Panel On Centralized 911 Presents Recomendations To County Commission

Commissioners Plan To Hold Town Hall Meeting To Seek Input From Citizens

APRIL M. FRONICK • EDITOR april@thepeoplestribune.com Efforts to consolidate 911 ser-

vices in Pike County took another

step forward last week. The panel working on the matter voted to recommend to county commissioners and residents that a ballot initiative, with an appropriate tax levy, be placed before voters to establish an independent, elected board, separate from the operations of the Sheriff's Office, to oversee all 911 and emergency service dispatching for the county.

The motion was made by Louisiana Mayor Bart Niedner. Eastern District Commissioner Justin Sheppard abstained while

all other members present voted in favor including Larry Beauchamp, Tylie Mills, Don Nacke, Kevin Keely, Mary Millan and Gale Frolos. Sheriff Stephen Korte and Tommy Beauchamp were absent for the meeting on Tuesday, Jan. 23.

Members of the 911 panel shared their recommendations with the county commissioners on Monday, Jan. 29. The commis-sioners indicated they wanted to do further research beyond what the appointed panel has done, par-ticularly the expenses. They also decided to hold a town hall type of meeting to seek public input on the recommendation.

Reminder: Champ Clark Bridge Is Closed **During Daytime Hours For Maintenance**

MoDot reminds motorists that weather permitting, the U.S. Route 54 Champ Clark Bridge in Louisiana will close each day from 9 a.m.-4 p.m., until Friday,

As crews work to construct piers for the new bridge, there have been some "close calls" from debris coming off the existing bridge. "The narrowness of the existing Chapter Ch existing Champ Clark Bridge can cause side mirrors and other debris to be a safety concern for crews below the bridge on the barges" explained Missouri

"We will be installing netting on the outside of the existing bridge to catch any-thing that falls or is thrown out, and this work will require workers to be on the outside of the truss working from a croppe and workworking from a crane, and workers inside the truss working from a man-lift," she further explained.

Red Cross Winter Blood Shortage

Ongoing severe winter weather has more than doubled the number of canceled American Red Cross blood drives and the resulting blood and platelet donation shortfall since earlier this month. The Red Cross now considers the situa-tion critical and is reissuing an urgent call for blood and platelet donors.

More than 550 blood drives have been forced to cancel due to winter weather in January, causing over 16,500 blood and platelet donations to go uncollected through last week. In addition, bitter cold and widespread flu have contributed to very low turnout at many blood drives

"Blood and platelet donations are currently being distributed to hospitals faster than they are com-ing in," said Joe Zyldo of the Missouri Illinois Blood Services Region. "Donors are critically needed to restock the shelves for patients in their community as well as areas where donors are unable to give due to inclement weather."

Every day, no matter the weather, the Red Cross must collect more than 13,000 blood and platelet donations to meet the

needs of patients like Finnegan "Finn" Olson. Last January, Finn was born with a rare heart condition. He required multiple transfu-sions before, during and after heart transplant surgery last summer. Transfusions had an almost immediate effect on his personality and skin's appearance.
"Each time Finn received a

"Each time Finn received a transfusion, you could see him pink up right away and have significantly more energy," said his mother, Ali Olson. "We credit blood donation with making Finn stronger and helping keep him stronger and pelping keep him alive long enough to receive a new heart. Finn is living proof that blood helps save lives."

How to donate blood Simply download the American Red Cross Blood Donor App, visit redcrossblood.org or call 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) to make an appointment or for more information. All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood and platelet donors can save time at their next donation by using RapidPass® to complete pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, before arriving at the blood drive. To get started, follow the instructions at redcrossblood.org/RapidPass or use the Blood Donor App



Parents Offered Free Resources To Ensure Child's Safety

Every day in America, too many children are riding in the wrong car seats or are completely unrestrained. To help combat the issue, Families and Communities Together (F.A.C.T.) announced today a new resource available to assist parents when making decisions about their childrens car F.A.C.T. has created an informational card that interacts It links with your smartphone. directly to Safekids Worldwide and the National Highway Transportation Safety

Administration (NHTSA).
"You use a QR code scanner app and scan the card with your phone," said Tom Dugger, Executive Director. "The scan goes directly to Safekids Ultimate Car Seat Guide and NHTSA's car seat recall list. You can enter the make and model of your seat and check to see if it has been recalled."

According to NHTSA, all too often, parents move their children to the front seat before they

should, which increases the risk of injury and death. The safest place for all kids under 13 is in the back seat of the car. Also, according to NHTSA, about 24 percent of chil-dren ages 4 to 7 (who should be riding in booster seats), were prematurely moved to seat belts, and 9 percent were unrestrained alto-

"It's our mission to keep chil-dren safe," F.A.C.T. stressed. "Get your car seats checked. Make certain they're installed correctly, that your kids are in the right seat and are buckled in the right way. Even if you think your child is safe, check every time, so you can be sure that your child is the safest he or she can be while traveling.

NHTSA recommends keeping children rear-facing as long as possible up to the top height or weight allowed by their particular seats. Once a child outgrows the rear-facing only "infant" car seat, he/she should travel in a rear-facing "convertible" or all-in-one car seat. Once your child outgrows

the rear-facing size limits, he or she is ready to travel in a forwardfacing car seat with a harness and tether. After outgrowing the forward-facing car seats, children should be placed in booster seats should be placed in booster seats until they're the right size to use seat belts safely. Each time you "graduate" your child to the next seat, there's a reduction in the level of protection for your child. Keep your child in each stage for as long as possible.











Korte noted that he was unable to attend the panel meeting last Tuesday but was present for the meeting with commissioners on Monday

He added that it will be impor-tant to move forward slowly to make sure everything is done

"I am exceedingly pleased that the panel was able to speak with a strong, single voice regarding the structural direction we recommended – namely an independent board separate from the Sheriff's office," Niedner remarked. "Many of us recognize that this vote came to the panel a bit soon-er than we would have liked, but

we felt it was necessary to get our growing public conversation on the topic." position out there in response to

Niedner added the panel needs to assemble an accurate determination of costs to attach a responsible funding solution.

The panel has discussed a levy of between a quarter-cent to a half-cent sales tax. Niedner noted the town hall meeting to discuss the process and recommendations will be key in raising awareness

"Our meetings continue to be constructive and candid – not always easy. I am very proud to be serving Pike County with such dedicated panel members. Our citizens have been waiting a very long time to see advancement on important public safety topic

Niedner said that despite some highly charged conversations. panel members have recommitted to working constructively together and staying focused on what's best for Pike County.

"To that end, I fully support the decision to have the costs and a public meeting before the Commissioners take formal public meeting Commissioners action."

The next 911 panel meeting will be held on Feb. 8 at 6 p.m. A town hall meeting has not been set at this time, but may be scheduled at that time
