Webster, who had rented her entire life, called NECAC last year after hearing about agency homeownership programs from a Bowling Green sister, Penny Dixon. Webster looked into the USDA Rural Development 502 Direct Loan Program adminis-tered by NECAC.

"People told me I couldn't own a home because I'm on a fixed income," she recalled. "They said I should just sign up for housing assistan The 502 Program is used by income-qualifying people to buy homes in rural areas. Participants must be able to afford the mortgage payments, including taxes and insurance. Loans are for 33 years, with the interest rate set by the lender. There is no down payment.

As part of the program, NECAC offers homeownership classes that teach participants about housing opportunities and financing, obstacles to homeownership, record-keeping, under-standing credit, cash flow, meeting with financial institutions, getting a loan, taxes and other topics.

John Henderson's Mark On Impeachment Would Resound Today

Editor's note: The following is the first part of a story by Louisiana author Brent Engel about the role of Pike County law-maker John Brooks Henderson in the 1868 impeachment trial of President Andrew Johnson.

As new talk of presidential peachment echoes in impeachment Washington, focus is cast upon a Pike County lawmaker who sat in

judgment of another commander-in-chief 150 years ago. Missouri U.S. Sen. John Brooks Henderson was one of eight Republicans who voted to acquit Democrat Andrew Johnson in 1868.

The decision cost an impervious Henderson politically. But his character outshone the dubious charges, which were questionable at the time and eerily similar to politically-motivated accusations of the abuse of presidential power being floated today.

Even as he was lobbied by Johnson's supporters and detrac-tors on the 11 articles of impeach-Henderson had plenty say about the case, which boiled down to whether the President had the right to oust a cabinet member.

do not say the President is of offense," Henderson said. void of offense. "I have not said even that he ought not to be impeached and removed from office. But I have said, and I now repeat it with emphasis, that in my judgement a cool and delib-erate future will not fail to look with amazement on this extraordinary proceeding as it is now presented to us, and the legal and discriminating minds of the world would visit with deserved condemnation a judgement of conviction on any one of these articles

now pending."
As he did during seven years in office, Henderson turned to the Constitution for guidance. He Johnson the "undoubted power" to fire Secretary of War Edwin Stanton and appoint an interim until the Senate confirmed a replacement.

Henderson said the Founding Fathers "clearly and explicitly conceded this power to the President as a constitutional pre-rogative which could not be con-trolled or limited by law."

Others weren't so sure. As with so many squabbles past and pre-sent, partisan wrangling ignited the Johnson case. Over the President's veto, Congress in March 1867 passed the Tenure of Office Act requiring people confirmed by the Senate to remain in their jobs until successors were approved

On Feb. 21, 1868, Johnson dis-missed Stanton, a holdover from the administration of Republican President Abraham Lincoln. His chosen replacement was career Army officer and Stanton oppo-

nent Maj. Gen. Lorenzo Thomas. Stanton, a Northern native, and the Southern-born Johnson vehemently disagreed on post-Civil War Reconstruction of the former Confederate states. Stanton refused to leave and barricaded himself in his office. He also had Thomas arrested for trying to steal his job.

The Constitution says President and other civil officers can be removed from office by impeachment when convicted of treason, bribery "or other high Crimes and Misdemeanors."

Buffalo Fort Offered Early Settlers An Oasis From Danger

It stood for only a few years, but it provided a safe haven for early settlers.

Work on Fort Buffalo began in December 1811 as tensions with the Sac and Fox tribes rose due to British incitement in the buildup to the War of 1812.

The dimensions aren't record-ed, but the primitive citadel got its name from the immense herds of bison that French explorer Rene-Robert de La Salle found in the area on his journey along the Mississippi River in 1690. Accounts differ as to whether a creek ran through the fort or flowed nearby. A channel may have been dug to bring water from

"Into this fort...more than twenty families were gathered, taking turns guarding and cultivating tarns guarding and curri-vating crops the next year," according to "A History of Northeast Missouri" by Walter

"The crops raised in this way

became common property of all, and though for a while they were permitted to work but little, yet so fruitful was the new cleared soil that no apprehension of famine was ever felt," reported the 1883 book "History of Pike County, Missouri.

Hunting expeditions also proved successful.

"If the earth could be made to yield the bread, the forests could be readily induced to supply the meat," the Pike County book offered. "Deer, turkeys and other game were abundant, and the hunter had little trouble in procur-ing all the necessities his household might demand."

Families listed as using the fort included those of John and Robert Jordan, Samuel, David, James and Watson, McConnell, James Templeton, James Mackey, John Farmer, Thomas Cunningham and Edward

The Summer Food Service

Program reimburses organizations for meals they serve to children who are at risk of not having enough to eat. The program is only one of the ways Missouri is working to fight childhood hunger.
"Preventing food insecurity in chil-

dren is an important step in improving the health of Missourians," said Dr. Randall Williams, DHSS director. "Without the assistance of organizations across the state many of Missouri's children would go hungry during the summer months. Thank you to all organizations who have participated in the past, and thank you to any organization considering participating this summer. DHSS would be happy to answer any questions an organization may have as they con-sider participating in this program."

The summer food program pro-vides nutritious meals to children

under age 18 during the summer months when school breakfast and lunch programs are not operating.

Organizations eligible to partici-

pate in the program include schools, faith-based organizations, camps, pri-vate nonprofit agencies and local gov-ernment entities. The sites are required to be located in areas where at least half of the children are eligible to receive free or the federally funded program is administered by DHSS. The department will accept applica-tions March 1-May 15 to participate in the program. Organizations interested in becoming sponsors are required to attend training.







What may have been the first wedding in Pike County took place in the fort. Again, accounts vary, but Peter Brandon and Mary McConnell likely took their vows in 1812 from either John Jordan or Samuel Watson. The Northeast Missouri book says Brandon was "one of the soldiers" who participated in the war.

Peace ensued until March 30, 1813, when 41-year-old Capt.
Robert Jordan and his 22-year-old
son, James McGee Jordan, were
shot as they returned from working in the fields. Some accounts list the son's age as 17, but cemetery records have him as being born in 1791.

Shortly before her death at age 68 in 1915, Caroline Maria Coulter Jordan described an omi-nous premonition James Jordan

apparently had.

"The morning the boy was killed, he begged his mother to cut his hair short, so if killed by Indians they would not scalp him," she wrote. "They did not, but scalpad his father." but scalped his father."

Two family members heard the

gunfire and found the bodies.
They speculated the British or
French had supplied the guns.
The April 10, 1813, edition of

the Missouri Gazette, one of the region's first newspapers, reported on the murders. It said "there are several small bodies of Indians in that tract of country between the Illinois and Mississippi (rivers) who are constantly watching the settlements and a very numerous collection preparing to burst into that country, and may be expected early next month." The prediction seemingly proved correct.

"The murderous Indians were on the war-path, and the safety of the white man depended alike upon his caution and skill," the Pike County book says. "But the greatest care was sometimes without avail, as the settlers were occasionally waylaid and shot down near their homes and in their

"The people were now thor-oughly alarmed and requested Governor (William) Clark at St. Louis to send soldiers for protec-tion," Williams wrote. Meanwhile, families took

Meanwhile, families took refuge inside the fort.

"Here they were a long time confined and forced to a dreary, monotonous life," the Pike County book noted. "Still they bore their hardships with that hereism characteristic of the early. heroism characteristic of the early settlers, and seldom complained of their hard fate, but each did his or her best to encourage the other. while all found in their confine-

Samuel Watson pleaded with Clark, who just seven years earli-er had returned with Meriwether Lewis and the Corps of Discovery after exploring the Louisiana Territory. Clark turned down the request for staffing the fort, but

Matters were made worse when the wife of James O'Neil and their nine children were killed and scalped near what would become Clarksville. O'Neil survived only because he at the time was attending a meeting about how to best defend settlers' homes.

Fort Buffalo was torn down in 1815, the year the War of 1812 ended. Many of the families that


left for St. Louis returned after the massacres and established the towns of Clarksville and agreed to have troops protect families who would abandon it and
