## Politics Heat Up In Summer Of 1848

Editor's note: Pike County celebrates its bicentennial in 2018. Following is the seventh in a series of monthly articles by Louisiana historian Brent Engel that will examine 200 years of local history.

Too young, too inexperienced and too poor.

Such were the criticisms John Brooks Henderson faced in the summer of 1848—170 years ago—as he and William Penix competed to represent Pike County in the Missouri House of Representatives.

But as the state and the nation would see, the Louisiana lawyer's abilities were profound.

Henderson wouldn't turn 22 until later in the year, but was already past the halfway mark to what was then a life expectancy for men of 37 years.

He had been heavily involved in Democrat Party politics as a township committeeman and a county clerk candidate, and had proven himself an eloquent speaker that crowds could understand.

"A certain portion of the legislative, executive and judicial power is placed in the hands of every man," he said during an Independence Day speech near Eolia in 1847. "Each citizen, to an equal extent, becomes a maker of the laws that are to govern us."

In a February 1847 letter, Henderson said he was flattered and proud that many people had called upon him to run for Pike County Clerk.

He then did something extremely rare among politicians by complimenting his rivals.

"The candidates already on the

field seem to be quite numerous, and in them I am happy to recognize gentlemen of talents and ability, of moral worth and eminent qualifications—gentlemen in a contest with whom success would be doubly brilliant and defeat less base and inglorious," he wrote.

Henderson dropped out before the August election, deferring to what he humorously called the "advanced age and numerous wrinkles" of opponents. One of his mentors, Louisiana attorney Samuel F. Murray, defeated the four remaining contestants.

Fortunes turned during the Pike County Democrat Convention in Bowling Green on May 8, 1848, when Henderson was nominated for state representative. He received 452

## PSC Approves New Liberty Utilities Rates

The Missouri Public Service Commission formally approved Liberty Utilities' request for a rate increase of approximately \$4.6 million on June 7, 2018, effective July 1, 2018, for its Missouri natural gas customers.

Liberty Utilities serves approximately 53,400 customers in 25 Missouri counties. The agreement reflects a reduction in the corporate tax rate from 35% to 21% resulting from the federal Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017.

Under the agreement, Liberty Utilities has consolidated its Northeast and West rate Districts. In addition, Liberty has also added a seasonal summer rate program for the combined district.

For a typical residential customer in the consolidated Northeast/West District, rates with increase by approximately \$5.00 a month.

In the Southeast District, rates will increase by approximately \$4 per month for a typical residential customer.

## MDC Sets CWD Sampling Efforts For Deer Season

The Missouri Conservation Commission recently approved recommendations by the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) for its fall and winter efforts to find cases of chronic wasting disease (CWD) and help limit the spread of the deadly deer disease to more deer and more areas.

MDC confirmed 33 new cases of CWD following the testing of nearly 24,500 free-ranging Missouri deer through its sampling and testing efforts last season. The new cases were found in Adair, Cedar, Franklin, Jefferson, Linn, Macon, Perry, Polk, St. Clair, and Ste. Genevieve counties. These new cases bring the total number of free-ranging deer in Missouri confirmed to have CWD to 75. Learn more at [mdc.mo.gov/cwd](http://mdc.mo.gov/cwd) under "CWD in Missouri."

**NEW COUNTIES ADDED TO CWD MANAGEMENT ZONE**  
Based on the findings from the past season, MDC has added seven new counties to its CWD Management Zone: Bollinger, Cape Girardeau, Grundy, Madison, McDonald, Mercer, and Perry.

These seven new counties join 41 existing counties of the Department's CWD Management Zone. The Zone consists of counties in or near where cases of the disease have been found. Mercer County was added because of the proximity of a CWD-positive deer found in southern Iowa. McDonald County was added because of CWD detection in northwest Arkansas.

The 48 counties are: Adair, Barry, Benton, Bollinger, Boone, Callaway, Cape Girardeau, Carroll, Cedar, Chariton, Cole, Cooper, Crawford, Dade, Franklin, Gasconade, Grundy, Hickory, Jefferson, Knox, Linn, Livingston, Macon, Madison, McDonald, Mercer, Miller, Moniteau, Morgan, Osage, Ozark, Perry, Polk, Putnam, Randolph, Schuyler, Scotland, Shelby, St. Charles, St. Clair, St. Francois, Ste. Genevieve, St. Louis, Stone, Sullivan, Taney, Warren, and Washington.

MDC has increased the availability of antlerless permits in the seven new counties and expanded the firearms antlerless portion to help harvest more deer in the counties and limit the spread of the disease.

MDC has also removed the antler-point restriction for Grundy and Mercer counties, which are included in the Zone.

To help limit the possible spread of CWD, MDC encourages hunters to process deer as close as possible to where harvested and to properly dispose of carcass parts by leaving or burying parts on site, or bagging parts and placing them in trash containers.

**NEW COUNTIES PART OF DEER FEEDING BAN**

The seven new counties added to the CWD Management Zone are also now included in MDC's ban on feeding deer and providing mineral supplements, effective July 1.

According to the Wildlife Code of

Missouri, the placement of grain, salt products, minerals, and other consumable natural and manufactured products used to attract deer is prohibited year-round within counties of the CWD Management Zone. Exceptions are feed placed within 100 feet of any residence or occupied building, feed placed in such a manner to reasonably exclude access by deer, and feed and minerals present solely as a result of normal agricultural or forest management, or crop and wildlife food production practices.

The feeding ban does not apply to food plots or other agricultural practices.

**MANDATORY CWD SAMPLING**

MDC will require hunters who harvest deer in 31 counties of its CWD Management Zone during the opening weekend of firearms deer season, Nov. 10 and 11, to present their deer – or the head with at least six inches of neck attached – for CWD sampling at one of 61 sampling stations throughout the counties.

The 31 counties include those where CWD has previously been detected, those within approximately five miles of a positive, select counties along the Missouri-Arkansas border near where cases of CWD have been found in Arkansas, and the seven counties added to the

CWD Management Zone.

The 31 counties for mandatory sampling are: Adair, Barry, Bollinger, Cape Girardeau, Cedar, Cole, Crawford, Franklin, Grundy, Hickory, Jefferson, Knox, Linn, Macon, Madison, McDonald, Mercer, Moniteau, Ozark, Perry, Polk, Putnam, St. Charles, St. Clair, St. Francois, Ste. Genevieve, Stone, Sullivan, Taney, Warren, and Washington.

MDC asks hunters to field dress and Telecheck their deer before taking them to a CWD sampling station. Hunters can get test results for their CWD-sampled deer online at [mdc.mo.gov/CWDTestResults](http://mdc.mo.gov/CWDTestResults).

"MDC is trying to limit the spread of CWD in Missouri by finding cases and slowing the spread to more deer and more areas," said MDC Cervid Program Supervisor Barbara Keller. "Mandatory sampling is a powerful surveillance tool we use to monitor the levels of CWD in areas known to have the disease, but more importantly, to detect any 'sparks' or new areas of infection so we can begin managing for the disease in those areas without

delay. With 75 confirmed cases of CWD in wild deer since 2012, the disease is still relatively rare in the state and we want to keep it that way."

**VOLUNTARY CWD SAMPLING**

MDC will again offer voluntary CWD sampling for deer harvested in any of the 48 counties of the CWD Management Zone during the entire deer season from Sept. 15 through Jan. 15, 2019. Get more information on MDC's voluntary sampling efforts, including locations, later this summer at [mdc.mo.gov/cwd](http://mdc.mo.gov/cwd) under "Voluntary Sampling."

MDC asks hunters to field dress and Telecheck their deer before taking them to a CWD sampling station. Hunters can get test results for their CWD-sampled deer online at [mdc.mo.gov/CWDTestResults](http://mdc.mo.gov/CWDTestResults).

There have been no cases of CWD infecting people, but the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) strongly recommends having deer tested for CWD if harvested in an area known to have cases of the disease. The CDC also recommends not eating meat from animals that test positive for CWD.

**ADDITIONAL EFFORTS**

MDC will again contact

landowners of five acres or more in areas very near to where multiple infected deer have been found to offer no-cost "CWD Management Seals" to further reduce deer numbers and help limit the spread of the disease.

MDC will again also work with landowners on a voluntary basis to harvest more deer in immediate areas where CWD has been found through post-season targeted culling. These efforts help limit the spread of the disease by removing more infected deer from the areas.

**MORE INFORMATION**

The Missouri Conservation Commission also recently approved several recommendations by MDC for the upcoming deer hunting season.

Growing deer numbers led MDC to allow unlimited archery antlerless permits in Butler, Iron, and Reynolds counties and to include Howell County in the antlerless portion of the fall firearms season.

Lower deer numbers and recent harvest totals led MDC to remove Andrew, Adair, Holt, and Nodaway counties from the antlerless portion of the fall firearms season.

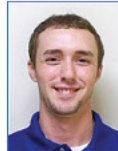

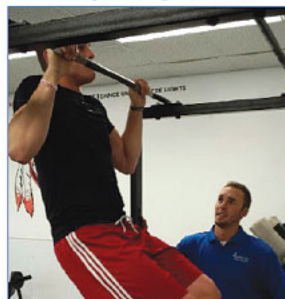

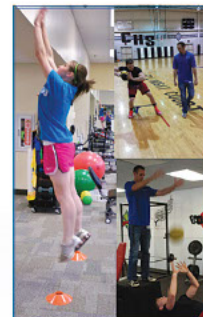

votes to 281 for 31-year-old Bowling Green lawyer A.H. Buckner and 73 ballots for 60-year-old Matthew Givens, who would successfully run for sheriff instead.

At 44, Penix was twice Henderson's age. He, too, was well known, having been appointed a deputy sheriff in 1838 and winning election to the county's top law enforcement job in 1840 and 1842. As with Henderson, he had been born in the South. Unlike Henderson, he was married and had a family.

Penix was the son of a Revolutionary War soldier and came to Pike County as a teenager to farm. He and a brother, John, ran a mill on Sugar Creek and later operated a wool business at Louisiana.

Henderson had support from the Democratic Banner newspaper of Louisiana. Penix was backed by The Seventy-Six, owned by W.F. Watson and B.B. Bonham and formerly known as the Bowling Green Journal.

Among the Seventy-Six's editors in its brief existence were Levi Pettibone, a War of 1812 veteran who would serve in two Pike County offices, and James Broadhead, who went on to a career as a legislator, diplomat and the first president of the American Bar Association.

The Banner said Henderson was "a faithful soldier in the democratic cause" who had "a warm heart, a social disposition, good judgment and an active energy." The newspaper

also addressed the age and financial factors brought up by Whig Party leaders.

"The only sin which they can find in Mr. Henderson is that he is a poor young man, who has been compelled to work his way by the sweat of his own brow, and for this they would endeavor to hunt him down," it said.

The paper theorized that Pike County residents didn't want political offices left solely to the moneyed and the aged.

"What motive have the young and gifted sons of our republic to read and study the history of our political institutions if gray hairs, no matter how stupid the head they cover, are the best qualification for every office?" it asked.

The Banner argued that while Penix was "a gentleman and we would not say one word to his prejudice," it believed Henderson had to be defended from the "unjust and unprovoked attack" by opponents. One letter writer to the paper applauded the candidate for being "the architect of his own fortune."

Henderson made at least 12 campaign stops and eked out a 37-vote victory from almost 1,800 ballots cast. He outpolled Penix in half of what were then eight townships, but his larger margins in Hartford, Indian and Spencer put him over the top.

Among Henderson's first acts in Jefferson City was the introduction of resolutions regarding slavery. It was the first step on a long road to the 13th Amendment, which Henderson drafted and introduced as a U.S. Senator 15 years later.

In 1846, Penix was awarded a government contract to provide beef to three military forts. He began a six-year stint as a Pike County commissioner in 1847 and was appointed a judge in 1862. Pike County voters elected him sheriff again in 1864. Penix died at age 87 on June 23, 1891, and is buried at Fairview Cemetery northwest of Louisiana.

"Probably no man in the county has the confidence and respect of the people more than Judge Penix," according to the 1883 book "The History of Pike County, Missouri."

One of Henderson's last public appearances came on Dec. 18, 1911—a little over a year before his death. Crowds gathered at the Cosmopolitan Baptist Church in Washington to commemorate passage of the 13th Amendment. The Rev. S.P.W. Drew offered praise.

"He declared Mr. Henderson to be one of the greatest statesmen ever produced in the United States," the Washington Times reported.
