Elsberry Woman Wins \$200,000 Lotto Jackpot

Playing the various jackpot Draw Games offered by the Missouri Lottery is a favorite pastime for Debra Powell of Elsberry.

When checking her tickets after the Feb. 1 Show Me Cash and Lucky for Life drawings, Powell was excited to learn that her Lucky for Life ticket was worth \$200.

"I kept scanning my Show Me Cash ticket because it kept saying 'Claim At Lottery.' I wasn't sure what that meant," said Powell, referring to the Lottery's Check-A-Ticket self-service machine.

Powell asked the clerk at Buzzy's, 208 N. Lincoln Drive in Troy, for a printout of the numbers drawn in the Feb. 1 Show Me Cash drawing. When she realized she had matched all five numbers drawn, her \$200 Lucky for Life prize quickly became overshadowed by the \$200,000 jackpot.

"Trust me, I'm happy with the \$200, too," laughed Powell.

It's Time To Buy 2018 Hunting, Fishing Permits

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) reminds hunters and anglers that annual hunting and fishing permits expire at the end of February, including 2017 permits for small game, fishing, trout fishing, and combination hunting and fishing.

Annual permits purchased on or after Dec. 1, 2017, are good until the end of February 2019.

Buy Missouri hunting and fishing permits from vendors around the state, online at mdc.mo.gov/buypermits, or through MDC's free mobile apps, MO Hunting and MO Fishing, available for download through Google Play for Android devices or the App Store for Apple devices.

Save time by buying hunting and fishing permits for multiple people in a single transaction. Select the "Additional Customer" option during the permit purchase.

Commercial and lifetime permits can be purchased only through the MDC Permit Services Unit by calling 573-522-0107 for an application.

Wording Selected For John B. Henderson Bust

It was announced recently that local artist John Stoeckley was working on the bronze bust of John Brooks Henderson that will be installed at Henderson Park in Louisiana in time for the Bicentennial celebration this summer.

The bust was unveiled at the Mayor's Ball on Saturday, Feb. 3 along with a rendering of the pillar on which the bust will sit. On the stone pillar will be a plaque containing the following information:

John Brooks Henderson
Nov. 16, 1826 – April 12, 1913

John Brooks Henderson was born in Virginia and moved with his family to Lincoln County Missouri when he was six years old. By age 10, he was an orphan.

Henderson overcame what could have been a life of obscurity to be a Pike County teacher, lawyer and state legislator. He lived and worked in Louisiana, and during the early part of the Civil War served as a brigadier general in Missouri's Union militia.

In 1862, Henderson was appointed a U.S. Senator and within six weeks of arriving in Washington, he began regular meetings with President Abraham Lincoln.

Though a one-time slave owner himself, Henderson in 1864 drafted and introduced the 13th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution outlawing human bondage – the first time the nation's founding document had been altered in 60 years.

Henderson also was a strong campaigner for women's voting rights, supported better relations with Native Americans, fought against federal government corruption and played a role in the temperance movement.

While Henderson was a strict constitutionalist, he embraced changes that would lead to a more equitable nation. The maverick served at various times as a Republican and a Democrat, but upset people of all parties.

MDC, Anglers Prepare For March 1 Trout Opener

As winter winds down, anglers throughout the Show-Me State are beginning to show some signs of trout fever. Symptoms include: tying flies, putting new fishing line on reels, checking waders for holes, and practicing casting. Most anglers who get trout fever get rid of it by doing one thing — visiting one of Missouri's four trout parks to participate in the catch-and-keep trout season.

Thursday, March 1, marks the opening of catch-and-keep trout fishing at Bennett Spring State Park near Lebanon, Montauk State Park near Licking, Roaring River State Park near Cassville, and Maramec Spring Park near St. James. The catch-and-keep season at the trout parks runs through Oct. 31.

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) operates trout hatcheries at all four parks. To help predict angler turnout on opening day, hatchery staff rely on permit records going back more than 80 years. Montauk, Bennett

Spring, and Roaring River hatchery staff expect crowds of about 2,000 anglers at each location and Maramec Spring staff are planning for a crowd of about 1,000. Based on these predictions, hatchery staff will stock three trout per expected angler on opening day for a total of more than 21,000 fish averaging around a foot in length. The hatcheries will also stock a mix of "lunkers" ranging from three to 10 pounds.

"We have plenty of fish for this year's trout season," said MDC Fisheries Division Chief Brian Canaday.

Trout anglers will need a daily trout tag to fish in Missouri's trout parks. Daily trout tags can only be purchased at each of the four trout parks. Missouri residents 16 through 64 and nonresidents 16 and older need a fishing permit in addition to the daily tag.

Buy Missouri fishing permits from numerous vendors around the state, online at

mdc.mo.gov/buypermits, or through MDC's free mobile apps, MO Hunting and MO Fishing, available for download through Google Play for Android devices or the App Store for Apple devices.

Trout hatcheries are just one way that conservation pays in Missouri. MDC stocks more than 800,000 trout annually at the state's four trout parks and approximately 1.5 million annually statewide. Trout anglers spend more than \$100 million each year in the Show-Me-State, which generates more than \$180 million in business activity, supports more than 2,300 jobs and creates more than \$70 million dollars in wages. About 30 percent of Missouri trout anglers come from other states, so a substantial portion of trout fishing expenditures is "new money" for the state's economy.

Starting November 26, 2017 the major United States tobacco companies must run court-ordered newspaper and television advertisements that tell the American public the truth about the deadly consequences of smoking and secondhand smoke, as well as the companies' intentional design of cigarettes to make them more addictive. The ads are called "corrective statements" and they are timely reminders both that tobacco use remains an enormous public health problem in the United States (it is the number one cause of preventable disease and death), and that tobacco's horrific toll stems directly from the harmful practices of the tobacco industry.

Text of Court-Ordered Corrective Statements - United States v. Philip Morris USA Inc.:

A Federal Court has ordered Altria, R.J. Reynolds Tobacco, Lorillard, and Philip Morris USA to make these statements about the health effects of smoking, addictiveness, nicotine, low tar and light cigarettes, nicotine delivery, and secondhand smoke:

Adverse Health Effects of Smoking

Smoking kills, on average, 1,200 Americans every day.

More people die every year from smoking than from murder, AIDS, suicide, drugs, car crashes, and alcohol, combined.

Smoking causes heart disease, emphysema, acute myeloid leukemia, and cancer of the mouth, esophagus, larynx, lung, stomach, kidney, bladder, and pancreas.

beating three pointer.

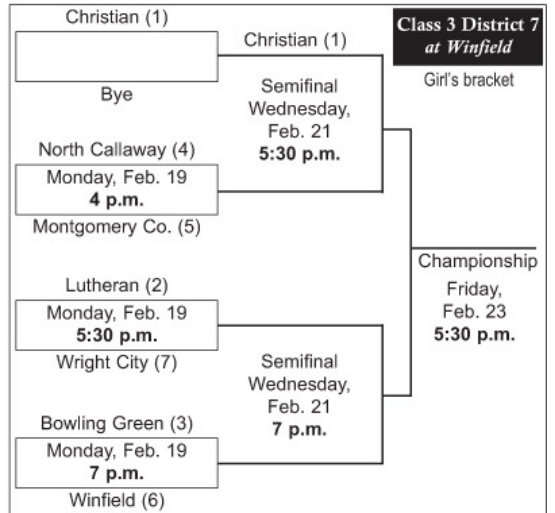
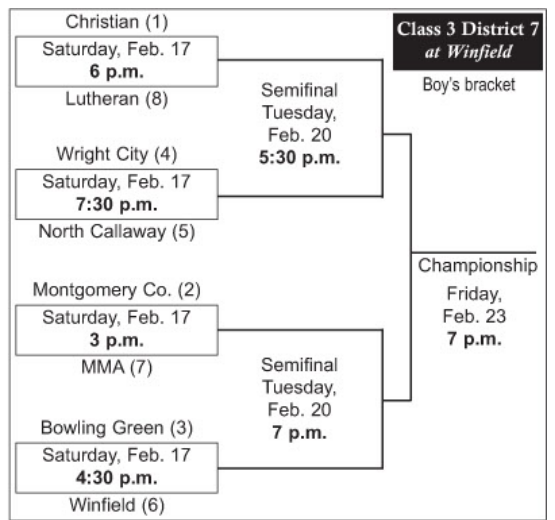
If Bowling Green wins they will compete in the championship on Friday, Feb. 23 at 7 p.m.

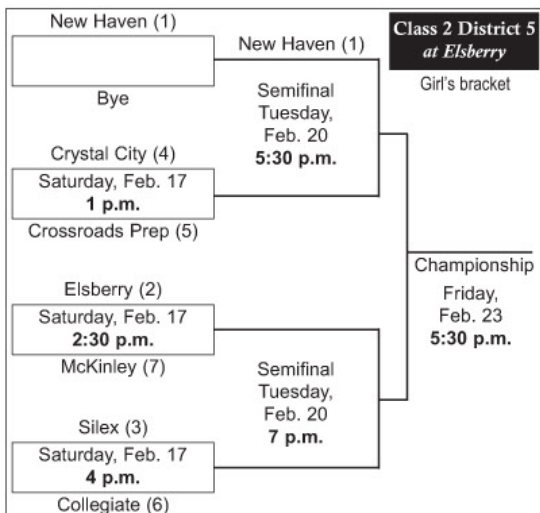
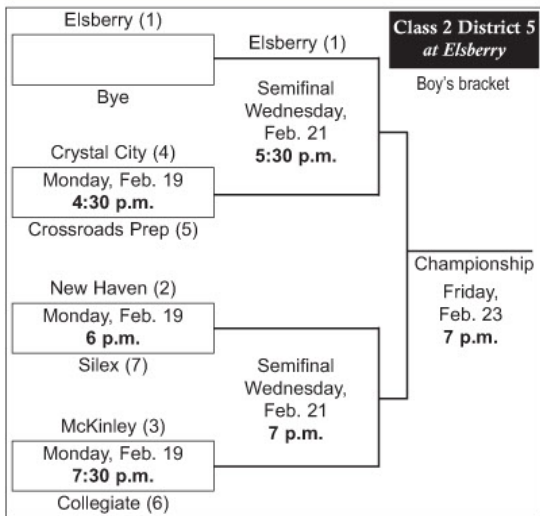

opening round game on Monday, Feb. 19.

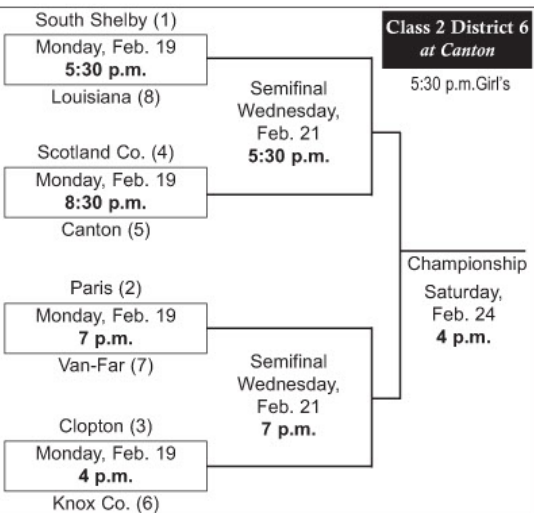
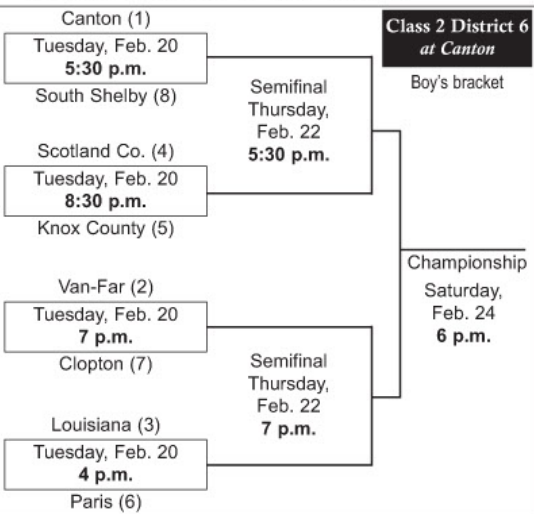

Tuna Casserole

This works great for kids or folks who don't care for peas
 Approximately 1/2 package of medium egg noodles, cooked and drained
 1 can of light tuna in water, well drained
 2 cans of cream of mushroom or cream of celery soup
 1 can of milk
 1 11 oz can of whole kernel corn - OR- 8 oz of frozen corn (doesn't need to be thawed)
 Crushed potato chips
 While the noodles are cooking, crush enough potato chips (plain corn flakes will work in a pinch) to top the casserole. Make sure the chips are coarsely crushed and not crumbs when you are done.
 In a mixing bowl, combine all the ingredients and mix well. You may add a little salt and pepper to your taste, but the canned soup will provide plenty of sodium. Pour mixture into a large baking dish or casserole. Top with a thin layer of potato chips

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so that all the casserole is covered. Bake in a 350 degree oven for 40 to 50 minutes, or until bubbles come through the chips. Serve with rolls/bread and a tossed salad with plenty of cold milk.
 The potato chip topping adds a little zest while keeping the top noodles from drying out and getting hard while baking. Using two cans of soup with one can of milk makes for a nice, creamy texture that is very palatable to children. When it isn't Lent, I also use cream of chicken soup. Actually, I use whatever is in the pantry - if I have one can of mushroom and one of celery or chicken, I use one of each, etc.

“I always told myself that if I ever won the Lottery, I’m getting a new riding lawn mower because mine keeps breaking down,” said Powell.

The \$200,000 jackpot winner used Quick Pick to match all five of her numbers in the Feb. 1 drawing, which were 7, 22, 26, 29 and 30. In fact, Powell was one of two

Lottery players who matched all of their numbers in the drawing, each receiving half of the \$400,000 jackpot. The other winning ticket, sold at Perryville Pit Stop, 312 S. Kingshighway St., in Perryville has not yet been claimed.

Powell is the 497th Missouri Lottery player to win a Show Me Cash jackpot in the 10 years since the Draw Game was first introduced. In 2017 alone, 54 jackpots were won with an average jackpot of more than \$162,000.

What is “the flu?”

Influenza, also known as flu, is a respiratory virus. It is not the nausea, vomiting and diarrhea illness that lasts approximately 24 hours. Influenza can occur throughout the year but is most common during fall and winter seasons. Influenza is worst during December through February and then begins to wane. There are two types of influenza, A and B. Both produce similar symptoms. Each year, the Center for Disease Control (CDC) collects, tracks and analyzes

influenza data based on the previous year. The CDC uses that data to develop a vaccine for the next year. It is difficult to determine the effectiveness of vaccine because viruses can mutate, or change making the vaccine ineffective.

Symptoms of influenza include fever, chills, body aches, increased fatigue, cough, headache, sore throat and head congestion. Symptoms start abruptly, can be mild to severe and can lead to death. Influenza is spread through droplets in the air. Once those droplets make it into a person's body, it can take one to four days for symptoms to start. Unfortunately, patients with influenza can spread the virus to others one day prior to starting symptoms and up to a week after experiencing symptoms. Everyone is at risk for getting influenza. Young children, older adults and those with chronic conditions have an increased risk of developing influenza.

If you have influenza symptoms, it is best to be seen by a medical provider. A nasal swab collects a sample and then tests for influenza A and B. The medical provider also uses signs and symptoms in addition to the rapid flu test to diagnose influenza. Treatment for influenza may include an anti-viral medication called Tamiflu and is most effective when started within two days of getting ill. Tamiflu helps reduce the length of illness by one or two days. Complete the medication as prescribed by the medical provider. Other ways to recover from influenza are rest, increase fluid intake, acetaminophen or ibuprofen and over-the-counter products to relieve symptoms.

Prevention is key to keep influenza from spreading. Get the influenza vaccine annually. Stay home from work, school, or going out to the store if you are sick. Wear a mask if you must go out to limit exposure to others. The recommendation is to be fever free for 24 hours without using medication to control temperature before returning to work or school. Influenza is spread by coughing, sneezing or talking. Cover your mouth and nose when you cough or sneeze. Wash your hands frequently with soap and water. Use paper towels to dry hands, turn off the faucet or touch the door handle. Hand sanitizer may be used if soap and water are not available. Disinfectant should be used to wipe down surfaces that may be contaminated with germs.
