

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

With fall firearms turkey season and archery season underway, the Missouin Department of Conservation (MDC) advises hunters it could be a challenging season.

"Although the woods tend to get a bit busier towards the end of October with the deer nut approaching, hunting pressure is relatively light during early-to-mid-October, even on public lands," said lashelle. Hunting hours for the fall freams turkey season, Oct. 1-31, are from one-half hour before sunsieto to sunset. Fall archery turkey hunting runs from Sept. 15 to Nov. 9 and resumes Nov. 21 to Jan. 15. Shooting hours for the archery season are one-half hour before sunsiet to one-half hour after sunset. Both seasons have a limit of two turkeys of either sex.
