Marks To Give Program For Louisiana Area Historical Museum

The Louisiana Area Historical Museum will feature Lisa Marks of Hannibal for its program at the annual fall dinner to be held on Thursday, Nov. 9 at 6 p.m., at the American Legion Post, 420 Kelly Lane in Louisiana. The meal will be prepared by Vicky Keely and served by members of the Louisiana Interact Club.

This year's program is titled "Molly Brown from Hannibal, Missouri: Her Life in the Gilded

Age." Marks and her husband, Ken, are owners and operators of the Hannibal Museum and authors of the books "Hannibal, Missouri: A Brief History" and "Molly Brown From Hannibal, Missouri." They also operate the Haunted Hannibal Ghost Tours as an extension of their museum, which is located at 200 North Main in downtown Hannibal. While dressed in Victorian garb, Marks will share the story of Molly, the feisty Hannibal native and Titanic

survivor who became known for her wealth and philanthropy in the West. She will also speak of life at the turn of the 20th century, when Hannibal was a stop on the routes from St. Louis and Kansas City to Chicago, when the train traffic boosted business and helped turn Hannibal temporarily into the second largest city in the state. The cosmopolitan nature of the town helped form the character and life of Molly Brown.

Eastern Missouri YMCA Groundbreaking Set For Nov. 2

The Vandalia Recreation Corporation will be hosting the official groundbreaking ceremony for the Eastern Missouri Family YMCA on Nov. 2.

The groundbreaking will occur at 11 a.m., at the project site located at 309 South Main in Vandalia. Following the ceremony, Spare Time Bowl and Grill, located at 1201 Hwy. P in Vandalia, will host a celebration lunch. Lunch will be available for purchase and will include meat, two sides, salad, dessert, and drink. Lunch reservations are suggested and appreciated, 573-406-2982.

The YMCA will be a branch of the Mexico Area Family YMCA. Lori Brandow, Executive Director of the Mexico Area Family YMCA, will oversee the Eastern Missouri Family YMCA; however, a local facility director and a variety of other positions will be hired to manage the day-to-day operations of the facility. The new YMCA facility for the Vandalia area is estimated to create 1-2 full-time positions and 10-15 part-time positions. In addition, the Eastern Missouri Family YMCA will be governed by a YMCA board comprised of members from the local

area. The completion of the Eastern Missouri Family YMCA is going to provide programs and opportunities for all ages. Typically, YMCA's become a community staple that unites residents, encourages community growth, and promotes health and wellbeing for all ages. YMCAs embrace and operate under the guidance of their mission statement, "To put Christian principles into practice through programs that build healthy spirit, mind, and body for all."

Through the generosity of the community, organizations, and grant programs, an astonishing \$1.67 Million has been raised for the project. Reaching this goal has allowed construction to begin on the YMCA facility; however, additional funds are needed to open the facility. Additional funds are still needed to purchase equipment for the facility and to secure an operating budget for employee salaries and facility utilities. These additional funds need to be raised so the area can enjoy the facility upon construction completion in the summer of 2018.

The Affordable Care Act Marketplace insurance (sometimes referred to as Obamacare) is still intact and is still the law. If you meet requirements set by the Federal Government, you may receive substantial tax credits and cost share reductions that will make health insurance more affordable to you and your family. If you do not have qualified health insurance you may face large penalties when you file your 2017 taxes.

Families and Communities Together (F.A.C.T.) has Certified Application Counselors that can help you through the process at no charge. Just call (573) 221-2285 and make an appointment to discuss your families' health insurance needs. We have assistance available in Marion, Ralls, Pike, Lewis and Clark counties.

If you do have insurance through the Marketplace, F.A.C.T. strongly encourages you to make an appointment to update your account's information. This will ensure your tax credits are current and that the health insurance policy you choose is the best fit for your health needs.

It is important to understand that this year's open enrollment is only six weeks long. It is from Nov. 1, 2017 through Dec. 15, 2017. Appointments will fill quickly, so please do not delay in making your appointment to meet with an application counselor.

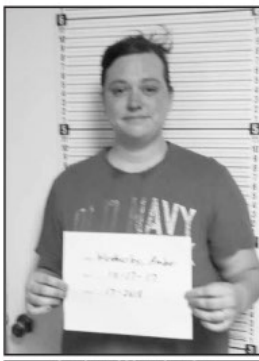

Lady Cats Earn First-Ever State Championship Title

T-shirts, posters and internet memes all agree "Softball is Life" and in life, you have to make your moments. The Bowling Green softball team made their moment in Springfield, earning the programs first ever State Championship.

It wasn't easy, lucky and definitely wasn't handed to the Lady Cats. For two days the girls battled and pushed for every foot that crossed the plate.

In the Class 2 Semifinal on Friday morning against Kelly, the Lady Cats had to overcome a four run deficit for a come-from-behind 7-6 victory.

Bowling Green picked up single runs in the bottom of the second and third innings when Haylee Chandler drove in Taylor Darnell with a two-out single then Mallory Feldewerth knocked in Anah Noble with a hit.

The Lady Cats surrendered the lead in the top of the fourth when an error and a couple of well-placed hits led to three Kelly runs.

The Hawks lead increased in the top of the fifth inning. With two outs, Kelly got a pair of infield singles which was followed by a three-run homer from catcher Marissa Worth.

With their Championship hopes on the line, Bowling Green came together in the bottom of the fifth and made a moment for themselves.

Noble and Feldewerth led off the inning with back-to-back singles, followed by an RBI hit from Gabi Deters and a two-run single from KateLynn Charlton to pull the Lady Cats within a run.

After a ground-out by Sarah Harness advanced two runners to second and third, Kaylyn McKee stroked an opposite field hit to

right to tie the game.

Harness allowed a single in the top of the sixth and the runner advanced to third, but Harness induced a ground-out and a pop-up to left to strand the runner in scoring position.

In the bottom of the frame, Deters and Charlton would put Bowling Green ahead for good.

With two outs and the bases empty, the Lady Cat catcher hit a ball to the gap for a double, then took an extra base as the Hawks defense tossed the ball back in. So with Deters at third, KateLynn Charlton brought her home with a liner to right.

Harness retired the Hawks in order with three ground balls in the top of the seventh, handling the last two herself to seal the win and advance to the title game.

Harness finished the semifinal with eight strikeouts in the game.

KateLynn Charlton was four for four with three RBIs and Gabi Deters picked up two hits and scored twice to share the Community State Bank TRiBCAST Player of the Game.

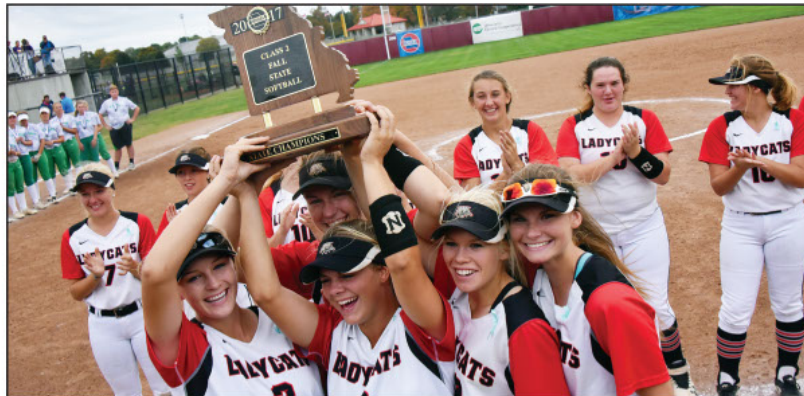
Coach Dean Streed pointed out the girls didn't panic when Kelly took the lead, instead they just responded and got the job done.

He added that "with Sarah [Harness] in the circle and this offense" the team is pretty unstoppable.

"You can see that confidence glaring in their eyes," he remarked.

Senior first baseman KateLynn Charlton noted the team was prepared and they all knew they could count on each other.

"All the work we put in has been worth it for this," Deters asserted. She added that it was tough seeing the Kelly home run

but she knew they would persevere and come from behind for the win.

The semifinal win set up a championship matchup on Saturday with last year's second place team - the Blair Oaks Lady Falcons.

Again, Bowling Green had to manufacture their moment.

As the Lady Cats offense was stymied by a wide strike zone and tough pitching from Makenna Kliethermes, it was on the defense to change the momentum.

Falcons right fielder Hannah Schroeder led off the second with a triple for Blair Oaks, putting the pressure on Harness and the Lady Cats.

Center fielder Brooke Boessen followed the triple, by lining a one strike pitch right at the ankles of Bowling Green third base Kaylyn McKee. The ball bent the glove of McKee, so she pinned the ball to her leg to record the first out and keep the runner at third.

The Falcons tried McKee again with a grounder that she handled nicely. Harness struck out the last batter to end the inning.

With momentum firmly in hand, Bowling Green went to work in the top of the fourth.

Gabi Deters doubled to lead off the frame, then stole third. The throw from catcher Sydney Wilde went over third base into left field, allowing Deters to come home for the Lady Cats' first run.

Two batters later, Bowling Green would add a two out run as Sarah Harness picked up her first hit since returning from injury and was replaced by runner Taylor Darnell.

Haylee Chandler followed with a walk ahead of center-fielder

Katy Horner who sent a one-strike pitch high into the air behind third base that caught the strong wind that had fielders baffled all afternoon.

The ball fell between the left-fielder and shortstop for a hit and the second Bowling Green run.

The Lady Falcons came back with a two out run in the bottom of the inning as Schroeder walked and scored on a triple from Boessen who ended up stranded at third as Harness picked up another strikeout to end the frame.

Now up 2-1, Bowling Green took advantage of a rare two out intentional walk to Deters. She stole second and the throw from Wilde was wild again. Deters took third, looked back as the center-fielder bobbled the ball and broke for home to score the third run for the Lady Cats.

Harness retired the next five batters she faced before a double and walk put runners on in the sixth for Blair Oaks. Once again Harness battled back to get the strikeout and end the Falcon threat.

In the seventh, Bowling Green came to bat looking for insurance runs. Kliethermes seemed to get tired under the stress of the most pitches she had been forced to throw all season, Bowling Green got even more selective at the plate.

After a hit from Morgen Billings to lead off, Anah Noble drew a walk. With two runners on base and one out Blair Oaks called for another intentional pass to Deters. Kliethermes lost her release point following the free pass and walked both KateLynn Charlton for an RBI and McKee to force in a run.

Sarah Harness followed with a

bouncing ball to second that forced Deters out at home, but Wilde threw over first base for her third error, allowing Charlton to score for a five run Bowling Green lead.

A lead-off walk and a one out error put runners on the corners for Blair Oaks in their final at bat, but Harness struck out Cameron Dulle for the second out, then got Macey Stockman to fly a ball high to short center. Katy Horner tracked the ball through the wind and squeezed it with both hands as the Lady Cats captured their first-ever softball championship title with the 6-1 win.

Harness and Deters shared the Community State Bank TRiBCAST Player of the Game. The big bat of Deters had Blair Oaks worried and she made them pay even when they intentionally walked her. Harness only allowed one run on three hits and struck out nine batters in the title win.

Killian Stadium was packed with Bowling Green faithful who were loud and proud for the Lady Cats throughout the game and following the win. The community gathered at the roundabout to cheer for the girls as they entered town. There were also fireworks and a ton of signs. The gym was also packed for the celebration at the school.

Streed said he was incredibly proud of the team and pointed out they brought tremendous energy to both games.

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Prep Pointers For The Upcoming Hunting Season

Hunting is a popular hobby and sport enjoyed by millions of people across North America. Over the last 10 years, data from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service indicates that more and more females are taking up hunting.

Hunting seasons vary depending on where you live. Regulations designed by local conservation, game, fish, and wildlife departments often dictate the start and end of hunting season. Although the licensing, seasons, limits, and fees for hunting may differ geographically, the preparation that goes into getting ready for hunting season is similar regardless of geography.

Many seasoned hunters realize hunting season does not begin on "opening day." Rather, it can take weeks or months to get ready for a successful season. Considering hunting seasons can be brief, preparation helps hunters make the most of their time spent in the field.

* Purchase your license, tag or stamp. Many wildlife departments require hunters register in advance of the season, and this registration includes securing a hunting license. Because there is a limit to how many animals each hunter can hunt, tags for the animals they're hunting also will be issued. Hunters planning on going out for

the season should stay apprised of when licensing and registration begins and ends so they can hunt legally.

* Scout areas. The landscape can change from year to year depending on a host of factors, including construction, commercialization and weather. Areas once open to hunting may now be restricted lands. Map out your potential hunting location and be aware of any new landmarks or changes.

* Check and replenish gear. Inspect weaponry, field-dressing supplies, clothing, and other supplies for wear and tear. Address any issues that need to be fixed, or replace items as necessary. If a rifle, bow or shotgun hasn't been fired in a while, take it to a range to verify accuracy and sighting. If you hunt out of a tree stand or blind, make sure it is sturdy and in good condition prior to use.

* Get in shape. Hunting often requires hiking in and out of the great outdoors in various terrain. It's helpful to increase physical activity leading up to the hunt to prepare your body for the physical demands of hunting.

* Organize and pack gear. Ensure your equipment is clean, in working order and packed away in your travel bags. Establish

a system of organization and a checklist so you're certain you will have what you need. Don't forget to bring along your hunting license and animal tags; otherwise, you may be levied with costly fines.

* Always hunt safely. It is quite easy to get swept up in the moment when tracking

game. Don't let overzealousness cloud rational judgement and safety precautions. Otherwise an injury or even death can occur.

Hunting season is on the horizon and that means preparing now for the few weeks of sport to come.

Teach Kids Safety Measures

The National Rifle Association (NRA) recommends teaching kids to follow these steps if they should ever come across a gun:

- Stop •Don't Touch
- Leave The Area •Tell An Adult

Having a gun in your home can pose a significant risk to children. In fact, firearm-related injuries are a leading cause of death in children. If you decide to keep a gun in your home, proper storage is essential to reduce the risk of injury. A gun should always be stored in a gun safe, lock box, or locked cabinet or drawer. It should be unloaded, and bullets should be securely stored in a separate place. In addition, it's important for children to understand that guns can be dangerous.



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CAUGHT IN THE HEADLIGHTS: Simple Tips To Avoid Deer Collisions

With the deer population increasing across the country, and living space for wildlife on the decline, the number of incidents involving a deer jumping into the path of a car has been steadily on the rise. This is especially true from October through December when male deer activity dramatically increases, resulting in a significant rise in the number of vehicular collisions.

A deer can literally come out of nowhere, leaving only seconds to react. Even worse, the collision can result in significant property damage and even life-threatening situations.

CONSIDER THE FOLLOWING:

- Watch the clock. Deer are most active from sunset to midnight, and during the hours just before and after sunrise, which are feeding times.

- Watch your speed. It's not just the speed of the animal that plays a factor - it's the speed of the vehicle. Think about it: if you are driving your vehicle at a speed of over 60 miles per hour, you'll cover the length of a football field in the same time it takes to

change a CD.

- Keep your eyes open. Deer don't run alone. If you see one, there are likely others nearby.

- Don't swerve. If a deer is suddenly in front of you, sound your horn to frighten it away. Break firmly, but stay in your lane. Serious crashes happen when drivers swerve to avoid a deer, only to hit other vehicles or lose control of their cars.

- Wear your seat belt. Most people injured in deer/car crashes were unbuckled at the time.

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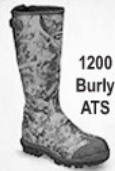

Using Deer & Turkey Hunting Permits Couldn't Be Easier

Using Missouri's deer-hunting and turkey-hunting permits couldn't be easier. Just remember: Bag it. Notch it. Tag it if you leave it. Check it.

Protect paper e-Permits in a plastic sandwich bag while afield.

Immediately after harvesting a deer or turkey, you must notch your permit.

To notch a paper permit, tear a small notch in the month and day of harvest on the permit.

New! To notch a permit using the MO Hunting app, simply select the permit you wish to use from the list in the app, and follow the short, easy prompts on the screen.

Once you notch your permit, you may transport your deer or turkey within Missouri.

As long as you stay with your harvested game, you don't need to tag it. But if you leave your deer or turkey, you must attach a tag.

If you have a paper permit, you can simply attach your notched permit to the deer or turkey's leg. We recommend sealing the permit in a zip-top bag and attaching the bag with string, wire, or tape.

New! If you're using the MO Hunting app, you must attach a label with your full name, address, permit number, and date of harvest to the deer or turkey's leg.

You must Telecheck your deer or turkey by 10 p.m. on the day of harvest, before processing your game, or before you leave the state, whichever comes first.

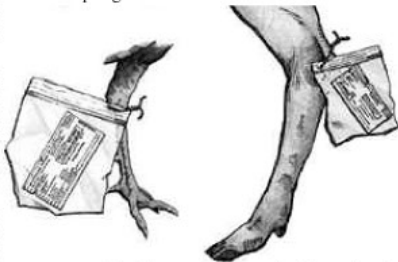
If you're using a paper permit, follow the Telecheck instructions. Write the confirmation number provided by Telecheck on your permit.

New! If you're using the MO Hunting app, select your notched permit from the list on the screen, tap "Telecheck," and follow the prompts. Telecheck will upload a confirmation number directly to your mobile device.

After you've reported to Telecheck, your deer or turkey may be processed, stored, or transported by anyone as long as it is labeled with your full name, address, date taken, and Telecheck confirmation number. You may now transport your deer or turkey out of state.

Things to remember before tagging and checking

If you harvest a deer from the CWD Management Zone during Nov. 11-12, you must take your deer (or the head with at least 6 inches of the neck in place) on the day of harvest to a designated CWD sampling station.



Use the correct permit. Many hunters carry multiple permits while deer and turkey hunting, so check your permit carefully to make sure you're using the right one before notching it.

Notching voids a permit. Do not notch your permit until you harvest a deer or turkey.

Until checked, heads of deer must remain attached, and turkeys must have their heads and plumage intact.

Deer and turkeys must be checked by 10 p.m. on the day they are harvested.

All deer and turkeys must be checked before they can be removed from Missouri. Only the person who harvested the deer or turkey may possess and transport the game before it has been checked.

After checking, deer and turkeys may be possessed and transported by anyone, but must be labeled with the taker's permit or full name, address, date taken, and Telecheck confirmation number.

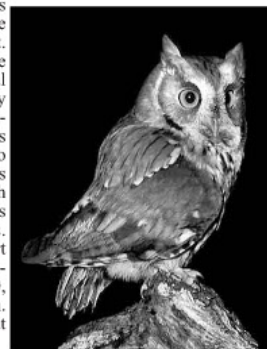
Avoid duplicate Telecheck records. If you are given a Telecheck confirmation number, your checking information has been successfully received and recorded. If you're using a paper permit, write the confirmation number on the permit, and the checking process is complete. Do not try to check the same deer or turkey twice.

MDC Busch Conservation Area Is Hosting Nighttime Hayrides Oct. 27

Discover how intriguing nature can be at a time when most people are heading indoors at the Missouri Department of Conservation's (MDC) August A. Busch Memorial Conservation Area.

MDC naturalists will hold nighttime hayrides Friday, Oct. 27, through the dynamic natural habitats on the nearly 7,000-acre conservation area. Visitors will get a chance to explore the sights and sounds of Busch Conservation Area's nocturnal residents. Rides will depart from the visitor center at 5:45, 6:00, 6:30, and 6:45 p.m. They will last about 45 minutes.



Riders might have the opportunity to see or hear owls, coyotes or deer. There may also be waterfowl inhabiting the area's wetlands. Each ride will be guided by a MDC naturalist who will explain and interpret the sights and sounds along the way.

The hayrides are free, but advanced registration is required by calling 636-441-

4554. Participants are encouraged to dress appropriately for the weather. Accommodations for visitors with disabilities are also available with advanced notice.

The nighttime hayrides are one of the many programs and events offered by MDC throughout the St. Louis area to help people discover nature. 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'Share The Harvest' Feeds Hungry Missourians

Missouri's Share the Harvest program helps deer hunters donate surplus venison to the needy. This program is administered by the Conservation Federation of Missouri and the Missouri Department of Conservation. In 2016, 4,280 hunters donated 198,277 pounds of venison.

DONATING IS EASY

Simply take your deer to an approved meat processor and let the processor know how much venison you wish to donate. The processor will package the meat, which will be picked up by local sponsoring organizations and taken to a charitable agency for distribution.

PROCESSING FUNDS ARE AVAILABLE AT SOME LOCAL PROCESSORS

Get help with processing costs when you donate a whole deer during all portions of the archery and firearms deer seasons. The Conservation Federation of Missouri reimburses processors a pre-determined amount for each whole deer donated. This allows processors to reduce processing fees to hunters. In addition, many processors have local money available that allows deer to be processed for free or at reduced cost. Be sure to contact individual processors to determine if funds are available. The cost of processing the deer is your responsibility when local funds to help cover the full cost are not available.

WHY SHARE THE HARVEST?

The National Institutes of Health state that children need protein in their diets for proper growth and development, and adults need it to maintain good health. Yet many Missourians and their families can't afford or can't get to good sources of protein. Through Share the Harvest, Missouri hunters can help provide those in need with high-quality protein in the form of deer meat, which is naturally lean.

WHO CAN GET THE MEAT?

Any Missourian who needs it. Adults or families can get in touch with a participating distributing agency, and the agency will allocate the venison according to its supply.

HOW DO HUNTERS DONATE VENISON TO THE PROGRAM?

It's easy to donate. Hunters take their deer to an approved processing plant and simply tell the processor how much venison

they wish to donate. The hunter has the option of donating a few pounds or the whole deer. There is no price reduction for partial donations. The processor then packages and stores the meat until it's transported to a distributing agency by the coordinator. Agencies receiving venison will distribute it to ensure that all venison is used and is going to where it serves the greatest need.

HOW CAN MY ORGANIZATION GET INVOLVED?

You can get involved as a member of almost any club or organization that would like to work with the Share the Harvest program. Sponsoring volunteer clubs are vital to this project. They provide promotion and manpower on a local level to a program that addresses the needy in their area. In addition many local groups provide additional funding to augment the moneys paid by the Conservation Federation on the donation of whole deer. Raising local funds greatly increases donations.

HOW TO GET SHARE THE HARVEST STARTED IN YOUR AREA

Clubs or organizations wishing to coordinate the Share the Harvest program in their area may contact a conservation agent in their county or the Conservation Department at the address on the back panel. Agencies that distribute venison also may fulfill the role of coordinator.

Distributing agencies should be nonprofit charitable organizations. They must have proper storage for the meat and agree to distribute uncooked venison directly to families or individuals.

The coordinator should locate a deer processor who agrees to participate in Share the Harvest. Processors also must be a government-inspected facility.

Once agreements are made with coordinator, deer processors and distributing agencies, permission must be obtained from the Conservation Department to conduct a Share the Harvest program.

After the local conservation agent approves the coordinator's choice of meat processors and distributing agencies, the coordinator will receive written authorization and instructions.

"SHARE THE HARVEST" GUIDELINES

Requests to participate in Share the

Harvest should be submitted to the director of the Conservation Department through a local conservation agent. Requests must include names of participating meat processors and the distributing agency.

Meat processors must be licensed by the Conservation Department to process deer and be subject to government health inspection, or be approved by the Missouri Department of Agriculture's Meat Inspection Program.

State and local health regulations must be followed.

A conservation agent must initially approve the coordinator, processors and distributing agency.

Only venison from white-tailed deer legally taken in Missouri will be accepted.

Donated venison must be processed at approved meat processing facilities.

Records detailing number of donors, pounds of donated venison, and charitable recipient group must be kept by the coordinator, and submitted to the local conservation agent no later than Feb. 1.

Donated venison must be stored and transported in department-provided plastic bags that display the Share the Harvest logo, or in approved containers clearly

marked with Share the Harvest labels.

Venison may not be served cooked by the distributing agency, and must be frozen at some time prior to being eaten.

All donated venison must be distributed by May 1.

Approval for participation is required annually.

IF YOU WANT A SUCCESSFUL SHARE THE HARVEST PROGRAM:

Knowledgeable, enthusiastic processors are a vital key to a successful program. Likewise the coordinating organization needs to take an active role in promoting the program. Having volunteers available at deer processing plants during the firearms deer season to personally contact hunters, hand out literature and answer questions about the program will greatly increase donations. However, don't interfere with the meat processor's business.

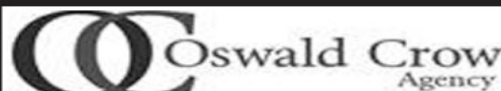
