 Vandalia City Administrator Darren Berry noted that while the town has lost a few businesses in the past several months, there are also positive things happening as well including construction of a new Dollar General store. Dollar General has been operating out of a building on Highway 54 for more than 20 years. The business moved there after IGA moved to the business plaza where it currently resides. Prior to that, Dollar General was located downtown in a building that was subsequently taken over by Water's Furniture. The company closed on the property where the cinema is located on Monday, Oct. 22. That property is owned by Michael and Audra Evans. The school districts of the first, second and third place winners of the contest will receive incredible prize packages. Voting started a few weeks ago and Chance has been at the top and led the way in votes many times. The public is encouraged to vote daily online at www.themostvaluablecoach.com. Nominations for the contest started on Aug. 21 and the field was narrowed to the top 50 on Sept. 10. The top 15 were identified on Oct. 8. Voting will continue until Nov. 13. Winners will be announced on Nov. 20 following a review by the judges. A rally was held in Chance's honor last week on Tuesday, Oct. 9. Van-Far District Votes To Participate In 'MoBeef for MoKids' Program

Fewer and fewer beef meals are being served in schools across America, which means children are missing out on the protein power and nutritional benefits of beef. The Van-Far School Board voted Thursday, Oct. 18 to participate in the MoBeef for MoKids Program for the 2018-19 school year. With nearly 50 percent of the recommend daily value for protein, and more than 10 percent of 10 essential nutrients in a three-ounce serving, beef is a nutritional powerhouse. The Missouri Department of Agriculture is spearheading an initiative to get more beef in schools across the state, with the support of local beef producers, meat processors, Opasa Food Management, and the Missouri Beef Industry Council. The program will kick off in November at Van-Far with Tony Dameron providing the first of four cows the district has requested for the school year. There are only six other school districts participating in MoBeef for MoKids. **See PROGRAM on page 17**

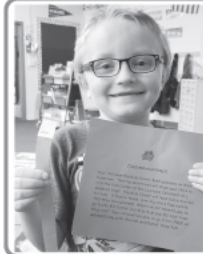

Twin Pike Family YMCA Holds Renew, Refresh, Revitalize Campaign

The Twin Pike Family YMCA's Renew, Refresh, Revitalize Facility Maintenance Campaign has been underway since the beginning of this year. Like most YMCA programs, this one depends on volunteers to help make it happen. Long-time Y member, Jody Fisher has stepped up to assist in the fundraising efforts.

The YMCA has held several activities during the past year to raise money towards the \$365,000 fundraising goal. Jody Fisher solicited area businesses and community members on behalf of the Y and raised over \$2,260 as part of the Zumba Rally and PiYo Pledge events.

Fisher raised 20 percent (\$960) of the total amount. A second event, the PiYo Pledge was held on August 18th, and was led by PiYo certified instructors, Karma Gow and Tina Shade. The event raised \$1,600 and Fisher raised \$1,300 of the total amount! Jody's hard work raised \$2,260 toward the Y's total fundraising goal.

When talking with Jody, she commented "I've seen the YMCA change people's lives. I know, because I am one of them!" The YMCA Board of Directors and staff cannot thank Jody enough for all her

hard work in helping to raise money for the campaign. The YMCA volunteers and staff have raised almost 33% of the total goal.

YMCA Board President, Mary Perkins shares that "All homes need on-going maintenance to sustain them. The YMCA is 'home' for so many in the Twin Pike communities, and it needs on-going maintenance in order to continue serving the area." Maintenance projects included under this campaign are updating fitness equipment in the

Fitness Center, roof repairs, parking lot repairs, adding a stainless steel changing table in the Family Changing Room to accommodate adults with support needs, child safety improvements in Child Watch Room, and LED energy-efficient lighting throughout the facility.

As part of the fundraising efforts, the YMCA has been awarded \$116,300 in 50% tax credits from the Missouri Department of Economic Development. This tax credit program is a chance for individuals and local businesses that have certain types of Missouri state tax liabilities to redirect their state tax dollars towards programs and services they deem valuable. Bobcats Take Down Van-Far At Home

Area Football Teams Gear Up For District Games

Bowling Green secured a home game to open district football by downing rival Van-Far 52-30 in the final regular season football game on Friday.

The Bobcats pulled ahead quickly even though Van-Far had the ball first. Early on in the Indians' first offensive series the Bobcat's Tony Garland fumbled at the end of a run and the ball was recovered by Clay Lazear. Two plays after the turnover Austin Callahan maneuvered past the Van-Far defense for a 37-yard touchdown. George Nimeyer added the point after and the Bobcats led 7-0.

The advantage was cut to a single point less than a minute later when Indians quarterback, Eric Hombs shook loose for a 32-yard score. Van-Far tried for a two-point conversion, but couldn't break the goal line and still trailed by one.

The Indians would take the lead before the end of the quarter after forcing a Bowling Green punt.

On the first play of the subsequent drive it was Verdell Johnson outrunning the Bobcats defense for a 77-yard score for Van-Far.

This time the two point try was successful as Hombs ran for the score and a 14-7 Indian lead.

Bowling Green took a slim lead back to start the second quarter when Kaleo Dade scored his first touchdown of the night on a 10-yard trot just four seconds into the quarter. Dade also scored on the two point try for a 15-14 lead.

The Bobcats would never trail again in the game.

Bowling Green scored the next three touchdowns as Callahan threw to Lane Parker for an 80-yard catch and run, then to Matt Kay for a 22 yard strike and another Dade run to start the second half fifty yards and a 38-14 lead.

The Indians got one back as Hombs threw to Julian Holtkamp for over 80 yards.

Dade scored his third of the night in response to the Van-Far TD, running for forty yards with 8:19 left in the third quarter for a 46-22 Bobcat lead.

Bowling Green scored their final touchdown of the night to close the third as Matt Kay tiptoed the sideline in the end zone to haul in a Callahan pass for a thirty point advantage.

The Indians would add a fourth quarter score on a four yard Verlynn Johnson run to reach the 52-30 final score.

Quarterback/Defensive back Austin Callahan threw for three touchdowns, ran for another and also picked off Hombs to earn the Community State Bank TribCAST Player of the Game.

Kaleo Dade moved past 400 career tackles to move from 10th to the number 8 spot on the Class 2 Career tackles list.

The Bobcats (6-3) will host the Clopton-Elsberry IndianHawks (3-6) in the 4/5 match-up this Friday in

the opening round of Class 2 District 6 play.

The IndianHawks dropped a heart-breaker in their season finale at Montgomery County as the Wildcats outscored Clopton-Elsberry 22-8 in the final quarter to steal the win 58-56.

Van-Far will be the sixth seeded team in the district, finishing with a 3-6 record. The Indians will have to

travel to Palmrya to face the third seed Panthers (6-3).

The Louisiana Bulldogs (2-6) fell to Scotland County in their final regular season game by a score of 44-6 on Friday.

The Bulldogs will be the seventh seed in the Class 1 District 6 Tournament and travel to (2) Westran to face the 7-2 Homets this Friday night.

FUR & FEATHERS HUNTING GUIDE

Preparation Pointers For The Upcoming Hunting Season

Hunting is a popular hobby and sport enjoyed by millions of people across North America. Over the last 10 years, data from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service indicates that more and more females are taking up hunting.

Hunting seasons vary depending on

where you live. Regulations designed by local conservation, game, fish, and wildlife departments often dictate the start and end of hunting season. Although the licensing, seasons, limits, and fees for hunting may differ geographically, the preparation that goes into getting ready for hunting season

is similar regardless of geography.

Many seasoned hunters realize hunting season does not begin on "opening day." Rather, it can take weeks or months to get ready for a successful season. Considering hunting seasons can be brief, preparation helps hunters make the most of their time spent in the field.

* Purchase your license, tag or stamp. Many wildlife departments require hunters register in advance of the season, and this registration includes securing a hunting license. Because there is a limit to how many animals each hunter can hunt, tags for the animals they're hunting also will be issued. Hunters planning on going out for the season should stay apprised of when licensing and registration begins and ends so they can hunt legally.

* Scout areas. The landscape can change from year to year depending on a host of factors, including construction, commercialization and weather. Areas once open to hunting may now be restricted lands. Map out your potential hunting location and be aware of any new landmarks or changes.

* Check and replenish gear. Inspect weaponry, field-dress in supplies, clothing, and other supplies for wear and tear. Address any issues that need to be fixed, or replace items as necessary. If a rifle, bow or shotgun hasn't been fired in a while, take it to a range to verify accuracy and sighting. If you hunt out of a tree stand or blind, make sure it is sturdy and in good condition prior

to use.

* Get in shape. Hunting often requires hiking in and out of the great outdoors in various terrain. It's helpful to increase physical activity leading up to the hunt to prepare your body for the physical demands of hunting.

* Organize and pack gear. Ensure your equipment is clean, in working order and packed away in your travel bags. Establish a system of organization and a checklist so you're certain you will have what you need. Don't forget to bring along your hunting license and animal tag; otherwise, you may be levied with costly fines.

* Always hunt safely. It is quite easy to get swept up in the moment when tracking game. Don't let overzealousness cloud rational judgement and safety precautions. Otherwise an injury or even death can occur.

Hunting season is on the horizon and that means preparing now for the few weeks of sport to come.

CAUGHT IN THE HEADLIGHTS: Simple Tips To Avoid Deer Collisions

With the deer population increasing across the country, and living space for wildlife on the decline, the number of incidents involving a deer jumping into the path of a car has been steadily on the rise. This is especially true from October through December when male deer activity dramatically increases, resulting in a significant rise in the number of vehicular collisions.

A deer can literally come out of nowhere, leaving only seconds to react. Even worse, the collision can result in significant property damage and even life-threatening situations.

• **Watch the clock.** Deer are most active from sunset to midnight, and during the hours just before and after sunrise, which are feeding times.

• **Watch your speed.** It's not just the speed of the animal that plays a factor - it's the speed of the vehicle. Think about it: if you are driving your vehicle at a speed of over 60 miles per hour, you'll cover the length of a football field in the same time it takes to change a CD.

• **Keep your eyes open.** Deer don't run alone. If you see one, there are likely others nearby.

• **Don't swerve.** If a deer is suddenly in front of you, sound your horn to frighten it away. Break firmly, but stay in your lane. Serious crashes happen when drivers swerve to avoid a deer, only to hit other vehicles or lose control of their cars.

• **Wear your seat belt.** Most people injured in deer/crashes were unbuckled at the time.

Teach Kids Safety Measures

The National Rifle Association (NRA) recommends teaching kids to follow these steps if they should ever come across a gun:

- **Stop • Don't Touch • Leave The Area • Tell An Adult**

Having a gun in your home can pose a significant risk to children. In fact, firearm-related injuries are a leading cause of death in children. If you decide to keep a gun in your home, proper storage is essential to reduce the risk of injury. A gun should always be stored in a gun safe, lock box, or locked cabinet or drawer. It should be unloaded, and bullets should be securely stored in a separate place. In addition, it's important for children to understand that guns can be dangerous.

With Louisiana's Bicentennial Celebration behind us, Colorfest just over and the Holiday Season still to come, I've made an observation that I wanted to share. I feel like our community is experiencing a revived sense of pulling together. Generous donations and active volunteers working in partnership with the city's dedicated staff have done some special things lately that we all appreciate.

Despite awful heat the Bicentennial was a great success that culminated in a wonderful new piece of art. The interest and generosity that made the John B. Henderson Bust at Riverview Park a reality is just one example of a lot of people coming together, working hard and making the Bicentennial a worthy recognition of Louisiana's heritage.

That same community commitment and collaboration with the City has brought us new trees planted around town, some nice public amenities added to the vacant corners at 4th and Georgia, new playground surfacing at Riverview Park, and coming soon...a bigger and more functional Sunset Park Pavilion. Others have got together, including city employees on their own time, to make needed improvements to our Animal Control Facility.

Colorfest clearly showed a rise in interest and participation. More participation in the parade - some great floats by the way - more participation by vendors and more special events brought tons of visitors to town. To make this happen, new volunteer leaders working with some who've been involved in the past, plus once again our own city crews, all came together behind one aim and that was to make Louisiana shine. Thank you all so much for your efforts.

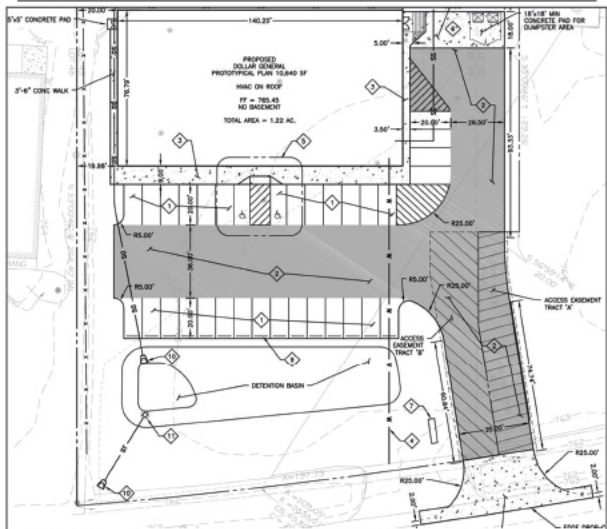
There's more to come. Next year the Champ Clark Bridge replacement and Georgia Street improvements will be completed. Once the bridge is finished 3rd Street/Highway 79 through town is due for repaving. Too slowly I know, but still surely, we are addressing water - sewer - street issues in other parts

of town. Thanks in part to a grant from USDA Rural Development, the library has a new roof and we're investigating the same possibility for City Hall. The Louisiana R-II School District continues working through their list of capital improvements. Stark Brothers has agreed to take over next year's downtown flower planters. Sun residents should be able to opt for curbside recycling.

Still, there's more that needs more work. A third survey mailed just went out intended to estimate Louisiana's average household incomes. We badly need folks to return theirs if they are one of the 450 people who were randomly selected. The information stays absolutely confidential. Less than half have been returned so far. If we can get to the needed amount the City will be able to apply for several additional grants that are currently not available to us, grants that could help with some of our needs.

On the to do list are things like upgrading the fire department, dealing with Town Branch issues and flooding at the south end of town, continuing to improve the appearance of a host of buildings and lots all over the city, plus other pressing concerns. We need to attract more commerce within city limits. We need to increase homeownership and owner occupancy versus rental occupancies. Sadly, we still hear of vandalism and other unsavory activities taking place in Louisiana, while having difficulty filling vacant police officer positions.

Despite these needed improvements I still believe we are on a path that is making Louisiana forward. As we wrap up the remainder of 2018 and lay plans for 2019 I hope we can build on the good collaborations we've observed of late. Community volunteers pulling in concert with the city's hard working employees have done a lot of special things recently. It's a model of how public/private collaborations can work and one we should all be proud to continue.

That building will be torn down to make way for the new Dollar General facility. The Westmore Group out of Chesterfield is the developer.

According to plans, the facility will have a prototypical floor plan and will be 10,640 square feet. It will sit on a total area of 1.22 acres on the property.

Berry pointed out that while there

have been losses in the business community, the new construction is welcome news. He added that Carquest is also slated to move into the Breneman-Tennis True Value facility. Berry noted this is the fifth store the owner is adding and is pleased he selected Vandalia.

"I've also been showing the spec building we have. That's how those things go sometimes. You don't hear anything in what seems like forever and then you get a lot of interest," Berry remarked.

He added that a new salon will also be opening downtown soon as

well. Berry said he anticipates that Carquest will be open and operating before the end of the year and that Dollar General construction will be completed by summer of next year.

He further pointed out that the new Eastern Missouri YMCA that will be opening in mid-January will add to the excitement as well.

"We are moving in the right direction," he said. "We're definitely going to miss Water's. They were a staple in Vandalia for many, many years. But there are exciting things happening, too."

The MoBeef for MoKids program connects local schools with area producers and processors that donate the beef product to be used in the school lunch program. The Mount Vernon School District, located in Lawrence County, was the pilot school for the MoBeef for MoKids program, with more schools and producers interested in getting involved.

WHY BEEF?
Beef is an important component

of nutrition, providing up to 10 percent of an individual's daily needs of essential nutrients, said Mark Russell, executive director of the Missouri Beef Industry Council.

According to the National Cattlemen's Beef Association:

- A 3-ounce serving of lean beef provides 25 grams, or about half of one's daily value, of protein.

- All lean beef cuts have less than 10 grams of total fat, 4.5 grams or less of saturated fat and less than 95 milligrams of cholesterol per 3.5-ounce cooked serving.

- A 3-ounce serving of lean beef provides the same amount of protein as 3 cups of quinoa, 6 tablespoons of peanut butter or nearly 2 cups of black beans.

- A 3-ounce serving of lean beef provides at least 10 percent of an individual's daily requirement of vitamin B12, selenium, zinc, niacin, vitamin B6, phosphorus, choline, iron and riboflavin.

The increase in Missouri-raised beef helps meet the Missouri Department of Agriculture's goal to have more Missouri grown food on the menu at schools, hospitals, correctional facilities and other such institutions across the state. MO Beef for MO Kids is perhaps the first of those initiatives to also include an education component about how food is grown and produced locally. 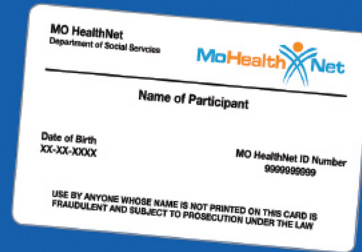

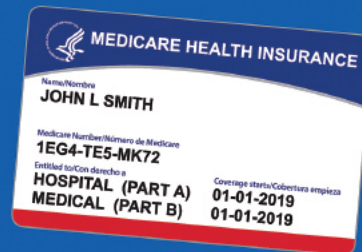
