Eastern Missouri YMCA Breaks Ground For Vandalia Facility To Come Next Year

A ground-breaking ceremony was held Thursday, Nov. 2 at the site of the new Eastern Missouri YMCA which was attended by many community stakeholders, members of the Van-Far and Community R-VI student councils, and other dignitaries includ-ing members of the Rual Morris

Foundation.
The 18,000 square-foot facility is expected to cost about \$1.6 mil-lion and is anticipated to be com-

pleted in eight months. In 2009 the Rual Morris Foundation began looking for a new home for the Vandalia Library. The idea of a YMCA was added shortly thereafter. It was noted at the ceremony that a few good people with huge vision, incredible spirit, courage, and determination has made this endeavor possible.

The Foundation asked Felicity Goodpasture-Culwell to chair the fund-raising efforts to make the

YMCA a reality.
"I'm not sure I knew what I was getting into, but would do it again in a heartbeat," Goodpasture-Culwell stated on Thursday.

The Foundation has pledged a total of \$650,000 for the project. The board presented the first installment on Thursday in the amount of \$25,000. Goodpasture-Culwell pointed out to everyone that it is never too late to donate as well

Audrain County Steve Hobbs said, "We see communities in Audrain County working together to make a better life. It is important to all of us for our health and social life. I can't congratulate you enough for all the years of trying

Bowling Green Board Opts To Demolish Two Delapidated Buildings Near Square

It's taken a couple of months debating the merits of taking down two buildings near the square that are in danger of collapse, but the Bowling Green Board of Aldermen decided to take action at a special meeting

last night (Monday, Nov. 6).

The buildings are located at the corner of Main and Court Streets and at 16 South Court Street. The block of Court Street between Main and Champ Clark Drive had to be closed until a decision was

made to ensure public safety.

Mel Orf, the city's building inspector, noted the problems at the three-story brick building at the corner of Main and Court Streets have been known for some time. He pointed out the build-ing's owner, Gary Rahmeyer, was informed of the structural problems but did not take corrective measures

McClure Engineering recommended the city close the street after going through the property on Sept. 11. While it was deter-mined the buildings didn't appear to be in danger of immediate collapse, it was determined the properties were beyond salvation.

The other two-story property is locally known as the former gas company and is owned by William Butler and Conita Butler.

Every board member in attendance at last night's special meeting agreed they were not happy about the situation, particularly

with the Rahmeyer property.

The city put the demolition of both buildings out for bid recently. They also attempted to work with the Pike County Commission in having all or a portion of the Annex taken down to help with costs. Commissioners decided in a recent 2-1 vote to rehabilitate their property.

draws near, grief can be thick in the air. November is National Hospice and Palliative Care month. Both palliative care and hospice services are an extremely helpful and supportive resource to individuals and their fami-

lies as they face terminal illness.
The staff at Pike County Health Department, Home Health & Hospice are blessed to be a part of that caregiving team and assist in providing comfort and support during such a critical and tender time in one's life. For those of you who may be contemplating hospice services, grieving for changes in your own health, or bereaving a loved one who has died please be mindful that grief IS a soulbased journey, there is NO time table and each of us experience and express grief differently.

According to playwright Robert Frost, "death ends one physical life, it does not end a relationship." Our loved one lives on in us, through us, and within our memories and their legacy. They are never forgotten. Nonetheless, a person's life is forever changed by the death of someone they love. Grief transforms us as one searches for finding meaning in living after a loss.

When facing a loss through death one might ask "how can I help?" First, be mindful of your fears and concerns of saying the wrong thing. Simply, be openly honest and let your loved one know that you are sorry for their loss and are aware they are hurting. Reflect on specific memories of the one who has passed and acknowl-

ence that person had on your life and others. Respect boundaries and allow time to grieve in a way that is necessary for that individual given their grief is within healthy parame-

November Is National Hospice, Palliative Care Month

If concerned about one's grief response, be open to the idea and acknowledge that for some of us addiitional counseling and services may be needed as they journey through their pain and loss. Again, healing takes time and going inward is necessary so expect a variable of emotions. Kebelr Ross indicates 5 stages of grieving a loss: denial and shock, anger, bargaining, depression and sorrow, and acceptance. As one experiences loss they fluctuate through these stages. During this fluctuation, grief comes in waves and at times it comes when we least expect it and can knock us off our feet with the severity of emotion felt. So expect that the waves will hit forcefully but that like waves the emotion shall ease if one just allows themselves permission to experience their feelings and embrace their grief vs suppress or deny their pain. Grief requires depression, irritability, anxiety, tears, and loss of control. Healthy grief also requires gentle time for us to regain our purpose and create new

meaning in our life. How much time one might ask, again grief is a sacred healing journey and there are no defi-nitions on time, we need to honor the process and our needs so healing can continue at its pace.

continue at its pace.

Lastly, send cards, calls, emails, texts to let the bereaved know that you are thinking of them and have not forgotten that they are hurting and adjusting to life without their loved one. Special dates like Birthdays, Anniversaries, and Holidays are often tender times. One can also offer to run an errand, help mow the lawn, or take them to appointments or places. take them to appointments or places of worship or business. Sharing and reminding them you are near and have not forgotten them as they continue their healing journey.

May I close with this sacred wis-m shared by Kahlil Gibran, "The dom shared by Kahlil Gibran, "The essence of grief is a profound loneliness. And we have the opportunity as we encounter those who are grieving to assuage a bit of that loneliness. We CAN'T fix the deep hurt but we can assure them we care and that they are not alone in their journey." Be mindful of that whether you are currently enduring your own journey of grieving or befriending a loved one who is. – Anna Wilson, Hospice Social Worker
