Despite the county commission deciding to back out of working together to take down two dilapi dated properties for the city along with portions of the Courthouse Annex, the Bowling Green Board of Aldermen opened bids for the projects vesterday.

Presiding Commissioner Chris

Gamm attended the board's committee meeting on Monday, Oct. 2. At that time he indicated the Annex has had problems for some time and that taking down a porto ion of it would make sense

"We've been kicking the can down the road since 2015," he had remarked.

Since then the commissioners met with their engineer, Michael Purol. He indicated that work could be done to restore the property. Western District Commissioner Bill Allen said he would rather spend anther \$150,000 and maintain the structure rather than spending that amount or more to demolish a building that can be structurally sound.

Bridge Web Cam: A Safe Way To View Champ Clark Bridge Construction





The Bulldogs appeared to be pulling out all the stops to end their long losing streak and their storied tenure in the conference on a high

Louisiana won the coin toss, but Louisiana won the coin toss, but elected to kick off to start the contest. The Bulldogs still opened with ball, pulling off an onside kick that stunned the Cougars.

The trickery by Louisiana started a twelve play drive that lasted nearly half of the first quarter.





Wiles Taken Into Custody In Osage County After Two Month Search Following Police Chase



Russell E. Wiles, 45. Of Vandalia was apprehended on Thursday, Oct. 12 by the Osage County Sheriff's Department.

Wiles was a fugitive from the

Vandalia Police Department.

On Tuesday, Sept. 19 the Vandalia Police Department responded to the area of South Lincoln St. for a report of a physical domestic taking place between two individuals in a vehicle with a female subject reportedly being dragged by the vehicle for a short dis-

Officer arrived on scene and located the vehicle in question. The driver, later identified as Russell Wiles, exited the vehicle and then quickly reentered the vehicle and fled the scene leading officers on a high-speed chase through the city.
Wiles then left the city limits and

the pursuit continued into rural Audrain County. Officer discontinued the pursuit when the subject entered a bean field and officer lost sight of the vehicle. The vehicle was later located after crashing in the area of Audrain County Road 556 in a drainage ditch.

Information along with charges of resisting arrest/detention/stop by flee-ing - creating a substantial risk of serious injury/death to any personproperty damage first degree-felony E, leaving the scene of an accident - property damage exceeding \$1,000 - felony E, fail to yield to emergency vehicle/with lights and sirens - misdemeanor A. operating a motor vehicle in a careless and imprudent manner - misdemeanor B. fail to stop at stop sign - misdemeanor C, failure to signal - misdemeanor C, possession of controlled substance felony D, possession of controlled substance - felony D, and unlawful possession of drug paraphernalia -misdemeanor D were sent to the Audrain County prosecutor's Office.

A warrant was issued for Wiles with a bond amount of \$15,000.

Individuals arrested are presumed innocent until proven guilty.

Eastern MO YMCA Construction Contract Signed

REDLG loans are awarded to utility companies that meet certain qualifications, and then the local project repays the loan to the utility company. Consolidated Electric is serving as the loan holder for the YMCA facility and the Vandalia Recreation Corporation the Eastern Missouri Family YMCA are responsible for ensuring the loan payments are made. YMCA Project would like to express great appreciation for Consolidated Electric's willingness to sponsor the REDLG loan and their dedication

towards the success of the project. While it is exciting that construction of the YMCA is beginning, there are still funds that need to be raised to stock the facility with equipment and ensure there is an operating budget to

pay employee salaries and utilities. This project is an investment in our Once completed, the community. facility will not only provide enjoyment for individuals of all ages, it will create new jobs, attract potential residents and businesses to the area, and spur growth for existing businesses.

While disappointed, the Board of Aldermen seem committed to moving forward for the sake of public safety and to reopen that portion of Court Street following the demolition of the brick threestory Rahmeyer building and the two-story Butler building that is better known as the old gas company building.

The city received three bids for the project but will only be able to consider two of them. The bid submitted by a local contractor did not contain all of the neces-sary paperwork by the deadline. That bid from Mark Ledford was for \$1,359. The next lowest bid

was for \$169,995 from Bricker Excavating out of Quincy, Ill. The last bid was for \$170,000 from Roberts Demolition Roll Off out of Center. All three contractors were at the meeting last night. Bricker indicated he would also install a fence around the job site for the duration of the projet.

Another company that Orf checked with priced the amount at about \$5,500.

The board voted to table a decision until the next board meeting on Monday, Nov. 6.

In other business, the board voted accept a bid from Chris Lohman of Heartland Forest Consulting. Aldermen also voted to continue a contract for IT services from Devin McClain Consulting for \$50 per hour and 50-cents per mile.
