Citing significant safety issues a landlocked area, the Missouri Department of Transportation has purchased additional property at the U.S. 54 and Business 54 interwest of Bowling section just Green to build a new maintenance

"The current facility is more than 50 years old, and over the years, our equipment has gotten larger than the building, making repairs and maintenance very challenging," explained Kevin James, MoDOT assistant district engineer. "We already owned a piece of that property where our stockpile of materials is located, and now we will be able to have all our equipment and facilities together in a better location. James said.

The Bowling Green mainte-nance facility has 18 full-time employees and takes care of approximately 300 miles of state highway in the Pike County area and maintains 71 state bridges and large culverts. "It has become large culverts. very challenging to safety move equipment around at the existing facility due to limited space," James explained. "We received a lot of interest from local organizations about purchasing the exist-ing space should we decide to move, so we expect the building and grounds will be put to good use after we move," he continued. The new location also will allow direct access to U.S. 54, so the large equipment will not necessarily always have to go through the

In addition to maintaining the state's highways and bridges, all maintenance crews help maintain clearing brush, trimming trees, replacing and maintaining driveway culverts, among many other tasks to keep Missouri's transportation system in good condition

The new facility is expected to be completed in late 2018 or early 2019 and is estimated to cost \$1.2 million.

National Direct Support Professional Week Is Sept. 10-16

Sept. 10-16 is national Direct Support Professional week. Direct Support Professionals, or "DSPs," are staff who provide care and support for persons with develop-mental disabilities.

Local agencies that employ DSPs include Ruth Jensen Village, the Pike Co. Agency for Developmental Disabilities, Pike Shop, and The Learning Center. All together, these agencies employ about 175 individuals who fill the role of DSPs.

Typical responsibilities of DSPs include teaching and training skills in activities of daily living; ensuring the health and safety of persons with developmental disabilities; assisting with personal care such as bathing, feeding, and toileting; assisting with community inclusion; training in vocational skills; and training in community living skills and social skills. In short, DSPs maintain considerable responsibility over the lives of our most vulnerable

Soil Health Workshop, Tour Held At Fairgrounds. Area Farms

On Thursday, Aug. 28 the Pike, Warren, Montgomery, and Lincoln County Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCD) held a Soil Health Workshop and Tour, featuring Ray "The Soil Guy" Archuleta as the key note speaker and John Scherder's Farm for the tour to demonstrate applied conservation practices.

The event started at the Pike County Fair Grounds at 3 p.m., with a demonstration on water infiltration. Ray Archuleta simulated a slate test. David Doctorian with the NRCS from the Palmyra office used the rainfall simulator to also demonstrate water infiltration. Ray Archuleta followed the demonstrations of water infiltration, with a power point presenta-tion, to further explain the importance of soil health and the effects

of human impacts.

Dinner was possible due to compliments of the Pike County Young Farmers and Ranchers and



September Is National Suicide Prevention N **Health Department Offers Information**

Suicide! It is such a scary word, one that is often avoided or danced around. Maybe it is because we do not understand, we do not know what to do, it makes us uncomfortable, or we have been affected by a loss and have difficulties coping with our emo-tions. But for many Americans the thoughts of suicide are all too real. World Health Organization estimates that approximately one million people die each year from (www.helpguide.org) Suicide does not discriminate based on age, gender, or social sta-

This means that every person is at risk. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports that the highest rate of suicide deaths among women is found between ages 45 and 64, while the highest rate for men occurs at ages 75+. Suicide is also the second leading cause of death for young

people ages 15 to 34 (www.cdc.gov).
September is National Suicide Prevention Month. We need to take this opportunity to break the stigma associated with mental health issues like suicide and begin building a community asking for help. Suicide can often be avoided if the person suffering has resources and supports available who know how to respond. So, what can you do to help raise

awareness about suicide preven-tion for your friends, family mem-bers, colleagues and neighbors? Know the risk factors. Individuals are at higher risk for suicide if they experience depression or other mental health disorders, have a substance abuse problem, have chronic pain or other medical problems, have a history of family violence, recently experienced a traumatic life event, or have made a previous suicide attempt.

Know the warning signs. Many individuals will begin talking about being a "burden" to others, start feeling as if there are no solutions to their problems, withdraw-ing from friends or family, lose interest in activities that they once enjoyed, or even start talking about wanting to die or ways to

Know how to respond. First, do not leave the person alone if you are concerned about their risk for suicide. You must take all suicidal comments seriously. Remain calm and supportive and listen to what

Do not argue with them or attempt to tell them that their feelings or thoughts are "wrong." Next, do not be afraid to ask them questions about their thoughts and feelings. The easiest way to find out if a person is considering suicide is to simply ask them directly: "Are you thinking about killing or harming yourself?" Although this question can be difficult to ask, it is the most effective and direct way to assess their risk for suicide. Do not allow yourself to believe that you will enhance a person's risk of suicide if you talk to them about it. Quite the opposite is true - bringing up the topic and talking about it openly is one

of the most helpful responses that you can have. If the person admits to suicidal thoughts or you still have concerns, then help them access resources as quickly as possible.

Know the resources. If you feel

that the person is in immediate danger then do not hesitate to call or take the individual to a local Emergency Department. Emergency personnel are often trained to assist an individual with accessing a safe environment while getting help for emotional

If you do not feel that there is an immediate danger, then help the person get set up with counsel-ing services. Counseling can assist them with managing emotions, finding solutions to problems, addressing mental health con-cerns, and working through the powerful feelings and thoughts

that often lead to suicide. Encourage the individual to access suicide prevention hotlines. Save the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline's number in your phone so it's there when you need it: 1-800-8255 (TALK).

Together we can start the con-versations that will assist with decreasing the stigma around sui-cide and begin to make Pike County a happier and healthier place to live.

Buy Native Trees, Shrubs From MDC

Native trees and shrubs can help improve wildlife habitat and soil and water conservation while soli and water conservation while also improving the appearance and value of private property. The Missouri Department of Conservation's (MDC) George O. White State Forest Nursery offers a variety of low-cost native tree and shrub seedlings for reforestation, windbreaks, erosion control, wildlife food and cover and other wildlife food and cover, and other

purposes. This year, the State Forest Nursery is taking orders starting a couple months early, beginning on Sept. 1 instead of in November. Orders are being accepted through April 15, 2018. Supplies are limited so order early. Orders will be shipped or can be picked up at the nursery near Licking from Eabrupy through May

rursery near Licking from February through May.

The nursery provides mainly one-year-old bare-root seedlings with sizes varying by species. Seedlings varieties include: pine, bald cypress, cottonwood, black walnut, hickory, oak, persimmon, birch, maple, willow, sycamore, blackberry, buttonbush, holly, dogwood, hazelnut, redbud, spice-bush, sumac, wild plum, and oth-

Seedlings are available in bundles of 10 or increments of 25 per species. Prices range from 16 – 80 cents per seedling. Sales tax of 6.1 percent will be added to orders unless tax exempt. There is an \$8 handling charge for each order. Receive a 15-percent discount up to \$20 off seedling orders with a Heritage Card, Permit Card, or Conservation ID Number.

It is likely you have seen DSPs at work within the community. It common practice and part of federal policy today to ensure that persons with developmental dis-abilities have "lives like everyone else", in terms of where people else", in terms of where people live, learn, work, and play. DSPs work hard to make this happen.

DSPs must achieve and maintain competencies in several areas, such as first aid and CPR, medication administration, positive behavioral supports, abuse and neglect detection, and emergency safety procedures. The work involved can be challenging, and unfortunately, the pay does not reflect the level of responsibilities that DSPs have, but it is very rewarding work even so.

They encourage the greater Pike County community to join them in recognizing the many individuals in the area employed as DSP staff, and for everything they have done and continue to do to improve the lives of persons with developmental disabilities.
