Brick Plant Mark 100 Years Of Business In Vandalia

The year marks the 100th anniversary for operation of the brick plant in Vandalia.

The business is now owned by Harbison-Walker International but started as the Walsh Fire Clay Products Company with the first bricks being produced in July of 1918.

The company's current plant manager, T.J. Clay, noted the kilns at the operation still run 24-hours a day and seven days a week. Shipping and other work is done over three shifts five days a week. Clay noted the plant can move up to 2,500 metric tons of product a month.

At one time the brick plant was recognized as the largest of its kind in the nation.

According to the "Vandalia Area Centennial" history book, the Mississippi Glass fireclay operation was reorganized in 1915 as the Walk Fire Clay Products Company, Inc.

"Plans were carefully made and two years later construction was underway about a mile south of the old Salamander for the biggest brick plant in the world at that time."

Charles G. Daniel and John C. Parrish helped arrange the deal to purchase the land necessary to construct the sprawling plant.

"The Chicago and Alton Railroad Company had to be convinced that building a spur to the plant would be worthwhile. Dr. Parrish, a railroad physician, made a trip to Chicago to convince them; and the spur was built."

Rotary Club Joins Forces With Other Groups To Complete Pavilion Project At Sunset Park BBQ To Raise Funds Set For Sept. 28

The pavilion at Sunset Park may be rebuilt sooner than initially expected.

The Louisiana Rotary Club board of directors voted unanimously to partner with the City of Louisiana and take the lead on moving the project along. The goal is to raise the funds needed to rebuild bigger and better and to have it completed to end the Bicentennial year with a dedication in the new structure.

Preliminary plans drawn by Rotarian and draftsman Darryle Wallace of White Horse Drafting have been approved by City Superintendent Kelly Henderson and are currently being used to develop a materials list.

A tentative budget of \$25,000 has been devised by the board. The Louisiana Trimble Fund made a pledge of \$1,000 which turned into a challenge that has already been met by a couple of individuals and entities.

Rotary intends to fund at least \$5,000 of the project and their annual barbeque being held on Sept. 28 will be the kick off for that effort.

The date was chosen because it is National "Good Neighbor Day." Community members are encouraged to be "good neighbors" by ordering from the Rotary Club that day to support the fundraising effort and help get the new pavilion built.

Greenwood Cemetery To Host Annual Breakfast

Saturday, Sept. 22, 2018, Greenwood Cemetery will have the annual fall breakfast at the American Legion hall in Clarksville.

Grilled sausage, scrambled eggs, biscuits, gravy, fried apples with coffee and orange juice will be served from 7-9:30 a.m. These breakfast fundraisers help to offset the yearly maintenance expenses and this year the funds will be directed to supplement the unusual costs after the summer storms.

Two storms came through and did a substantial amount of damage to the trees that have been a part of the landscape for over 100 years. Many of the trees that were severely decayed and hollow were planted in the late 1890's and they created most of problems. We had no choice but to remove what was left of some and

to extensively trim back others.

The City of Clarksville, Roger Dowell, and Kelly Skaggs Tree Service did a tremendous job in getting the cemetery back in order. The volunteer cemetery board appreciates the continued support from our generous community and hopes to see you for breakfast.

Every year we honor some of our military veterans who are buried in Greenwood and this year we are honoring Mark Hipes. Rex and Martha Hipes are two of our board members and they share the story and history of their military family.

Mark R. Hipes, Sr., the youngest of 6 children, was born Sept. 15, 1915 in Ste. Genevieve, Missouri. After high school, he worked on the Ste. Genevieve Droge. In October 1935 he was joined in marriage to

Dorothy LeGrande. To this union 4 children were born, Betty Hipes Lemmon, Mark R. Jr., John Hipes, and Sherry Hipes Epperson.

Early in 1945 Mark was drafted into the U.S. Army. While serving as tank mechanic for the 9th Armored Tank Division, stationed at Fort Knox, Kentucky, he earned the status Submachine Gun Expert.

During his lifetime, Mark instilled in his children the love of country and dedication to serve. His oldest son Mark Jr. (Rex) was drafted October 1965. Achieving the rank of Army Spec E4, Rex served as a Penning Missile Crewman while stationed in Neckarsulm, Germany. As his father was a Machine Gun Expert, Rex was awarded the designation Expert Rifleman for his sharp shooting ability.

Free Prostate Cancer Screenings Offered At James E. Cary Cancer Center In Hannibal

Free prostate cancer screenings will be available from 6-8 p.m., Monday, Sept. 24 and Wednesday, Sept. 26 at the James E. Cary Cancer Center in Hannibal.

Space is limited and an appointment is required. To schedule your appointment call 573-406-1641. "Prostate cancer really has no symptoms in its early stages of development," says Dr. Cockrell, Urologist with Hannibal Regional Medical Group. "Most men who have prostate cancer may not even know it, which is why regular screenings are so important." The screening will include both a digital rectal examination and a prostate specific antigen (PSA) blood test. The two tests together can often detect cancer before it becomes symptomatic.

Leading to earlier treatments and better outcomes. The free screenings are provided by medical professionals from James E. Cary Cancer Center, Hannibal Regional Medical Group and Hannibal Clinic.

Dr. Cockrell says there are some symptoms which should raise a red flag for any man. These symptoms, which may also appear with benign enlargement of the prostate, may be experienced as prostate cancer progresses. Symptoms include: difficulty starting urination; a need to urinate frequently, especially at night; inability to urinate; weak or interrupted flow of urine (dribbling); painful or burning urination; painful ejaculation; blood in urine or semen; and frequent pain or stiffness in the back, hips, or upper thighs.

Screenings are not just for men who may have symptoms of prostate cancer. Since all men are at risk for prostate cancer, physicians suggest all men over the age of 55 be screened every year for the disease. It is also recommended that all men who are at a higher risk for prostate cancer, like African American men and men who have a family history of prostate cancer, be screened annually beginning at age 40.

Screenings are the only way to catch prostate cancer before it becomes dangerous to you or your loved one. If you are between the ages of 45 - 75, a prostate cancer screening may be right for you. Call 573-406-1641 to see if you are eligible for a free prostate cancer screening.

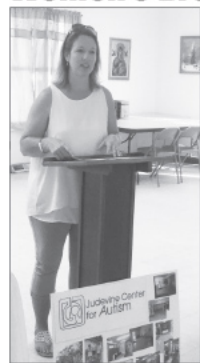
essay contest for grades six-eight and the Voice of Democracy contest for high school students.

Nationwide Wireless Emergency Alert Test Set For Sept. 20

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) in coordination with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), will conduct a nationwide combined test of the Wireless Emergency Alert (WEA) and Emergency Alert System (EAS) on Sept. 20, 2018. As one of several participating national wireless carriers in this test, U.S. Cellular wants to ensure that everyone is aware of the test and knows that there is no action needed and no imminent danger since this is only a test.

At 1:18 p.m. CST on Sept. 20, FEMA will begin sending a WEA test message to WEA-capable wire-

less devices, and most handsets will receive the alert within a few minutes. The test message will state: "THIS IS A TEST of the National Wireless Emergency Alert System. No action is needed." The alert will have a special tone and vibration that will repeat twice. There is no charge to receive the message.

"Our participation in this test will provide valuable information on the effectiveness and reliability of the emergency alert system and wireless emergency alerts," said Nakota Stewart, director of sales for U.S. Cellular in Missouri. "We encourage everyone to have their wireless phones turned on and available at the time of the test so they know

what to expect in a real emergency."

There are three categories of alerts sent through WEA: imminent threat alerts about emergencies including extreme weather, AMBER alerts, and Presidential alerts about emergencies of national consequence. Users may opt out of imminent threat and AMBER alerts but cannot opt out of receiving Presidential alerts.

This will be the first national WEA test. In the event that the test is not able to be conducted on Sept. 20, the back-up date is Oct. 3. More information is available at <https://www.fema.gov/emergency-alert-test>.

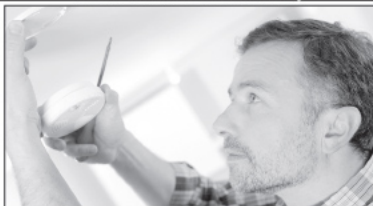

Cuivre River Electric Participates In AMEC Lineman's Rodeo In Jefferson City

Four Cuivre River Electric Cooperative (CREC) employees participated in the Association of Missouri Electric Cooperatives (AMEC) Second Annual Lineman's Rodeo Aug. 28-29 at the association's headquarters in Jefferson City.

CREC linemen Bryce Menne, Jonathan Pauk and Jared Lewis competed in individual and team events, while Operations Supervisor Marvin Pease served as one of the judges for the rodeo. This year's competition was the first time that CREC participated. CREC's team placed seventh in the overall team competition. Jonathan Pauk had the ninth highest score in the individual apprentice division.

"We had the opportunity to meet and network with other co-ops, as well as see new tools of the trade and talk with others about safety and best practices," Lewis said. Pauk commented that the rodeo was very well done. "The competition was enjoyable," he said, "and a good morale booster." Menne said he learned a great deal in participating and meeting other linemen. "There's a lot of talented guys in the state," he said.

The event — designed to let linemen show off the skills they use on the job — also raised funds for future projects that send Missouri linemen to developing nations to help power lines for people living without the benefits of electricity.

Gov. Mike Parson visited the event Wednesday morning and spoke with the linemen on the importance of their work abroad. "It truly does make a difference," said Gov. Parson, who is a member of Southwest Electric Cooperative. "When you hear those stories, it makes you proud to know that we are doing things for a higher cause

than just those of us back home. We're trying to help other people across the country who don't have the utilities that we take for granted every day."

The governor also commented on workforce development, an initiative he plans to make central to his administration. He told the linemen there is a critical need for more workers to fill a growing number of technical jobs in Missouri.

The two-day event consists of team and individual competitions in the apprentice and journeyman divisions. Some of the challenges include the Hurt-Man Rescue and Modified Pole Climb. Linemen were also faced with a 100-question knowledge test and mystery events they had little time to prepare for, such as changing out transformer arresters. Competitors are judged on how safely they complete each challenge. Individual times are only used in the case of a tiebreaker.

"Safety is always the first concern for co-op crews when they head out to work," said AMEC's Craig Moeller, who organized the event and also leads Missouri's International Program. "The Lineman's Rodeo is a great opportunity for them to practice the challenges they face every day and reinforce the training they need to get home safely."

The AMEC Lineman's Rodeo is a fundraiser for international electrification projects sponsored by Missouri's electric cooperatives and the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association. Over the last three years, lineworkers from Missouri's electric co-ops have traveled to developing areas in Bolivia to help rural communities see their lights turn on for the first time. Visit www.facebook.com/MissouriElectricCoops for more information about the trips.

Eleven teams and a total of 43 linemen from eight cooperatives in Missouri took part in the safety, skills and knowledge competition. They braved brutally hot temperatures Tuesday afternoon and dealt with wet weather Wednesday morning, similar to their real-life work environments.

"The rodeo was a great way to bring attention not only to local co-ops, but to the international program," Pauk said.

Leaves of Threes, Let It Be: Do Not Let Poison Ivy Ruin Your Fall Hike.

Three poison ivy, poison oak, and poison sumac all contain the oil urushiol, which is extremely allergic. Annually, an estimated 25 to 40 million Americans require medical treatment after exposure. Poison oak and poison sumac are rare in Missouri, but poison ivy is common. The best way to avoid the itchy rash which occurs after exposure is to avoid the plants which cause it.

The old saying, "leaves of three, let it be," are accurate, but these leaves can come in several different shapes, even on the same plant. You are safe if the plant has three-lobed leaves and its relatives do not, however, poison ivy may come from three-lobed, small green berries.

Another sneaky feature of the species that can fool people by: Poison ivy plants can grow in many shapes and sizes. When mature vines climb up a tree, their shape can mimic that of the host tree. Just simply pulling aside an ivy-covered branch could make you pay a few days later when the rash begins to show. In cities and towns, poison ivy tends to grow as a climbing vine, but in the woods, most of the plants are ground-creeping vines. For some unknown reason, poison ivy is much more common on "hardwoods" modified by humans than in the middle of the woods.

If you think you have come in contact with a plant, or unfortunately know you have, follow these tips to avoid (hopefully) the consequences. Of course, prevention is the best plan. If you know you are going to be around poison ivy, wear long trousers and gloves, avoid touching exposed skin with your gloved hands. Wear disposable coveralls and gloves, or wash all clothes immediately in hot water (or cold oil can hang around on clothes, shoes, shoes, etc. for a long time).

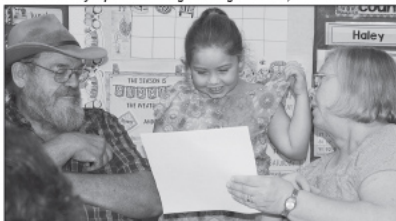
- If you once suspect you may have brushed up against a plant, wash with soap and warm water as soon as possible. This tends to reduce an outbreak for most people.
- To confirm you touched poison ivy, you can try what is known as "the black dot test" – but be careful! With gloved hands, tear the leaf in half and put the top half on a piece of white paper. If the leaf is poison ivy, the uncut half will turn black in about 30 minutes. This is the reason black dots occasionally appear on stems of the plants.
- Be on the look out for a steadily red rash in the first days after you may have been exposed, especially if you have had a reaction to the plant in the past. For those who have had no, or few outbreaks in the past, the rash could take up to a week to develop. Repeat cases can start breaking out in a day or so. Rashes from touching immunity, multiple exposures can make someone more sensitive, putting the immune system to produce a more robust response.
- When a rash appears, try to scratch it with an over-the-counter corticosteroid cream.
- If the rash gets really bad, or if it involves the face or genitals, seek medical attention.
- Steroids are the only thing medicine has to offer at this time for a poison ivy rash, and they do not always solve the whole problem.
- If your dog comes along with you for the hike that exposed you to poison ivy, do not worry – dogs are not allergic. But, clean for the dog the oil and transfer it to their owner, so be careful and cautious about petting your dog if you think he or she may have come in contact with poison ivy.

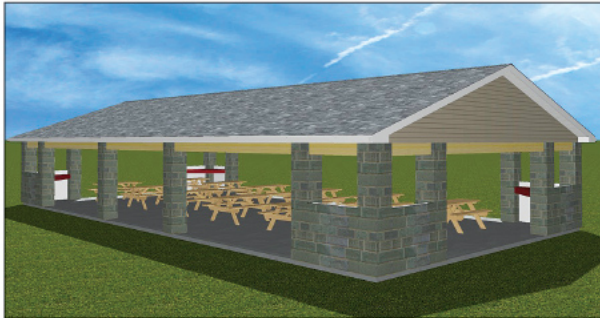

It's noted the nation became involved in World War I in 1917 so recruiting labor was difficult in addition to the labor turnover and increasing thievery. Eventually admission to the plant had to be controlled with a chain-link fence.

"Despite difficulties, the plant was finished and the first brick came out of the kiln in July 1918, W. H. Schewe was plant superintendent. He was followed by C. C. Hardy."

The Walsh Fire Clay Products Company was in operation for nine years. During that time much of the products used at the operation were locally-sourced. Another history book points out that clay from mines in Vandalia were determined to be equal to, if not better, than most veins in the country.

The plant even had houses built in that area of town that were designed for those who worked at the plant. The community even had its own store, which remains standing today, along with many of the old homes.

"In 1927 the plant was transferred to Harbison-Walker Refractories Company, which was expanding out of its Pittsburgh area into the Midwest. By early 1928 all the properties of Walsh Fire Clay Products Company, including the workers' house, had been sold privately or turned over to Harbison-Walker. Many established employees remained, and the Walsh name remained on the brick."

According to "Vandalia, Missouri - Queen of the Prairie" history book, the acquisition was regarded as the anchor to the future expansion of Vandalia's leading industry and its success in the industry and for the community is still being realized today.

"Harbison-Walker's 1927 investment led the way for the other brick

plants to later be built in the Vandalia area, including the North Missouri Fire Brick Company (C&F), located between Vandalia and Farber, along with the brick plant located in Farber (NARCO)."

The plant has employed hundreds and hundreds of people throughout the area over the years.

John Hodde has been with the plant for 45 years and continues to work maintenance for the company. He noted that a lot has changed over the years including the materials that are used. He pointed out that some materials are still local, but that materials from other parts of the world are also shipped to the plant for final production.

Hodde pointed out the plant makes some of the best materials available. He is eligible to retire, but continues to work full-time.

"It's good. It's an enjoyable place to work," he remarked.

He added the company has been a good citizen of the area over the years as well and continues to employ a great deal of people locally.

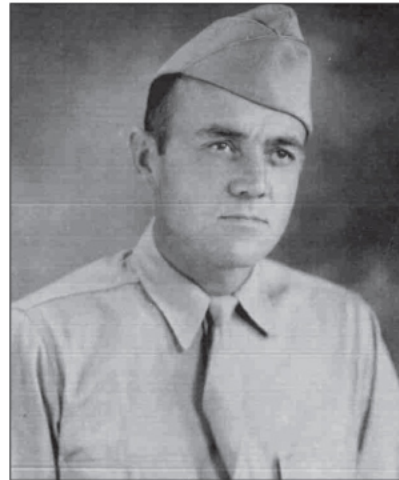
For this service he earned the National Defense Medal. He was discharged on Sept. 28, 1967.
