



NECAC's Janice Robinson Earns Top Statewide Award

In a career that spans almost 50 years, Janice Robinson has lived by a principle her father handed down and that she still uses.

Robinson, Deputy Director for Community Services Programs at the not-for-profit 12-county area North East Community Action Corporation (NECAC) headquartered in Bowling Green, received the prestigious Charles Braithwait Leadership Award. The presentation was made during the Missouri Community Action Network (MOCAN) 2018 Conference at Lake of the Ozarks. MOCAN represents the 19 Missouri Community

Action Agencies.
"My father always said 'Never think you're better than anyone else, but know that you're just as good as everyone else," Robinson told the audience of Community Action colleagues from around the state. "I hold that true in every one of our clients who comes through the door,

chents who comes through the door, because it's the right thing to do."

"This is a great honor and pleasure for both Janice and all of us at NECAC," said NECAC President and Chief Executive Officer Don and Chief Executive Officer Don Patrick. "In 1985, Janice was serv-ing in the position of my executive secretary. She served me in that position for 15 years until I saw the opportunity to promote her to a higher management role. I hated to lose her as my chief assistant, but she had such a complete and thorough knowledge of our agency's internal workings and displayed the proper management and leadership skills that I couldn't hold her back and had to move her forward within our agency. She has proven ever since she deserves this prestigious statewide Community Action recognition. Charles Braithwait was a close colleague and friend of mine, and I know he would be very proud of Janice receiving this award in his

name."
Robinson joined NECAC on Sept. 28, 1971, just a few months after graduating from Bowling Green High School. Community Action had been formed just seven years earlier with the signing by President Lyndon Johnson of the Economic Opportunity Act It record Economic Opportunity Act. It paved the way for new programs in education, employment training, commu-nity progress and family develop-

Braithwait became executive director in 1965 of the West Central Missouri Community Action Agency in Appleton City. He helped to organize and was the elected president of the National Community Action Foundation (NCAF) from 1992 to 2010, and later was appointed by President Gerald Ford to the National Commission for Economic Development. NCAF represents more than 1,000 Community Action Agencies across the nation.

Braithwait, who died in 2014, Braithwait became executive

Braithwait, who died in 2014, uccessfully sued when President Richard Nixon refused to allocate money that Congress had already approved for Community Action. Robinson remembers opening the parchment letter from Nixon requesting Community Action Agencies such as NECAC to start dismantling their programs.

"Every time I think about Charles Braithwait, I think about the steps he took to do the right thing and fight for our cause," she said. Robinson has held many posi-tions at NECAC. She was promoted

from executive secretary Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) director on Jan. 2, 2002, and to her current position on April 1, 2004. Coming to work is never a challenge.

"I've seen the difference we nake in people's lives every day," she said. "What we do out there is a never-ending job."

Of the thousands of NECAC

clients Robinson has seen over the years, one stands out. The immi-grant woman and her two children moved to Missouri from California. She had no job or housing, and could barely speak English.

NECAC helped the family get a place to live and the mother found a job at a nursing home. The agency continued to work with her and eventually the woman enrolled in medical school. She's now a doctor.

medical school. She's now a doctor.
"She still stays in touch with us and says how important we were when she was in a time of need," Robinson said, "That's why our work is so important. She did not give up, and we did not give up on

Robinson was joined at the cere-mony by her husband, Phil, daughter Chelsea, son Jared and Jared's wife, Sarah. Daughter Kristen lives out of state and was unable to attend.

Robinson is proud of the award, but is also typically unselfish. "I truly, truly am honored," she said. "I feel so humbled because there are so many of you out there that are so deserving. 

Knowing the signs and symp-toms of heat related illness and how treat them is also important. "Symptoms related to heat stroke or heat exhaustion can be very serious," said Williams. "Developing muscle cramping may be the first indication that you are developing a heat related illness. Knowing the signs and symptoms of heat exhaustion and heat stroke could save your life or that of a loved one."

that of a loved one."

Signs of heat exhaustion may include muscle cramps; heavy sweating; cold, pale and clammy skin; dizziness; headache; nausea or vomiting; and fainting or passing out. If you think you or a loved one are experiencing heat loved one are experiencing heat exhaustion you should stop physical activity; move to a cool place—preferably air-condi-tioned—loosen clothing; and sip cool water. Seek medical attention immediately if you are throwing up, your symptoms get worse or symptoms last longer than one

Signs of heat stroke may clude high body temperature (103°F or higher); hot, red, dry or damp skin; fast, strong pulse; headache; dizziness; nausea; conor loss of consciousness. If you think you or a loved one are experiencing heat stroke you should call 911 immediately. Heat stroke is a medical emergency. Move the person to a cool place-preferably air-conditioned. Help lower the person's body tempera-ture with cool cloths or a cool bath until medical personnel arrive. Do not give the person anything to

Hendersons Featured By Missouri Humanities Council

John Brooks and Mary Foote Henderson are featured in the spring/summer issue of the Missouri Humanities Council mag-

The man who drafted the 13th Amendment outlawing slavery and the woman who campaigned for female suffrage are profiled in an article entitled "Meet the Hendersons of Missouri."

The three-page piece was writ-ten by Humanities Council person-nel Greg Wolk and Marilyn Webster Brown. It includes photos and Louisiana's bicentennial logo with information about the 200th anniversary celebration June 30 to

July 4.

"The combined lives of this power couple spanned 107 years," the authors say. "Two revolutions in civil rights for Americans were

at the center of their lives." Orphaned at 10, John Brooks Henderson became a teacher. lawyer and Missouri state representative. During the early part of the Civil War, he served as a brigadier general and in 1862 was appointed to the U.S. Senate. In 1864, Henderson was respon-

sible for something that hadn't been done in six decades - a change to the Constitution.

"Though he was a slave owner who for a time subscribed to the idea of eventual emancipation, John Henderson's Senate career John Henderson's Senate career reflects a man enlightened by the events that wrecked the nation in the 1860s," the authors write. Mary Foote Henderson had

quite a different upbringing. Her father was a lawyer, scientist and government civil servant. Her mother helped to organize the first women's rights convention and authored "a scientific paper describing the greenhouse effect of

CO2," the story offers.

The senator and the activist met in Washington in 1866 and were

married in 1868. Their only child, John Brooks Henderson Jr., was born in Louisiana on Feb. 18, 1870.

"For the next 15 years, while John continued to build his (law) practice, Mary attended Washington University, founded the St. Louis Woman's Exchange and (in 1876) served as president of the Missouri State Suffrage Association," according to the humanities council story.

The couple moved back to Washington in 1888 and built a huge home at the corner of Florida Avenue and 16th Street NW. They were very philanthropic and involved with many social and political issues.

political issues.
"The Henderson Castle remained a fixture of this part of Washington through John's death in 1913 and Mary's passing in 1931, ultimately facing the wrecking ball in 1949," the authors say.
The article notes that Democrat

The article notes that Democrat President John F. Kennedy included Republican lawmaker Henderson in his 1956 book "Profiles in Courage." Kennedy highlighted Henderson's work on the 13th Amendment and his defiant response to Missouri lawmak-ers who urged him to vote in favor of impeaching Democrat President Andrew Johnson.

Andrew Johnson.
"Denounced, threatened and burned in effigy in Missouri, he did not even bother to seek re-election to the Senate," Kennedy wrote.

The museum got its start in 1992 with a handful of history buffs in a tiny room behind the Chamber of Commerce at 107 S.

Experts such as former Mark Twain Boyhood Home curator Henry Sweets and Jim Millan, was instrumental restoration of Champ Clark's Bowling Green home, Honey Shuck, were called in to offer advice on policies and displays.

Financial contributions helped keep the lights on and artifacts began pouring in. The volume became so great that within two years of opening, the museum was moved to its current location. The

building was originally two for-mer retail stores, one that had made and sold hats and another that had offered shoes

The museum board once considered a proposal to build a new facility away from the downtown, but just didn't have the heart to move away for its Victorian build-ing in the center of the historic business district. Donations were used several years ago to stabilize the structure, replace one of the original entrances and put in a center stairway. Additional renovations have been made over the winter by board member Trent Meyers, and more work is Meyers, planned.

The collection has now become so vast that displays must be rotated – just as in big-city museums. But Schmidt says the welcome remains small town.
