# **Louisiana Council Approves Appointment Of Ringhausen**

City Reviews Proposal For 401 Georgia Street Property

The Louisiana City Council has all eight seats full again as the appointment of Bob Ringhausen was approved at a special meeting on Monday, July 10 prior to the committee meetings.

Mayor Bart Niedner made the appointment and thanked Ringhausen for his willingness to serve until the April election. Ringhausen took the seat in Ward 4 that was recently vacated by Chris Koetters. Ringhausen was placed on the public safety, enter-prise and finance committees

City Administrator Kelly Henderson notified council members that a proposal for the property at 401 Georgia Street has been submitted by Jay Thomas on behalf of the "Save Our Streetscape" (SOS) group. Thomas told council members at a recent council meeting that the

group is comprised of concerned citizens who want to see the building saved rather than demol-

Henderson informed council members he had received the proposal that day and that he would forward copies to all the mem-

bers. He told The People's Tribune after the meeting that details of the proposal would be available later this week.

Engineering reports have con-firmed the stability of the structure at 401 Georgia is in serious condition. The city recently hired contractor Danny Orf to stabi-

lize the shared wall with the prop-erty at 403 Georgia Street that is occupied by James Davis and his Maxfield's cafe.

Thomas told the council the group is very committed to the restoration effort.

## Bridges Start Coming Down

Work is underway on the Noix Creek bridge on Highway 79. The \$1.41 million project is expected to be complete by early August. Louisiana City Administrator Kelly Henderson says the city is pleased to see the investment in infrastructure for the long-term success of the town. The new bridge will be expanded to 244-feet long, 38-feet wide with eight-feet of shoulder space and a protected pedestrian walkway on the west side. The \$1.14 million Buffalo Creek bridge project will begin in early August and is expected to be done by October. The state established an expedited 80-day work schedule for both bridges.

# **MDC**, Partners Provide Mentored

Interested in dove hunting but have not yet given it a try? The Missouri Department of of Conservation (MDC) -- in partner-ship with the National Wild Turkey Federation, Conservation Federation of Missouri, Quail Forever, Missouri Prairie Foundation, and private landowners -- will provide mentored dove hunts for first-time hunters starting in September.

The hunts will take place on 10 fields primarily located on private land in or near the communities of Cabool, Chillicothe, Hartsville, Lynchburg, Mol Joplin. Mokane. Mountain Genevieve, and Washington.

According to event organizers, there will be three hunts offered on each field, including one or two on opening day of dove season (Sept.

1) and then one or two other days. Those dates are yet to be determined.

Each field will be limited to two first-time hunters and their mentors per acre to maximize safety and provide a quality experience. Priority will be given to anyone 11 and older who is hunting for the first time. Second priority will be given to new migratory bird hunters and youths 11-15 who may have previously hunted doves

Field assignments will be deter-mined on a first-come-first-served basis. First-time hunters can attend multiple hunts as registration space permits.

Each participating new hunter will be assigned a mentor and are encouraged to attend a pre-hunt workshop or a hunter-education course prior to participating in a

hunt. Workshops provide basic hunter safety in addition to information about dove biology and management, the importance of hunters and hunting, and the oppor-tunity to practice shooting a shot-

## **FUNCTIONAL MOVEMENT SCREENING**

## WHAT IS FUNCTIONAL MOVEMENT SCREENING?

It's seven fundamental movement patterns that evaluate and identify movement limitations and left/right muscle asymmetries. Put simply, it's a trouble-detection system to prevent injuries before they happen. The seven movements place the individual in extreme positions where weaknesses and imbalances become easily noticeable if appropriate stability and muscle balance is not present- which often leads to injury

# MDC Offers Adult All-Online Hunter Education Course

Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) now offers an all-online hunter-education course for Missouri residents 16 years or older to provide a more flexible and convenient option to become hunter-education certified. The all-online course includes videos and animation to teach hunter safety, firearm safety, ethics, regulations, and wildlife management.

"The way adults are learning is ever changing. More individuals are utilizing mobile applications and online tools to educate themselves," MDC Hunter Education Coordinator Kyle Lairmore said. "This option provides individuals the flexibility to learn at their own pace and at a time they choose" time they choose.

Students will receive a temporary hunter-education certificate once they complete and pass the 60-question final exam with an 80% or higher. Individuals 15 years or younger are still required to complete the blended hunter education course requiring both a knowledge portion and in-person skills session to receive certification.

Missouri's hunter education course is required for any hunter born on or after Jan. 1, 1967. Hunters who plan to hunt during a Missouri firearms season or are acting as an adult mentor must first complete an approved hunter-education certification program and provide proof of completion unless:

Fifteen years of age or younger and will be hunting with a properly permitted adult mentor 18 or older.

Born before Jan. 1, 1967.

Disability exemption from MDC's Protection Division.

Sixteen years of age or older and have purchased an apprentice hunter authorization and will be hunting with a

property permitted adult mentor 18 or older.

Landowner or lessee hunting on self-owned land or land of residence.
