Louisiana Quizbowl Team Is Headed To State For Third Year

The LHS Quizbowl team is set bound for the third straight year!

Louisiana defeated Brentwood High School in the Sectional round on Wednesday, April 17 to once again advance to the State Championship.

The sectional was a best two out of three format. The Bulldogs clinched the victory with two consecutive wins over the Eagles.

The first match was a decisive win with a score of Louisiana 680 - Brentwood 160.

Brentwood did not lay down, however, and the second match

brought the teams to the last set of bonus questions with Louisiana coming out on top by one question, winning the match by a score of 350-340.

The Bulldogs were once again led by senior captain Michael Powers with an average of 15 points per match. The team worked together to correctly answer 73 bonus questions for a total of 730 points.

LHS Quizbowlers will travel to the University of Missouri in Columbia on Friday, May 3 to compete at the MSHSAA State Scholar Bowl Tournament.

Only eight Class 2 teams in Missouri will advance to this level. The team will play three preliminary rounds at 10 a.m., 11 a.m., and at noon, 12 p.m.

The Bulldogs are matched up against Thayer High School, College Heights Christian High School, and Lone Jack High School for the prelims.

The results of the prelims will determine the final four teams for the afternoon. The top four teams will then play in a semi-final round at 2 p.m. and a final round at 3 p.m. to determine final placement.

Options For Women opened in May 2016 and serves pregnant women and fathers from Pike County and surrounding counties. Services include free pregnancy testing, limited first trimester ultrasounds, adoption referrals, abortion education, parenting education and material aid through an "I Am While You Learn" program, referrals for medical help, prenatal vitamins, referrals for temporary housing, post-abortion counseling, miscarriage grief support and recovery, a fatherhood group, and ongoing friendship and encouragement. Since opening,

in May of 2016, over 170 clients have been served. The center is sustained by the generosity of donors and community volunteers.

Participants in this year's Walk For Life will walk at their own pace and strollers are welcome. Family friendly activities in conjunction with the walk are a bounce house and face painting.

Food items including grilled hamburgers, porkburgers, hotdogs, fruit, and chips will be available from 11 a.m.-1:30 p.m. Carry-outs will be available for those not participating in the walk event.

In advance of the walk, participants are encouraged to ask friends, family, and co-workers for a donation to benefit the pregnancy resource center. Registration is available online at www.supportlife73.com.

Three Area Grads Among State Fair Youth In Ag Scholarship Winners

Missouri State Fair Director Mark Wolfe announced today that 42 youth, selected from Missouri 4-H and FFA State Fair exhibitors, will be awarded scholarships by the Missouri State Fair Youth in Agriculture (YIA) committee. These students are seeking higher education at a Missouri university/college, and will be recognized Friday, April 26, during the annual State FFA Convention in Columbia.

"We are proud to carry on the tradition of supporting higher education for Missouri agriculture youth year after year," Wolfe said. "Many supporters come together to support these young people and make these scholarships possible."

Scholarship applicants were evaluated in a variety of areas including Missouri State Fair participation, grade point average, community involvement and leadership roles. Since 1992, the YIA committee has awarded 648 scholarships totaling \$684,000.

The scholarships are funded through the generosity of Youth in Agriculture sponsors and buyers of the livestock sold during the annual State of Champions; the sponsors and buyers list is available online. A portion of each animal's sale price is allocated to the scholarship program. Support of the scholarship program is also provided through fundraising efforts including the Governor's Ham Breakfast, Mis-

souri Department of Agriculture's Annual Ag Golf Classic, Queen USA of SoLa, Missouri State Fair Foundation, Sydenstricker John Deere of Missouri/Sydenstricker Angus Genetics, and The Saint Louis Science Center.

Caidin Jeddika, of Konkhonko, has been selected to receive the \$5,000 platinum scholarship offered by YIA supporters.

Kaylee Nicole Lewis, of Chillicothe, has been selected to receive the \$2,500 supreme scholarship, sponsored by Sydenstricker John Deere of Missouri/Sydenstricker Angus Genetics.

Youth Turkey Hunters Harvest 2,540 Birds

According to preliminary data from Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC), young turkey hunters harvested 2,540 turkeys during the 2019 spring youth season, April 6 and 7. Top harvest counties were Franklin with 61 turkeys harvested, LaGrange with 56, and Texas with 52.

Warm weather and sunny skies helped increase this year's youth-weekend harvest over last year's where young hunters checked 1,729 turkeys.

Spring turkey hunting continues with the upcoming regular spring turkey hunting season April 15

MDC Urges Public To Avoid Planting Problematic Pear Trees

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) encourages homeowners and landscapers to avoid planting Callery pear trees this spring. Though these trees bear beautiful white flowers in the springtime, looks can be deceiving.

The Callery pear tree is often found for sale as Bradford pear, Cleveland Select, Autumn Blaze, or Aristocrat. It is a highly invasive species that multiplies quickly, flourishes in a variety of poor growing conditions, and reduces biodiversity by crowding out native Missouri plants.

The trees were introduced as ornamental landscape trees in the 1930s and became popular because they were inexpensive, grew relatively fast, and provided beautiful blooms. However, the species has since become notorious for its poor branch structure, cross-pollination problems, and that stinky smell.

"Different varieties of these ornamental pear trees were started close to each other, which allowed them to cross-pollinate and take over natural areas," said Forestry Field Program Supervisor Russell Hinmah. "But they're also a poor landscaping choice because they don't do well in storms, often losing limbs or splitting apart."

MDC urges Missourians to remove pear trees and plant native trees instead. "The best plan is to select species native to Missouri, and there are several great options," said Hinmah. "Serviceberry trees produce similar showy white blooms in the spring and have smaller



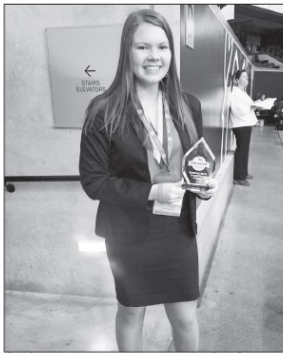

fruits that attract wildlife.

Other great alternatives include American plum, hawthorn, eastern redbud and Missouri's state tree, the flowering dogwood. Hawthorn provides beautiful fruit and attractive fall color.

Dogwoods thrive in shady areas but can be difficult to grow.

Avoiding Diseases Transmitted By Ticks, Mosquitoes

With warmer weather on the way, the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) wants to remind those living in and visiting the state to take precautions against tick and mosquito bites. Both can transmit serious and potentially deadly illnesses and these insects can be active anytime the ground is not frozen.

Missouri is home to a variety of tick species, meaning the state experiences a variety of tick-borne diseases. In 2018, Missouri reported 587 cases of Rocky Mountain spotted fever and 393 cases of ehrlichiosis. In the United States, 60 percent of cases of Rocky Mountain spotted fever are in five states, with Missouri being one. At least six different types of tick-borne diseases in humans have been reported in Missouri, including Rocky Mountain spotted fever, ehrlichiosis, tularemia, Lyme disease, Heartland virus and Bourbon virus. West Nile virus is the most common virus spread by mosquitoes in the United States. In 2018, 23 cases were reported in Missouri. Many of these illnesses can be effectively treated if they are caught early enough, on occasion they can be deadly.

Ticks can be found throughout Missouri, primarily in wooded and brushy areas, tall grasses, and close to the ground in leaf litter. Objects that collect water are the primary breeding ground for mosquitoes. Objects such as buckets, old tires, flower pots or clogged gutters are all items that can attract mosquitoes.

Flooding events can produce large amounts of mosquitoes. Historically, flooding events have not resulted in an increase in mosquito-borne disease illnesses reports. This is because the mosquitoes that emerge after flooding are not the same kinds of mosquitoes that transmit West Nile virus. Mosquitoes that emerge after flooding events are strong fliers and aggressive biters, but they are nuisance species that do not pose a significant disease risk.

Despite the presence of ticks and mosquitoes, everyone can safely enjoy the outdoors by taking a few safety precautions.

DHSS recommends the following precautions to prevent tick and mosquito bites:

- Use an insect repellent with DEET, picaridin or IR3535 as the active ingredient.

- For ticks, look for a product with at least 20 percent concentration of one of these active ingredients.

- Apply repellent to exposed skin for protection that lasts several hours when ever you spend time outdoors. DEET products should not be used on infants under two months of age. Always apply repellent products according to package instructions.

- When possible, wear protective clothing (light colored, long sleeved shirts and pants) when outdoors to keep ticks off skin and make it easier to see ticks that are crawling on clothing.

- Avoid areas including brushy areas, tall grasses, wood piles, and leaf litter. When hiking, stay near the center of trails to avoid ticks.

- Reduce ticks around your home by keeping lawns mowed short, shrubs and trees trimmed, and remove leaf litter, wood piles, fallen branches, trash and debris from yards.

- Reduce mosquitoes around your home by cleaning out gutters and remove anything in the yard that could hold standing water.

- Those with pets should talk with their veterinarian about use of tick prevention treatments. Regularly check pets for ticks.

- Check for ticks while outdoors and again after returning from the outdoors. If possible you should change clothes and shower soon after spending time outdoors.

- Preventing bites is the best way to avoid getting sick from any number of diseases that ticks and mosquitoes can carry. Just one tick bite can lead to serious illness. If you find an attached tick do not panic. The tick should be removed promptly. The longer it is attached, the greater the risk of infection. To remove ticks:

- Using tweezers, grasp tick near its mouth and as close to your skin as possible.

- Pull tick firmly straight out, away from skin. Do not jerk or twist the tick.

- Do NOT use alcohol, kerosene, liquid soap or petroleum jelly to remove a tick. Wash your hands and the bite site with soap and water after the tick is removed. Apply an antiseptic to the bite site.

- If bit by a mosquito, wash the site with soap and water. Anti-itch cream or an ice pack can alleviate pain or itching.

Everyone should be aware of the signs and symptoms of tick- and mosquito-borne diseases, which can vary among individuals and differ according to the disease. In general, a sudden high fever, severe headache, muscle or joint aches, nausea, vomiting or diarrhea can be signs of these types of diseases. Admittedly, a possible sign of tick-borne disease is a pus-filled wound that appears at the site of a tick bite, or a rash that follows a tick bite. You should consult your health care provider if experiencing these symptoms. If these symptoms occur following a bite, or even after exposure to a tick habitat, be sure to tell your health care provider.

MDC Encourages Public To Learn About Hummingbirds During Spring Migration

The ruby-throated hummingbird, the finest bird to nest in the Show-Me State, is a harbinger of spring. The Missouri Department of Conservation is inviting the public to learn more about these long-distance fliers as they begin to arrive during their spring migration.

"It's time to put out feeders! Hummingbirds will be here soon and their numbers will ramp up in the next few weeks," said MDC State Ornithologist Sarah Kendrick. "They have already been spotted in northern Arkansas and Tennessee."

The diet of a hummingbird consists of flower nectar, tree sap, and even small insects. Kendrick reminds Missourians who want to feed the small fliers that their sugar water does not need to be colored.

To make your own sugar water, mix one part sugar with four parts water and bring to a boil until dissolved. Cool the mixture before filling the feeder and re-saturate your water before it gets cloudy. Any extra sugar water can be stored in the refrigerator.

Ruby-throated hummingbirds spend winter in Mexico and Central America and start their spring migration north as early as March. To track their migration and report your hummingbird sightings, Kendrick recommends visiting Journey North at <http://journynorth.com>.

egg and eBird at <http://tinyurl.com/y4hez8>. Hummingbirds are not only fascinating to watch, averaging 55 wing strokes per second, but they also play an important role in the ecosystem.

"Hummingbirds are important pollinators for many plants that require a long-billed pollinator and they eat lots of insects," Kendrick noted. "And because of their small size, hummingbirds can end up as food for predators, such as

large insects, frogs, and other birds. Kendrick said growing native plants is a great way to help hummingbirds and other migratory birds.

DIY DO KNOW: The male ruby-throated hummingbird has a striking red throat called a gorget, but the female does not. These speedy birds often hover, but can also fly up and down and backwards. They have very short legs, so they can hardly walk.

State FFA Convention is April 25-26

FFA members from across the state will meet in Columbia, April 25-26, at the 11th Missouri FFA Convention to honor fellow members for outstanding achievements, conduct association business, elect new officers and participate in leadership workshops. For the first time, convention sessions will be viewable at <https://livestream.com/moderneffa>.

"Cultivate Tomorrow, Today" is the theme for this year's annual convention, which is expected to attract more than 8,000 students and guests to Heanes Center on the University of Missouri campus.

According to Missouri FFA Executive Secretary Keith Detschold, the state association will present State FFA Degrees to 760 members who, as a result of their agricultural and leadership achievements, have qualified for the state's highest FFA degree. Detschold also said Missouri has the largest number of American FFA Degree recipients of any state—518 Missouri FFA members received the American FFA Degree in 2018 during the national convention held in Indianapolis, Ind., in October.

During the convention the State Star Farmer, State Star in Agriculture, State Star in Placement and State Star in Agriculture will be named. In addition, 576 FFA members will receive awards in 48 agricultural proficiency areas for development of their supervised agricultural experience (SAE) program. The proficiency areas are varied and include production, management and communication disciplines. In Missouri, SAE programs during the 2017-18 school year generated more than \$52 million in student income.

FFA members also will participate in a number of organization program areas including speaking competition and career development events such as agricultural sales, floriculture, and livestock judging.

The Missouri FFA will present awards to several adults and groups for their support of agricultural education and FFA. This year 22 Honorary State FFA Degrees will be presented. An additional 16 honorary degrees will be presented to parents of retiring state officers.

The Distinguished Service Citation will be presented to Don Fuhrmann of Hillsboro, Fuhrmann started working as a lifeguard in 1978 at Missouri FFA Camp Rising Sun. His position grew to include boat mechanic, ski instructor, lifeguard trainer, boating instructor and waterfront supervisor. Fuhrmann

taught at Hillsboro High School for 32 years. He also coached football, wrestling and track. After retiring in 2005, he continued to work with the wrestling program and was recently honored with the Hillsboro Wrestling Tournament being renamed the Don Fuhrmann Duels.

During the convention Missouri FFA President Paxton Dahner, Nevada FFA Chapter member, will lead 694 delegates in official business sessions. Each chapter is represented by two delegates.

Four FFA chapters will be chartered during the Thursday evening session. The new chapters are Oak Ridge, Valley Caledonia, Newburg and East Carter.

During the first general session Thursday afternoon, Christopher R. Daubert, vice chancellor and dean of the University of Missouri College of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources, Columbia, will welcome convention attendees. Prior to joining MU in August 2017, Daubert was at North Carolina State University, Raleigh, North Carolina, where he served as a professor and head of the Department of Food, Bioprocessing and Nutrition Sciences, director of the Food Biotechnology Laboratory, and system co-chair of Food, Biochemical and Engineering Systems. Daubert has served as editor-in-chief of the Journal of Texture Studies, is on the editorial board of the Journal of Food Process Engineering and is a fellow of the Institute of Food Technologists. He has received distinguished alumnus awards from Pennsylvania State University, University Park, Pennsylvania, and Michigan State University, East Lansing, Michigan. He earned a doctorate in agricultural engineering and food science from Michigan State University.

National FFA Western Region Vice President Shea Boster, a member of the Band FFA Chapter, Bend, Oregon, will speak during the first session. In high school, Boster's SAE focused on hog production. He was the 2016-17 Oregon State FFA president. Boster is a sophomore at Oregon State University, Corvallis, Oregon, where he is studying agricultural business management. Boster's goals include being in a leadership-development or communications position with an agricultural company and eventually taking over his father's leadership-consultation company.

Boster was elected as a national officer in October during national convention. The six-person national officer team collectively will log more than 100,000 miles representing FFA

to top leaders in business, government and education. National officers also lead numerous personal growth and leadership training sessions, and promote agricultural literacy.

Also during first session, Missouri Director of Agriculture Chris Chinn will speak. Chinn, named to director January 2017, resides on his family farm in Shelby County with his husband and two children. The Chins have a farm-to-table fish-hog operation, a small cow-calf herd, raise corn, soybeans and alfalfa, and operate a family feed mill.

During the Thursday evening session, Missouri Commissioner of Education Marge Vandeven will address the convention. Vandeven joined the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education in 2005 as a supervisor of the Missouri School Improvement Program before becoming the director of Accountability Data and School Improvement, an assistant commissioner in the Office of Quality Schools and as deputy commissioner of the Division of Learning Services.

She was appointed commissioner of DESB by the Missouri State Board of Education in December 2014 and served until December 2017. She was reappointed in January 2019. Vandeven earned a bachelor's degree from Missouri State University, Springfield, and a master's degree from Loyola University Maryland, Baltimore, Maryland. She earned a doctorate from Saint Louis University, Saint Louis, Missouri. Vandeven has been recognized by Missouri State University and Saint Louis University as a distinguished alumna.

During the Friday evening final session, Vietnam Veteran and Purple Heart Recipient Dave Roever of Fort Worth, Texas, will share a story of survival and inspiration. At the height of the Vietnam War, he joined the U.S. Navy and served as a river boat gunner in the elite Brown Water Black Beret. Then tragedy occurred. Today, Roever travels the globe, speaking at national conventions, public schools and to U.S. military audiences, including in war zones. Since 2007, Roever and his team have run Operation Warrior RECONnect at the two Eagle Summit Ranches near Westfield, Colorado, and Junction, Texas.

The Missouri FFA Association has 25,775 members, ranking sixth as a state in membership. FFA strives to make a positive difference in the lives of students by developing their potential for premier leadership, personal growth and career success through agricultural education.
