## Downtown Committee To Hold 'Food Truck Fridays' Promotion This June

The Bowling Green Downtown Revitalization Committee is rolling out a new promotion in June called "Food Truck Fridays" that will feature some local favorites and some new additions.

Vendors will set up in the grassy area next to Pike County Mutual Insurance and will offer lunch and dinner from 11 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Committee chair Tracy Brookshier said that when they put out feelers it received a lot of positive feedback.

"Our committee is made up of volunteers and all of us are working hard on so many different projects big and small, so we decided to put this idea on the back burner until we could find a volunteer willing to organize the idea. Then recently the heavens opened up and sent us Danielle Orf, who mentioned the idea to me and agreed to take on the organization-

al efforts involved. She has done an amazing job at not only locating available vendors, but working through all the regulations that involve an event like this," Brookshier explained. "Danielle has done practically all of the work needed to get this going and we are extremely blessed to have her motivational efforts on our side."

Brookshier said it is the committee's hope that with word of mouth and a successful launch that vendors will want to return and more will join.

"We are also hoping that it goes over so well, that we feel the need to extend it even further into the summer months. We would love it if the public would help us out by getting themselves downtown on each Friday in June from 11 a.m.-7 p.m. and enjoy the mobile grub our vendors have to offer."

## Sheriff's Department Investigates Possible Poisoning In Drug-Related Death

Pike County Sheriff Stephen Korte said an investigation continues into the possible poisoning of a Bowling Green man in a drug-related death on Sunday.

Korte said his department responded to Pike County Memorial Hospital on May 27. It was reported that two patients had driven themselves to the hospital after taking methamphetamine and feared an overdose.

Shortly after arriving on the scene, it was confirmed that James P. Gregory, 37, had died at the hospital. His symptoms prior to dying were consistent with strychnine poisoning. Korte noted an autopsy is being performed to

confirm the cause of death.

"Strychnine is a main ingredient in rat poison," Korte reported. "Folks selling illegal drugs will sometimes add other substances such as fentanyl or strychnine to change the high [of certain drugs]."

He added that a second person was treated and released. That person has been questioned as part of the investigation.

"Due to the amount of forensics involved with this type of case it will be a lengthy investigation," Korte explained.

He added that investigators in Pike County have experience with these types of cases.

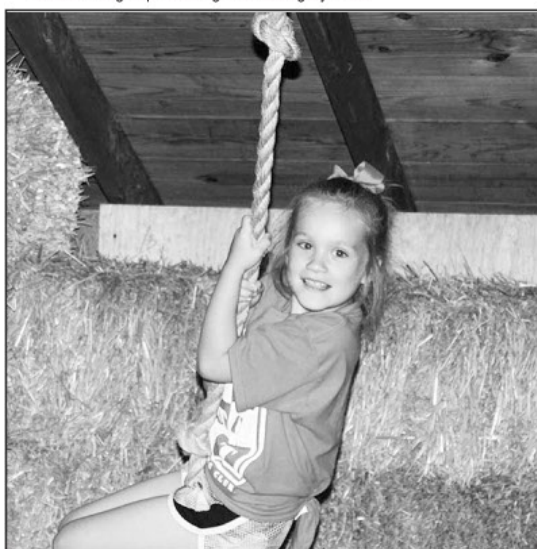


## Walking Club Goes To Purina Farms

# Don't Let Your Healthy Tan Kill You

Skin cancer is the most common cancer in the U.S. More people will get skin cancer this year than breast, prostate, lung, and colon cancer combined. The National Council on Skin Cancer Prevention has designated the Friday before Memorial Day as "Don't Fry Day" to raise awareness of skin cancer prevention and to encourage everyone to protect their skin as they head outdoors to kick off the summer season.

"One in five Americans will develop skin cancer in the course of their lifetime," shares Dr. Schuyler Metlis with Hannibal Regional Medical Group. "'Don't Fry Day' is a great way to remind us to take preventative measures to protect our skin." In order to protect yourself from the sun remember to seek shade, wear

protective clothing, generously apply sunscreen, do not burn or tan (including tanning beds) and use extra caution near water, snow and sand.

Another way to help catch skin cancer early is to carefully examine your skin monthly. Suspicious lesions or progressive changes in a lesion's appearance or size should be evaluated promptly by a physician. "There has been a decrease of incidence of many common cancers, but the rates of melanoma continue to rise significantly. If you have a new skin lesion that is growing, changing shape, bleeding or itching, you should have it checked immediately by a trained professional," says Dr. Metlis.

Some risk factors for skin cancer include a lighter natural skin

color; family history of skin cancer; history of indoor tanning; history of sunburns (especially early in life); and skin that burns, freckles, or reddens easily. "If you have any of these risk factors, you should see a doctor for a skin cancer screening at least once a year," says Dr. Metlis. "Catching cancer early often allows for more treatment options. If you have skin cancer, finding it early is the best way to make sure it can be treated with success and with less noticeable scarring."

#### Source Water Assessment

The Department of Natural Resources conducted a source water assessment to determine the susceptibility of our water source to potential contaminants. This process involved the establishment of source water area delineations for each well or surface water intake and then a contaminant inventory was performed within those delineated areas to assess potential threats to each source. To access the maps for your water system you will need the State-assigned identification code, which is printed at the top of this report. The Source Water Inventory Project summary information sheets provide a foundation upon which a more comprehensive source water protection plan can be developed.

#### Why are there contaminants in my water?

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

#### Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- A. Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.

- C. Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses.
- D. Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are byproducts of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.
- E. Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the Department of Natural Resources prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Department of Health regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection of public health.

Is our water system meeting other rules that govern our operations? The Missouri Department of Natural Resources regulates our water system and requires us to test our water on a regular basis to ensure its safety. Our system has been assigned the identification number MO2024471 for the purposes of tracking our test results. Last year, we tested for a variety of contaminants. The detectable results of these tests are on the following pages of this report. Any violations of state requirements or standards will be further explained later in this report.

#### Do I need to take any special precautions?

## Firefighters Battle Residential Fire On Cuivre Street Sunday

The Bowling Green Fire Department was dispatched to a residential fire at 311 S. Cuivre Street on Sunday, May 27.

Firefighters and apparatus arrived on the scene within six minutes of being dispatched and arrived to heavy smoke and flames.

"Firefighters were able to perform a quick interior and exterior attack on the fire and had the fire controlled within 20 minutes of being on the scene," noted Bowling Green Fire Chief Adam Mitalovich.

He noted in a press release that firefighters stayed several hours performing salvage and overhaul operations to ensure the fire was completely extinguished.

A total of 11 firefighters responded and three pieces of apparatus were dispatched by the Bowling Green Fire Department. Mitalovich said that due to the excessive heat the department received assistance from the Buffalo Township Fire Protection District and Eolia Community Fire Department. Firefighters were also assisted by the Bowling Green Police Department and Pike County Memorial Hospital EMS crews.

Mitalovich said the owner was home at the time of the blaze and was able to escape with two pets. No injuries were reported.

The cause of the fire is undetermined at this time.

The life of a teenager and former resident of Bowling Green was taken in a head-on collision that took place on Thursday, May 24.

According to a report by the Missouri State Highway Patrol, Trenton Robb, 19, suffered fatal injuries following an accident that took place on Highway T and Prairie Chapel Road at about 6:45 a.m. last week.

The report states that the 2005 Volkswagen Jetta that Robb was driving crossed the center lane and collided with a 2015 Ford F-250 truck driven by Gerald R. Moore, 61, of Sedalia.

Robb, of Sweet Springs, formerly lived in Bowling Green. He was taken to Research Medical by EMS where he succumbed to injuries.

"It was an honor to have someone who owns a business in my district testify before my committee," Graves said. "I've been to Mike's sale barn in Bowling Green and his business is critical to feeding the world. We've got to make sure that the transportation regulations that are put in place don't hinder the vital work that our folks in the agriculture industry do which is so important to this region."

VanMaanen appeared on behalf

of the Livestock Marketers Association and talked about the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration's rollout of provisions in the FAST Act as well as regulations like the Electronic Logging Device (ELD) mandate and its effect on the livestock hauling industry.

"We cannot thank Congressman Graves enough for his work on behalf of the livestock industry especially in light of the challenges we are facing with trucking regulations that challenge the livelihoods of farmers, ranchers, and livestock haulers alike," VanMaanen said.

# BGHS Track Athletes Turn In Strong Performances At State Meet

Three individual Bowling Green track athletes and the 4x800 girl's relay team earned All-State honors at the state track meet over the weekend.

Kate Klott, KateLynn Charlton and Austin Orf earned All-State in addition to the relay team which includes Klott, Hannah Kroencke, Quinn Grote and Sylvia Wagner.

Klott took fourth place in the 1600 meter run with a time of 5:21.

Coach Matt Chance noted that she ran a great race.

"The pace was extremely fast early on and she did a great job of holding on to the lead pack and finishing strong at the end. This was her second fastest time ever in the 1600 and has been All-State in the 1600 meter run back-to-back seasons."

Klott also took 15th place in the 800-meter run with a time of 2:34 at the state meet.

Charlton took seventh in the javelin event with a 116' throw.

"KateLynn is the first BGHS athlete to qualify for state in the

javelin and for her to earn All-State was great. She had two of her best throws of the season when it counted at state. She is the school record holder in the javelin also," Chance said.

Charlton also collected All-State honors for her eighth place finish in the discus with a throw of 114'9".

"KateLynn has been a three-time state qualifier in the discus and it was great to see her finish her career on the podium. She has been one of the best to ever throw at BGHS during her four-year career. She ends as a three-time All-State athlete in track and field," Chance added.

Orf took seventh in the high jump with a height of 6'3".

"Austin had a tremendous year in the high jump this year," Chance remarked. "He improved over a foot from last year and really became one of the best high jumpers around. We are very excited that he is just a sophomore and hopefully he can continue to move up and compete for a state

title the next few years."

The 4x800 meter relay team took fourth place at state with a time of 10:00.

"These girls ran a great race and had their best time of the year by 12 seconds. This is the fourth straight year the 4x800 relay has made All-State and we are the only school in Class 3 to run 10:00 or under the last four years at the state meet. Hannah Kroencke earned her 4th All-State honor in track, Quinn Grote her second All-State honor, Sylvia Wagner her first All-State honor, and Kate Klott earned her 8th All-State honor in track and cross country."

Grace Dameron also took 12th place in the shot put event with a throw of 35'1".

"Grace had a tremendous freshman year," Chance said. "She was All-Conference, All-District, and qualified for state. She gained some great experience this year and should have an excellent chance to get back to state next year and make the podium."

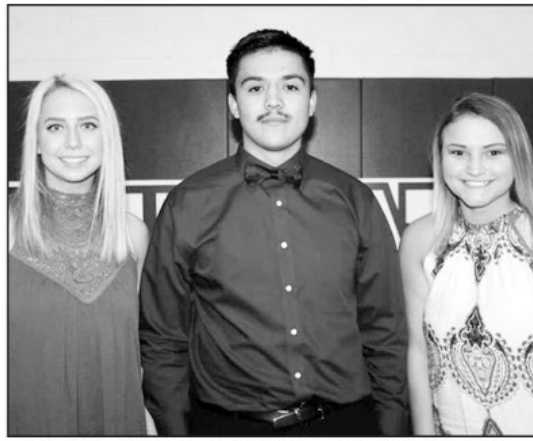

### NECAC Awarded NeighborWorks Grant For Home Upgrades

The not-for-profit North East Community Action Corporation (NECAC) has been awarded a \$45,500 grant to provide energy-efficient upgrades to homes.

The grant comes from the Neighborhood Reinvestment Corporation through NeighborWorks America, a Congressionally-chartered national organization that supports community development through grants and technical assistance. The work will be done by NECAC's Weatherization Department, and the agency will leverage additional dollars through the Home Depot Foundation and the Missouri Housing Development Commission.

The grant is part of the Safe and Sound Program, which was made possible with a \$600,000 national donation by the Wells Fargo Housing Foundation.

"NECAC appreciates the chance through this NeighborWorks grant to continue our commitment to quality, affordable housing in our region," said NECAC President and Chief Executive Officer Don Patrick. "NECAC will use the funding to bring substandard rural homes up to state and federal housing codes through rehabilitation. Grant funds will be used to increase energy efficiency and stabilize affordable homeownership for economically-challenged people while increasing their opportunities to grow assets."

"We're delighted to welcome NECAC as a 2018 Safe and Sound grantee, and we're confident that these resources will both improve the lives of local residents and strengthen their communities," said David Dangler, director of the NeighborWorks Rural Initiative.

The goal of the program is to complete at least 40 rural housing rehabilitation or replacement projects in four regions of the nation by Sept. 30.

NECAC, a 12-county area social service, community health and public housing agency, has been a charter member of NeighborWorks since 2004, and is one of 166 NeighborWorks organizations serving rural America.

A recent NeighborWorks consumer finance survey found that 46 percent of American adults living in rural areas are "not too confident" or "not confident at all" of their ability to withstand a sudden financial emergency. The grant will allow NECAC to boost its efforts to change the numbers.

"NECAC, along with the entire NeighborWorks network, is having a strong economic impact in rural communities across the country," Patrick said. "We will continue to address the housing needs and challenges facing our 12 counties."

North East Community Action Corporation (NECAC) President and Chief Executive Officer Don Patrick has announced the hiring of Ashley Deters of Bowling Green as administrative assistant in the NECAC Self-Help Housing Home Rehabilitation program.

NECAC is a 12-county area not-for-profit social service, community health and public housing Community Action Agency that serves the low-income, elderly, youth, disabled and disadvantaged. The agency's Central Administration Offices are located in Bowling Green, with NECAC Service Centers operated in each county.

Deters will work with clients, organize special projects and perform administrative duties under the direction of NECAC Self-Help Housing Construction Supervisor Brian Reed.

Under the Self-Help program, NECAC was awarded a \$159,000 USDA Rural Development grant to finance renovation work at 26 owner-occupied homes in Marion, Pike and Ralls counties. Reed is working with income-qualifying people to provide one-on-one instruction on the skills they need to do the renovation work. Supplies are purchased by the program, but labor is contributed by families or individuals. So far, two homes have been completed and seven others are under construction.
