The weather was gorgeous for another successful Pike County Fair last week that culminated with the big Lucas Oil Pro Pulling League truck and tractor pull on Saturday night.

Despite a little rain on Saturday afternoon and evening, Fair Board President Tim Gamm noted that the weather couldn't have cooperated better for the week with mild temperatures for fair-goers.

"It was a great week. It looks like most of the numbers are up," he remarked.

Gamm added there was a lot of positive feedback on the Saturday night truck and tractor pull, along with the other many events.

"I think everyone had a good time at the fair this year."

The final numbers on this year's fair will be released after all of the bills are reconciled.

Work will soon be underway on planning next year's event.

Several changes were made at the fairgrounds this year including the addition of a permanent shelter next to the fair building. Folks were able to enjoy dinner outside the food stand without the tents that had been used before.

The small stage was also moved to a permanent shelter where the

Stained Glass Window Restoration Nears Completion At Presbyterian Church

Jacksonville Stained Glass Company is putting the finishing touches on the installation of 56 restored individual stained glass panels in the windows of First Presbyterian Church in Louisiana. The windows were originally installed at the time the church was built in 1890.

Ron Weaver, of the stained glass company, said their goal was to bring the glass in the windows as close to original as possible; but to

add to their strength and durability with modern restoration methods now available.

The windows have many jewels (small round glass pieces of jewel colors) and roundels (larger round glass pieces). Seventeen of the roundels had to be replaced, with each one hand cut after glass to match was found. He estimated the window's new life expectancy at 150 years. The company guarantees

their work on the windows against defects in workmanship for a period of 10 years.

The two large center windows on the north side of the sanctuary were given as a memorial to William (1880) and Emma Pharr Stark (1881) and the two large ones on the south side are in memory of Mary G. Fritz and John L. Fritz and John and Philomena Wyland.

How much will a membership cost?

Listed below are the MONTHLY membership rates.

Family - \$38 (Includes IRS allowable dependents/college students through 23)

Adult - \$29 (Individual 19-59 years of age)

Senior - \$25 (60 and over)

Senior Couple - \$30

Youth - \$15 (13-18 years of age)

In addition to the monthly membership fees, there will be a one-time joining fee of \$50. The one-time joining fee helps with a variety of things for the YMCA, but its main purpose is to build a fund for exercise equipment maintenance or replacement.

Are YMCA's only for younger generations? What will be offered for Seniors?

YMCA's offer programs for all ages. Specifically for seniors there are low impact fitness classes and chair classes. These classes are designed to help keep individuals ac-

tive, but are not as strenuous as other classes that are offered. Low impact fitness and chair classes focus on range of motion, building endurance, flexibility, and balance. Classes are led by certified instructors that create an enjoyable environment and adjust to the needs of the class participants.

From the Mayor's Desk...

One of the largest challenges in the inner workings of any City is getting to the right person to obtain accurate information on the subject at hand. The objective in making a decision and moving toward positive progress will result if sharing, debating, and securing a better understanding of the needs of the issue is part of the process.

When attitudes, feelings and beliefs of negativity are harbored, there is little opportunity for healthy and successful forward movement. "I don't like the city because they once did something I opposed."

"I don't like how the city doesn't attend to its responsibilities."

"I will not support the city because they never solve problems."

"I do not like the city employees, they are paid too much, they spend too much time drinking around or drinking coffee, visiting with folks etc." Have you ever heard any of these sentiments expressed?

If the person(s) expressing such strongly held positions were to become engaged in the process of decision making for a municipality, their attitudes would likely change and their perception of municipal government would surely become more realistic. The change which has occurred in laws and citizen expectations of yesterday, to the more demanding and fast-paced living of today, is dramatic. The financial obligations and responsibilities

of municipal government continue to rise and the income does not match the trend.

"The water bills are too high. The water is not safe. We should be using water from the Mississippi River. We should be using county water. The water does not taste good."

Again, these comments and many similar ones enter conversations daily. It seems difficult to communicate that we live and operate in a more strict regulatory environment than even 10 years ago and with those regulations upon us, the financial demands are enormous in comparison.

The absolutely amazing result of working with citizens who volunteer to participate in one or more of the city committees is that these persons gain understanding and appreciation for the city and municipal government beyond their expectation. This new-found or up-dated perception of city government yields major benefits. While sharing the load of a committee responsibility they become advocates for the needs of the city and a strong supporter of doing what is in the best interest of all the citizens of Clarksville.

Clarksville continues to be fortunate in having residents who are willing to give of their time and effort in several of the city committees. There are always vacancies to be filled and there is a place for YOU awaiting your nod.

The YMCA 21st Community Learning Centers provide a safe, educational environment for students in grades K-6 during out of school hours (K-8 at BONCL site).

The programs offer homework help, a healthy snack, a wide array of activities that focus on educational achievement, lifestyle enrichment and healthy active life-style choices. Activities include physical exercise, health and nutrition education, STEM (science, technology, engineering, math), reading/language arts, math, computers, arts and crafts, character education, multicultural education, college and career readiness and service learning activities. Additional enrichment classes are funded by the Lay Family Foundation.

At sites where before school programs are available, the weekly fee includes both morning and afternoon program time. Once a child is enrolled, fees are charged for a monthly slot. The live cells that make up breast milk are the essential building blocks for a thriving child. Breastfed babies have lower risks of ear infections, colds, flu, stomach issues, SIDS, diabetes, and some cancers. Women who breastfeed have a lower risk of high blood pressure, high cholesterol, heart disease, and type 2 diabetes. The benefits of breastfeeding can be seen in our community and world-wide.

The World Alliance for Breastfeeding Action (WABA) states, "Optimal breastfeeding helps prevent malnutrition in all its forms with positive lifelong effects on both children and mothers. Breastfeeding is a climate-smart decision that helps ensure food security even in times of crisis. Breastfeeding improves the health and wellbeing of women and children and is the foundation of a country's development and future. It is the great equalizer that can help break the cycle of poverty. Protecting, promoting and supporting breastfeeding is crucial for the health of our planet and its people."

It is essential that we encourage and normalize breastfeeding! The Pike County Health Department is proud to be part of the global solution through education, support, and celebration and we encourage the whole community to join us.

1. Education: A monthly breastfeeding class is offered for expecting moms and their support systems. One-on-one counseling is also available through our Breastfeeding Peer Counselor program. It's important for families to know normal baby behavior and what a day in the life of breastfeeding looks like. Knowledge of health benefits, proper latch, and other breastfeeding basics gives new families a solid foundation to their breastfeeding journey. Babies are born to breastfeed.

2. Support: Breastfeeding Support Group is held the first Monday of every month at the Health Department. Weekly groups are offered at the surrounding area hospitals. Along with mother-to-mother support, support from family and friends is very important. This includes words of encouragement, helping mom with household chores, and caring for baby with non-feeding duties like holding and diaper changing. Even with the best intention, questioning mom's milk supply or encouraging bottle feeding can undermine her confidence and long-term success. Prompting a visit with a skilled Lactation Consultant is the best way to help if you have a concern. Workplace support includes the proper time and space to pump or nurse at the job site.

3. Celebration: At the Pike County Health Department we celebrate every woman's breastfeeding journey, whether it is 3 days or 3 years. Every drop of breast milk is a gift of health. Mothers face a multitude of challenges and sometimes need a pat on the back, a "Good Job!" or just a supportive smile when they are making the best choices for their family.

To celebrate the breastfeeding mothers of Pike County, the Health Department's Women, Infant, and Children program is hosting a Breastfeeding Awareness Walk at the Bowling Green City Park on Monday August 6th at 10:00 a.m. We will meet at the pavilion by the concession stand. There will be a walk around the park so moms are encouraged to bring their strollers or carriers. Pregnant women, breastfeeding moms, and anyone with support are welcome to attend this free event. 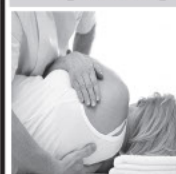

NECAC Seeks Nominations For Two Board Positions From Pike County

The LIR candidate must be a resident of Pike County and be nominated by a low-income resident of the county or a service organization or group that serves the interest and needs of the low-income in the county. LIR candidates need not be low-income persons themselves.

The NECAC Board is a tri-parity membership represented by three members from each county in the service area; one CIR, one LIR and one Public Elected Official (PEO).

The nomination period will be open for 30 days, beginning on Aug. 14 and closing on Sept. 14. The election will be held on Sept. 25 by the NECAC Board of Directors, with installation and term of office beginning on Oct. 23.

Nominations must be made on authorized forms that are available at the NECAC Pike County Service Center, 805 Business Highway 61 in Bowling Green. A biographical questionnaire provided by NECAC must be completed on a personal letter.

sumes will be required from all candidates.

The NECAC Board meets on the fourth Tuesday at 7 p.m. during the months of January, March, May, July, September, October and November at the agency's Central Administration Executive Office Building in Bowling Green. A complimentary meal is provided to board members before each meeting and a travel reimbursement of 51 cents per mile to and from each meeting is allowed. Meetings usually are completed by 9 p.m.

NECAC is one of 19 not-for-profit Community Action Agencies in Missouri and more than 1,000 across the United States. Marion County Presiding Commissioner Lyndon Bode of Palmyra is the current Chairman of the Board and Don Patrick of Louisiana is the agency's President and Chief Executive Officer.

Dept. Of Health, Senior Services Encourages People To Make Tick Bite Prevention A Summer Routine

To date in 2018, the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) has recorded 344 cases of spotted fever rickettsiosis, including Rocky Mountain spotted fever, 208 cases of ehrlichiosis, seven cases of Lyme disease, 11 cases of tularemia and one case of Heartland virus. There have been no recorded cases of acute Bourbon virus. Overall, 2018 tick-borne illness case counts are slightly behind 2017 reported cases.

"Missouri is a beautiful state, home to gorgeous parks, fantastic hiking trails, national forest lands, pretty lakes, and unfortunately ticks," said Dr. Randall Williams, DHSS Director. "Symptoms of tick-borne diseases typically begin within two weeks of a bite by an infected tick and for most people include a sudden fever, body aches and headache. Symptoms are often flu-like. If you find an attached tick, remove it promptly. The longer it is attached the greater the risk of infection."

To remove ticks:

- Using tweezers, grasp tick near its mouth and as close to your skin as possible.
- Pull tick firmly, straight out, away from skin. Do not jerk or twist the tick.
- Do NOT use alcohol, matches, liquid soap or petroleum jelly to remove a tick.
- Wash your hands and the bite site with soap and water after the tick is removed. Apply an antiseptic to the bite site.

In 1804, Lewis and Clark even made note in their journals about Missouri's ticks and mosquitoes. Back then, they didn't have the same awareness of the dangers of tick bites as we do today. Today we know tick bites can transmit disease which is why DHSS continues to collaborate with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) regarding ticks and the diseases they carry, including emerging diseases such as Heartland and Bourbon viruses. As was published this past Wednesday, July 25, in the New England Journal of Medicine, (Tick-borne Diseases - Confronting a Growing Threat) "The burden of tick-borne diseases seems likely to continue to grow substantially."

Ticks may be small pests but their bite can have big consequences. DHSS was notified by the CDC that final results for a recent possible case of Bourbon virus were not indicative of acute Bourbon virus infection. Test results indicated that the individual most likely had ehrlichiosis. It is important to note that

scientists and researchers are still learning how Bourbon virus affects the body and how the body responds to exposure. Due to test results, it is possible this individual had a prior infection due to Bourbon virus.

"As with any emerging illness, we still have a lot to learn about Bourbon virus," said Williams. Missouri continues to monitor tick-borne diseases and request testing through the CDC for emerging diseases such as Heartland virus and Bourbon virus when indicated. Acute Bourbon virus illness has been detected in two Missourians. Since its discovery, Bourbon virus has also been detected in tick populations in Missouri. Ongoing statewide collaborations between DHSS and the CDC, including additional testing this summer, indicate that statewide, five others in Missouri may have been infected with Bourbon virus, but to our knowledge, the infection was not associated with a known illness. Like other tick-borne diseases, not everyone who is bitten by a tick gets infected or gets sick.

"We are able to provide this number at this time because additional testing of this emerging disease has now been conducted on individuals throughout the state, including this summer, providing us and our partners at the CDC confidence that both privacy requirements and public health objectives are met," said Williams. "With such a new virus, we just don't know how prevalent the disease is in Missouri or the United States. We do know that Bourbon virus and Heartland virus are present in Missouri ticks, which is why tick bite prevention is so important. We anticipate as the tick season continues, we will continue to test for Bourbon and Heartland viruses."

In addition to collaborating on testing, DHSS is working with the CDC to better understand the burden of tick-borne illness in Missouri and the United States. DHSS and the CDC will be partnering to conduct enhanced surveillance for rickettsial diseases (spotted fever group), to identify hot spots for ehrlichiosis, and to improve diagnostic testing.

DHSS and the CDC also plan to conduct additional surveillance of ticks in Missouri in the near future and will be releasing findings regarding the predicted prevalence of Heartland virus in Northwest Missouri and other vector-borne diseases in animals. The tick-borne disease expertise of DHSS staff in Missouri make Missouri an ideal partner for collaborations with the

CDC on these issues.

Missouri has also prepared and distributed health guidance for medical professionals regarding tick-borne illness in Missouri. The health guidance includes information regarding the number of tick-borne illnesses in Missouri, common symptoms to look for, and information regarding testing and diagnosis. Preventing tick bites and reducing your risk of tick-borne infections such as Bourbon and Heartland viruses, Rocky Mountain spotted fever, ehrlichiosis, tularemia, and Lyme or other tick-borne diseases. Everyone can more safely enjoy the outdoors, whether at home or traveling, by using the following precautions to avoid tick bites.

Take two minutes to apply an insect repellent with a minimum of 20 percent DEET, picaridin, or IR3535 on exposed skin and clothing. Choose a product that lasts several hours whenever you spend time outdoors. DEET products should not be used on infants under two months of age.

When possible, wear protective clothing (light colored, long sleeved shirts and pants) when outdoors to keep ticks off skin.

Avoid tick infested areas including brushy areas, tall grasses, wood piles and leaf litter. When hiking, stay near the center of trails to avoid ticks.

Reduce ticks around your home by keeping lawns mowed short, shrubs and trees trimmed, and remove leaf litter, wood piles, fallen branches, trash and debris from yards.

People with pets should talk with their veterinarian about use of tick prevention treatments and should regularly check pets for ticks.

Take two more minutes to check for ticks while outdoors and again after returning from the outdoors. If possible, change clothes and shower soon after spending time outdoors.

When possible, wear light-colored, long-sleeved shirts and pants. Always check yourself, family, and friends for ticks after spending time outdoors.

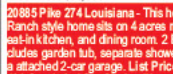

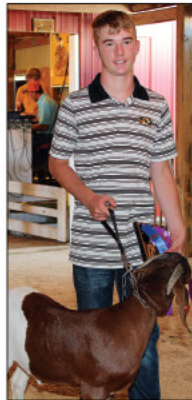
