
Blaylock and Smith put out the call for help. Several people stepped

### Passionate Politician Breathes Fire During Visit

Editor's note: Pike County celebrates its bicentennial in 2018. Following is the 11th in a series of monthly articles by Louisiana historian Brent Engel that will examine 200 years of local history.

When a future President from the other political party writes a biography of you, there can be little doubt about your far-reaching impact on America.

Such was the case of Thomas Hart Benton, a legendary political force who was loved, hated, challenged and appeased for more than three decades.

In 1846, the man who had the distinction of serving as one of Mis-souri's first U.S. Senators made a speech at the Pike County Courthouse in Bowling Green, and got in was so good at handing out.

By then, Benton had served in Washington for 25 years, leading efforts for territorial expansion in the West, authoring laws encouraging new settlements, supporting construction of a continental railway, advocating greater use of technologies, backing the relocation of Native Americans and going joining in the battle over slavery.

The legislative warrior for Democrat Presidents Andrew Jackson and Martin Van Buren had earlier shown his anger, wounding Jackson during a brawl and even killing another man during a duel.

The 1906 recollection of Benton's Pike County visit was told by retired Missouri Supreme Court Justice Thomas James Clark Fagg of Louisiana, and was published in the

#### first issue of the "Historical Review." Fagg, who arrived in Pike County

from Virginia with his parents in 1836 and became an attorney in 1845, cautions at the outset that he had not been "prompted either by any personal predilections or partisan feeling" in his story.

## **MDC Thanks Hunters For Help With CWD Sampling**

The Missouri Department of Health Risks. Conservation (MDC) thanks the thousands of deer hunters who par-ticipated in its mandatory CWD sampling efforts last weekend in 31 counties. Thanks to hunter participation, MDC collected more than 20,000 tissue samples last weekend from harvested deer for CWD test-

According to MDC, mandatory sampling dramatically increases the number of tissue samples the Conservation Department can collect in a brief period of time. The increased number of samples gives MDC sci-entists a much better understanding of the distribution and prevalence of the disease -- where it is and how many deer may have it. It can also help find new cases in new areas.

MDC adds that opening weekend of the firearms deer season is the most popular two hunting days for most deer hunters. Hunters take about a third of our state's total annual deer harvest during those two days. Focusing on this key weekend gives MDC the best opportunity to collect the most tissue samples during a very concentrated time period.

MDC has also collected nearly 800 tissue samples for CWD testing over the past several months through its ongoing statewide voluntary CWD sampling efforts and from road-killed and sick deer.

MDC sends test samples to an independent laboratory for testing and will report test results as they become available. Stay up to date on test results received by MDC at mdc.mo.gov/cwd under CWD in

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), there have been no documented cases of CWD in humans, but it is important to prevent human exposure to CWD. As a safeguard, the CDC recommends hunters strongly consider having their harvested deer tested for CWD before eating the meat if the animal was harvested from an area where CWD has been found. The CDC also recommends not consuming an animal that tests positive for the disease. Learn more at mdc,mo,gov/cwd under Human

MDC continues voluntary CWD

sampling statewide all season Hunters who harvest deer anywhere in Missouri throughout the entire deer hunting season -- Sept. 15 through Jan. 15, 2019 -- can have their harvested deer sampled for free CWD testing at select MDC offices around the state and through participating taxidermists and meat processors located in the CWD Management Zone. Sampling is vol-

MDC asks hunters to field dress and Telecheck deer before taking them for sampling. Hunters can bring the entire field-dressed deer, or just the head with about six inches of neck in place. Heads that have the cape removed for taxidermy can be sampled.

Get free test results

Hunters can get free test results for their deer from both mandatory and voluntary CWD sampling online at mdc.mo.gov/CWDTestResults. Due to the volume of test samples submitted, test results will take up to four weeks from the time of submission

#### ALDERMAN-WARD 1, 2, and 3 (Two-year term)

RSMo 79.070 provides that no person shall be an Alderman unless he or she be at least eighteen (18) years of age, a citizen of the United States and an inhabitant and resident of the City one year next preceding this election, and a resident, at the time he or she files and during the time the he or she serves of the ward from which he or she is elected.

No person shall qualify as a candidate for elective public office in the state of Missouri who has been found guilty of or pled guilty to a felony or misdemeanor under the federal laws of the United States of American or to a felony under the laws of this state or an offense committed in another state that would be considered a felony in this state.

ADDITIONALLY, any person who files as a candidate for election to a public office shall be disqualified from participation in the election for which the candidate has filed if such person is delinquent in the payment of any state income taxes, personal property taxes, municipal taxes, real property taxes on the place of residence, as stated on the Declaration of Candidacy, or if the person is a past or present corporate officer of any fee office that owes any taxes to the state. Each potential candidate for election to a public office shall file an affidavit with the Department of Revenue and include a copy of the affidavit with the Declaration of Candidacy required under Section 115.349.



### The Origin Of Thanksgiving Day BICENTENNIAL Continued from front page

180-ton ship, set sail from Southampton, England. After difficulties with the vessel, resulting in her return to port, finally the voyage began. Her 102 passengers were to become some of the founding pilgrims of the United States of America, and the initiators of one of this nation's most popular holidays.

After weeks of plowing through the tumultuous Atlantic waters, battling strong winds, pounding waves and a number of problems with their vessel, the pilgrims spotted Cape Cod, off the coast of Massachusetts. The stormy weather was brewing so strongly that they had arrived there by accident. Their intended location was off the Virginia coast, where other pilgrims had begun colonies.

Before anchoring at Plymouth Rock and disembarking to explore the territory, the pilgrims devised the "Mayflower Compact." This was to serve as the basis for governing their new colony, where all would have the freedom to worship God as they chose.

The compact stated, "We whose names are underwritten, the loyal subjects of our dread sovereign lord King James...Having undertaken, for the glory of God, and advancement of the Christian faith, and honor of our king and country, a voyage to plant the first colony in the northern parts of Virginia, do by these presents solemnly and mutually in the presence of God and one of another, covenant, and combine ourselves together into a civil body politic, for our better ordering and preservation, and furtherance of the ends aforesaid; and by virtue hereof to enact, constitute, and frame such just and equal laws, ordinances, acts, constitutions, offices from time to time, as shall be thought most meet and convenient for the general good of the colony: unto which we promise all due submission and obedience. In witness whereof we have hereunder subscribed our names; Cape Cod, the 11th of November...

Pilgrims at Plymouth).

The next few months would prove to be difficult and trying. More than half of the original pilgrims did not survive the first, long, bleak New England winter. Often, two or three people would die in one day due to infection and sickness.

But, with the approaching of spring came new hope. The survivors built homes and planted crops. They made friendships with local Indian tribes, and traded with them. The passing of winter allowed the pilgrims to labor and produce, causing the colony to flourish.

After reaping their first harvest in the fall of 1621, the pilgrims dedicated a day for thanking God for the bounty with which He had blessed them. They had endured the many hardships that came with pioneering new land. They toiled through building an entire colony from what was simply wilderness. They were at peace with their neighbors. And they were especially grateful for their harvest. This allowed them to gather and store plenteous food and crops for the long and brutal winter ahead.

Their governor, William Brad-ford, proclaimed a day of thanksgiving toward God. They prepared a great feast to enjoy with family and friends-both from within the colony and with neighboring Indian

The following quotes from America's God and Country demonstrate Bradford's and the colony's thankfulness for God's protection and

"Being thus arrived in a good harbor, and brought safe to land, they fell upon their knees and blessed the God of Heaven who had brought them over the vast and furious ocean, and delivered them from all the perils and miseries thereof, again to set their feet on the firm and stable earth, their proper element."

In reminiscing upon the colony's success, Bradford continued, "Thus out of small beginnings greater things have been produced by His hand that made all things of nothing, and gives being to all things that are; and, as one small candle may light a thousand, so the light here kindled hath shone unto many, yea in some sort to our whole nation; let the glorious name of [God] have all the praise" (ibid.).

Clearly, pilgrims of the Plymouth colony gave God credit for all that they had. Notice the many references to God, and their acknowledgement of how He granted them so many blessings. The pilgrim's beliefs were firmly entrenched in the realization of God's presence and intervention in their everyday lives. Thanksgiving Day began because of this belief. It is a day dedicated to giving thanks to God for the many things we often take for granted.

Over the years, many colonies did keep Thanksgiving, but they kept various other days of thanksgiving, at different times of the year. It is a popular misconception that the pilgrims kept Thanksgiving on the same day each year following the first celebration in 1621, and that the other colonies began keeping that same day. In truth, it was a tradition always used to highlight and show gratitude for important events, such as bountiful harvests, victories in battle, etc. Whenever these took place, the colony called for the celebration of a day of thanksgiving.

In the late 1700s, during the American Revolution, the Continental Congresses suggested the yearly observance of a day of national thanksgiving, in hopes to unite factious states.

In 1817, the state of New York adopted Thanksgiving Day as an an-nual holiday. By the mid-1800s, other states likewise adopted the practice. In 1863, President Lincoln appointed it as a national holiday, and gave a Thanksgiving proclamation. Each president since then has issued a proclamation, announcing the celebration of this day.

"According to my understanding of his character he was a great man, and justice to his memory as well as a true history of the times in which he lived demand a true and impartial history of his life and public services," the author said.

The judge related many stories from what was a remarkable life. Benton was born in 1782 in North Carolina, the son of a wealthy attorney. He was kicked out of the University of North Carolina in 1799 for stealing. Characteristically, he did not go silently

"I am leaving here now, but damn you, you will hear from me again," Benton promised.

The scomed young man relocated to Tennessee, became a lawyer, and in 1815 moved to Missouri. He and David Barton were chosen as Missouri's first two U.S. Senators. Benton would become one of the nation's most powerful politicians

Fagg was on hand as the 64-year-old Democrat strolled into the Pike County Courthouse and came across an older man who had supported the Whigs, a precursor of the Republican Party.

The man reminded Benton that "he had met him in Tennessee and was a member of the jury in Benton's first case after he commenced practicing law," Fagg wrote.

The personal property suit involved pumpkins. Benton said he recalled the case and shook the older man's hand.

"I was right, wasn't I?" Fagg quotes Benton as saying.

"Yes," the old line Whig answered, "but I'll be damned if you haven't been wrong ever since. Fagg said Benton had a "look of in-

tense disgust as he turned away.

"The hell you say!" Benton replied

State legislatures chose U.S. senators at the time and in 1851, Benton was not nominated for another ferm. The decision almost certainly resulted from his reversal on the slavery is sue the year before, when the former slaveholder said he was now "against the institution." The stand defied the Democrat Party and many constituents.

Benton served one term in the U.S. House, but lost an election for Missouri governor in 1856. Despite being rejected by many Democrats, he remained rebelliously true to his party — voting against his Republican son-in-law, John C. Fremont, in the 1856 presidential election.

One of the many books written about him was published in 1886 by an upand-coming Republican Theodore Roosevelt. He said Benton's "rugged figure" had "never been given its proper place" in American politics.

The man who represented Missouri when she was the westernmost State, with all the frontier virtues, but also with all the frontier limitations and narrow prejudices, could not well avoid making what, by our standard, we should call mistakes; but we cannot refuse the meed of generous praise who was always entirely honest and entirely courageous," Roosevelt said.

Benton also is cited in "Profiles in Courage" by Democrat President John F. Kennedy.

"Benton's was a noble personage," Fagg wrote. 'His was a stalwart frame, above the ordinary height and with a physical constitution well preserved by a life of prudent, temperate habits, he had the proud, dignified appearance of the Roman Senator."

Benton published a massive autobiography, "Thirty Years' View," but it doesn't mention Fagg or Pike County. He died in Washington at age 76 on April 10, 1858. Benton was related to the artist who also bears the name.

Fagg served as a Pike County judge for 15 years, was a member of the Mis souri General Assembly and spent two years on the state's high court. He died at age 92 on Oct. 26, 1914, and is buried in Louisiana's Riverview Cemetery.

Benton could not have predicted the intensity of political hatred shown in the 21st century, but the following appears near the end of his 1854 autobiography. Though the topic is slavery, the words could have easily been written about the political climate of 2018.

"A sectional guestion now divides the Union, arraying one-half against the other, becoming more exasperated daily - which has already destroyed the benefits of the Union, and which, unless checked, will also destroy its form.



Deters Siblings Score Big


