

umn memorializes Henderson's life, Nov. 16, 1826-April 12, 1913. John Brooks Henderson was born in Virginia and moved with his family to Lincoln County, Missouri when he was six years old. By age 10, he was an ophan.

Henderson overcume what could have been a life of obscurity to be a Pike County teacher, lawyer, and state legislator. He lived and worked in Louistana, and was the first president of the Bank of Louistana. During the early part of the Civil War, he served as a brigadier general in Missouri's Union militia.

In 1862, Henderson was appointed a U.S. Senator and within six weeks of arriving in Misshington, he began regular meetings with President Abraham Lincoln.


