. Our kids are big on tubing, knee boarding, and wake boarding. We live between three beautiful lakes here in the Ozarks and try to go every chance we get. I also love going back to Clarksville, where my parents, Bob and Linda Frank, still reside, and my sister, Erica, and her family also live. It's always good to get back and see the people I grew up with and spend some time back in Northeast Missouri," he said.

Twelve high school juniors made their parents and teachers proud as they competed for trips to Washington, D.C. and college scholarships. All 12 finalists walked in as winners in Cuivre River's 49th Annual Youth Tour contest. Final judging helped determine the prize.

Six high school juniors earned the chance to visit historic landmarks and enjoy many other sights at our nation's capital this summer. Six earned \$500 scholarships to the universities of their choice.

Youth Tour delegates selected were Jane Zuroweste and Chloe Momphard, both of Troy Buchanan High School; Unsun Lee, Fort Zumwalt South High School; Ben Mertens, Warrenton High School; Brendan Heslin, Francis Howell High School; and Audrey Hahn, a home school student.

Alishia Curry, Bowling Green High School, was named an alternate and will replace Lee on the trip.

Lee will receive a \$500 scholarship along with Emily Kurtz and Caroline Neal, both of Timberland High School; Christopher Vogt and Destinee Frost, both of Warrenton High School; and Brianna Hines, Fort Zumwalt South High School.

Students from more than 12 schools entered the preliminary stage of competition by submitting an essay. The top 12 students won

the opportunity to advance to the final competition. In the final stage students took a cooperative knowledge quiz and presented their essays orally.

This year's topic was "My Favorite Cooperative Principle." Students were asked to select one or more of the seven cooperative principles (Voluntary and Open Membership; Democratic Member Control; Members' Economic Participation; Autonomy and Independence; Education, Training and Information; Cooperation Among Cooperatives, and Concern for Community) and explain in 500 - 1,000 words how Cuivre River uses the principles to make a positive impact in the community.

Scores from all three contest segments were combined to select the delegates and scholarship recipients.

"Concern for Community was a top favorite of nearly every student, but Education, Training and Information was a very close second," said Manager of Communications Mary Jane Clark.

"Students valued the way cooperatives work in their communities and support learning as a way to build a foundation for their future leadership," she added. Voluntary and Open Membership, and Autonomy and Independence were also viewed as important values that promote inclusion and social responsibility in what one student termed, "a different type of system in today's world."

## MDC Asks Public Not To Plant Invasive Bradford Pear Trees

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) encourages homeowners and landscapers to avoid planting Callery pear trees this spring.

Better known as Bradford pears, the Callery pear tree is an invasive species known to multiply quickly and crowd out Missouri native plants. While it's been a popular landscaping tree for decades, cultivated forms have spread aggressively throughout the state.

"Different varieties of Bradford pear trees were planted close to each other, which allowed them to cross pollinate and take over natural areas," said Forestry Field Program Supervisor Russell Hinnah. "But they're also a poor landscaping choice because they don't do well in storms, often losing limbs or splitting apart."

Stopping the spread means

selecting alternate trees for yards and forested property.

"The best plan is to select a native species to Missouri, and there are several great options," said Hinnah. "Serviceberry trees produce similar showy white blooms in the spring and have small red fruits that attract wildlife."

Eastern redbuds and Missouri's state tree, the flowering dogwood, are also good alternatives. The redbud tree grows quickly with eye-catching lavender flowers in the spring. Dogwoods do best in shady areas but can be somewhat difficult to grow.

One of the 12 children, Edward H. Bryant, age 94, and living with his wife Gertrude Kahler in Colorado Springs, Colo., retired as a Lt. Colonel from the Air Force, serving over 29 years as a pilot. He flew 13 missions over Berlin and also flew in Vietnam.

Ed wrote in his memoirs about life on the farm in the 1920s and 1930s. He said growing up on the farm was a great experience and he wouldn't trade it for anything else he had done in his life. As he recalls, "at 5 years old I started milking cows. I would be awakened at 4:00 am. Between 4 am and 8 am my father, brothers and I would milk as many as 20 cows twice daily, seven days a week. We had a milk separator that was hand operated and would separate the milk from the cream. Breakfast was served at 6 am, prepared by mother and my sisters. After breakfast we would feed the chickens and other livestock. We walked about 2 miles to the Salem School, crossing fields and climbing fences, some barbed wire. It was a lot easier for the boys in their overalls but hard for the girls in their dresses. Salem school had one classroom and a hall for hanging coats and lunch

boxes. Each grade would move up to the front of the class when it was their time for instruction." Ed also recalls when he was in the 7th & 8th grade he was the school janitor, arriving early to start the wood stove and keep it burning all day and keep the floors swept. His pay was \$2.50 a month. With this money he purchased a 22 single shot bolt action rifle from a Montgomery Ward catalog for \$2.49.

High school was 5 miles away so my sister, Ann, and I used a two wheeled cart and a horse named Jerry to get us there. Every other day we took a 5 gallon can of cream to place on the train at Clarksville for delivery to the creamery. We also delivered cream and eggs to the family dentist and doctor to pay for services."

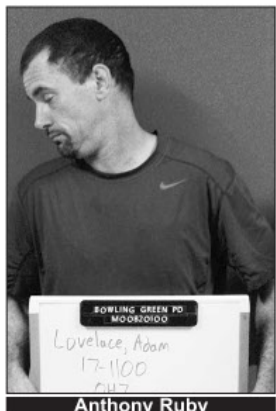

difficult to see the removal of funding as anything other than a way to augment the current budget for the sheriff's department.

Eastern District Commissioner Justin Sheppard said he has been tasked with moving forward the centralization of 911. He said that he has researched the way other counties have done this and noted he likes the Lincoln County's methods. He further stated that he was working from the state statute RSMo 190.309. He added it suggests people who should sit on an advisory board such as the mayor and chief of police of the county seat which is Mayor Don Hunter and Chief Don Nacke. Sheppard added that he didn't care who served on the new advisory panel, but that it should include people who are stakeholders and understood law enforcement.

Niedner offered to serve on a newly-formed advisory board and noted that the only way to move forward is with a robust public discussion that brings all parties to the table.

The background of how the county came to have different 911 operations is murky. In 1988, Louisiana passed a two percent telephone tax to fund operations. However, it doesn't appear the tax was ever collected. In 1994 the county passed a tax of up to 15 percent on land lines to fund 911 operations. Henderson pointed out that there was some handshake agreements around that time that provided for Louisiana to continue its own operation for as long as

it wanted in exchange for supporting the county-wide operation. Many at the meeting on Monday agreed they had either heard or knew of such agreements. However, there is no paper trail for current officials to go back and examine.

In 2003, then-Chief of Police Jim Graham requested funding in the amount of \$25,000 annually for Louisiana's 911 operations. It is the same amount that the Pike County Sheriff's Department was receiving as well. That payment has continued to be made out of the 911 funds that are collected every year by the county. The county receives between \$170,000-\$200,000 annually from the land line tax, but the move to cellular phones has made that number dwindle every year.

Presiding Commissioner Chris Gamm said the letter that was sent to the City of Louisiana was to give city officials fair warning that they would no longer receive that annual funding. He pointed out the city's budget year goes from June until June where the county's is done by the calendar year. He said it was never the intention of the commission to leave Louisiana out of the discussion.

Niedner noted that receiving a letter like that left Louisiana city officials to wonder about the commission's intentions.

Both Niedner and Chief Epperson questioned the commissioners about their plans for consolidating 911 services. Western District Commissioner Bill Allen said the 911 fund currently pays for all of the equipment and that there is a capability at the Sheriff's Department to house the entire operation.

Sheriff Stephen Korte agreed. He added the department currently has 911 operations in the jail area. He said that it could be moved to another area that would stand alone.

"All the hardware is in place." Sheppard said he wants the new advisory board to work on a plan that works for everyone so that a transition can be made this year.

Chief Epperson pointed out there are four dispatchers who work for the Louisiana Police Department. She asked how the dispatchers would be selected and combined.

Niedner stressed the importance of the 911 operation to be independent of any other county agency, such as the sheriff's department. He suggested the commissioners rescind their decision to pull funding from Louisiana until a plan for the consolidation is put in place. After more discussion, the commission voted unanimously to rescind the decision, though Gamm noted that funding after 2017 is unlikely for Louisiana.

"If push comes to shove, that letter just gets sent again," he noted.

The county has a 911 director which is Sara Cunningham. She has held the position for several years and currently handles 911 addresses and has worked on the mapping. There is also a current advisory board, though commissioners agreed a new board would be put in place to implement the upcoming transition.

There were several officials at the meeting on Monday including Cunningham, Bowling Green Chief of Police Don Nacke, Bowling Green City Administrator Barb Allison and Clarksville Mayor Jo Anne Smiley.

Bowling Green currently contracts dispatching services during overnight hours with the Pike County Sheriff's Department to save money. Clarksville has also paid for services in the past.

Sheppard said he plans to begin having meeting with a new advisory panel in place by June. He

said if he had his way, the commission would pull funds from the sheriff's department budget and all 911 expenses would be paid from the 911 fund and that the consolidated 911 service would continue to have a director that answered to the commission.

Niedner said he was pleased with aspects of the conversation on Monday. He added there is still a lot of work to be done to make consolidated 911 service a reality.

"It is unfortunate that the Commission initially choose to de-fund Louisiana's 911 without so much as a conversation with us beforehand. I am glad that we had the opportunity to object and I applaud the Commissioners' action to rescind their initial decision," Niedner stated.

"The alternative would have meant double-taxing Louisiana for 911 by enforcing the existing

tax authority in our district - not the most cooperative environment if the Commission's goal is to establish a centralized 911 campaign. It remains of great concern, however, that the Commission attempted this unilateral action without a robust public conversation. In the absence of any plan, and given the clear lack of any research into current funding impacts and district authority, it is difficult to see this as anything other than an attempt to extend the Sheriff's dispatch operation at the expense of Louisiana's public safety."

He added that he appreciated the frank conversation on Monday morning.

"I have confidence that they will proceed with the inclusion and transparency such decisions require. I look forward to working with them to find the best 911 solution for Pike County."

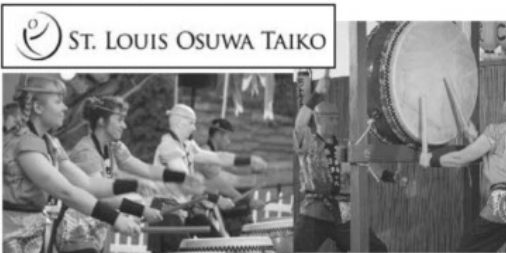
