

Secretary Of State Talks About New Voter ID Law

Secretary of State John R. Ashcroft offered a presentation at the Bowling Green Housing Authority last week regarding the state's new voter identification

Several area residents attended the presentation to learn more about the law and to hear details about obtaining a state identification card free of charge.

Ashcroft noted that any form of identification that individuals used before will still work under the state's new system, however, there are stipulations about the preferred types of identification. He provided informational handouts and had forms available for those who need to obtain new identification.

He also pointed out that even those who arrive at a polling place on election day with no identification will be allowed to vote with a

"We need your voice, your vote," Ashcroft said. "We want your voice to be heard. If you're a registered voter, you can vote."

While there are no changes for individuals who vote using an absentee ballot, a new photo voter ID law went into effect on June 1 which outlines the various identification options for voters.

The presentation was part of a larger state-wide effort to make residents aware of the law change and to urge voter registration. The campaign "#ShowIt2Vote" pro-vides complete information about the new law and how residents can get a free photo ID.

According to the new law, the preferred option for voting will be a state driver's licence or non-dri-ver license, U.S. passport or military identification.

Vandalia YMCA Location Seeks Help To Finish Fundraising Effort

ity of receiving the interest-free project loan through the Rural Economic Development Loan and Grant Program (REDLG), the Vandalia Recreation Corporation reviewed updated construction costs, plus other necessary costs for the Eastern Missouri Family YMCA Project at a July 18, 2017 meeting.

Through the generosity of the community and grants, the YMCA Project has raised \$1,658,000. This amount is a remarkable amount to be collected in a small, rural area, but more is needed to actually open the doors for the area to start using the facil-

The current available balance will build a basic YMCA building, but it will not cover the expenses to furnish the facility with exercise equipment, office supplies. and other necessary supplies. In addition, YMCA's are required to have a year's worth of operating costs before opening the facility.

Operating costs account for staff wages and benefits, plus utility costs to run the facility.

Having a secure operating bal-ance ensures the YMCA will be successful and capable of paying expenses. Securing proper oper-ating costs before opening a facil-ity is good business practice, plus it is simply the right thing to do. Below is a summary of the esti-

mated project costs. In order to open the facility, an additional \$264,500 needs to be raised.

Building Const Estimate/Bid - \$1,496,700 Construction

Architectural and Engineering Expenses for Construction Plan Development and Construction

Facility Equipment (Fitness, Office, Kitchen, etc.) - \$92,500 Operating Expenses for 1-year (Staff wages and Utilities, etc.) - \$205,600 benefits.

Total Required to Open the YMCA - \$1,922,500

Funds Raised \$1,658,000 Additional Funds Required \$264,500

The area should be extremely proud of the efforts to bring this project to its current state. Once notification is received regarding the second phase of the REDLG loan, construction will begin on the building. The YMCA committees are hopeful that notifica-See YMCA on page 7

For the first time in 148 years
(August 7, 1869) a total solar
eclipse will come to Missouri on
August 21, 2017. A total solar
eclipse occurs when the moon
passes between the sun and earth
and completely blocks the sun,
and the moon casts a shadow over and completely blocks the sun, and the moon casts a shadow over the earth. The 1869 the eclipse only clipped the northeast corner of our state. The upcoming eclipse promises to be even better as the center of the path will follow a diagonal line crossing Missouri from Buchanan County in the porthwest to Perry County in the northwest to Perry County in the northwest to Perry County in the southeast. Depending upon where you are in the state, the eclipse will begin between 11:30 a.m. and noon until between 2:30 p.m. and 2:00 p.m. 3:00 p.m.

Millions of people will be out-side on August 21st to watch the eclipse which is one of nature's grandest spectacles. Looking directly at the sun is unsafe except during the brief phase of the solar eclipse, known as totality. The only safe way to look directly at only safe way to look directly at the uneclipsed or partially eclipsed sun is through special-purpose solar filters, such as eclipse glasses or hand held solar viewers. These may be purchased at Walmart, Amazon, eBay and several other vendors listed on-

Missouri will offer some of the best vantage points in the nation best vantage points in the nation for witnessing this historic event, and many Missouri communities are planning festivals and other events for residents and visitors alike to take advantage of the fact that many Show-Me-State com-munities are directly in the "path of totality", meaning the areas will experience the longest period of darkness on that Monday after-noon.

According to some estimates, hundreds of thousands of addi-tional visitors could be in the tional visitors could be in the Show-Me-State to catch a glimpse of the eclipse, which will last approximately 90 minutes. This will coincide with summer vacations and the closing weekend of the Missouri State Fair. For this reason, the State Emergency Management Agency, other Department of Public Safety

agencies and state and local part-ners began planning for the eclipse in the spring.

August in Missouri can mean extreme heat or severe weather. extreme heat or severe weather. Keeping traffic moving smoothly and ensuring reliable communications are also key considerations. As a precaution, the state plans to activate the State Emergency Operations Center in the days leading up to the eclipse. This will allow for immediate state response and coordination if the need arises.

Here are some safety tips to ensure a safe and enjoyable expe-

rience for everyone:

Plan in advance, book ahead, and avoid travel during peak times

Check your route, allow extra time and have alternate routes just in case, be patient and check MODOT's Traveler Info

(http://traveler.modot.org/map/).

Gas up.
Don't wear "eclipse glasses" when driving.
Don't stop along interstates or roads or park on the shoulder. Exit the road and find a

safe place to stop to watch or photograph the eclipse.

• Prepare for congestion, watch out for extra pedestrians and cyclists.

Keep your cell phone charged and know how to call for help. On the highway you can reach the Missouri State Highway Patrol at *55. In other locations

Have an emergency kit and plan. Include water, flash-lights, batteries, sunscreen, insect repellent, prescription medica-tions, food and a First Aid Kit.

 Have games, books and videos to keep children occupied and be patient since you may encounter traffic and crowds.


5K Benefit Raises Over \$12,000 For Chance Family

MDC To Eliminate Feral Hogs

When Ken Hobbs bought his 362 acres in Reynolds County, it was pris-tine and he planned to farm cattle and goats on the land. Then feral hogs moved in. Feral hogs are an aggressive invasive species. Their violent nature, rooting habits, and known diseases pose a threat to wildlife, farm crops, and the balance of nature.

"I had planned until this problem got so big to have cattle and goats in here," Hobbs said. "I'd be afraid to put cattle out there because there's no way I'm going to have a herd of cattle out there without broken legs, it's not going to

The feral hogs didn't only dash Hobb's hopes of farming his land, they've also significantly decreased the numbers of wildlife that once thrived on

the property.

Hobbs first began to try to control the feral hogs by shooting them and enlisting the help of his friends to trap small numbers of them at a time.

Now, on any given night, more than 30 feral hogs will congregate in Hobbs' front yard, leaving scat every foot or so and rooting up his once flat, lush yard into continuous divots. His fields are in even worse, school. even worse shape.

even worse snape. Tooted eight-to-10 inches, quite often though it's 12, 16, sometimes 18-inches deep," he said. Those damaged fields, the dashed hopes of farming, and the general destruction Hobbs has endured on his property are why he and other landowners reached out the Missouri

Department of Conservation (MDC) to help. MDC, United States Department of Agriculture and other partner agencies are working with private landowners to teach them how to trap whole sounders of feral hogs at a time, which is more effective than shooting the feral

Dean Bridger is an Iron County landowner about 20 miles away from Hobbs. Bridger also understands that it's just not possible to control feral hogs by hunting.

But trapping isn't the only strategy that must be used against feral hogs.

Mark McClain, a wildlife management biologist with MDC, is working hard to trap hogs and to pull people together on the effort. McLain leads feral hog elimination efforts in south-east Missouri. He spends a lot of his time with landowners like Hobbs and Bridger, outlining plans to trap the feral hogs on their property. This coopera-tion between landowners and conservation groups is the key to success in feral hog elimination.

so far in 2017, MDC and partners have removed 4,128 feral hogs from Missouri, which is a great increase from previous years. This is nearly double the progress that was made at the same time in 2016. Increased efforts and better technology continue to show success each year and McLain says MDC and its partners will continue improving until their goal is met.



Making the first day easier:
