1861 Speech May Have Lessons For Today

Editor's note: Louisiana author and historian Brent Engel published the 2013 book "John Brooks Henderson: A Life of Service to America" and is a frequent contributor of stories about the former Pike County legislator.
 John Brooks Henderson had a way of pointing out the best of American exceptionalism even at the darkest times, and many of his words would ring true in today's divided political landscape.

Former City Administrator Bob Jenne Wins Damages In Suit Against Louisiana

It took just shy of three and a half years to go to trial, but it appears that closure is on the horizon in the case of Robert Jenne and the City of Louisiana.
 Jenne had served as the city's administrator up until February of 2015 when the city council at that time decided to relieve him of duties. He had also served as interim chief of police following the tragic death of Rich Hughes.
 Jenne filed charges against the city including claims of age discrimination, retaliation and unlawful discharge. Named in filings were then-mayor Bart Nischner and council members Chuck Hoffman, Kathy Smith, Mona Brown, Jeff Guay and Lori Lewis.
 A four-day jury trial wrapped up last week on Friday, Oct. 26. A post-trial motion has been filed by Jenne's attorney seeking attorney fees and court costs.
 Jenne won compensatory damages of \$188,000 on the count of retaliation. No punitive damages were assessed and no other wrongdoing was found.
 The case has been continued to Nov. 16 for post-trial motions and entry of final judgment. It is anticipated the case will be closed in early December.
 The parties involved noted they have been advised against speaking at length about the matter until it is officially closed.

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 Kate Klott was already the most decorated runner in Bowling Green High School history when she capped her senior cross country season with a second place finish at the Class 2 state meet on Saturday.
 The meet at Oak Hills Golf Course in Jefferson City on Saturday was the last Klott will run in a Bobcats uniform.
 "The nerves were definitely there," she said. "Since it was my last race of my high school career I wanted to finish strong so I treated it like it was just another race."
 Klott has competed at state in cross country all four years of high school and has earned All-State honors all four years. She finished in 13th place her freshman and sophomore years and then in fourth place last year as a junior.

Hunters Check 2,169 Turkeys During MO Fall Firearms Season

Preliminary data from the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) shows that hunters checked 2,169 turkeys during Missouri's fall firearms turkey season, Oct. 1-31. Top harvest counties were Greene with 57, Henry with 48, and Laclede with 47. Last year's fall firearms turkey harvest total was 2,899.

MDC's turkey biologist says the low harvest total can be attributed to several years of poor hatches.

"We had really poor production in 2016 and 2017, which resulted in lower turkey numbers across the state," said MDC Turkey Biologist Jason Isabelle. "Unfortunately, on top of those two bad hatches, production was down again this year, so the drop in harvest this fall certainly wasn't unexpected."

Another factor that has resulted in lower fall turkey harvests is declining hunter participation. This year, 10,262 fall firearms turkey hunting permits were purchased. During the peak year of 1987, nearly 53,000 permits were purchased. Missouri has seen a declining interest in fall firearms turkey season as

have other states. Isabelle attributes the bulk of this declining interest to the popularity of archery season. "Each year we continue to see more and more hunters participating in the archery deer and turkey season," said Isabelle. "Rather than carry a shotgun in the woods in October, I think a lot of hunters are now carrying a bow."

Despite the low harvest and participation numbers, Missouri's fall firearms turkey season provides hunters with ample time to spend in the selling of the state's beautiful fall woods, and there are hunters who enjoy the fall experience just as much as the spring.

"Fall turkey hunting can be pretty exciting," Isabelle said. "Having a scattered flock of turkeys respond to your calls from all directions is an incredible experience."

Fall archery turkey hunting continues through Nov. 9 and resumes from Nov. 21 through Jan. 15, 2019. For fall firearms turkey harvest results by county, go online to MDC's website at <http://on.mo.gov/1jz2EW>.

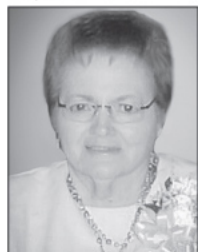

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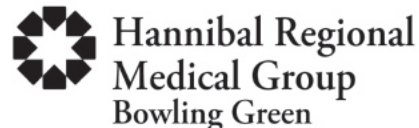

Louisiana R-II School District Releases Compliance Review

The Louisiana R-II school district completed a triennial compliance review for the state of Missouri in May of 2018.

The results from the review were released to the school at the end of October.

* The Louisiana R-2 Special Education Team received a 100 percent compliance rating from the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education.

* The review was comprised of over 30 pages comprising hundreds of individual standards and indicators that had to be met to obtain this rating.

* The special education department received a letter of recognition

from the regional professional development center recognizing excellence in achievement.

* According to the letter, "A 100% compliance rating is a significant achievement with a very small number of schools state wide obtaining this rating each cycle".

* This was the first time that Louisiana R-2 has achieved this highest level of performance rating review on a triennial Special Education Review.

* When asked how this compares to previous reviews Director of Special Services Dr. John Picone noted, "When I took over as director the district had just completed a triennial file review. Significant teacher turn over and extensive health issues had plagued the department and fac-

tered into the performance results. They simply were not where we wanted them to be. Our department sat down as a team and decided we could do better and then mapped out a course of action to improve. We developed a corrective action plan and worked with the state to build our compliance back to 100 percent. Once we had achieved this we set our sights on maintaining a high standard of compliance. When our next triennial review came up we were ready. Louisiana has a staff of dedicated, hardworking in the special education department, our certificated staff, support staff, and service providers are second to none. Together we reach a lot of kids and I am proud to work with such a group of talented educators."

The Clopton cross country team sent four runners to the Class 1 state meet on Saturday at Oak Hills Golf Course in Jefferson City.

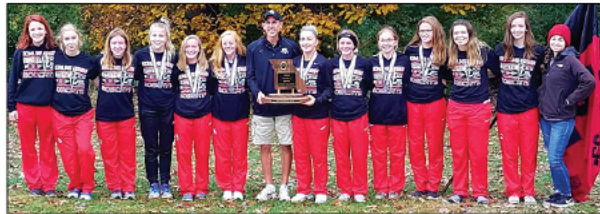
Senior runner Donovan Denlow took seventh place overall with a time of 17:58 and earned All-State honors.

Bobcats Season Ends With Loss In District Semifinal To Monroe City

After taking care of rival Clifton-Elisberry at home in the district opener a week prior, the Bowling Green Bobcats faced another level of competition in the semifinal at Monroe City on Friday night.

The top-seeded Panthers lived up to their reputation, amassing 550 yards of total offense to end the Bobcats season in a 48-12 final.

Monroe City won the Class 1 championship last season and finished second the year prior at state, haven't been deterred by the jump to Class 2 this year.

The Panthers won the coin toss and went right to work on the Bobcats on Friday night.

In just seven plays and two and a half minutes the Panthers took the lead when Gage Botswana came out of the backfield for a 20-yard scoring run and a 6-0 lead.

Bowling Green was moving the ball on their first offensive series, converting a first down and creeping toward mid-field before Austin Callahan had a pass tipped at the line and into the arms of linebacker Gatin Bischof.

The turnover led to another Panthers score exactly five minutes after the first when quarterback Blake Hays connected with Zach Osborn for a 16-yard score.

The Bobcats, down 12-0 after the first quarter, were forced to punt on the second play of the second.

The Callahan punt pinned Monroe City at their own two yard line, but the Panthers still managed to score quickly as a run of twenty-three yards moved the home squad away from their goal-line and Os-

born scored his second on a 42-yard run to increase the lead to 20.

The Bobcat defense stopped the Monroe City offense with 5:22 left in the first half, giving the offense the ball at their own 45 yard line.

Bowling Green went to the air and found success as Callahan connected with Matt Kay to convert a long first down. He found the senior again for a 41-yard score to get the Bobcats on the board.

Down 20-6 at the half would have been encouraging, especially with the Bobcats set to receive the opening kick in the third quarter, but Osborn struck again. The talented back torched the Bobcats for a 54-yard TD to restore the 20-point Monroe City advantage before the teams went to the locker room.

The second half start was a back-breaker for Bowling Green.

Callahan was picked off on the first play from scrimmage and Monroe scored on the very next play, then again quickly after a Bowling Green three and out.

By the end of the third the Panthers had recovered an on-side kick, scored again and led 48-6 to trigger a running clock on the Bobcats.

Bowling Green added a touchdown in the fourth, capping an eight play drive with a Nick Breakfield touchdown on a short run.

The Bobcats finished their season second in the EMO conference with a 7-4 record.

The Panthers will host (2) Clark County on Friday in the district title game. The Indians shut out (3) Palmyra in their semifinal 36-0 to reach the championship game.

the best athlete to come out of the cross country program. Her second place finish at state was the highest of any runner at BGHS. Chance added that she is All-State nine times over with four in cross country and five nods in track (so far). She owns every track school record from 800-meters to 3,200-meters.

"Kate has had a tremendous career representing the Bowling Green track and cross country programs," Chance stated. "She is a fierce competitor and has consistently thrived on state championship meets. You won't find a more dedicated and committed individual than Kate. She deserves every award that comes her way. She has earned the training program year after year and it's one of the many reasons she dominates when she gets to the state meet."

Chance pointed out that not many high school age athletes can turn up the effort at the state level the way she does.

"Kate has mastered the art of performing on the biggest stage. She has been a joy to coach and I'm proud I was able to coach her for four years," he added.

Klott said the course was a little muddy in places on Saturday since the girls ran the last race of that day. She noted that other than that it couldn't have gone any better than it did.

While all of Klott's state appearances are special to her, she noted this one was particularly sweet because it was the last and because it was her best personal finish and the best finish as a team to date.

"It takes all of us pushing each other."

She added that she has been around some pretty great people, accomplishing some pretty great things. Klott is also quick to give credit to Coach Chance.

"He has been such a great influence on myself and so many others," she remarked. "There are not very many people who can make a person want to go out and run seven miles a day, but he is such an inspiration that we want to do it for him...to make him proud."

When asked what advice she would give younger kids who are thinking about joining cross country she encourages everyone to try it. She noted that while it is a very hard sport it is also very rewarding and a very family-oriented sport.

Klott's plans after high school aren't concrete at this point. She said that she is looking at a couple of colleges but definitely plans to continue running at the college level.

Sept. 10. He added that he was even more surprised when he was a finalist in the top 15.

"People in the community have really rallied around this contest along with my friends, family, and teammates from high school and college. They have been persistent in getting their votes in every day and making sure everyone is voting. It's been very overwhelming - in a good way," Chance added.

In addition to being a phenomenal coach, Chance is a highly-decorated athlete. He played four sports in high school including cross country, basketball, track and baseball. "I competed in track and cross country in college because I felt that I could still improve in those sports given another four years."

He went on to be a three-time All-American in track at the college level. He was inducted into the Simpson College Hall of Fame in 2016 and is the college's only multi-time All-American distance runner. Chance graduated in 1997 with degrees in physical education and health before earning a master's degree in education from Lindenwood University in 2002.

He is the Bowling Green R-I athletic director and has headed up the school's cross country and track programs for 20 years. The program is well known around the state for turning out top contenders.

Chance said he was drawn to coaching through his high school and college coaches.

"They took interest in me as an athlete and they had a tremendous impact on how my life shaped out. These coaches always pushed me to be the best I could and guided me to be a successful athlete and person," he explained.

Chance says he loves every minute of coaching at BGHS. "Coaching at Bowling Green is one of the most rewarding things I have done. Every season is a little different but the way my cross country kids treat me as a coach is very special."

When asked what moments/seasons stick out from over the years, Chance is quick to point out there are a great deal of wonderful memories. He notes the boy's cross country state championship in 2009, back-to-back 4x800 meter relay teams in 2016 and 2017 along with the many conference and district championship memories from track and cross country including the 10 state cross country trophy teams.

"They're all special moments." Chance said it means a great deal just to have been considered in the top 15 of the contest and noted the opportunity to win the award is very special.

"I am fully aware that awards like this do not happen if your kids aren't performing at a high level in championship meets."

Chance has remarked before about how much the community has rallied behind him and his family in

the good times and the scary times. In addition to his list of achievements, Chance also battled stage four cancer.

"I am just really proud how the community has responded to this award and how they continue to go out of their way to vote and try and get more people voting," Chance said. "It has brought a positive light to the school and community and I'm glad that I could help with that. I take great pride in representing this school, community, and track and cross country program."

The coach who finishes in second place will receive \$20,000 and the third place prize is \$10,000. Chance hasn't dropped below second place since the voting became serious business.

All of the rigs are four-wheel drive to handle the terrain the ambulances often must travel. All of them feature new electric stretchers that have hydraulic lift/lower mechanisms.

"This is obviously for the safety of our crew members and it makes a better experience for the patient as well."

EMT Gary Moore noted that all of the ambulances have lock-down monitors along with other equipment that can now be locked into place and not become a projectile while in transport. All three have blanket warming devices. He added that all of them have been set up so they are easy to clean and get back into service following a call. Moore further pointed out there are dual large-capacity oxygen tanks so patients can be transported farther before that becomes an issue.

The newest rig features an upgraded heavy-duty front bumper, since deer are an ongoing hazard in

Pike County.

"We wanted them all to be uniform so that staff can move from one to the next and everything is the same and not different from one to another," Vanhooser pointed out. All of the rigs also feature digital-locking on drugs, particularly narcotics.

Vanhooser noted the hospital is

constantly looking at ways to ensure the best treatment and safety for patients and this was a major achievement.

PCMH Ambulances service approximately 3,200 calls per year.

Bart Niedner noted that he has been so advised, but wishes to discuss the case in full following its conclusion.

Niedner did offer a public statement on Monday.

Just before closing arguments on Oct. 26, 2018, and after years of as-

serting claims against the city councilpersons, Mr. Jenne dismissed his charges against all five city councilpersons. It is my prayer that the painful experience does not erode their continued public service or dissuade others from volunteering," Niedner remarked.

"We are pleased that the jury found in our favor on the charge of age discrimination. I am very relieved to be completely exonerated from this accusation. It has been a

very painful burden for my family and me these past three years," he stated. "Unfortunately, the jury found in favor of Mr. Jenne on the secondary count of retaliation. I remain wholly in objection to this finding; however, because this second count is the subject of post-trial motions, I will have to delay my comments on advice of my counsel."

The People's Tribune will include a comprehensive report following the conclusion of final judgment.

Eighty-two of the 99 delegates meeting in St. Louis had been born in slave states, including the 34-year-old Henderson. At issue was whether Missouri should join the seven states which had already left the Union.

Henderson, who would serve as a brigadier general for the Union Army, called the U.S. Constitution "the best instrument ever devised for the government of man" and declared secession "damnable heresy." While modern day political battles certainly are not at the dangerous level of those in 1861, Henderson's speech eerily reflects many of the themes found in the war of words past and present.

"I can not wish that any man may have belonged to, or what set of political principles he was attempting to establish upon the policy of the country, yet it must be admitted that every man presumed that we had a government the best that had been guaranteed to man, and that we enjoyed a prosperity never enjoyed by the people of any nation on the earth," he said. "And yet, by some strange delusion, by some unaccountable transformation of the human mind, we have come to the conclusion that we are just upon the verge of destruction."

Unlike many, the former state lawmaker was quick to point out that all sides shared blame while pointing out there was a vast, unspoken majority who did not want chaos.

"There are loyal hearts in this country, from one end to the other, that beat steadily and responsive to that flag and the Constitution of our fathers," he said.

Henderson, who started his political career as a Democrat but turned to the Republican Party, chastised protesters who acted harshly toward those with whom they disagreed, calling them "drunken demagogues." He also reminded dissenters that the Constitution protected everyone's speech while saying personal attacks "left little room for the expression of honest sentiments."

"Those who are interested in the character and perpetuity of the Union are in danger if they make know their sentiments of loyalty," he said.

Henderson also had words for those who thought mob rule should

replace the sanctity of law—that legislation, and not violence, was the key to progress.

"I was once taught, and I yet believe it, that when the law is defective, when its execution is not properly enforced, we can make the law more stringent and provide better remedies for its true and proper enforcement," he said. "That is the true doctrine of the government, and when we depart from it ten thousand difficulties will environ Missouri and this Union, consecrated by the wisdom of an illustrious ancestry."

As a metaphor for his line of thought, Henderson offered a story about a robber stealing his property only to have another band of thugs side with the guilty man. In the example, extremist attitudes prevailed over common sense.

"Is that the true doctrine?" he asked. "Is our government to be preserved by a doctrine of that character? Surely not."

Henderson predicted America would have to deal with "wild fanaticism" as it took "possession of the better feelings of the human heart," but that "peace and regeneration" would return.

"I look forward with renewed hope to the brilliant prospects in the future, when I look to the hallowed associations of the past, and I now again renew my faith in the good of my country, and no act of mine, from this day on, shall ever tend to dissolve the union of Missouri and the Federal Government."

A week later, on March 19, the convention voted 98-1 against secession. Further effectiveness was diminished by the war, and it would take another fractious convention to approve a new state constitution in 1865.

Henderson was appointed a U.S. Senator in January 1862 and two years later would draft and introduce the 13th Amendment outlawing slavery.

At the 1861 convention, Henderson planned to "stand true" and said he considered it a duty to "bring back once more those erring sisters that have gone off in madness into the path of their own destruction" through secession.

"And, sir, looking at the best interests of Missouri—looking at my own fealty to the Constitution—I can never consent to follow."

Eight hunters and their assistants gathered at the refuge October 26 through 28, 2018, for an excellent weekend of deer hunting. Qualified hunters submitted their applications to the Annada, Missouri-based office during the summer, and nine applicants were selected through a lottery drawing.

Community partners supported these hunters by providing food and supplies for the event. Monty's Bar-B-Que and Finkling Eye Health Associates, both of Bowling Green, provided lunch and desserts throughout the weekend. Pepsi-Cola Bottling Company of Bowling Green provided drinks during the three days and gave each hunter a camouflaged Sun-Drop hat. The Pike County Twin Rivers Chapter of White-tails Unlimited provided Jim Shockley tripod shooting sticks for each hunter to use and gave each hunter White-tails Unlimited hunter-orange hat and Wood's Snoked Meats of Bowling Green offered each hunter

a processing discount on deer harvested during the managed hunt. "Thank you guys for all you did for us hunters. We love this hunt and the hospitality is second to none. I managed to kill both my deer on Friday, and [it was] my first buck ever! It was a great one - nine point and field dressed at 226 [pounds]," said Billy Freetland of Sikeston, Missouri.

Over the three day hunt, six antlered and six antlerless deer were harvested in total. Even though not every hunter harvested a deer, all participants saw deer and plan to apply again next year. Many consider the weekend successful not only because of the deer harvested, but because of the camaraderie, support and appreciation for wildlife they experienced throughout the weekend. Through mobility and visually impaired hunts, many friendships have formed and hunters look forward to seeing one another each deer season.

Matt Woodson of St. Louis, Missouri said, "I thank again to everyone that helped out. The sponsors - everyone - who makes this hunt possible. I really appreciate it. It was a fantastic time!"

Elsbey resident, Jeff Reed, echoed Woodson's thoughts, saying, "I want to thank you guys up there

at the refuge very much for all the help and support you all did for all of us hunters. It was a great weekend!"

MDC Stocks Trout For Winter Fishing Around State

Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) Fisheries staff have recently stocked more than 70,000 rainbow trout in more than 30 urban-area lakes around the state for winter trout fishing beginning early November. Many of these are new to anglers as harvest trout as soon as they are stocked, while others are catch-and-release until Feb. 1.

Find locations and other information for winter trout fishing online at huntfish.mdc.mo.gov/fishing/species/trout/trout-where-fish/winter-trout-fishing-areas.

Limits and tackle restrictions vary by lake and season. Check for special area regulations before fishing. The daily limit for catch-and-keep at these locations is four trout with no length limit. All Missouri residents over age 15 and under age 65 must have a fishing permit. All non-resi-

dents over age 15 must have a fishing permit. To keep trout, all anglers of all ages must have a Missouri trout permit.

Buy fishing permits from numerous vendors around the state, online at mdc.mo.gov/permits or through the FREE MDC mobile app, Mo Fishing, available for download through Google Play for Android devices or the App Store for Apple devices.

MDC Reminds Deer Hunters About CWD Sampling

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) reminds deer hunters that it is conducting mandatory sampling and voluntary sampling of harvested deer to help find cases of chronic wasting disease (CWD). MDC encourages hunters to properly dispose of deer carcasses to help limit the spread of the disease. MDC also encourages hunters to Share the Harvest and to follow special guidelines for having a harvested deer from a county where CWD has been found.

CWD is an infectious and deadly illness for white-tailed deer and other members of the deer family, called cervids. There have been no known cases of CWD infecting people, but the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) strongly recommends having deer tested for CWD if harvested in an area known to have cases of the disease. The CDC also recommends not eating meat from animals that test positive for CWD. Cases of CWD are relatively rare in Missouri with 76 confirmed cases in free-ranging deer since the disease was first found in free-ranging deer in 2012. Learn more at mdc.mo.gov/cwd.

Mandatory CWD sampling Nov. 10 and 11

MDC will be conducting mandatory CWD sampling of deer harvested in 31 of the 48 counties of its CWD Management Zone during the opening weekend of the fall firearms deer season, Nov. 10 and 11.

The counties are: Adair, Barry, Bollinger, Cape Girardeau, Cedar, Cole, Crawford, Franklin, Grundy, Hickory, Jefferson, Knox, Linn, Macon, Madison, McDonald, Mercer, Moniteau, Ozark, Perry, Polk, Putnam, St. Charles, St. Clair, St. Francois, Ste. Genevieve, Stone, Sullivan, Taney, Warren, and Washington.

Hunters who harvest deer from these counties Nov. 10 or 11 must take their deer - or the head with at least 6 inches of the neck in place - on the day of harvest to one of MDC's 61 CWD mandatory sampling stations. Deer may be presented at any mandatory sampling station and hunters can get free test results of their sampled deer.
