Library Construction Coming Along In Vandalia

New Facility Will Feature Greater Square Footage, Improved Parking

It seemed like one day it was a concrete pad and

the next day there was a building.

Construction of the new library in Vandalia is coming along quickly. Officials with the Audrain County District are very pleased with the progress so

"Everything is coming along really well. We're excited about getting it open," said Kathy Kephart, director of the library district.

The outdated library facility that was right across

the street from the new facility was demolished. It was decided the library would be its own facility rather than having a joint venture with the proposed Eastern Missouri Family YMCA. The spot selected was right across the street at 312 South Main Street.

The concrete pad was poured last month. It had to sit for over 20 days before the remaining construc-tion could begin. Last week the framing and roof went up. Kephart said the lower portion of the exterior will have a stone skirting. Work will begin on

residents and Pike County motorists on Highway 79 are reminded that a public meeting will be held on Thursday, June 15 to discuss traffic detours as two new bridges will be constructed this summer.

Residents and motorists can look forward to the new bridges on Highway 79 over the Noix Creek and the Buffalo Creek, both south of Louisiana. Construction for the bridge replacements will begin this summer. Highway 79 have closures during struction, but drivers will still be able to access all parts of it by

using the detours

To help area drivers understand the closure and the improvements being made, a public informational meeting will be held on Thursday, June 15 from 4:30-6 p.m., at the Abel Oil Corporate conference room located on Route 79 in Louisiana.

This is an open-house style meeting, so individuals may stop by anytime during the meeting to visit with MoDOT representatives about the project. There will be a formal presentation at 4:45 p.m.

The President designated 47 counties as primary agricultural disaster areas making certain farmers and other agricultural producers in primary and contiguous counties eligible for low-interest emergency loans from USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA).
The following counties were

designated as primary disaster areas due to damages and losses caused by severe storms, tornadoes, straight-line winds and flooding which occurred from April 28, 2017 to May 11, 2017. Those counties are: Barry. Bollinger, Butler. Camden, Carter, Cedar, Christian, Cole, Crawford, Dade, Dallas, Dent, Douglas, Dunklin, Franklin, Gasconade, Howell, Iron, Jasper, Jefferson, Lawrence, McDonald, Madison, Maries, Miller, Morgan, Madison, Maries, Miller, Morgan, Newton, Oregon, Ozark, Pemiscot, Perry, Phelps, Pike, Pulaski, Ralls, Reynolds, Ripley, St. Louis, Shannon, Stone, Taney, Texas, Washington, Wayne, Webster and Wright.

Twenty six Missouri counties were designated as contiguous natural disaster areas due to damages and losses caused by severe storms, tornadoes, straight-line winds and flooding which occurred April 28, 2017-May 11,

Producers in contiguous coun-ties may also be eligible for programs based on this designation.
The contiguous counties are:
Audrain, Benton, Boone, Callaway, Cape Girardeau, Cooper, Laclede, Greene. Hickory, Lincoln, Marion. Moniteau, Monroe, Montgomery, New Madrid, Osage, Pettis, Polk, St. Charles, St. Clair, Ste. Genevieve, St. Francois, Stoddard, Vernon, Warren and St. Louis City.

All counties listed above were designated disaster areas on June 2, 2017, making all qualified farm operators in the designated areas eligible for low interest emer-

gency (EM) loans from FSA, provided eligibility requirements are met. Farmers in eligible counties have eight months from the date of the declaration to apply for loans to help cover part of their actual losses. FSA will consider each loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available

and repayment ability.

Loans for physical losses must be used to replace or repair damage to buildings, fences or to com-pensate the farmer for losses of basic livestock, stored crops, or supplies on hand, equipment, etc., that was lost due to the disaster. Loans for production losses may also be used to buy feed, seed, ferments on real estate or chattel debts. Generally, loans for production losses cannot be approved until crops have completed their production cycle or have been harvested.

In order to qualify, a farmer must have suffered a 30 percent loss in production or an actual physical loss that was essential to the successful operation of the farm.

looked at the past and present while getting a glimpse of the future June 8 in Burlington, Iowa.

The annual event was hosted by the not-for-profit North East Community Action Corporation (NECAC) in cooperation with the Southeast Iowa Regional Planning Commission, the Illinois Two Rivers Regional Council of Public Officials, the Tri-State Development Summit and national organizations NeighborWorks America and Rural LISC.

It was held at the 80-year-old Capitol Theater, which was renovated and is planning an expansion. People who attended also got to see progress in the redevelop-ment of the nearby Tama-Chittenden-Eastman Buildings that are being converted to apart-ments, as well as learn more about a variety of homeownership programs offered in all three states.

The keynote speaker was Kevin Morris, senior vice president of organizational review for organizational NeighborWorks,

Congressionally-chartered nonprofit organization that supports community and housing development through grants and technical assistance.

Morris urged the public and prirate partners to take note of the changing demographic in the 36-county Tri-State region, where opulation growth since 2000 has

been among minorities. "It begs this question: What are we doing in our organizations, on our boards of directors, with our staff, with the people that are com-ing into our leadership development programs what are we doing to develop new leaders in our increasingly diverse commu-nities?" Morris asked, adding that housing ties directly into developing "critical" to regional growth and praised Tri-State partners for coming up with innovative ideas

"And when we add the full complement of diversity that's growing in our communities, we're going to have the solutions for the issues that we're going to face in the future," he said.

Representatives of the nonprofit partners from the three states also spoke about progress made in the last year.

"We are very proud to help all of our communities and all of the individuals," said Dan Eberhardt of the Southeast Iowa Regional Planning Commission. "It's been a wonderful experience for us and to try to get the word out that we're out here to help and make a difference in our communities, and to make Southeast Iowa, Western Illinois and Northeast Missouri a better place to live."

"It isn't easy getting people from three states, 36 counties and five telephone area codes together, but this group - the Workforce Housing Task Force - has done it," said NECAC President and Chief Executive Officer Don Patrick. "We may not always see it or realize it, but our work does wonders in people's lives. For that reason, we cannot abandon the task we've started. We have an obligation to our neighbors and friends throughout the region to leave the Tri-States better for the generations to come.

Two Rivers Regional Council Public Officials Executive of Public Director Mike McLaughlin and Pat Poepping of the Tri-State Development Summit Steering Committee touted the success of working across state boundaries amid tight budget times.

"We enjoy the partnerships with NECAC and the Southeast

Iowa Regional Planning Commission," McLaughlin said. "We are very pleased with the

efforts of those of you in this room today," Poepping added. "Good, affordable housing is very important to the region. Without it, our quality of life is significantly affected. Without adequate and affordable housing, the region will gradually lose its industrial, agricultural and commercial base and we will suffer the consequences.

Other speakers Burlington Mayor Shane McCampbell; Burlington Downtown Partners Director Steve Frevert; John Fischer of Missouri Inclusive Housing; Capitol Theater Executive Director Jerry Johnson; and Tama Building developer Kuckelman.

Other topics addressed includ-ed an update on NECAC's Tiny Homes and Aspire Partnership Prison Homes program, the Great River Housing Trust Fund and development efforts of the Southeast Iowa Regional Planning Commission, and weatherization and other programs offered by Two Rivers Regional Council of Public Officials

The event is an outgrowth of e Tri-State Development Summit, a group formed after the Flood of 1993. Regional conferences have been held since 1996 in an effort to discuss common issues and solutions in 36 Missouri, Illinois and Iowa counties. Housing is one of the steering committees that meets and reports to the larger group.

2017 Fall Calving Show-Me-Select Sale

Daniel Mallory University of Missouri

Regional Livestock Specialist The Northeast Missouri Show-Me-Select Replacement heifer program held a fall calving heifer sale where 120 heifers averaged \$1,928. The sale was held on Saturday, June 3 at F&T Livestock Auction.

The 12 producers were enrolled in the University of Missouri Extension's educational heifer management program. The heifers were bred to sires with both calving-ease and growth genetics. The top selling lot, consigned by Richards Farms Inc., brought \$2,550.

Highest consigner average was \$2,300 on four head from James Penn, Edina, Mo. Other high averaging consignors were Richards Farms Inc., Keytesville, Mo. \$2,074 on 21 head; McCutchan Angus, Monticello, Mo. \$2,067 on three head; Deer Creek Cattle Co.,

Clarksville, \$1,940 on 10 head.
Sixteen buyers purchased over \$230,000 worth of bred heifers; exchanging hands in less than 45 minutes. Calving surveys returned by buyers provide important information that is given back to conmation that is given back to con-signors to guide improvements in

future years. The Show-Me-Select heifer development program takes nearly a year to complete. Pre-breeding exams are completed on heifers usually four-eight weeks before being bred. These exams include a pelvic measurement, reproductive tract score, and weight record. Heifers may be bred artificially or

be exposed to natural service, however; the service sires must meet specific calving ease EPD requirements based on breed. This year 75 head, or 63 percent, of the heifers in the sale were synchronized and bred AI. In this sale, the choice to AI, showed a \$127 price advantage over those bred naturally.

All heifers must be pregnancy tested within 90 days of breeding by a veterinarian to determine expected calving date. The use of ultrasound has helped many of the veterinarians improve their accura-cies on calving dates. During the development period the heifers undergo an extensive health pro-gram and are vaccinated at weaning, pre-breeding, and pregnancy examination as well as treated several times for internal and external parasites. Heifers are also screened for blemishes, condition, muscling and structural soundness by MU Extension livestock specialists and Missouri Department

Agriculture graders.

This is the 21st year for the Show-Me-Select heifer sale in Palmyra, and over 36,000 heifers have been through the program and 5,951 head have been sold. If you are interested contact your local Extension Livestock Specialist.

"We want to pull out the red carpet and take care of these folks," remarked council member Tim Jackson, who introduced the topic at the meeting.

Mayor Bart Niedner noted the

Mayor Bart Niedner noted the importance of crafting responsible guidelines both for the temporary and long-term. He suggested examining how other municipalities are dealing with short-term lodging following the popularity of companies such as Airbnb. "This has a time frame that needs addressed," Jackson cautioned.

Niedner suggested a joint meet-ing with the council and planning and zoning committee within the next month. The bridge replacement project is slated to get off the ground later this summer. The contractor, will be selected and ground later this summer. The con-tractor will be selected and announced by MoDOT at the end of the month. Niedner pointed out the city should have more infor-mation about work schedules and the number of laborers anticipated at that time. The project is expect-ed to be completed in late 2019. Jackson provided council mem-bers present at the meeting on

bers present at the meeting on Monday with copies of the current ordinance governing RVs and other travel trailer vehicles. He said that he has worked with the city's code enforcement officer, Jeff Windmiller, on some preliminary ideas.

nary ideas.

The city currently has at least three lots that would accommodate several RVs. Right now the limit is one per lot. The council will consider increasing that number. Jackson suggested breaking down the number allowed by square footage. Considering the standard length of a recreational vehicle length of a recreational vehicle with slide-out features and parking for a separate vehicle it appears 825 square feet are needed per space (55'x15'). Those with lots may be able to take on as many as that formula would allow.

Council members also discussed how to best handle water and sewer hook-ups, garbage col-lection and electricity. Several voiced concerns about having hoses and wires simply run from a residence. It was suggested the city also look at other cities that have crafted successful ordinance

and zoning controls.

The council also tackled whether rules should be temporary for the bridge project or opt for more permanent measures.

City attorney Robert Rapp
advised the council to be cognizant of emergency vehicle
access and maneuverability.
Windmiller also pointed out that
off-street parking will have to be
examined. examined

Jackson further proposed establishing a permit fee for those stay-ing in Louisiana for the duration of the project. He offered that the fee should be adequate to cover city expenses and show a professional-level of commitment from the

otential lodger.
Council members agreed that there should be a sunset clause in any temporary agreements made

to change the current ordinance.
"We're all in agreement we need to figure it out and do it," said council member Lori Lewis.

In other business, Mayor Niedner said there may be a route to a complete overhaul of the city to a complete overnaul of the city branch. He said that talks are in a preliminary stage with FEMA, but it appears the entire branch could be addressed. Niedner shared his enthusiasm at the prospect that a deal could be struck. He reiterated that plans are still in a preliminary

The council had a quorum for the finance, public safety and enterprise committees.

It appears the council will be full again soon. Niedner announced his intent to appoint Racheal White to the seat that was recently vacated by Chris recently vacated by Chris Koetters. That will take place at the regular council meeting that will take place on Monday, June
