According to the board, once Porter is established he will welcome questions from the public.

Crews Battle Large Blaze At ••• Louisiana's Past Looking Forward ••• Jensen Auto Body In Vandalia

Editor's note: Louisiana celebrates its bicentennial in 2018. Following is the 11th in a series of monthly articles by Louisiana author Brent Engel that will examine 200 years of local history.

As with people around the world, Louisiana went all out in marking the end of The Great War.

The Daily Press-Journal jokingly said the observance was done in nice, gentle, lady-like manner," befor e more accurately adding "if there were any species of noise on the face of the earth that wasn't utilized, we'd like to have it described."

Word of the armistice first came to town by train at 5 a.m. on Nov. 11, 1918. A shot and an "incipient" yelp

were soon heard. "This was followed by several more shots and some more yells that were not quite so incipient," the newspaper reported. "People commenced tumbling out of bed and by six o'clock the spontaneous celebration commenced."

The Louisiana Fife and Drum Corps took to the streets and churches began ringing their bells. Buildings were decorated with flags and bunting, businesses closed for the day, trash cans were tied to the backs of cars to be dragged through the streets and a processional that featured men, women, children and pets was formed.

"Every train that came in had its whistle on a continuous toot, and from early morn till frosty eve every minute was occupied by noise of some kind," the Press-Journal noted.

At 11 a.m., residents gathered around a flagpole at Third and Georgia to hear the Rev. A.D. Johnston read a copy of the armistice that had been printed in the St. Louis Globe-Democrat newspaper.

"Everything for which America fought has been accomplished," Johnston read to the crowd. "It will now be our fortunate duty to assist by example, by sober, friendly counFire Claims Building, Contents, Several Vehicles

He explained that crews were dispatched to the scene at about 9 a.m. on Sunday and remained on the scene until about 2 p.m.

"When we arrived flames were coming out of the northeast comer," he said. "It was really cooking through the ceiling area.

He noted the structure is very large and one-story.

It's wide open inside. It's like a vault. There was nothing to stop it spreading everywhere."

He noted the building naturally had a great deal of chemicals and other products such as paint and paint thinners that had to be considered as crews were working to control the blaze.

"It was hot. It warped the ceiling beams which are super high," Strother explained. "It was really tough to access with the steel. It wasn't one we could chase," he added.

He noted that a cause could not be immediately determined. Strother said an investigator from the state fire marshal's office out of Montgomery City visited the scene and

will provide a report. Strother noted the scene is not considered suspi-

A total of 14 firefighters from the Vandalia Fire Department were on the scene and four trucks were called into service. Mutual aid was also received from the Farber Fire Department which sent a truck and about six crew members. No injuries were reported.

Strother said there were about three cars, a tractor and ambulance and a van for the Department of Corrections that were destroyed at the property.

The business is owned and operated by Scott Jensen.

Deer Totals In For Opening

april@thepeoplestribune.com The numbers keep rising, but the totals for the opening weekend were strong with over 101,000 deer harvested in the state of Missouri

through Monday morning. Firearms season started this weekend. Atotal of 1.606 deer were taken in Pike County. Of that total, 803 were antlered bucks, 164 were button bucks, and 639 does.

Atotal of 1,391 were harvested in Lincoln County. Of that, a total of 733 were antlered bucks, 146 were button bucks and 512 were does claimed.

In Audrain County a total of 929 deer were checked in by Monday morning. Of that a total of 426 were antlered bucks, 127 were button bucks and 376 were does.





MO State Parks Announces Rate Increase For Campsites With Electricity

In response to campers' request for more electric sites and more sites with higher amperage, Missouri State Parks is raising its rates for campsites with electricity. For arrivals beginning May 1, 2019, campers will see a \$2 per night increase for all on-season campsites with electricity.

Basic campsite rates will remain at\$13 per night, and off-season rates

On-season is generally April through October but varies around the state parks. This is the first rate increase Missouri State Parks has implemented since 2013

The rate increase will help fund various electrification projects, including upgrading electrical service to 50 amp and repairing and replac-ing electrical systems," said Ben

Ellis, director of MoDNR's Division of State Parks. "We want to address the power issues that have resulted in closure of some campsites and better meet our customers' needs."







sel and by material aid in the establishment of just democracy through-out the world." The Rev. W.L. Meyers then of-

fered a prayer and an appeal for ad-ditional donations to the United War Work campaign,

"All this has been accomplished by our boys," The Press-Journal said in its effort to drum up support. "They have saved the world. Is it now too much to do something from

The ceremony continued after what the newspaper called "a mighty short dinner hour" with more speeches, including those by politi-cally-prominent Louisiana attorney Ras Pearson and former Missouri State Sen, David Alexander Ball.

At 7:30 p.m., the crowds went to John Brooks Henderson Riverview Park overlooking the Mississippi River "where a huge bonfire was started which could be seen as far up and down the river as the eye could reach," the Press-Journal said. More speeches and prayers were offered.

"The park was crowded with autos and cheering crowds, and the skies were lighted up with sky rockets," the paper reported. "And this was the end of a perfect day. And it was perfect, both in atmosphere and the sense of perfect joy that permeated every human being at the thought of the cessation of four years of horror and bloodshed."

The momentous nature of the occasion may have inadvertently halted a mandate against such large gatherings. A virulent strain of the flu virus unlike any before or since had been killing people in the prime of their lives, and because of it Louisiana schools and churches had

been closed. The quarantine was lifted for services on Nov. 17 and classes on Nov. 18. Louisiana Presbyterian's service featured a reading from Psalms 46:9, which includes the line "He maketh wars to cease unto the end of the earth."

Louisiana Baptist promised its service would be "filled with worthwhile incentives to worship. Come knowing you are coming to the house of God and the time will be well spent."

The joy only increased when families received letters from their loved ones overseas. Landon and Louise Brown got notes from their sons, Abe and Elmer.

"There's no place like home, and a fellow finds it out when he gets so far away," said Abe, who died in 1950 at age 56, "I see some boy from Louisiana almost every day and it makes me feel better to get around and talk about that old

In the days that followed, residents turned to talk of needs that had been neglected during the war. Pike County Lumber & Supply Co. noted the \$10,000 government limit on private building had been lifted and suggested "now is a good time to fix up the 'Old Home Place' before the Boys Come Home."

Wernert's Garage offered a "gigantic tire sale" on items ranging from \$13 to \$28. The Star Theatre showed "Allies' Official War Reviews" and promised to screen "The Freedom of the World" and "America's Answer" soon.

Mayor Frank Jennings told residents that all who wanted formaldehyde candles "for fumigating purposes" could pick them up at the Louisiana Police Department.

An article on Doan's Kidney Pills declared "Sex isn't the reason for backaches, dizzy headaches and uri-nary disorders" among women because "men have those troubles, too, and they often come from kidney

Amid all of the festivities, however, The Press-Journal turned its attention to almost 75,000 Americans who "made the supreme sacrifice and rest in foreign graves." It noted the dead included local men Warren Tillotson, Charles Frederick and William Guy Shannon.

The observance of Veterans Day harkens to the end of World War I hostilities at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month in 1918.



It's that time of year! Preparing for cold weather, family gatherings, and holidays.

But have you prepared for FLU season?



What are symptoms of the flu: Influenza can cause mild to severe illness and can even lead to death. Flu is different from a cold and symptoms usually come on suddenly. People frequently label vomiting and diarrhea as "the flu" while usually also caused by a virus these are not typical influenza symptoms. People who have the flu often feel some or all of these symptoms:

Fever

- Cough
- Sore throat
- Runny or stuffy nose
- Body aches Headache
- Chills
- Fever

How is the flu spread? Usually spread by tiny droplets that are made when people with the flu cough, sneeze, or talk. These droplets can land in mouth or nose of people nearby. It's is also possible that a person could get the flu by touching a surface that has the flu virus on it then touching their mouth or nose.

How long is a person contagious? You can pass the flu to someone else before you even know you are sick. A person is the most contagious in the first 3-4 days after their illness begins. However, you may infect others 1 day before you develop symptoms and up to 5-7 days after you become sick. You may develop symptoms anywhere from 1-4 days after exposure.

Are there complications of the flu? Yes, you could develop pneumonia, ear infections, sinus infection, worsening of chronic medical conditions. Each year many people die from these complica-

How can you keep from getting the flu? The most important step to flu prevention is getting a flu vaccine each year. Please note that it takes 2 weeks after getting a flu vaccine to develop immunity, which is why it is important to prepare before flu season happens. Influenza vaccine has i to reduce flu related illness and risk of serious flu complications. CDC also recommends everyday preventive measures like covering coughs and sneezes, frequent hand washing, not being around people who are sick.

How do you know that your symptoms are related to the flu? It is difficult to know if influenza is the cause of your illness based on symptoms alone. There are tests that your healthcare provider can perform to diagnose flu. If you suspect you have the flu it is important that you limit exposure to other people to prevent the spread of illness.

So while you are getting winter coats, gloves and hats, groceries for holiday meals and gifts for exchanges don't forget to get your flu vaccine to help you stay healthy this flu season.


