



There was a serious side, of course. Genevieve campaigned for women's voting rights and worked on many social causes. One of her fondest was the "Made in America" movement, which garnered huge at-

which gamered huge at-tention.

"Miss Clark takes considerable interest in politics and has become acquainted with most of the leaders in Washington," said the Anderson Daily Intelligencer of South Car-olina. "Some of them talk politics with her, and her knowledge of the game has been commented on very ofen."

Though she decided to forego llege. Genevieve began writing Though she decided to forego college, Genevieve began writing for publication. One story was about a trip she took with a Congressional delegation to Panama. Another featured a look at life in Washington. Her article on the "suffrage luke" was prominently featured in the Washington Times.

As in the past, Genevieve remained a media darling, Her image appeared on front pages across the country, and her pals included the President's damphier, Jessie Wilson, and Thomas Edison's daughter. A formal Washington society debut took placed on New Year's Eve 1913, but everyone already the work of th meeting with increasing nature, joking with sincerity that the only time her beloved father had lost a re-election bid was the year she was born.

"Since then, she has been in great demand, not only in the younger set, but among the grown-upe, at the most formal sort of official functions, brilliant diplomatic dinners, and Senatorial feasts," raved the Times' social observer, Jean Eliot.

James and Genevieve kept in touch, with both periodically making the trip between Washington and New Orelans. At some point, the two decided to see the knot. Eliot speculated the engagement dated to

two decided to se the knot. Eliot speculated the engagement dated to Genevieve's visit at Mardi Gras 1914.

The New York Times made things official in an article on Dec. 28, 1914. "The only news in the announcement was that "Speaker and Mrs. Clark announce," Eliot streastically said.

Two months later, the Times reported Genevieve had suffered a "breaddown" due to a "slight indisposition" that caused her to "go to a sanitarium" to recover. Though no specific reason was given, the papers speculated whether Genevieve was having second thoughts or had just been overcome by buildup to the big day.

Whetever the case Genevieve

arose.
The Speaker had family, friends,

colleagues and constituents stretch-ing from coast to coast. If just one

of them failed to get an invitation, the offense would draw all kinds of unwanted inquiry. Clark finally came up with a solution, announced in a notice from his secretary, Wallace Bassford of Montgomery City.

"As it has been found utterly impossible to issue individual invitations, all Missourians are invited," it read.

Many wanted the commonsto

read. Many wanted the ceremony to take place in Washington, but Genevieve was adamant. She "put aside all suggestions for a more brilliant setting for her wedding than Honey Shuck," The Quincy Daily

liant setting for her wedding than Honey Shuck, "The Quincy Daily Whig reported.
"The gianthoney locust rees that give her home its name and shade its awn are her first distinct memories," the paper said. "Long ago, she said if she was ever married, it would be in June under those same, dear old trees."

It seems the only person not welcarole was William Jennings Bryan. Speaking with reporters, Clark denied that his 1912 Democrat National Convention nemes had not been identified. But he "did not say Bryan would be invited," one newspaper noted.

The wedding plans almost came to a screeching halt when the British liner Lustania was sunk by a German U-boat on May 7, 1915 Almost 1,200 people were killed, including 128 Americans. Speaker Clark and Congress were called into special session, but the Wilson administration took a cue from American public opinion and said it would not get involved.

So, in Bowling Green, preparations continued.

Reporters sitting with Clark on his front porch at Honey Shuck asked for a statement. The Speaker's lips grew tight and he barked: "I shall say should by nothing. I am ont going to say a word about it."

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

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
