Bridge Took Major Effort And Sacrifice

Editor's note: Louisiana celebrates its bicentennial in 2018. Following is the fifth in a series of monthly articles by Louisiana author Brent Engel that will examine 200 years of local history. It is the first of three parts.

As with so many American dreams, it was a big one.

Construction of a Mississippi River bridge at Louisiana and an accompanying highway would link the Midwest with the coasts.

Backers understood the project

would be a defining milestone for a community that had relied since its founding in 1818 mostly upon barges and railroads for major transportation needs.

As a new era dawned, the

Hendersons Deeded Park To City In 1903

The bluff top Louisiana park where a bust of 13th Amendment author John Brooks Henderson will be placed was given to the city 115 years ago.

Henderson and his wife, Mary

Footo Henderson, executed the deed in Washington, D.C., on May 2, 1903.

The couple was very specific that the tract be "a public park" and be "used and enjoyed solely

as such by the inhabitants (of Louisiana) and by those who may visit or be therein."

The Hendersons gave the city six years for the tract to be "well

From the Mayor's Desk...

What would you include if you were asked to create a list of reasons to live in a small town?

Would your list be comparable to the one you make for reasons to live in Clarksville?

Visitors to Clarksville often share their desire to live in a town of this size and identify numerous positive reasons why this town is attractive to them. It is truly amazing what guests see that those who live here simply take for granted.

Caring for what makes the town attractive is of major importance for the future. That includes taking care of each other, of property, of Events & Celebrations, of Ordinances created for the good of all, and of sharing the joy of living in this part of the world.

This week, two near mishaps/accidents inside city limits were brought to attention. One occurred on Howard in front of city hall when a car traveling the wrong way nearly missed hitting a person crossing to access a business on the other side of the street. With cars parked on each side of Howard, there is not room

for traffic in both directions (cars or particularly delivery trucks). Thus the reason for

Howard becoming a one way street. This designation applies to EVERYONE, including those who have long lived in Clarksville, those who see no reason to abide by the rule when the street is empty at that time, or when it seems unnecessary to drive around the block.

The second occurrence was on Lewis Street (another one-way street). In this case a car traveling East toward the River at a fast rate of speed nearly missed a crash (no room on either side of the narrow road except deep ditches). The frightening experience involved a resident traveling the wrong way and a guest moving West as the signs direct.

In both instances, a possible major accident was avoided. However, the opportunity for tragedy existed because persons failed to adhere to a simple rule designed in the best interest of all. Please be alert & attentive to rules of the municipality designed for you.

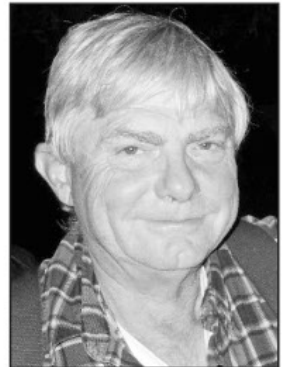
In 2001, Linda and her husband moved to New London to be near her sister-in-law, Mrs. Ray Thelma Gibbs.

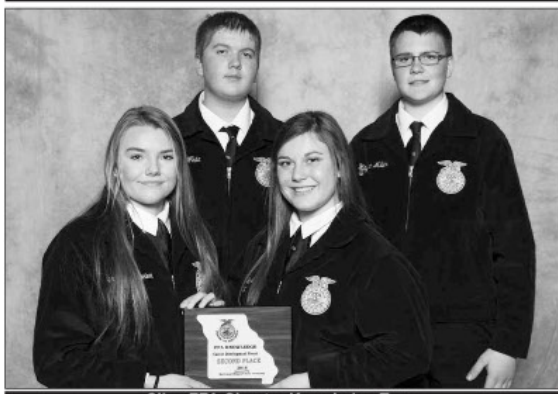

nation's love affair with automobiles created demand for new infrastructure. But by the quarter-century mark, there were still no designated highway bridges between St. Louis and Keokuk, Iowa.

Quincy would not begin construction of Memorial Bridge until 1928. Vehicles could cross at Hannibal, but only on the Wabash railroad bridge – an impractical method that wouldn't be abandoned until Mark Twain Memorial Bridge opened in 1936.

So, Louisiana caught the eye of people from around the country as it stood at the forefront of high-tech advancement during a decade in which nothing seemed impossible, and just about everyone recognized it.

"No event in the history of Pike Co. since its founding means more to the county and that section of the state than the erection of this bridge," Congressman Clarence Cannon of Elsberry declared in a letter dated April 23, 1926. "It makes Pike County one of the high points in...one of the great trans-continental highways of the nation."

"It behooves Louisiana people to boost the promoters and help make this great 'bridge dream' come true," the Louisiana Press-Journal urged. "Other cities no larger than Louisiana have built bridges and we will venture the assertion that no town was ever more favorably situated than is Louisiana."

When the first cars rolled across the completed structure on Saturday, May 12, 1928 – 90 years ago – none of the drivers were probably thinking about the tremendous effort that had led to the moment.

A VISION IS BORN

Railroad trestles that could be used by horse-drawn carriages and early motorized vehicles had been in place at Louisiana since 1873. But the quest to traverse the river by highway had gone nowhere in the half-century that followed.

Louisiana businessman Lloyd Crow Stark complained in 1923 that bridge discussions had been "all talk." Of course, as top execu-

tive of the family nursery founded in 1816, he had the power to act.

Stark would quickly become the project's leading cheerleader, and the man who more than just about any other broke down invisible walls of separation between Pike County communities and two states.

Stark knew that before a bridge could be built, it had to be funded. And before that could happen, the project had to have widespread support.

The vision began to take shape in December 1925, when Stark and others formed the Pike County Chamber of Commerce. The first meeting was held in Clarksville, with later get-togethers in other communities. The Louisiana Press-Journal hailed the first event as a "wonderful representative gathering of citizens of Imperial Pike County."

Stark made it his mission to convince everyone on both sides of the river to support the effort. State officials from Missouri and Illinois jumped on the bandwagon, promising to upgrade highways if Louisiana built its bridge.

Stark's campaign also worked outside of Jefferson City and Springfield. In early January 1926, the topic at a meeting of the Louisiana Rotary Club was listed simply as "roads." A few days later, the Chamber of Commerce heard the same message.

"It is no longer a dream to see a paved ocean to ocean highway through the city of Louisiana," the Press-Journal reported. "It is well along on the way of being an accomplished fact."

Stark also was president of the Louisiana Chamber, and used his speech at the group's annual meeting in February 1926 to hammer home the message of regional unity.

"We have been living in a half-circle," he noted. "We want to expand and spread out until we are living in a whole circle."

The timing was perfect because progress seemed to be taking shape everywhere.

Louisiana was planning construction of a hospital and would soon finish paving all of its streets. A \$25,000 contract had just been awarded to build a Champ Clark statue in Bowling Green. Pike County Commissioners voted to end toll roads.

In March 1926, the U.S. House

of Representatives approved a bill by Cannon to authorize construction of a five-span truss. It quickly passed the Senate and was signed by President Calvin Coolidge.

Back in Louisiana, two cigars cost 15 cents, ladies' high heels were on sale for \$6.50 and the silent films "Excuse Me" and "Heart of a Siren" were playing at the Star Theater.

At a regional conference in May 1926, delegates from Illinois and Missouri were impressed that Louisiana was moving forward.

That same month, Stark thanked Cannon in a letter in which he called the legislator a "man who goes out and 'gets the bacon' and doesn't play the old game of passing the buck."

FORESIGHT IS KEY

As to be expected from such a successful businessman, Stark was meticulous and astute.

He and other bridge enthusiasts did their homework, consulting with some of America's best authorities on finance, engineering, design and traffic flow.

In an era when the first interstate states were still almost two decades away, the Press-Journal played up that the "shortest route from New York to San Francisco passed through Louisiana."

On June 7, 1926, backers met with bankers in St. Louis to work out a funding plan to cover the estimated \$1 million cost. At the time, Missouri and Illinois financed highways, but many bridges were paid for privately.

The meeting went well and it was agreed that construction would be covered by bond sales, with tolls from motorists used to pay off the debt.

Later that month, soundings were done to find the best places for bridge supports. At least one homeowner would be displaced. George Penrod's riverfront cabin was in the path of what would be the first pier.

The Missouri-Illinois Bridge Company was formed to oversee contractors, with Stark as the president and La Crosse Lumber executive Charles Gustavus Buffum as vice president.

It took just five days for Pike County to raise its \$125,000 share for the bond campaign – almost \$1.7 million today.

"Once a county divided against itself, Pike county (sic) can now

point to many things it has been able to accomplish by uniting," the Press-Journal wrote in August 1926.

Preparations got going in early September and lower-than-expected bids were opened Oct. 5.

Design was handled by Harrington, Howard & Ash of Kansas City. The substructure work went to Missouri Valley Bridge & Iron of Leavenworth, Kan. The superstructure would be handled by Wisconsin Bridge & Iron of Milwaukee, and E.C. Johnson of Carrolton, Mo., would oversee grading and paving. They wasted little time, with work starting full speed in late October.

In November – the same month as dedication of the Champ Clark statue in Bowling Green – word came that the highway crossing

the bridge would be named U.S. 54. The announcement featured a map that highlighted U.S. 54, called the "Lindbergh Way" in honor of famed aviator Charles Lindbergh.

"This map also shows that the Louisiana Bridge route is the most direct route between Kansas City and Chicago and points beyond both places," the Press-Journal said.

The newspaper couldn't help but note that 1926 had been a very good year. "What city the size of Louisiana can boast a grander record of achievement within a period of a simple year than this?" it said on Dec. 14.

Unfortunately, tragedy would strike in 1927.

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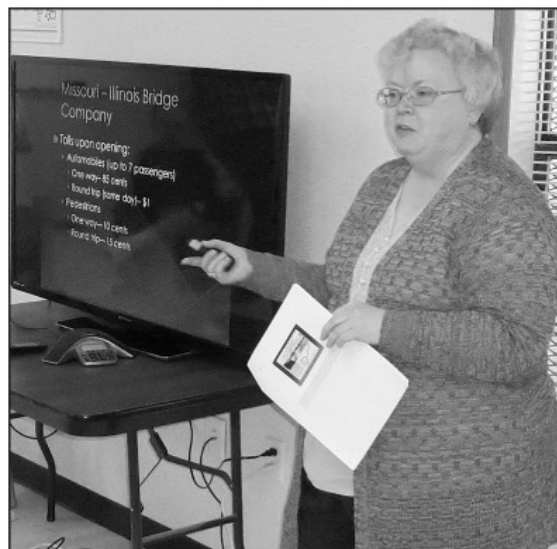
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Champ Clark Bridge History

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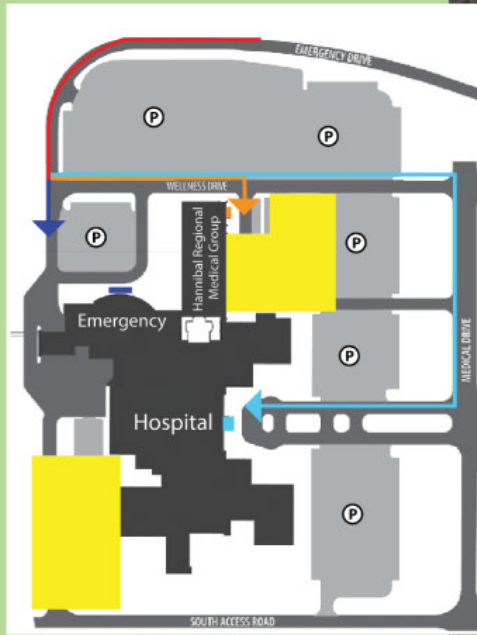
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ALTERNATE ENTRANCES DURING ROUNDABOUT CONSTRUCTION

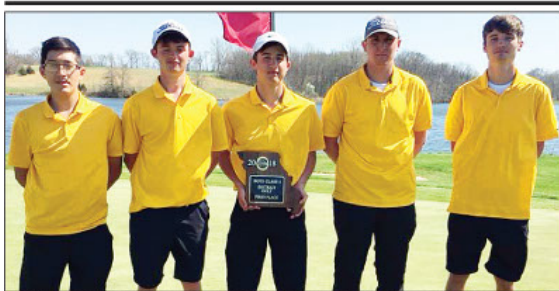
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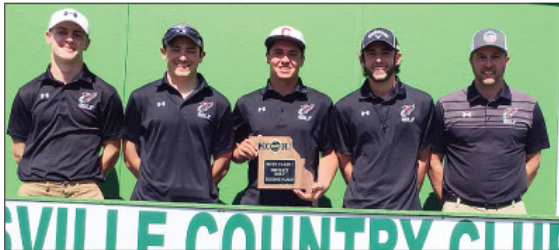

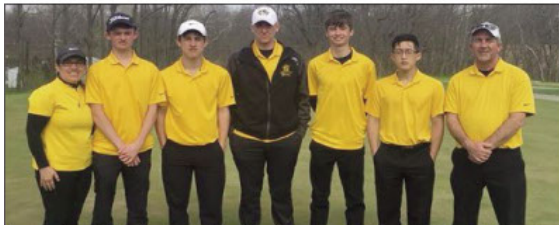
EMO Conference Golf was held Monday, April 23 at Norwoods Golf Course near Hannibal.

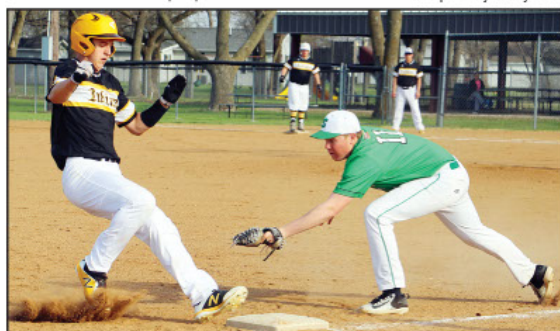

Civil War. Of the 59 Civil War veterans, 12 have been identified as Confederate and 47 as Union.

(Note: There are likely many more Confederate veterans in Greenwood that have not been identified. In 1890 the United States conducted a Census of "Surviving Soldiers, Sailors and Marines and Widows" in Clarksville to substantiate veteran benefits. The Confederates were on the losing side and were not entitled to benefits. Thus, identifying Union veterans in Greenwood is somewhat easier.)

Of the 47 Union veterans, 12 have been identified as having

served in the United States Colored Troop.

From Wikipedia.org:

"The United States War Department issued General Order Number 143 on May 22, 1863, establishing the Bureau of Colored Troops to facilitate the recruitment of African-American soldiers to fight for the Union Army. Other people of color who were not of African descent, such as Native Americans, Pacific Islanders, and Asian Americans also fought under USCT regiments. Regiments, including infantry, cavalry, engineers, light artillery, and heavy artillery units, were recruited from all states of the Union and became known as the United States Colored Troops (USCT)."

Approximately 175 regiments comprising more than 178,000 free blacks and freedmen served during the last two years of the war. Their service bolstered the Union war effort at a critical time. By war's end, the men of the USCT made up nearly one-tenth of all Union troops. The USCT suffered 2,751 combat casualties during the war, and 68,178 losses from all causes. Disease caused the most fatalities for all troops, both black and white."

Check for an entry under the "Flowers" that would indicate a recognized veteran. Our process of identifying veterans is fairly slow since there is not a complete database of veterans available for Pike County or Statewide or Nationally. This is especially true for those veterans that served in the early years. Our work is done by reviewing cemetery records and searching any available information we can find. Contact with descendants is also done when possible.

We appreciate receiving any information that will help document our Greenwood Cemetery veterans.

and sufficiently improved" or they would take it back.

They also said the land "shall not be appropriated to or used for any other purpose or purposes than those herein specified" and that if the city tried to sell or give the plot away, the couple would retain ownership.

"And any permission given, granted or allowed by the said City that the said lands be used by others contrary to the spirit and intent of this deed shall in like manner render this conveyance void and cause the lands conveyed to revert to said grantor, their heirs and assignees forever," the deed concluded.

On June 5, 1903, the Louisiana City Council passed Ordinance No. 1732 "accepting a gift of land from General John B. Henderson for park and providing for (its) improvement and maintenance.

The ordinance appointed E.E. Campbell, C.G. Buffum and R.H. Good to two-year terms as park commissioners.

Henderson Riverview Park on Main between Noyes and Jackson streets, offers stunning views that on a clear day can stretch to 20 miles or more.

Work is progressing nicely on the Henderson bust, which will be formally dedicated during the Louisiana Bicentennial Celebration. Hand work on a wax replica that's being used to make the final plaster mold has been completed and blemishes in the

wax have been repaired.

"Everything looks to be going well," said John Stoeckley, the Louisiana artist who designed the sculpture. "It just takes a lot of time at each important step of the way."

A plaster cast will now be made in Kansas. The replica will be dipped repeatedly in wet plaster until a thicker, harder plaster mold is formed around the wax.

The plaster mold will then be heated so that the wax melts out of the mold. "At that time, we will be ready to melt bronze and pour it into the mold," Stoeckley said.

The Louisiana Bicentennial Committee is highlighting Henderson's accomplishments as part of the 200th anniversary June 30 to July 4. The bust dedication is scheduled for 3 p.m. Saturday, June 30, at Louisiana High School.

Henderson was a native of Virginia who moved with his family to Missouri when he was six years old. By age 10, he was an orphan and his brother and two sisters were split up.

Henderson became a teacher and then a lawyer before being elected to the state legislature. He served as brigadier general in the Union Army at the outbreak of the Civil War.

In 1862, Henderson was appointed a U.S. Senator and within six weeks of arriving in

VonVain Indicted By Federal Grand Jury

On Wednesday, April 11 a federal grand jury for eastern Missouri, indicted James M. VonVain Jr., 46, for intentionally distributing heroin on or about Nov. 12, 2015 in the County of Pike, to Del Shane McLaughlin, the use of such heroin caused the death of McLaughlin.

VonVain made his initial appearance Wednesday, April 25, 2018 before United States Magistrate, Judge David Noco.

At the time of the indictment VonVain was incarcerated in the Missouri Department of Corrections for possession of controlled substance.

All persons charged with a crime are presumed innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

Washington, he began regular meetings with President Abraham Lincoln.

Though a one-time slave owner himself, Henderson in 1864 drafted and introduced the 13th Amendment outlawing human bondage – the first time the Constitution had been altered in 60 years.

Henderson also was a strong campaigner for women's voting rights, supported better relations with Native Americans, fought against federal government corruption, was one of only seven Republicans who voted to acquit Democrat President Andrew Johnson of impeachment charges, and played a role in the temperance movement.

Talk With Your Teen About E-cigarettes: Tips For Parents

Before the talk know the facts. Get credible information about e-cigarettes and young people at E-cigarettes.SurgeonGeneral.gov.

Be patient and ready to listen. Avoid criticism and encourage open dialogue.

Remember, your goal is to have a conversation, not to deliver a lecture.

It's okay for your conversation to take place over time, in bits and pieces.

Set a positive example by being tobacco-free. If you use tobacco, it's never too late to quit. For free help visit smokefree.gov or call 1-800-QUIT-NOW.

Start the conversation – find the right moment:

A more natural discussion will increase the likelihood that your teen will listen. Rather than saying "we need to talk," you might ask your teen what he or she thinks about a situation you witness together, such as:

1. Seeing someone use an e-cigarette in person or in a video.
2. Passing an e-cigarette shop when you are walking or driving.
3. Seeing an e-cigarette advertisement in a store or magazine or on the internet.

Ask for support:

Not sure where to begin? Ask your health care provider to talk to your teen about the risks of e-cigarettes.

You might also suggest that your teen talk with other trusted adults, such as relatives, teachers, faith leaders, coaches, or counselors whom you know are aware of the risks of e-cigarettes.

These supportive adults can help reinforce your message as a

parent.

Answer their questions – here are some questions and comments you might get from your teen about e-cigarettes and some ideas about how you can answer them.

Why don't you want me to use e-cigarettes?

Science shows that e-cigarettes contain ingredients that are addictive and could harm different parts of your body.

Right now your brain is still developing, which means you are more vulnerable to addiction. Many e-cigarettes contain nicotine, and using nicotine can change your brain to make you crave more nicotine. It can also affect your memory and concentration. I don't want that for you!

E-cigarettes contain chemicals that are harmful. When people use e-cigarettes they breathe in tiny particles that can harm their lungs.

The cloud that people exhale from e-cigarettes can expose you to chemicals that are not safe to breathe.

What's the big deal about nicotine?

Your brain is still developing until about age 25. The Surgeon General reported that nicotine is addictive and can harm your brain development.

Using nicotine at your age may make it harder for you to concentrate, learn, or control your impulses.

Nicotine can even train your brain to be more easily addicted to other drugs like meth and cocaine.

I don't say this to scare you, but I want you to have the facts because nothing is more important to me than your health and safety.

Aren't e-cigarettes safer than conventional cigarettes?

Because your brain is still

developing, scientific studies show that it isn't safe for you to use any tobacco product that contains nicotine, including e-cigarettes.

Whether you get nicotine from an e-cigarette or a cigarette, it's still risky.

Some e-cigarette batteries have even exploded and hurt people.

I thought e-cigarettes didn't have nicotine, just water and flavoring?

I used to think that too. But many e-cigarettes have nicotine. There are also other chemicals in them that can be harmful.

Let's look at the Surgeon General's website on e-cigarettes together so you can see for yourself: E-cigarettes.SurgeonGeneral.gov.

I (or my friends) have tried e-cigarettes and it was no big deal.

I appreciate your honesty. In the future I hope you (or your friends) will stay away from them and other tobacco products, including cigarettes.

Next time we go to the doctor let's ask about the risks of nicotine, e-cigarettes, and other tobacco products.

You used tobacco, so why shouldn't I?

If I could live my life over again I never would have started smoking. I learned that people who smoke are much more likely to develop, and die from, certain diseases than people who don't smoke. This was really scary, so I quit smoking.

Quitting was really hard and I don't want you to go through that. The best thing is to not start at all.

Keep the conversation going at opportune times – remind and repeat, and share facts and resources.

The poem was written by Lt. Col. John McCrae in 1915 after witnessing the death of his friend, a fellow soldier.

The American Legion Auxiliary poppy has 4 crepe paper petals with a black and green center. The black and green center is also of crepe paper. The flower is attached to a green coated wire and a label is attached stating: American Legion Auxiliary - In Memoriam.

Competition began on Saturday. Louisiana competed in 10 matches with the following results: Athens, Wis. (355-120 win), Itawamba, Miss "B" (420-70 win), Bridge Creek, Ohio (400-290 win), Cooperstown, New York (400-300 loss), Cloverleaf, Ohio (380-235 win), Southwestern Piasa, Ill. (430-285 loss), Huntingdon, Penn. "A" (325-280 win), Danville, Kent. (330-270 loss), and New Berlin, Ill. (480-120 win).

This gave the team a 7-3 record which qualified them for the double-elimination playoff rounds on Sunday.

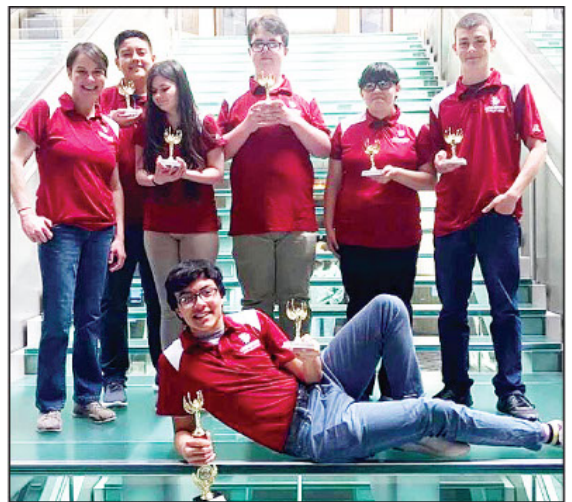
The morning began with a rematch against Danville, Kent., in which LHS avenged Saturday's loss with a 390-205 victory. The win brought the Bulldogs face to face with the number one seed in the tournament, Glasgow "A" from Kentucky. While they put up a fight, Louisiana lost to the eventual winners of the tournament by a score of 580-230.

Despite the loss, the Bulldogs went on to play Macomb, Ill., and won by a score of 420-280. Next up was Raceland, Kent., where Louisiana came up short 520-170.

This second loss in the playoffs put Louisiana in 10th place out of 96 teams. A final round to determine placement in the "Very Small School" division matched the Bulldogs with Camp Hill, Penn. The Bulldogs fell 360-265 putting them in sixth place out of the 53 in the division.

Louisiana team captain Michael Powers placed first overall individually in the tournament in which 527 students from across the country participated. Powers answered 117 tossups in the preliminary rounds, 40 of which were for "power" which is when a question is answered very early and therefore earns extra points.

Overall Powers answered 163 tossups with 61 for power. LHS Coach Malia Jolly noted that having an exceptional player on the team can make it difficult to answer tossups but team members Brandy Farmer, Evan Jones, Rachel Beard, Hunter Hobbs and Jerry Perez all contributed by
