Clopton Grad Named To Coaching Hall Of Fame

Nothing good comes easily and never stop learning.

Those principles have guided Steve Frank for almost 40 years as a successful basketball player and coach. The 1985 Clopton High School graduate recently was inducted into the Missouri Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame—a fitting tribute to a career that will soon be sealed back a bit.

"This was such a special feeling as a coach to receive such an honor, solidifying all the long hours and mentally draining days you put in as a coach," said Frank, who turns 52 this year. "I have coached for 28 years, and have enjoyed and loved every moment of it. The relationships you build along the way are

priceless, and getting to watch young people grow and become successful young adults I have taught and coached are why I love my job."

GREAT START

Frank's talent was apparent from the moment he picked up a ball. But he also showed a lot of smarts in absorbing the lessons of those around him. His father, Bob, was a winning Clopton coach, and his mother, Linda, was the rock he could count on.

"My father was a no-nonsense person," Frank recalls. "It was all about working hard and never being complacent. There was always something to work on to keep getting better. My parents were my backbone and helped lay the corner-

stones not only in coaching, but how to be a good father and husband. They taught me hard work, to treat everyone with respect and always remain humble."

Bob Frank said his son knew the value of hard work early on.

"He started driving a hay truck when he was too little to reach the pedals," Bob said. "He steered on his knees in the seat and would slide under the steering wheel to push on the clutch and brake. Then, he would jump back up to see to steer. He continued baling and hauling hay to help with his college expenses."

Linda Frank admires her son for his unselfishness, faith, fortitude and compassion.

AmeriCorps Helps Flood-Beleaguered Clarksville

They stack sandbags, check pumps and fill needs that arise.

They came to Clarksville from across the nation — and one from England — to sleep on cots in an abandoned building and help strangers in a town whose name was unfamiliar until the call went out.

Crews of young people from AmeriCorps are part of the flood fight in Clarksville. The federally-funded program suppletes workers who offer assistance with disaster relief and education, environmen-

tal, community and public safety projects.

"I enjoy the service of it," said 24-year-old Matt Farrington, a native of Virginia and a geological science graduate of James Madison University. "We don't see it as work. We're out here to help."

"I love it," added 24-year-old Florida native Nicholas Oberfrank. "This is a unique experience. It's a good way to spend time — serving others."

Members receive a stipend, living

expenses and time off, but the work is far from easy. A lot of time is spent away from home. Drawbacks aside, participants say it's rewarding.

Twenty-seven-year-old Kenan Ender of St. Louis has been with AmeriCorps for five years, and has been involved with floods, fires, tornadoes, hurricanes and ice storms. He wouldn't trade the experience.

"It's part of a service ethic — trying to give back to folks and do some positive impact," he said.

Antioch Presbyterian Church 'The Mother Of Churches'

The Presbyterian General Assembly and New England Congregationalist agreed on a plan of Union to plant churches in the backcountry. In 1801, the Protestant Revival sent waves of camp meetings throughout the South and Midwest giving rise to the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in 1810.

In the spring of 1819, the Ladies Missionary Society of Kentucky requested the Cumberland Presbytery to send the Rev. Robert D. Morrow on a preaching tour through the Missouri Territory. His salary was \$25 per month. He had to make his own appointments and "blaze his own way." He started a church, Antioch, and laid the cornerstone of Scott's Spring in 1819 in the home of John Scott and Robert Fullerton.

In 1821, the first camp meetings

were at the location of the present Antioch Church. For a number of years, it was held at different locations, such as Auburn, Buffalo, Ashley, and Madisonville in the surrounding area, when at last it became a fixture for the Antioch Church. Yearly meetings were held in August, and the people gathered from all sections of the county coming from hundreds of miles. They would bring the whole family and provisions for carrying for days or weeks at a time. Hundreds and thousands were converted and went back to their homes to form the nucleus for many of the churches of Pike, Lincoln, Montgomery, and Ralls counties. This is how Antioch became known as the "Mother of Churches" within the bounds of Sak River Presbytery.

"As a toddler, he fought for his life as he battled through encephalitis," she said. "Then, he met the struggles of 'growing up,' of school and came to the aid of his grandparents, his sister and his partner through many challenges of life. In the midst of his responsibilities, he could always be counted on to be beside whoever needed him. I'm thankful that Steve has been blessed with many people who have had a loving, positive influence in his life, and that he has had opportunities to share that with many others. As a mother, I am so thankful to see him living his life as a loving, respected husband, father, son and brother, along with adroitly giving so much of himself for others."

Frank had the fortune to play for legendary Clifton basketball guru Dale Miller, who was inducted into Hall of Fame in 2014. The Hawks finished second in the state in 1983 and 1984, and took third in 1985. "As a player, Steve was the nucleus of our teams in 1984 and 1985," Miller recalls. "Almost as important to our success as his talent was his outstanding work ethic and dedication to the game. He made all of his teammates better. As a coach, the past four years at Stratford speak for itself. You can't write a better story."

Miller is particularly impressed with Frank's "ability to teach the value of hard work and dedication to the game" while instilling a sense of honor.

"It is easy to display good sportsmanship and teamwork when you always win," he said. "Not all teams do that! Steve was humble; he gave his team all the credit. He respected his opponents and set the example for great sportsmanship for his teams, school and community."

The state tournaments were a big deal for a small, rural school such as Clifton. Frank says Miller "was an inspiration for me, and I modeled a lot of my coaching philosophy after him. The memories will last a lifetime, and I would use those years playing on those great teams as a basis in my coaching career."

Frank spent two years playing for Steve Tapscott at East Central Community College in Union before finishing at College of the Ozarks in Harrison under Al Waller, who retired in 2015 after working at the college for 37 years.

"Coach Waller had a huge influ-

ence on me and my coaching career," he said. "I served as his student assistant for two years as I finished up my classes. During this time, I really grew and matured in my philosophy and mindset."

Though he played for the Bobcats only two years, Frank finished fifth overall in rebounding and sixth in all-time scoring. He still has the highest shooting percentage for a season at 69 percent and is second in free throw percentage at 83 percent. An induction into the College of the Ozarks Hall of Fame came in 2007.

SILEX & BEYOND
The first nine years of Frank's coaching career were with boys' teams at Hollister and Silos.

He guided the Owls to the Lincoln County school's first boys' district championship. In 1999, Frank switched girls and began coaching girls at Conroy High School. He also did a stint at Seymour before arriving at Stratford, a town of more than 2,300 residents along Interstate 44 just outside of Springfield.

The Lady Indians won four consecutive state Class 3 championships from 2016 to 2019. Frank and his wife, Mona, go to watch their twin daughters, Hayley and Kayley, as part of those teams.

"Being able to experience and share these last four years with my kids and to win four straight state championships with them at my side was a Dad's dream," he said. "I would not trade the time spent with my daughters for the world. They have compiled a 129-3 career record over their four years in high school, and we are on a current state record winning streak of 115 games straight to this point. They have finished the last two seasons ranked in the top 25 in the Nation USA Team Poll, finishing this year at 13th in the nation in the final poll. That makes you very proud as a father and coach."

Frank's overall career record is 533 wins and 179 losses. Other accolades include coaching 14 college players, a two-time Gatorade Player of the Year, a three-time Max Prep All American, a Wendy's Missouri Heisman Player of the Year, 14 district championship, 61 all-district players and 12 all-state players. He was named Missouri Class 3 Coach of the Year in 2016, 2017, 2018 and 2019, and received the National Federation of State High School Associations' 2017-2018 Midwest Section Coach of the Year award in 2018.

"Since he started coaching, I've observed his work ethic grow stronger as he has spent many extra hours beyond practicing and preparing his team by watching films,

games and opponents, then developing strategies to meet the challenge," Job Frank said. "Steve always seems to know and take care of whatever needs to be done on and off the court. His success has resulted from hard work and perseverance, and many long days beyond regular hours doing all he felt able to do to be successful."

The honors are appreciated, but Frank finds his greatest pleasure in passing along the fundamentals of the game.

"Oh or than losing, the toughest thing about coaching is getting the kids to understand the short window of time they have to be the best they can possibly be in sports and school," he said. "As a young age, many get caught up in things that keep them from excelling and meeting their full potential. It's always years later when they realize the opportunity they had and always come back and say 'Coach, you were so right. I wish I would have listened to you then.'"

The gratification of knowing he has passed along the traits of discipline, tenacity and teamwork in making a difference is a reward in itself.

"Besides winning, this is one of the most satisfying things as a coach you can get," Frank said. "It reinforces everything you teach and stand for as a coach."

Frank plans to continue teaching and coaching fall and spring sports at Stratford. But he's hanging up his basketball coach's whistle to watch his girls play college ball. Hayley is going to the University of Missouri and is already talking about a coaching career. Kayley will attend her Dad's alma mater, College of the Ozarks, but is undecided on a major. "I'm looking forward to watching them as they move forward into the next phase of life," he said.

AS THE BALL BOUNCES

Once the girls graduate, Frank is leaving his options open.

Given his winning record, that's something which should strike fear into every other coach across Missouri. "I will re-evaluate my situation and decide if I want to go back into coaching basketball again or retire all together," Frank said. "Whatever the case may be, I have had a great career and worked with a lot of great people. I couldn't have had a more fulfilling career."

Twenty-four-year-old Jane Kersch graduated from Iowa State University in 2016 with a degree in political science and sustainability. The Dubuque native was keeping an eye on flooding in Davenport while chocking pumps in Clarksville.

United Methodist Church is feeding AmeriCorps workers and dozens of other volunteers who come to help each day. Last Friday, 175 lunches were served. One day it pulled pork and smoked chicken sandwiches. The next it's mostaccioli with garlic bread and green beans. Farrington calls it "the best food I've eaten during a disaster."

Ender sores in Clarkville what he's witnessed in other places where trouble has erupted — something he calls a "community effect" in which people pull together and take care of what needs to be done.

"It's not anything anyone can do on their own," he said. Farrington says that no matter how far he roams with AmeriCorps, there are always sights and sounds he remembers at each stop. During

a hurricane recovery in Puerto Rico, a faith-based group he came across provided inspiration by dancing and singing.

"It was a sight to behold," Farrington said. Bruce Bailey headed up the 15-member AmeriCorps emergency response team that came from St. Louis May 2. Some members went home May 5, but Bailey said the program will still provide services until it believes Clarkville has adequate protection.

That could be a while. The river crested overnight Saturday. But after hearing dire predictions of more rain this week, officials agreed Sunday afternoon to raise the sandbag wall protecting the downtown by two feet. In addition, Raintree Arts Council is working on plans to move the Missouri Show-Me Chili Cook-Off — originally scheduled for June 8 in Clarkville — to Louisiana as part of the Ribs on the River event June 21-22.

AmeriCorps members know at some point they'll leave Clarkville and eventually the agency. However, they are certain they won't stop being selfless. "Joining this program has really opened my eyes," Farrington said. "It's a life-changing experience."

Bob Jenne Awarded Almost \$800,000

Robert (Bob) Jenne, the former city administrator and interim police chief for the City of Louisiana, has been awarded almost \$800,000 after filing suit following his dismissal.

Among Jenne's claims were age discrimination, retaliation and unlawful removal from office. While Jenne did not win on all claims, a jury found in his favor on his dismissal and retaliation.

Named in the suit was the City of Louisiana.

Louisiana, former mayor Bud Niecher and members of the city council.

Jenne did not win punitive damages, but received a judgment of \$188,000 for compensatory damages for retaliation, salary of \$78,000, front pay of \$32,000, attorney fees of \$279,730 and over \$7,000 in court costs.

The case went to court in October last year for a four-day jury trial. The city may decide to appeal the decision.

The campground was elevated above the spring, on the East side of a little valley. An altar with an altar was built for protection with a log church on North side and surrounded by small cabins that various families used yearly when attending. These cabins usually had two rooms, one for men and boys and one for women and children and bedding of branches or hay. Often stayed in their wagons or camped out, bringing supplies for the duration. The surrounding timber provided room for the large crowds numbered by the thousands and hiking paths for the horses.

and vicious characters assembled. Hucklebers, by law, set up wagons one mile from the meeting grounds to sell refreshments and other goods. On the West side of the creek the area became known as "devil's campground." Here assembled, the crowds of loafers, uninvited in five and six meetings. There was a strong sentiment in the community against camp meetings, on account of the vicious elements that were attracted to the grounds. But many thought the good accomplished out weighed the evil.

In 1859, the camp meetings were abandoned because of the fact that the county was becoming more thickly settled, churches being built and the crowds were so large as to be unmanageable. While the camp meetings were abandoned, the protracted meeting was continued at the same time of year until the Civil War began in 1861.

History Of The Graduation Cap



While many aspects of graduation ceremonies have evolved over the years, the graduation cap has remained a hallmark of such ceremonies.

Graduation ceremonies are a tradition that dates back to the first high schools and universities. While many aspects of graduation ceremonies have evolved over the years, the graduation cap has remained a hallmark of such ceremonies.

Graduation caps are one of the most visible aspects of graduation dress. Many scholars believe the mortarboard style cap graduates don was developed from the hennin, a similar-looking Italian hat worn by Roman Catholic clergy. In the 12th and 13th centuries, students and teachers typically wore clerical clothing because the church was

highly influential at this time. Medieval universities helped inspire academic dress, including the familiar

graduation cap. Mortarboards are shaped like a square, perhaps to give them a scholarly appearance like a book or to represent the shape of a quail on the campus of England's Oxford University, where many graduation dress customs are believed to have originated. Others theorize that the mortarboard, which is named after the flat board used by bricklayers and masons, represents the skill of a mason workman.

Many graduation caps were initially black or gray. According to the graduation information site Graduation Source, when color photography became the norm in the 20th century, schools began to use gowns and caps in different shades because they would show up in photographs. Schools often coordinate caps and gowns so their colors reflect their official school colors.

While certain degrees warrant dif-

ferent styles of gown, cowls and hoods, mortarboard caps are relatively standard.

In addition to the cap, there is a single button at the top. Tassels hang from these buttons. At commencement, tassels are traditionally worn on the right side of the cap and then

moved to the left once graduates receive their diplomas.

Graduation caps are part of the larger scope of academic dress that comprises school traditions. Millions of graduates across the globe will don their caps and toss them into the air later in celebration of hard work.

Tips To Pay Off Student Debt Early

Recent college graduates may be entering the job market with degrees in tow, but many also are leaving school with sizable amounts of student loan debt. According to a 2017 report from the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, student loan debt rose for the eighteenth consecutive year, while Debt.org reports that student debt in the United States totaled \$1.4 trillion in 2017. Canadian students are not faring much better than their American counterparts, owing an average of \$28,000 after four years according to the Canadian Federation of Students. Student loan debt is a heavy burden that has short- and long-term effects on borrowers. Similar student loan debts may affect young professionals' ability to support themselves, while the Federal Reserve Bank of New York reports that each debt has contributed to a decline in the housing market, as fewer college graduates can afford to buy homes while still in their 20s.

The notion of paying off their student loans before they reach maturity may seem implausible to some borrowers. But there are a handful of ways for adults with sizable student debts to do just that.

• Make more frequent payments. Many homeowners pay their mortgages off early by making bi-weekly payments. Doing so means they will make 26 half-payments, or 13 full payments, each year as opposed to the 12 full payments made by homeowners who pay on a monthly schedule. The same approach can be applied to student loans. That extra annual payment each year can gradually chip away at loan balances, helping borrowers pay

loans off before they reach maturity.

- **Prioritize paying off high-interest loans.** Many students finance their education by taking out multiple loans. If these loans come with different interest rates, borrowers should pay off the highest interest loans first to reduce the amount they're spending on interest. Borrowers will still need to make minimum payments on other loans, but any extra money they intend to pay each month should go toward paying down the high-interest loans.

- **Refinance loans.** Many recent college graduates do not have lengthy credit histories, and some might be carrying low credit scores. Once such borrowers have shown that they can consistently make payments in full and on time, they can approach their lenders to refinance their loans in the hopes of getting a lower interest rate reflective of their creditworthiness. Refinancing may only be available to borrowers with private loans, but this strategy can save student debt holders a lot of money over the life of their loans.

- **Take advantage of offers from lenders.** Some lenders may reduce interest rates for borrowers who agree to certain terms, such as signing up to receive e-statements or enrolling in automatic payment programs in which money is deducted directly from a borrower's bank account on the same day each month. The savings created by such offers may seem insignificant each month, but can add up over time. Paying off student loan debts early can be done, even for borrowers whose debts are tens of thousands of dollars.

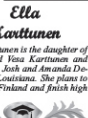

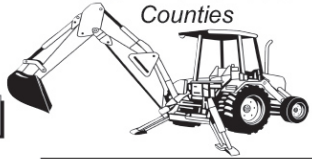
