## Louisiana Quiz Bowl Team Delivers Second Straight State Championship

The Louisiana High School Quiz Bowl team captured their second consecutive Class 2 Scholar Bowl title on Friday, May 4 at the University of Missouri in Columbia and team captain Michael Powers took first place individually overall.

The Bulldogs went undefeated and took down each opponent in

the tournament by a large margin. Louisiana clenched the top seed in the semifinal with powerful performances in the three preliminary rounds, averaging 556.67 points per game.

In the preliminaries, Louisiana handily defeated familiar adversary Calvary Lutheran 580-170 in the first round. Next the Bulldogs

served up a 500-180 victory over Clarence Cannon Conference rival South Shelby. In the final round of the prelims Louisiana crushed Portageville 590-130.

The Bulldogs squared off with South Shelby again in the semifinal with a similar result, winning 510-180.

## Bridge Claims A Life - Gets A Name

**Editor's note: Louisiana celebrates its bicentennial in 2018. Following is the fifth in a series of monthly articles by Louisiana author Brent Engel that will examine 200 years of local history. It is the second of three parts.**

Backers of a Mississippi River bridge at Louisiana were positive when the calendar turned to 1927.

Efforts the previous year by Stark Brothers Nurseries executive Lloyd Stark and others had led to federal approval of construction. Since Missouri and Illinois would not provide funding, it would be up to Louisiana to pay for the project. But no one seem daunted by the idea of rais-

ing \$1 million locally -- the equivalent of about \$14 million today.

At the annual Louisiana Chamber of Commerce meeting on Feb. 24, 1927, Stark cited all of the exciting projects that were happening, and encouraged diners to keep up their efforts.

"Service should be the slogan of every citizen during the coming year," Stark said.

Ground was broken for Louisiana's hospital on May 2 and just 25 days later, the first bridge pier was put in place.

Regional efforts got a boost on June 10, when the Northeast Missouri Chamber of Commerce was organized with 29 counties. Stark was elected president. In

accepting the honor, he pointed out that Northeast Missouri was an economic and transportation hub of America.

## Three Charged In Beating Of Bowling Green Man

Three individuals from Troy have been charged in the beating of a Bowling Green man that took place on Tuesday, May 1.

Police Chief Don Nacke said the office was contacted at about 1:30 a.m. by a man claiming a group of people had robbed him and during the assault one had fired a gun at him. Officers responded to an area along Business Highway 61 at

Fairgrounds Road in town.

The victim was identified as a 22-year-old male. He reported a group of five people had chased him to that location from the park area. He said they beat him and tried to shoot him while stealing his backpack.

Nacke said the victim had sustained injuries to his face from being punched. A 9mm handgun was also recovered at the scene in addition to an empty shell casing.

## Capital Campaign Is Established To Complete YMCA Funding

Construction is progressing on the Eastern Missouri Family YMCA and the area is excited to see this project become a reality. Approximately \$1.7 Million has been raised for this project through the generosity of local residents, businesses, foundations, and grants. This amount will open a facility with basic essentials to function. To complete the vision that Felicity Goodpasture-Culwell had for the YMCA, a Capital Campaign Committee has been formed to raise funds to fully equip the facility, secure an oper-

ating budget, and establish an endowment for the future.

The Capital Campaign is being led by honorary co-chairs, Ann Kohl and Ramon Barnes, plus co-chairs Alan Winders and Debbie Hopke. The group is coordinating with Interim Project Manager Jeff Frazier, to establish the needs to complete the facility.

A goal of \$1 million has been set for the campaign with the following budget breakdown: \$200,000 - First year operating expenses

## NECAC Touts Home Ownership Numbers

The not-for-profit North East Community Action Corporation (NECAC) continues to make strides in putting people on the path to homeownership.

Newly-released numbers show the agency has substantially increased the number of people who've been helped and the amount of dollars brought in for homeownership and rehabilitation services.

"These leveraged funds are dollars coming back into Northeast Missouri in the creation of new housing, making homes energy efficient through weatherization, the improvement of older housing stock -- which in turn improves local communities -- and new homeowners providing additional tax base for our area," said NECAC Deputy Director for Housing Development Programs Carla Potts. "We continue to provide more opportunities for people to buy or improve their homes."

In the last 18 months, NECAC has:

- \*Helped 109 families become homeowners, up from 62 during the previous 18-month period.

- \*Rehabilitated 257 owner-occupied homes, up from 200.

- \*Repaired 172 homes through weatherization, up from 157.

- \*Counseled 777 families with homeownership training and pre-purchase education, up from 665.

- \*Leveraged direct investment dollars totaling \$21,416,943, up from \$15,691,355.

In addition to its efforts in Missouri, NECAC works on

homeownership with agencies and partners in Illinois and Iowa.

In 2013, NECAC was instrumental in bringing a USDA Great Regions designation to the 35-county area that makes up the Tri-State Development Summit. Housing is one of the steering committees that meets and reports to the summit. The designation gave the region another tool in building a stronger housing market and economy.

In the last year, NECAC received national honors for its housing programs, co-hosted the Tri-State Housing Summit and expanded packaging of USDA

502 Direct home loans. In addition, the agency completed construction of a senior apartment complex and made progress on the Tiny Homes, Healthy Homes and Aspire Partnership Prison Homes programs. This year's housing summit is June 8 in Quincy, Ill.

"We are pleased that we've been able to move forward, but we know there is a lot of work to do," Potts said. "We urge anyone who is interested in buying a home or those who would like to partner with this to join the effort."

made many dear friends.

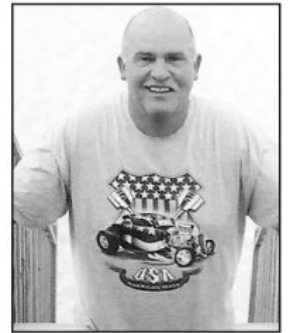

"If Northeast Missouri will arise from her long sleep, she will reap a rich harvest," the Press-Journal said in its story about the effort.

Nature had other ideas. The most destructive flood in American history hit the Mississippi River, generally affecting people living along the lower part of the river from Southern Missouri to the Gulf of Mexico. But high water delayed work on the Louisiana bridge for about a month. Construction finally resumed in late June.

"Barring more high water, which is not anticipated, rapid progress is expected to be made both with the substructure and the superstructure of the bridge from now on," the Press-Journal assured.

In early July, Stark reported "everything is working smoothly." On July 16, the Missouri-Illinois Bridge Company contest to name the structure closed. People from 80 towns in 13 states contributed. Entrants sometimes offered multiple suggestions, sent from places as diverse as Franklin, Ca., and Staten Island, N.Y.

Names were not revealed, but the contest "created considerable interest among the people of several states of the union," the Press-Journal observed.

Media attention began to mount as construction progressed. The newspaper of Springfield, Ill., did a feature July 31 on the Louisiana bridge, as well as the span being built along the Illinois River at Florence. It predicted greater cooperation between the two states.

Everything was fine until Tuesday, Sept. 6, 1927.

At 11:30 a.m., the second span of the bridge collapsed, plunging one worker to his death and injuring another.

Thirty-seven-year-old Ed Engle died when temporary supports gave way. An examination showed that he may have drowned, but he also had a broken neck. The body was recovered about an hour later in six feet of water near the first pier.

"The accident was due to the fact that the false work which had been constructed between piers one and two gave way under weight of the steel work and the span crashed downward into the river," the Press-Journal told horrified readers in an edition published the same day.

Engle had worked for Wisconsin Bridge & Iron for 12 years, and was living with his wife and their two daughters, 11-year-old Marian and seven-year-old Jane in an apartment on South Sixth Street across from Louisiana Christian Church.

"The little girls had enrolled in the public school here Monday, the family expecting to stay here during the winter," the Press-Journal said.

A brief funeral was held on the evening of Sept. 6 at Haley's Mortuary. The wife and daughters left the next morning by train for Wisconsin.

The man who was injured, H.C. Boren, jumped from the bridge as it started to collapse and was struck in the left knee by a timber as he swam away. He recovered.

Six witnesses testified at a coroner's inquest. Workers said that just before the collapse, pilings underneath the bridge began to buckle. One worker said the pilings were stronger than necessary, but another said condemned pilings had been used before being replaced.

The six-man coroner's jury could find no conclusive cause and ruled the death an accident.

Stark and other bridge company officials were upset and saddened by the incident, but were determined to press on. Construction resumed on Sept. 8, even as barges and a crane were brought in to remove debris.

A couple of weeks later, a man who had earlier worked on a bridge construction site in Cape Girardeau. Newspapers blamed alcoholism for the death of R.J. Armstrong.

Thankfully, it would be the last sad news for a long time.

Name announced  
Things took a more positive turn on Sept. 27, 1927.

The Missouri-Illinois Bridge Company finally issued the results of the naming contest.

In 2018, the span is simply known as "The Champ Clark Bridge." But in 1927, that just wasn't good enough.

Stark and his compatriots announced the modern marvel would be called "The Champ Clark Mississippi River Bridge at Louisiana, Mo., the Gateway to the West."

Mrs. H.L. Banks of Hannibal and C.C. Moore of Vandalia split the \$100 prize. Banks had suggested Clark and Moore offered "Gateway to the West." The bridge company liked both too much to choose just one.

Banks had also suggested the SERVANA Bridge, the letters of which stood for Serves A Nation. As it happened, her Champ nomination came in just before that of Clark's widow, Genevieve.

Fourteen people suggested famed aviator Charles Lindbergh and five voted for Joe Bowers, the main character in a popular folk song that mentions Pike County, Mo. Others included "Two Pikes" and "Twin Pikes." There also was the "Abe Lincoln and Mark Twain Bridge."

Mrs. Clark penned a letter Sept. 29 from her Bowling Green home, Honey Shuck, that she and the family were "touched and pleased beyond speech." Her daughter, Genevieve Clark Thomson, wrote from New Orleans, where just four years earlier she had run unsuccessfully for a Congressional seat.

"It seems to me that there could be no more fitting memorial to my father than to have a noble span across that sometimes rampageous but always noble stream named after him," Thomson said. "He loved the Mississippi valley so much and his life and work are so bound up with its history that such a commemoration of his name seems peculiarly suitable. But the thing that really touches us most deeply is this beautiful gesture which gives proof of the fact that he still lives in the hearts of his neighbors...to whom in life he gave such genuine devotion."

On Oct. 27, an announcement was made that Chicago sculptor Frederick C. Hibbard planned to place a three-foot bust of Clark on a six-foot base along the Missouri approach. That prompted talk of placing a bust of Revolutionary War hero George Rogers Clark on

the Illinois side. Neither was erected. The general already had gotten a statue in Quincy in 1909.

On Nov. 18, 1927, the Press-Journal carried news for everyone had waited - the bridge would open Feb. 1, 1928.

That didn't mean the structure was finished. In fact, to that point work had mostly been done from the Missouri side. That changed when the project superintendent asked in December 1927 to start building from the Illinois shore as well.

Media attention ramped up once again, with journalists traveling U.S. 54 across the state to show readers how easy travel was becoming. Some of that may have been attributed to Stark being named to the Missouri State Highway Bond Campaign, which was backing a \$75 million bond issue to be put before Missouri voters on Nov. 6, 1928.

"Chicago, Springfield and Kansas City motorists are interested in the completion of the Champ Clark Mississippi River Bridge at Louisiana as well as trans-continental tourists," the Press-Journal reported on Jan. 13, 1928. "The route will be shortened 85 miles, and it will not be necessary to pass through St. Louis and its heavy traffic."

Eastern spans were completed in early March and later that month, the bridge company announced that a formal dedication would take place at 11 a.m. Saturday, June 9.

"There will be a great array of distinguished and prominent citi-

zens from many parts of the United States," including governors from "the twelve states through which the state capitol to state capitol highway passes from Sacramento, California, to Washington, D.C.," the Press-Journal noted.

Mrs. Clark and her family were invited, and a steamboat from St. Louis was reserved to bring in

passengers. There were even plans to have trains headed to the Republican National Convention in Kansas City make stops.

There was just one question. Who was going to coordinate a celebration that would include many activities and thousands of people?

"This is a time when we can highlight the important social service, community health and public housing programs that we administer and deliver to those who need our services."

"It's important to recognize that without Community Action, many of the neediest among us would not get the services they need to improve their lives," said NECAC Pike County Service Coordinator Chandra Roberts. "We provide temporary assistance to our neighbors in need, helping them to become more self-sufficient."

Changes later were made to make sure there was broad tri-partite representation on the boards of Community Action Agencies of local elected officials, civic interest representatives and low-income representatives.

NECAC is governed by a 36-member volunteer Board of Directors with three representatives from each of the 12 counties. The

Board consists of one Public Elected Official (PEO) representative, one Civic Interest Representative (CIR) and one Low-Income Representative (LIR) from each county. Lyndon Bode, Presiding Commissioner of Marion County, is the Chairman of the Board and serves as the Marion County PEO.

Serving on the NECAC Board from Pike County are County Commissioner Bill Allen of Bowling Green as the PEO, D. Randall Cone of Louisiana as the CIR and Bette Maxwell of Louisiana as the LIR.

## Louisiana Bicentennial Seeks Vendors, Volunteers

Louisiana got motivated in 1928 when the call went out for volunteers to help plan the grand opening of the Champ Clark Bridge.

The Louisiana Bicentennial Committee hopes that enthusiasm will blossom again for this year's 200th anniversary celebration June 30 to July 4. Volunteers and vendors are needed.

"We encourage civic groups, businesses, families and individuals to get involved," said committee co-chairman Cindy Blaylock. "The more people we have, the better the celebration. We don't expect people to work all day. We're asking for just a few hours of their time."

In 1928, a committee was formed to plan for the bridge dedication on June 9. The group came up with a street dance, food stands and community-wide decorations. It even set aside \$500 - more than \$7,000 today - to pay the many bands hired to perform.

For the bicentennial, the committee has been planning for two years, and has a wide variety of activities and events planned for all ages. Individuals, families, businesses, groups, churches and civic clubs are invited to get involved or to sponsor events.

Following are tasks that need to be filled:

\*Saturday, June 30: Placement of stages, trash cans, barricades, signage, banners and sound system. During the parade, six people at the staging area, two at the high school entrance and two for parking. Two people to register vendors and two more to assist in setup. Two people to work shifts helping with stage events. A host or hostess to work with entertainers.

\*Sunday, July 1: Host or hostess to work with Ministerial Alliance and manage day's events. Host or hostess to work with vendors and vendor chair.

\*Monday, July 2: Host or hostess for the day to help coordinate organizational and business events and work with Louisiana Chamber of Commerce and the Unified Economic Development Council. The committee is encouraging businesses and organizations to use this day to celebrate their contribution to the community. Open houses, sidewalk sales and other special events could be ideas.

\*Tuesday, July 3: Host or hostess to work with Kids' Day coordinator.

\*Wednesday, July 4: A parade coordinator with four people at the staging area and two at Main and Georgia. Host or hostess for the vendors at riverfront.

Vendors are particularly needed for Saturday and Sunday, June 30 and July 1. Spots at the high school grounds are available for \$25 to \$50 per day, depending upon size. ## NECAC To Host Public Hearing On Rent-Assistance Plan

NECAC also has a separate contract with HUD and the St. Charles County government to administer the Section 8 program in that county.

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### USDA Farm Service Agency News

**Report Your Cover Crops to FSA**  
 The USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) recently made several policy updates for acreage reporting for cover crops, revising intended use, late-filed provisions, grazing allotments as well as updated the definitions of "idle" and "fallow." Reporting your cover crop across records the history on the FSA-578 and can help if you are pulled for a compliance spot check in the future. NRCS reviews cropping history when completing compliance reviews on farms. By reporting your

cover crop it allows NRCS to have the most accurate information of your conservation practices. The deadline to report cover crops is the crop reporting deadline for spring planted crops, which is July 15. FSA made changes to the types of cover crops. Cover crop types can be chosen from the following four categories:  
 • Cereals and other grasses - Any cover crop that is classified as a grass plant or cereal grain, and would include, but not be limited to, the following cover crops: cereal rye, wheat, barley, oats,

black oats, triticale, annual ryegrass, pearl millet, foxtail millet (also called German, Italian or Hungarian millet), sorghum sudan grass, sorghum and other millets and grasses.  
 • Legumes - Any cover crop that is classified as a legume, including, but not limited to, clovers, vetches, peas, sun hemp, cowpeas, lentils and other legumes.  
 • Brassicas and other broadleaves - Any cover crop that is classified as a non-legume broadleaf, including, but not limited to, Brassicas such as radishes, turnips,

canola, rapeseed, oilseed rape, and mustards, as well as other broadleaf plants such as phacelia, flax, sunflower, buckwheat, and safflower.  
 • Mixtures - Mixes of two or more cover crop species planted at the same time, for example, oats and radishes. If the cover crop is harvested for any use other than forage or grazing and is not terminated according to policy guidelines, then that crop will no longer be considered a cover crop and the acreage report must be revised to reflect the actual crop.

Louisiana took down College Heights Christian 490-260 to claim the state title for the second year in a row.

The Bulldogs are led by LHS junior Michael Powers who is the team captain. Powers captured first place individually in the tournament overall with an average of 31 tossups per game, earning him the top spot on both the All-Star and All-State teams.

LHS Quiz Bowl Coach Malia Jolly pointed out that Powers and the team broke several state records last weekend. The accomplishments include:

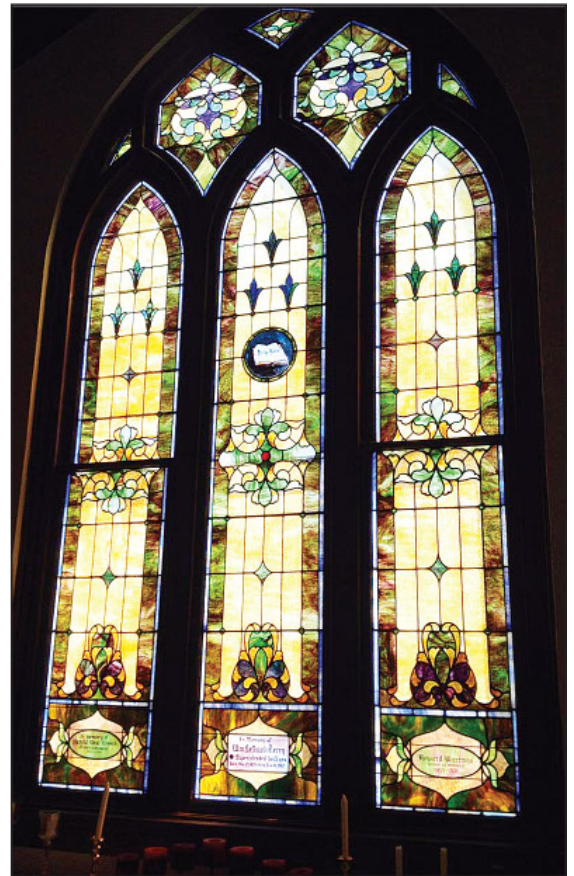
- Powers broke his own record for most tossups in one championship with 155 this year beating his record of 138 in 2017. He also set the record for most tossups in Class 2A with the same numbers.
- Powers broke the previous record of tossups by a junior that was previously held by Max Schindler with 132 in 2012.
- Powers broke the record for most tossups in one round with 35 this year beating the record previously held by Ross Simmons with 34 last year.
- Powers broke his own record set last year for most single game 2A tossups.
- Powers now holds the records for most tossups at state by a freshman, sophomore and a junior along with most games of 30+ tossups.

- The team smashed a 17-year record for most points in Class 2 with 2,610 this year to beat the previous record of 2,285 set by Richland in 2001.
- The team tied the record for most team points in a single round with 590 against Portageville this year. Richland set the record in 2015.
