Louisiana Man Faces Numerous Charges After Alleged Kidnapping At Knife-Point

William Joseph Shade, 34, of Louisiana. faces numerous charges after being arrested by Ste. Genevieve Police last week allegedly kidnapping his exgirlfriend by using a knife to threaten her.

The incident occurred on Wednesday, Sept. 13 as law enforcement was called to the Ste. Genevieve Courthouse after the victim reported the matter. Police arrived at the courthouse where Shade's ex-girlfriend had gone

inside to use the restroom and alerted staff to the situation.

Shade was sitting in the vehicle and officials claim he would not comply with orders when first commanded to show his hands Police report drawing a weapon to eventually urge Shade out of the vehicle and onto the ground.

A knife with an almost seveninch blade was found inside the vehicle. The victim told authorities that Shade had contacted her

Deteriorating Building Was Once Masonic Temple

While engineers recently exam-ined the three-story brick building at the corner of Main and Court Bowling Green and determined it is beyond repair, the city may attempt to preserve some local history as it is demolished.

The city is currently examining

costs for taking down the building that most recently housed a flower shop. The owner, Gary Rahmeyer, was unable to salvage the building and it is now a hazard to the pub-lic. The building was constructed in 1869 and was originally the Masonic Phoenix Lodge that was chargered in 1851.

Leonard Pratte, a member of the local organization, says there may be two keystones on the second and third floors that could contain memorabilia from the 19th Century. He's asked the city to take a look into the matter.

Mel Orf, the city's building inspector, said the city will see what can be done to salvage the

Sponsored by the USDA Food and Nutrition Service (FNS), the initiative encourages all schools to take a leadership role in helping students make healthier eating and physical activity choices that will last a lifetime. Schools, such as Bowling Green Elementary, in partnership with their nutrition provider, Opaa! Food provider, Opaa! Food Management, that champion the HUSSC: SL, work hard to make environment in order to (1) main-tain high quality for the foods served on campus, (2) provide stu-dents with nutrition education, and (3) provide students with physical education and opportuni-

physical education and opportunities for physical activity.

To qualify for an award, a school must submit a formal application and meet basic criteria application and fleet basic criteria set forth by the FNS. The HUSSC: SL criteria reflect the requirements of the Healthy Hunger Free Kids Act, regulation adopted in 2012 for all foods sold on school campus. Opaa! Menus are designed to meet the require-ments of HUSSC: SL and provided the nutrition support needed to apply for the awards. HealthierUS Schools must also have a local school wellness policy, as mandated by Congress. Schools receiving a HUSSC: SL award commit to meeting the cri-teria throughout their four year certification period.

Voice Of Democracy, Patriot's Pen Programs
