## Honor The Past; Enjoy Family Fun At Louisiana's Bicentennial Celebration

The theme of the upcoming Louisiana Bicentennial celebration is "The Past Looking Forward" and organizers are hopeful folks will enjoy the lineup of activities that features parades, historical portrayals and ceremonies, music, fun for kids, fireworks and much more.

An opening ceremony will take place following the parade at 11 a.m. on Saturday. Organizers have announced that descendants of the Shaw and Caldwell families will be in attendance.

John Bryson had the first recorded residence in Louisiana which was roughly located at 9th Street at Tennessee and Georgia Streets. He sold land to the Shaw and Caldwell families who were the first to plant permanent roots in the Mississippi River town in 1818 and helped build the future.

The celebration is set to kick off on Saturday, June 30 and wrap up with live music and fireworks at the riverfront on Wednesday, July 4.

A parade will be held at 10 a.m. on Saturday to get things going. The grand marshals for the parade will be Mayor Marvin Brown as well as descendants of the Stack family - representatives of the Walter Logan and Clay Logan families. Marshals were selected in keeping with the theme of the past looking forward.

There will be several activities and contests throughout the celebration including a Little Mister and Miss Bicentennial Contest on Sunday and an afternoon of fun on Tuesday, July 3. ## Accident Almost Derails Genevieve Clark's Wedding

**Editor's note: Pike County celebrates its bicentennial in 2018. Following is the sixth in a series of monthly articles by Louisiana historian Brent Engel that will examine 200 years of local history. It is the third of four parts.**

Less than three weeks before his sister's wedding, Bennett Clark told those gathered for a luncheon in Columbia that he was getting engaged to Helen Morton Robnett. The announcement on June 12, 1915, could have caused sibling sparks. As it turned out, there was no need to worry.

Genevieve Clark, who was to be united with New Orleans newspaper publisher James Thomson on June 30 in Bowling Green, already knew Bennett had proposed because Robnett was one of her bridesmaids.

The 22-year-old daughter of a furniture company president and the 25-year-old son of House of Representatives Speaker Champ Clark met while students at the University of Missouri. He planned to give up his Washington job as House parliamentarian and return to a Pike County law practice.

stolen Genevieve's thunder, anyway. All of Bowling Green was agog with the arrival of so many dignitaries and strangers who planned to attend her ceremony.

Mayor George T. Lee issued a proclamation declaring the city should "put our best foot forward and appear in our best bib and tucker." Homes were spruced up, buildings were given a makeover and yards were made pristine. Newspapers soon noted that seemingly everyone took on a task or responsibility

## Local Man Brings Home World Championship First Place Trophy From Las Vegas In 8-Ball

Local business owner Jay Hurd was thrilled to collect the first place trophy in the Valley National 8-Ball League Association (VNEA) World Championship Classic in Las Vegas recently.

The VNEA is one of the world's largest amateur pool leagues. The competition took place at Bally's Hotel and Casino. In addition to the first place trophy in the Classic, Hurd also collected a \$1,600 prize and a championship jacket.

Hurd said he had to win 11 consecutive matches and beat the nine-ball champion to get into "the hot seat" at Vegas. "I am going back to Las Vegas the last week of July to play in the BCA Pool League."

In addition to the individual championship, Hurd also took part in a team competition with five other men and took 33rd place overall. Hurd noted that their competition came down to the last eight-ball.

## Blaze Claims Home Near Bowling Green

A rural Bowling Green family is working to pick up the pieces following a fire that claimed their home on Wednesday night.

Firefighters were called to the scene at about 10:15 p.m. on Wednesday when homeowners Joey and Christy Orf arrived to their home engulfed in flames.

Bowling Green Fire Chief Adam Mitalovich said he was in the first truck that arrived at the scene at 10:26 p.m.

"It was fully involved when we arrived. It was a big fire that had been going for a while before we got there," Mitalovich told The People's Tribune.

He said there were about 15 firefighters on the scene and a total of

six apparatus. Mutual aid was provided by the Buffalo Township Fire Protection District. Mitalovich said the fire was out by about 2 a.m. and the cause of the fire at the two-story house is undetermined.

Christy Orf noted it was terrifying to drive up to the fire. She noted the family lost pets inside but that animals outside were spared. She added how grateful she was for the safety of her family.

"We've been flooded with an outpouring of support," she remarked. "Our immediate needs are being met."

Immediately after the fire the community circulated information and clothing sizes for the family and donations were made along with crowd-funding social media ac-

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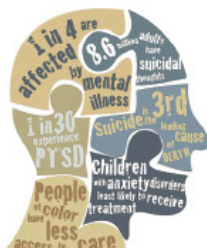

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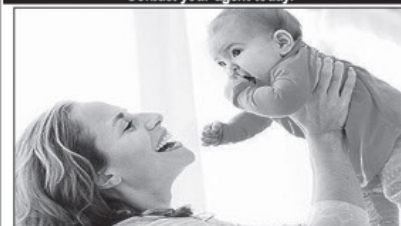

## MDC Expands Deer Feeding Ban To More Counties

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) has expanded its restrictions on feeding deer and placing minerals for deer to seven new counties in response to finding cases of chronic wasting disease (CWD) in or near them. The seven new counties are: Bollinger, Cape Girardeau, Grundy, Madison, McDonald, Mercer, and Perry. The feeding ban for these seven new counties becomes effective July 1.  
 These seven new counties join 41 existing counties of the Department's CWD Management Zone where feeding deer and placing minerals for deer is restricted. The Zone consists of counties in or near where cases of the disease have been found. The 48 counties are: Adair, Barry, Benton, Bollinger, Boone, Callaway, Cape Girardeau, Carroll, Cedar, Chariton, Cole, Cooper, Crawford, Dade, Franklin, Gasconade, Grundy, Hickory, Jefferson, Knox, Linn, Livingston, Macon, Madison, McDonald, Mercer, Miller, Moniteau, Morgan, Osage, Ozark, Perry, Polk, Putnam, Ran-

dolph, Schuyler, Soodand, Shelby, St. Charles, St. Clair, St. Francois, Ste. Genevieve, St. Louis, Stone, Sullivan, Taney, Warren, and Washington.  
 According to the Wildlife Code of Missouri, the placement of grain, salt products, minerals, and other consumable natural and manufactured products used to attract deer is prohibited year-round within counties of the CWD Management Zone. Exceptions are feed placed within 100 feet of any residence or occupied building, feed placed in such a manner to reasonably exclude access by deer, and feed and minerals present solely as a result of normal agricultural or forest management, or crop and wildlife food production practices.  
 "CWD is spread from deer to deer and the potential for transmission increases when deer are unnaturally congregated," said MDC Wildlife Disease Coordinator Jasmine Barton. "CWD can also spread when healthy deer come into contact with saliva, urine, or feces shed into the environ-

ment by infected deer. Placing feed and minerals for deer can facilitate the spread of diseases such as CWD. Recent research has confirmed the presence of CWD at mineral sites, which further supports this ban."  
 For the seven new counties, MDC has also increased the availability of antlerless permits, and expanded the firearms antlerless portion to help harvest more deer in the counties and limit the spread of the disease.  
 MDC confirmed 33 new cases of CWD following the testing of nearly 24,500 free-ranging Missouri deer through its sampling and testing efforts last season. The new cases were found in Adair, Cedar, Franklin, Jefferson, Linn, Macon, Perry, Polk, St. Clair, and Ste. Genevieve counties. These new cases bring the total number of free-ranging deer in Missouri confirmed to have CWD to 75.

## Start Applying July 1 For MDC Managed Deer Hunts

Beginning July 1, deer hunters can apply online through the Missouri Department of Conservation's (MDC) website for a shot at more than 100 managed deer hunts throughout the state for archery, muzzleloading, and modern firearms from mid-September through mid-January at conservation areas, state and other parks, national wildlife refuges, and other public areas. Some managed hunts are held

specifically for youth or for people with disabilities.  
 The managed deer hunt application period is July 1 - 31. Hunters are selected by a weighted random drawing. Draw results will be available Sept. 1 through Jan. 15. Applicants who are drawn will receive area maps and other hunt information by mail.

## Top 20 Things To Do With The Kids This Summer

Summer is a great time of year, especially if you live in the north. It's a chance to be free from thick clothing and the hectic schedule that takes place during the school year.

It's also a chance for parents to do a ton of fun things with their kids after work and on weekends. It's an exercise in bonding that is natural and will ideally create happy memories for your kids and with these suggestions; they don't take a lot of planning or cost money.

What To Do With The Kids has assembled a list of 20 fun things that parents can do with their kids.

1. Go to the beach  
It may seem like a lot of trouble but not if you keep it simple. Beach towel, a few beach toys and lots of sun screen is all you really need. Remember to get the sand out of the bathing suits before you start going home.

2. Mini golf  
As far as we are concerned, mini-golf should be an Olympic event. It's a great activity that anyone can play. In fact, the worst you are the more fun it is. We like playing in the early evening when it starts getting dark and cooler.

3. Bowling  
Bowling is another "potential" Olympic event that anyone can play. Most bowling alleys have lanes with "bumpers" that block the gutters so the kids are almost guaranteed to hit some pins. It's also a great place to be on a really hot day because bowlers hate to sweat so you know the air conditioning will be just right.

4. Play catch  
It's the one thing that movies like to use as the only activity dad never did with the hero of the story but it doesn't have to be forced or organized, it can be spontaneous. Most people think of playing catch involves a baseball glove and a ball but there are a lot more items you can use. Try a football, beach ball, tennis ball or the classic Frisbee. There are also variations you can use like drawing a few circles on the ground in chalk and try to bounce the ball inside it when sending it to the other person. If they are able to, use a football and a Frisbee at the same time. Just be careful how you throw it.

5. Explore your city  
A lot of people grow up in a city and never take in the sites so why not take the kids and explore? Most downtowns have a lot of old stores

with a lot of unique things in them and some may even have some history to them. Explore different parks or check online for festivals and events. Become a tourist in your own town by taking a tour bus. You may just discover things about your home town that you never knew.

6. Fishing  
Old fishing rods, hooks and worms are all you need to spend time by the water. There are a lot of options you can buy but if you go to a garage sale, there's a good chance you'll find everything you need for a few dollars. You might also need a fishing license in your area so do a little research. Since you're near water, you need to stay very close to the kids and you will need to put the worm on the hook for them. Use a lot of sun screen, give them a hat, pack a snack and you're ready to go. Find out where the best fishing spots are for kids but be prepared to cut it short. Some kids might not find it exciting so don't force them to stay. Plan on going for a short time and then make it longer the more you go. While you're waiting for the fish to nibble, tell them about how people who fish like to make up stories about "big one that got away" and come up with your own. Catch and release is great but if you happen to catch something big and you know how to properly prepare and cook them, bring them home as a special treat.

7. Biking  
Biking is a great activity for getting outside; exercising and exploring new areas but as we've written in a past blog, teach your kids the rules of the road or don't take them out! Teach them hand signals and what to do at a stop sign. In case you've forgotten, a stop sign does not mean to slow down, make eye contact with a car driver and continue through. Look online for local bike paths, pack a picnic or snack, put on some sun screen and make sure those helmets are on right. Start with short trips and then make them longer as they get older. Remember, they may have no problem biking there but it's biking back that can be tricky.

8. Swimming  
Learning to swim is something that every parent should have their kids do at an early age. It's a skill they will never forget and will save their lives. The younger they are, the closer you must be to them. This must also be the rule at the beach, a public pool or even in a small wading pool in your backyard. Never leave them alone. If you can, bring plastic balls or Frisbee to play in the water since kids love to make diving catches. Pool noodles, boogie boards and beach balls are great fun but again; don't forget to bring the sunscreen.

9. Hiking  
Hiking is another great activity that should be short to introduce them and gradually increased as they like. Start with simple and easy trails, wear appropriate shoes and clothing, bug spray and sunscreen and even pack a lunch or snack.

Water is very important if you plan on being out most of the day and make sure you know where you are going before you leave. You don't want to share the joys of being found with a search party do you?

10. Backyard party  
Why not host a party just for the heck of it? Make up a reason such as celebrating International Pickle Day or just a good old fashioned summer party. Barbecue some hotdogs and burgers, make some potato salad, coleslaw and have a few games. It doesn't have to be fancy or really organized. 11. Backyard camping

12. Fly a kite  
If you can find an open space free of power lines and gopher holes, you can fly a kite. Start with the inexpensive ones found at the department store and try it out. If the kids like it, you may want to invest in a really nice kite and watch them perform acrobatics in the sky.

13. Campfire  
Unfortunately, not every town or city allows campfires; especially open ones that are basically a hole in the ground surrounded by rocks. If your city does allow them, invest in a metal, enclosed one. These are designed to keep the fire from getting out of control and the doors help keep the kids away from the flames. Roast marshmallows, make s'mores and then close the door and enjoy the view. Just remember to keep a bucket of water and some sand handy and make sure the entire fire is out before you go to bed.

14. Sidewalk/driveway chalk drawing

If you're in a school playground or empty parking lot, you can also draw a race track that the kids can go through on their bikes, skateboard or roller skates. 15. Outdoor movie  
Watching a movie outdoors and under the stars is a great way to spend an evening. Projectors can be borrowed from schools or offices and a large white bed sheet makes for a great screen. Hook the projector up to your laptop and set up a few speakers. Make some popcorn,

bring out the patio chairs and enjoy.

16. Container planting  
If you're a gardener, you already know how much fun it can be but for the rest of us, we don't have the motivation to take it to that level. That's why container plants are great. Check out local garage sales for great deals on different size planters. They may need a coat of paint but as long as they're not broken, they'll work fine. Buy a bag of soil and select a few flowers and even vegetables to grow. Check online or at your local garden center to see what plants grow well in containers in your area. Find a good spot for the containers but if you need to, they can be easily moved somewhere else. Have the kids water it regularly and maybe record how it's growing in a diary. Fruit and vegetable plants are possible so that at the end of the growing season the kids could actually eat what they've grown.

17. Picnic  
A picnic is a rather simple way to have lunch but is much more than just your sandwich in a brown bag. Along with the sandwiches you can have salads, a veggie platter, assorted fruits and all types of drinks. Place the food in a cooler with an ice pack, pack some plates, utensils and cups, bring a blanket to lie on and you're set. You can also bring a plastic table cover to use if you find a picnic table. The secret is to find someplace that has a soft patch of ground that you can enjoy such as a park, the beach or along a trail. Make sure to take all your garbage home and don't leave any food for the animals.

18. Photo essay  
A photo essay is just a fancy way to get kids to take photos with their phones. In the old days we used something called a camera but since smartphones are here, they'll work just fine. Have the kids document a trip or an outing such as a day at the beach or to the zoo. Ask them to take photos of your arrival and the different things they see. When they

arrive home, they can upload the photos to their computer and create a slide show. The older kids may be able to incorporate video and background music as well. Once done, save a copy in a safe place and in a few years, you can remind them of how much fun they had that day.

19. Water slide  
On a hot day, there's nothing like gliding across your lawn on your own personal water slide. Sheets of plastic are available at your local hardware store and try to find a safe place to lay it down, preferably with a bit of a slope and no rocks. 20. Hanging out  
Why not play a board game outside, read a book together or just sit and talk with the kids. The young ones might get bored but the older ones may just enjoy spending time with you and that's what we are all about. Make it spontaneous. Find a shady spot, bring out some toys, games or crafts and spend some time together while the weather is nice. It can result in the type of memories you want your kids to have.

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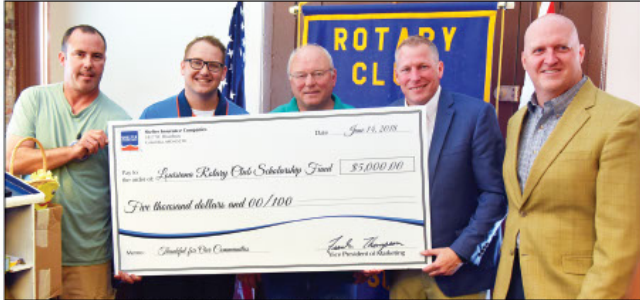

We have a rich supply of well-kept, historic homes built prior to the 1900's. Our nationally registered historic downtown district includes one of the largest collections of Mesker Buildings found anywhere. These are brick structures manufactured and shipped out of the Mesker Company in St. Louis and typified by unique sheet metal facades and often the establishment's name produced in the masonry work of an upper floor. Historic churches, a Carnegie Foundation library and a large cemetery, started before the Civil War and providing fantastic panoramas of the river valley, are also part of the list of things to see when you get the chance to visit.

For outdoors enthusiasts Louisiana is a four seasons destination. The mighty Mississippi offers excellent opportunities all year long. We sit on Pool 24 between the Clarksville and Saverton Locks and Dams. The River behaves more like a lake with current and provides plenty of pools, sandbars and protected holes for both excellent fishing and recreational boating. A boat access downtown or a marina across the bridge will get you into the water. In the winter you can watch dozens of bald eagles sitting on ice floes waiting for a chance to grab a fish. When you've tried everything out on the big river take a run up the Salt River that empties into the Mississippi on the north edge of town.

During migration seasons you might see pelicans hanging out at the mouth of Noix Creek or thousands of ducks and geese stopping over at either the Shanks State Wildlife Area to the north or Cannon National Wildlife Refuge to the south. Snowy owls, trumpeter swans, blue herons, terns, hawks and a host of other feathery specimens call the area home or occasionally drop by. If you want to hunt turkeys or moose mushrooms in the Spring, try the Dupont State Forest next to the Shanks Area. Waterfowl and deer hunting provide good Fall sporting opportunities.

If you're looking for a little exercise take a hike on public land or visit the Lay Center just a couple of miles from the City limits. This retreat owned by St. Louis University has trails that wind through what is essentially an outdoor sculpture park. It's open to the public and free of charge. You'll not find a more peaceful and serene experience than a leisurely walk past unique works

Homemade doughnuts, great catfish, huge tenders, hand patted burgers, daily buffets, fancy pastries, soups, quiches and other more creative dishes are all waiting for you in one of our restaurants when you get out of the hospital and are feeling better... plus a margarita if you're so inclined.

Some of the world's best-known apples, Red and Golden Delicious among others, originated here in Louisiana. Stark Brothers Nursery has been here since the 1800's and is a pioneer in the introduction of fruit varieties. Millions of plants of all kinds are produced right outside of town and shipped throughout the country. If you prefer to pick them out and take them home yourself, you can visit their onsite store. Other businesses have also found this to be a good place to locate, perhaps because we are at the junction of north/south and east/west rail and road connections, plus home to a large terminal.

## NECAC Has Money Available For Summer Energy Assistance

The not-for-profit North East Community Action Corporation (NECAC) has money available to help qualifying clients with summer utility assistance.

The summer portion of the Energy Crisis Intervention Program (ECIP) began June 1. The program pays overdue electricity bills of up to \$300 for income-qualifying households. It is funded by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and is distributed through the Missouri Department of Social Services, which then contracts with NECAC to administer the program in Lewis, Lincoln, Macon, Marion, Monroe, Montgomery, Pike, Ralls, Randolph, St. Charles, Shelby and Warren counties. NECAC has been allocated \$382,130 in ECIP funding, down slightly from \$397,743 last year.

"We are pleased to offer assistance to qualifying families and individuals in need," said NECAC Supervisor Angela Kattenbraker. "We can help a lot of households, and not all of them will need \$300 of assistance. So, we urge people to

give us a call if they need help."

In 2017, assistance was provided to 2,033 households in 12 counties, up from 1,443 in summer 2016. Participants must have received a utility shut-off notice for electric service. If they received assistance from the winter portion of the program through NECAC and did not move, all that will be needed is the shut-off notice. Those who are new to the program, have moved and those who did not participate in the winter portion must fill out additional paperwork.

## Margot Mudd Visits Cryptologic Museum

Former Bowling Green resident, Margot Mudd, 96, visited the National Cryptologic Museum near Baltimore, Md., Monday, June 11.

Mudd worked in Washington, D.C., as a cryptologist during World War II. At the time she was sworn to secrecy, with a fine of \$10,000 and 10 years in prison if she talked about her work.

In 1972 the information was declassified, and last year the book "Code Girls" was published which chronicled the women who worked to break both the German and the Japanese codes.

Mudd was given a personal tour of the museum and thanked for her service to the country. She doesn't use a wheelchair, but the museum thoughtfully provided one so that she didn't need to stand for the entire presentation.

The museum is open to anyone wanting to visit. It's about the use of code from ancient times until the present with an emphasis on wartime usage. She was accompanied by her daughter, Perry and son-in-law, Ernie.

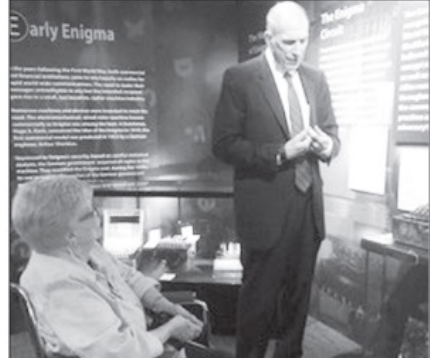
Perry had sent a message to the museum that they would be visiting, and they were very interested in meeting her and giving her a personal tour.

## MPH Clinic Minute

Did you know that June is "Men's Health Month"? This was started in 1994 to increase awareness of men's health issues and preventive screenings. Cardiovascular health is a topic of importance since heart disease is the leading cause of death in men in the United States. Here are some things you should know and ensure all the "men in your life" are taking the proper steps to protect themselves from heart disease:

Heart disease is also called coronary artery disease, cardiovascular disease, and coronary heart disease. It can cause heart failure, chest pain, heart attack, and ischemia (lack of blood flow).

Atherosclerosis is the most common kind of heart disease caused by a buildup of fat plaque which creates narrowing in blood vessels and decreasing blood and oxygen to and from the heart.

Symptoms of blockage can include chest pain, shortness of breath, fatigue and dizziness.

Things you can do to help decrease risks of heart disease include: Eating healthy, staying at a healthy weight, exercising, keeping blood pressure normal, ensuring blood sugars are normal, quit smoking, decreasing cholesterol, try to remove stress and avoid caffeine, fat, salt and alcohol.

Anyone who has symptoms of chest pain, tightness, shortness of breath should be seen by a doctor right away.

Men should have a yearly check up and blood pressure screening at least every year. Your doctor will decide if checking cholesterol is needed and prescribe treatment if needed which can help to prevent heart attacks and death.

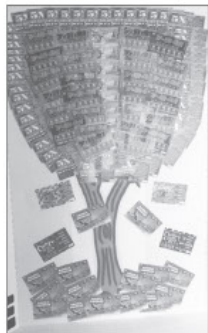

The town planned to celebrate the event "as if it were a royal occasion," said the *Monett Times*. "From every window a flag was flying, streets were gay with bunting and the townspeople vied with each other in making the wedding guests feel welcome."

Well, not everyone. "Outsiders, except prominent Democrats and home-guard Republicans, aren't held very strongly in this (Clark) stronghold, the former being regarded with suspicion and the latter with pity because Pike County always votes straight," offered the *Tacoma Times* of Wash-

ington. One Pike County newspaper said it was glad Genevieve was marrying "a democratic editor — a true American, born in Virginia and self-transplanted to Louisiana." The *Bowling Green Times* said the nation approved of Genevieve's "tender discretion" in choosing Thomson.

Crowds that filled into town were great for local businesses, but created a few problems. Railroad yards had to be filled with additional sleeping cars to accommodate the masses.

"Thousands of visitors are taxing the hospitality of Bowling Green," reported the *Washington Times*. "More are arriving hourly by automobile and railroad and are trampling through the lanes of bunting that form the city's streets. Even the

fence posts on the country roads in the territory near the town are wrapped in red, white and blue."

A few of those who were directly involved in the wedding made it to Pike County with plenty of time to spare, but circumstances and work commitments kept many away until the last minute.

The groom did not arrive until the day before. There was a pre-wedding dance that night. In an era when some newspapers published blatantly racist stories, the *Philadelphia Public Ledger* reported on one African American child who attended.

"There were Virginia reels and square dances, and a little Nigger urchin, whose feet 'jostled' at the squeaky fiddles, was dragged to the centre of the floor, where he 'cut the pigdin wing' and flung his feet to 'Turkey in the Straw,'" the newspaper wrote. "Leaving, he carried a hatful of coins."

Soon after the dance ended came word of what many feared would be a tragedy.

At around midnight, part of the Chicago and Alton train carrying family, members of the wedding party and other guests from Kansas City derailed near Curryville. Four cars left the track.

"Two chair cars prevented the remainder of the train from plunging down an eight-foot embankment," the *Washington Times* told readers.

Without awaking the Speaker, Genevieve's mother and brother gathered reporters and raced to the scene at 2 a.m., fearing there had been fatalities.

At age 56 and 5 feet 9 inches tall, Genevieve Davis Bennett Clark was no slouch. She climbed over two barbed wire fences and waded through a half-mile of what the *Times* called "a miniature sea of muddy water" to reach the wreck.

"Mrs. Clark's cries to her nephews were answered by cheerful greeting and complaints of a delayed dinner," according to the newspaper. "A shake-up was the only result of the thrilling episode."

There were no injuries, and with disaster avoided, weary wedding-goers got into cars and rode back to town for a little shuteye before the ceremony.

The Speaker slept through it all. Next time: At last, vows are spoken.
