Pam Meier, administrator of Moore-Pike Nursing Home in Bowling Green issued a statement on Monday regarding rumors about the facility and its potential

"The State of Missouri cut all Missouri nursing home Medicaid rates by \$5.37 per person, per day last year. Our census has been low the last four years due to residents staying home longer with personal care givers, hospital's swing bed programs, other new type facilities being constructed, etc., she explained in the statement.

MoDOT To Close MO 79 **For Bridge**

Weather permitting, Missouri Department Transportation's contractor, Bleigh Construction, will close Missouri Route 79 mid-morning Monday, April 9, to begin demolition of the Ramsey and Fox Creek bridges and construction of new bridges. The cost of both bridge replacements is more than \$1.7 million, and the road is expected to reopen mid July.

Ramsey Creek is located about 2.5 miles north of Annada, Fox Creek is located two miles south of Clarksville. Residents in the area between those two bridges have been informed of plans to close both bridges at the same Message boards will alert MO 79 travelers of the upcoming

Vandalia Police Department Conducts Compliance Checks

On Friday, April 6 the Vandalia Police Department conducted alcohol sale compliance checks at local establishments. During this operation, three establishments were found to be non-compliant and sold intoxicating liquor to a minor. Non-Compliant establishments were identified as Goodfella's Bar & Grill, County Market and Pick-A-Dilly #704.

Compliant establishments who did not sale intoxicating liquor to a minor were identified as Abels Quik Shop #13 and Spare Time Bowl & Grill.

As a result of the compliance checks, officers issued Lori L. Cook, 35 of Vandalia, Kaylee L. Holmes, 23 of Vandalia and Walter W. Salmon Jr, 18 of Vandalia, summons's for supplying intoxicating liquor to a minor. All were given a date to appear in Vandalia Municipal Court. Additionally, the State of Missouri Department of Public Safety's Division of Alcohol and Tobacco Control will receive a report of the establishments who were non-complaint for their review and action. The Division of Alcohol & Tobacco Control has the ability to issue written warnings, levy fines against non-complainant estab-lishments and suspend or revoke establishments state liquor license if an incident is warranted.

"During the course of this operation, Officers adhered to strict guidelines put forth by the Missouri Division of Alcohol &

Tobacco Control regarding standards for the use of minors in intoxicating liquor investigations" said Chief of Police Christopher Hammann. Within those guide-lines include the following conditions; the minor must either be 18 or 19 years of age. The minor shall have a youthful appearance and the minor, if a male, shall not have facial hair or a receding hairline; if a female, the minor shall not wear excessive makeup or excessive jewelry. The minor, male or female, shall not wear headgear that will obstruct a clear view of the face or hairline. Additionally, the minor shall carry his or her own identification showing the minor's correct date of birth and shall, upon request, produce such identification to the seller of the intoxicating liquor or nonintoxi-cating beer at the licensed establishment The minor shall also answer truthfully any questions about his or her age and shall not remain silent when asked questions regarding his or her age, nor misrepresent anything in order to induce a sale of intoxicating liquor

or nonintoxicating beer.
"In two instances where our minor was able to purchase alcohol, the employee of the establish-ment did not ask for any identification. In the other instance, an employee did ask for identification, was provided the minors identification and after review still sold intoxicating liquor to the minor" said Chief Hammann.

There were many reasons why the police department decided to do alcohol compliance checks. One of which involved a follow up of an incident which occurred on July 1st, 2017 when one of our officers was involved in a highspeed pursuit with an intoxicated subject who fled south of town. During the pursuit, the subject had a traffic accident and a passenger in the vehicle was injured. Following an investigation, we learned the driver, who was a minor, had been able to purchase intoxicating liquor from one of our local establishments prior to the pursuit" said Hammann. "We also do these compliance checks also to reduce the likelihood of illegal alcohol sales to minors in the future". Chief Hammann stated he would like to see the police department make alcohol and or tobacco sale compliance checks at local establishments an annual or semi-annual occurrence depending on the department's resources and its ability to obtain the services of volunteer minors for use in the future.

"We basically just want to keep everyone on their toes and stress the importance of remaining vigilant" said Hammann, "whether you're an owner, manager, cashier, bartender etc, selling or allowing the sale of intoxicating liquor to a minor out of a local business is illegal and it's some-thing the Vandalia Police Department will always address"

Help Bash Trash During MDC. MoDOT Annual Trash Bash

The Missouri Department of Conservation and Department Missouri Transportation (MoDOT) encourage people throughout Missouri to help "bash trash" during their 16th annual No MOre Trash! Bash April 15-May 15.

The event focuses on "spring cleaning" the outdoors by asking people to pick up litter across Missouri from roadsides, parks, neighborhoods, rivers, streams, trails, and other places. Trash Bash activities also include various educational efforts in schools, community events, and Earth Day celebrations around the state.

"Littering harms the environment and pollutes our waterways said MoDOT No MOre Trash! Coordinator Stacy Armstrong. "Please consider the impact you can make on the environment by recycling, reusing, and disposing

of waste properly."

Fach vear, MoDOT spends Each year, MoDOT spends about \$6.75 million to remove litter from more than 385,000 acres of roadsides along 34,000 state highway miles. Annual volunteer efforts to pick up litter along Missouri highways are valued at more than \$1 million.

Littering also hurts wildlife and Missouri outdoors.

"Many animals mistake litter for food and become sick and die when they try to ingest it," said

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) reports 33 news cases of chronic wasting disease (CWD) have been found following the testing of 24,486 free-ranging Missouri deer through its 2017-18 sampling and testing efforts.

be very useful in finding cases of CWD and in reducing the spread of the disease by removing additional CWD-infected animals," explained Batten. "We found about half of the new CWD cases this year through targeted culling. Without targeted culling, those 16 infected deer would have continued to spread the disease.

She added that targeted culling is the only tested method of slow ing the growth of CWD in a local

deer population.
"The state of Illinois has been successful in stabilizing levels of CWD through the use of a sustained targeted culling program over many years," Batten said. "In contrast, states such as Wisconsin that have not used targeted culling, or that have only implemented tar-geted culling for a short period of time, have seen levels of CWD climb steadily."

Of the more than 101,000 deer MDC has tested for CWD since 2001, about 4,500 have been harvested through targeted culling, including 1,485 from the past sea-

"This accounts for about 4 percent of all CWD samples collected so far, but has resulted in finding about 49 percent of CWD cases in Missouri," Batten explained.



Meetings have been held with staff and [to] alert residents," Meier continued. "We have an interested buyer, but no contract has been written or signed. More information will follow when available."

She concluded the statement by noting no other comments would be made about the situation at this time.

Use Of Synthetic Cannabinoids Linked To Severe Bledding In The U.S.

The Centers of Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) issued a Clinician Outreach message to thealth care providers related to the use of synthetic cannabinoids with street names such as synthetic marijuana, fake weed, K2 and spice. According to the message, 94 people in five states who used synthetic cannabinoids have been treated since March 10, 2018, for bleeding due to coagulopathy, a blood clotting disorder. The number of cases reported in the message include: 89 in Illinois, two in Indiana, one in Maryland, one in Missouri and one in Wisconsin. There were two fatalities in Illinois.

Laboratory testing confirmed that at least 18 individuals had been exposed to brodifacoum, a highly lethal vitamin K antagonist anticoagulant. It is used in commercial products for killing rodents and other pests. Some synthetic cannabinoid product samples related to the outbreak also tested positive for brodifacoum. Public health investigation indicates that synthetic cannabinoids were likely contaminated with brodifacoum.

Synthetic cannabinoids are classified as a controlled substance and their possession can lead to misdemeanor or felony charges depending on the amount possessed.

The Missouri Department of

Health and Senior Services (DHSS) is asking healthcare providers to maintain a high index of suspicion for vitamin K—dependent antagonist coagulopathy in patients presenting with clinical signs of coagulopathy, bleeding unrelated to an injury, or bleeding without another explanation and with a possible history of use of synthetic cannabinoids.

MDC Encourages People To Help Hummingh

Conservation (MDC) encourages people to discover nature this spring by learning about the rubythroated hummingbird.

Missourians will begin seeing these birds this month as the tiny long-distance fliers return to the state as part of their spring migra-

"Hummingbirds will be arriv-ing soon and a few have already been spotted Missouri," sai been spotted in southern Missouri," said MDC State Ornithologist Sarah Kendrick. "It's time to put out feeders! Their numbers will increase throughout

the month of April."

Hummingbird feeder sugar
water does not need to be colored red, added Kendrick. The birds will find it and drink it without coloring.

She noted hummingbirds.net/ map.html is a fun and useful website to see when and where hummingbirds are migrating. The migration map shows locations where the birds have already been spotted this year as they migrate northward into the U.S. and Canada. The website also allows visitors to help out by submitting dates and exact locations of hum-mingbird sightings. Other online resources, such as eBird.org, also use birder-submitted information to track bird sightings as they move northward. Like about 80 other bird

species that breed in Missouri, hummingbirds typically migrate south in early fall and migrate back north in the spring. "Hummingbirds ar

arrive Missouri in April and May to nest and raise their young. They then make their fall southward migration in mid-August with most leaving by early October," leaving by early October,' Kendrick said. "A few birds overwinter in extreme southern coastal states, but most overwinter from southern Mexico to Costa Rica These tiny birds are so amazing! During migration, they fly non-stop for 600 miles from the Gulf

The Missouri Department of Coast of the U.S. to the Yucatan Peninsula over the Gulf of Mexico and then back on their return trips. They can lose half their body weight during this 24-hour flight."

Early spring arrivals rely on sap oozing from sapsucker-drilled holes and insects for food. With warmer weather, they soon switch to eating nectar from many differ-ent kinds of flowers later in spring. This gives them energy needed to catch insects all day long to feed their young.

Hummingbirds are more than just a delight to watch zipping around at your feeder, they also play very important roles in our ecosystem.

ecosystem.

"Hummingbirds are important pollinators for many plants that require a long-billed pollinator," Kendrick said. "And because of their small size, hummingbirds can end up as food for predators, such as large insects, spiders, other birds, and frogs."

She added, "Another great way to help hummers and other migratory birds is to grow native plants.



Hummingbirds are found across Missouri throughout the summer and can be seen around nectar feeders outside homes and in parks and gardens. Hummingbirds nest in wooded areas on small tree branches 10-20 feet up, and are frequently observed near forests and streams. 



Young Turkey Hunters Harvest 1,732 Birds

According to preliminary data from Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC), young turkey hunters harvested 1,723 turkeys during the 2018 spring youth season, April 7-8. Top harvest counties were Franklin with 51 turkeys harvested, Miller with 43, and Maries with 43.

Young hunters checked a little over

4,000 turkeys during last year's youth weekend.

MDC's Turkey Biologist, Jason lsabelle, says the drop in harvest can be attributed mostly to unseasonably cold temperatures this weekend and for much of spring thus far.

season harvest," Isabelle said.
"Temperatures that were well-below average probably made it difficult for young hunters to spend as much time hunting this past weekend as they would have with more seasonal temperatures."

Isabelle also notes that in addition to cold temperatures this weekend, spring has been slow to get here this year causing turkeys to be a little behind schedule as far as the winter flock break-up.

"When turkeys are still flocked up as they are in much of the state right now, it can make for some very challenging hunting," he said. "With warmer temperatures in the forecast, hunting conditions should be much more favorable

for the upcoming regular spring turkey season."
