### **MoDOT Reveals Details For Two Bridge Replacements On Hwy. 79** At Noix And Buffalo Creeks

The bridges at Noix Creek and Buffalo Creek will be replaced this summer on Highway 79.

It is tentatively planned to begin with the Noix Creek bridge in Louisiana with the closure starting on Wednesday, July 5. Work on the bridge at Buffalo Creek looks to overlap starting a few weeks later.

The contracts for each bridge were based on an accelerated schedule of 80 days. The contractor will have to pay a fee for every day over that time frame. Both bridges will be closed simultane ously during a portion of August and September. The Noix Creek bridge is scheduled to be completed by Oct. 1 and the Buffalo Creek bridge by Nov. 1.

Detour routes were announced a public presentation on

Thursday last week. Motorists are urged to use Highway 61 and Routes D and N.

It was pointed out that use of Route 251 will likely increase by local drivers. MoDOT officials noted there is no way they can noted there is no way they can prevent people from using the shortcut. Bucky Ward was at the meeting on behalf of the special road district and remarked that some anticipatory measures have been taken.

# Counterfeit Money Turns Up In

Counterfeit money has turned up around the area over the past couple of months and in Frankford and Vandalia last week.

Frankford Chief of Police Joey Minor said two individuals will be charged in connection with the incidents. The names of the individuals were not released as of press time.

Minor noted that residents and businesses should check all cash. He explained that criminals will often mix counterfeit bills with real currency when perpetrating such crimes

If the currency has [foreign] markings or 'for motion picture use only on the bills, do not accept them," Minor remarked. He added that anyone who is suspicious of bills should take them to a local bank

A Frankford business was hit on Tuesday last week. Similar bills turned up at the Vandalia license office. Vandalia Police Chief Chris Hammann said the department is going through surveillance footage

and the investigation is ongoing.

Louisiana Police Chief April Epperson said twenty-dollar bills have also been passed there.

#### YMCA Receives First Round Approval

The Eastern Missouri YMCA Project is in the process of seeking a 10-year, interest-free loan through the Rural Economic Development Loan and Grant Program (REDLG) and the first phase of a two-phase process has

been approved.

This loan is critical to the project in order to turn pledges that will be collected over the next several years into money to begin construction. The interest-free REDLG loan will save approxi-mately \$200,000 in interest that would be paid under a traditional loan, and it will allow 100 percent of the donations received to be incorporated into the YMCA facil-

The REDLG loan requires sponsorship through a qualified utility company. Consolidated utility company. Consolidated Electric, based in Mexico, has reviewed the YMCA project and has agreed to sponsor the loan with some minor conditions. The first condition was a guarantee from the Vandalia Recreation Corporation to ensure repayment of the loan, which was approved at the June 6, 2017 Vandalia Recreation Corporation meeting. The other items requested were information regarding the Rual Morris Foundation pledge and support from the City of Vandalia should Rual Morris not complete

their pledge. The Rual Morris Foundation has fully committed to the YMCA project, so the motion of support from the City of Vandalia is just an added layer of security. In addition, the Rual Morris Foundation amended their pledge to be payable over 10 years instead of 15. This pledge change coincides with the 10-year duration of the REDLG loan.

The second phase of the approval process is submitting a variety of information to the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). The addi-tional information is due on June 30, and the project will be reviewed by the USDA over the

summer months.
The YMCA Project would like to thank Consolidated Electric, the Rual Morris Foundation, and the City of Vandalia for their efforts in securing the first phase of the REDLG loan. The completion of this project will enhance the area and provide a facility for all ages to enjoy.

### Two Arrested Following High-Speed Chase

following a high-speed chase that led law enforcement through Audrain County and ended in Pike County.

Marty Poff, 49, of Kansas City, Kan., and Brandy Sport, 38, of Jefferson City, were arrested fol-lowing the incident that took place on Wednesday, June 14. According to a report from the

Boone County Sheriff's Office, the incident started just before 3 a.m. Law enforcement attempted to stop a silver four-door Chevrolet Impala that was discov-ered to have stolen license plates. The vehicle was traveling east on Highway 54 from Callaway into Audrain County.

At approximately 3:16 a.m., Audrain County Sheriff's deputies spotted the vehicle near Laddonia and attempted to stop the vehicle. The driver refused to stop traveling northbound on Highway 19 to Highway 54.

The pursuit ended on Highway U in Pike County when it appeared the driver decided he could no longer outrun law enforcement officers. Poff and Sport was taken into custody without incident.

Upon their arrest, Poff and Sport were found to have in their possession controlled substances s well as drug paraphernalia. The silver four door passenger car involved in the incident was fur-ther found to be stolen from Kansas City, Mo. Poff and Sport were subsequently transported to the Audrain County Jail.

Poff was arrested for tampering with a motor vehicle, driving while suspended, failure to yield to an emergency vehicle, resisting arrest, possession of heroin, possession of methamphetamine, possession of drug paraphernalia.

### **Apply Online Starting July 1 For A Shot At More Than 100 MDC Managed Deer Hun**

Beginning July 1, deer hunters can apply online through the Department Conservation's (MDC) website for a shot at more than 100 managed deer hunts throughout the state for archery, muzzleloading, and modern firearms from mid-September through mid-January at conservation areas, state and other parks, national wildlife refuges, and other public areas. Some managed hunts are held specifically for youth or for people with disabilities.

The managed deer hunt application period is July 1-31. Hunters are selected by a weighted random drawing. Draw results will be available Sept. 1 through Jan. 15. Applicants who are drawn will receive area maps and other hunt information by mail.

Mika was only six months old when she died from heat stroke after being left in a vehicle. Mika's father dropped off her sister at school, but Mika fell asleep in her rear-facing car seat while her dad was distracted by a phone call with news of a possible job after having been laid off weeks before. The road he normally took was blocked so he had to take a detour. He stopped at the post office where he ran into a friend he'd been helping with a project at church. He then drove to the church, not realizing until later

that day, he never dropped Mika off at day care. When Mika was found, it was too late.

On average, 38 children die in hot cars each year from heat related deaths after being trapped inside a motor vabile. Even the inside a motor vehicle. Even the best of parents or caregivers can unknowingly leave a sleeping baby in a car, and the end result can be injury or even death. Between 1990 and 2016 the number of child vehicular heat stroke deaths in the US was 793, with 20 of them being in Missouri. 87 per-cent of children who have died from vehicular heat stroke are age

three and younger.

Facts show new parents suffer from exhaustion due to lack of sleep, hormone changes, stress, and changes in their normal routine. Any one of these changes can cause your memory to fail at a ou least expect it

Children have died in hot cars when the outside temperature was as low as 60 degrees. A child's body temperature overheats threefive times faster than an adult body. Cracking the windows does NOT help slow the heating process or decrease the maximum temperature. The inside of a vehicle heats up very quickly. Even with the windows cracked, the temperature inside a car can reach 125 degrees in minutes. Two-thirds of the increase in temperature happens in the first 20 minutes.

Planning can help keep your

child from being hurt. Follow

these safety tips: Never leave children alone in or around cars not even for a

Make it a routine to open the back door of your car every time you park to check that no one has been left behind.

Put something in the back seat to remind you to open the back door every time you park - cell phone, employee badge, handbag, brief case, etc

Keep a stuffed animal in baby's car seat. Place it in the front seat as a reminder when baby is in the

Ask your babysitter or child care provider to call you if your child hasn't arrived as scheduled.

Make sure children cannot get into a parked car.

Keep vehicles locked at all times, even in the garage or driveway. Ask home visitors, child care providers and neighbors to do the

and remote openers should never be left within reach of children.

If a child goes missing, immediately check the inside passenger compartments and trunks of all vehicles in the area very carefully even if they are locked. A child may lock the car doors after entering a vehicle on their own, but may not be able to unlock them.

If you see a child alone in vehicle, get involved. Call 911 immediately. If the child seems hot or sick, get them out of the vehicle as quickly as possible.

Be especially careful during busy times, schedule changes, and periods of crisis or holidays. This when many tragedies occur.

Use drive-thru services when available - restaurants, banks, pharmacies, dry cleaners, etc. and

pay for gas at the pump.

#### Free Testing Of Dial **Pressure Gauges**

The University of Missouri Extension Pike County office will host a food preservation program on Friday, July 7 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Jim Meyer, Nutrition and Health Education Specialist, will be on hand to test dial pressure gauges for accuracy and answer questions about home food preservation. Don't miss this opportunity to learn about home food preservaind to learn advortion and preserva-tion and have your dial gauges tested for free. The University Extension office is at 115 West Main Street on the first floor of the courthouse in Bowling Green. Please call the office at 324-5464 to schedule an appointment if you

need your gauge tested.

Dial pressure gauges need checked every year for accuracy. Testing a gauge usually takes about 10 –20 minutes. You only need to bring the canner lid with the dial gauge attached. You do not need to

data gauge attaction. You do not need to detach the gauge from the lid. Having an accurate gauge is impor-tant because low acid foods such as green beans must be pressure canned to reach a temperature high enough to kill any botulinum spores present in the food. If the dial gauge is inaccurate the canner may not reach a high enough canner may not reach a high enough temperature during processing. This is very dangerous. You should have your dial gauge checked each year. Also, if you buy a new gauge it should be checked as well. There is no guarantee that a new gauge is accurate or has not been damaged

University of Missouri Extension has several guide sheets to help you with food preservation from freezing, drying and canning food to making pickles or jams and jellies. The sheets are packed with easy to follow, step-bystep instructions and the procedures are researched based to help ensure you preserve a safe product. 



#### DETAILS ABOUT THE NEW BRIDGES

Noix Creek Bridge: The bridge is currently 217-feet long and 24-feet wide with a pedestrian walkway. There are multiple areas of exposed rebar on the bridge that was constructed in 1935.

The proposed Noix Creek Bridge will be 244-feet long and have an overall width of 38-feet. It will have a travelway of 22-feet with 2-foot shoulder on the west and a 6-foot shoulder on the east side of the bridge. There will also be a 5-foot protected pedestrian walkway along west side of the

bridge.

The proposed bridge will further beapproximately a foot and a half higher than the existing bridge. The proposed elevation coincides with a flood study per-formed by the U.S. Army Corps of

and the City of Engineers

The new bridge could lessen the occurrences of flooding; how-ever, it will not eliminate flooding due to the lower elevation of the railroad crossing. The cost for Noix Creek bridge is \$1.4 million

and the new bridge is expected to have a life span of 75 years.

<u>Buffalo Creek Bridge</u>: The bridge is currently 187-feet long and 22-feet wide with multiple bridge that was constructed in 1935.

The proposed Buffalo Creek Bridge will be 206-feet long and

The new Buffalo Creek Bridge on Highway 79 will cost over \$1.1 million and will be longer and wider to accommo-

date the bike path that is currently pinched at the crossing. The Ashland-Hercules overhead truss will also be removed during construction that is slated to be complete by Nov. 1.



Varble was later released on summons for domestic assault fourth degree and given a date to appear in the Audrain County Circuit Court.



Carrie Wells, Behavioral Health/Substance Abuse Social Worker at the Pike County Health Department, shared valuable information about the services of the Healthy Minds, Healthy Lives Coalition of Pike County at the June meeting of the Ecumenical Women's Breakfast group. The meeting was held at First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and co-hosted by the ladies of Bethel A.M.E. Church of Louisiana.


